Fine Rains Soak Dry West Texas Area

Noah Pruitt, Jr. Named Acting Postmaster Here

Earth-soaking rains have fallen over West Texas and this area for the past five days, bringing smiles and renewed hope for a good year on farms and ranches.

Old timers say this has been the wettest February they have seen in many years.

Rain gauges in Bronte showed 1½ inches of rain since it began falling last weekend. East of town, Clifford Clark reported 1.6 inches, while south of him, Don Edmiaston had 1 inch. Closer in to town, Taylor Emerson had 1.41 inches. The rainfall was lighter north of town, where F. S. Higginbotham and Jesse Parker both reported .7 inch. South of town, C. E. Arrott reported better than 2 inches and A. N. Rawlings had 1.7 inches at his ranch.

Those who know moisture problems in this area say that this rain will be especially beneficial

because of the wide area it has covered. The rain belt has covered the area from the Big Bend section on the West and extending eastward over the entire state. Of special importance was the slowness of the rain and very little runoff was noted.

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said the rainfall was the most encouraging for the breaking of the drouth in Texas since 1950.

Weather forecast Thursday called for a break-up of the clouds which have engulfed the area for almost a week.

Noah Pruitt, Jr. will take over today as acting post master in Bronte. He will replace Mrs. Mary Ruth Stevens, who has held the position since March 31, 1956.

E. E. English, postal inspector of San Angelo, made the announcement of the change Thursday when he was in Bronte.

Mrs. Stevens will remain as clerk in the local post office, a position she has held since Sept. 1955.

English said he will be in Bronte Friday to give the necessary ex-

planations and instructions to Pruitt, who will actually take over when the post office opens Saturday morning.

Pruitt has been in the grocery business with his father, Noah Pruitt, Sr., and formerly with his brother, Francis Pruitt, since 1946. The store will continue under the management of Noah Pruitt, Sr.

Pruitt served 33 months in the army, with more than two years of that time being in the Pacific theater of operations during World War II. He is a graduate of Bronte High School and a member of the Kickapoo Baptist Church. He is married to the former Dorothy Fay Scott. They have one daughter, Norma Lynn, who is five years old.

Mrs. Stevens, who has a permanent civil service rank as clerk, took over as acting postmaster when J. A. (Jap) Stephenson resigned last year. Stephenson replaced Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, who served several years in that capacity.

The Bronte post office is a second class office, which means its annual gross receipts run in excess of \$8,000 per year.

City Election Called; Deadline For Filing Saturday, March 2

Officials of the City of Bronte have announced that an election will be held April 2 for the purpose of naming two councilmen. The terms of Bob Wilson and Paul

McGuire expire this year. The election is held each year on the first Tuesday in April.

Anyone who wishes to run for one of the councilman jobs is required to file his name with the city secretary 30 days before the election, which would be March 2.

Neither McGuire nor Wilson has indicated whether or not he will seek re-election to the council. McGuire is completing his third term on Bronte's governing board while Wilson is completing his first term. City officials are elected for two years. The councilman positions pay \$5.00 per month.

Any qualified voter who resides within the city limits of Bronte is eligible to run for the office.

Holdover city officials whose terms expire in 1958 include Mayor Ernest Ivey and Councilmen Charlie Boecking, Bill Thomas and Ben Oglesby.

Members of the 1957 Bronte senior class were given Kuder Preference Tests Monday. Purpose of the tests, which were given by representatives of San Angelo College, is to determine occupational preferences of the students. Principal Joe Simpson said the college representatives were very complimentary concerning the results.

Red Cross Drive Starts Next Week

H. A. Springer, chairman of the Coke County Chapter of the American Red Cross, said this week that the annual Red Cross drive for funds will get underway next Friday, March 1. Coke County's quota for this year is \$1,138.

Claude Word is fund chairman for the east side of the county. He will be assisted by I. C. Oden. A fund chairman for Robert Lee and the west side had not been secured up to Thursday. However, Mrs. Sam Powell will be in charge of soliciting funds in the Robert Lee school.

Of the amount raised in Coke County, 36.47 per cent remains in the county for local use and 63.53 per cent is remitted to the area office. Any funds raised above the quota are split 50-50, half going to the area office and half remaining in the county.

Springer said Wednesday he hopes to get the drive over the top the first week of March. He urged the cooperation of everyone.

CHEST X-RAY NEXT FRIDAY

Plans are shaping up for the visit of the State Department of Health X-ray unit which will be in Bronte all day Friday, March 1. It will be located at the City Hall on Main Street.

The number of persons getting the x-ray will determine whether the machine will return to Bronte again. It was here about eight years ago and the turn-out was excellent.

Everyone in this vicinity is urged to have their chest x-rayed during the time the machine is in Coke County. It will be in Robert Lee later the same week. It will operate here from 8:30 a. m. until 5:00 p. m.

A spokesman for the State Health Department, who was in Bronte making advance arrangements, said they are particularly anxious that older persons take advantage of the x-ray unit, since most cases of lung disease, particularly tuberculosis, are found in persons over 55. A committee will be appointed to contact and provide transportation for older persons who may not have an automobile or other way to get to

Survey to Be Made of Persons Who Have Had Salk Vaccine

The Coke County Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced this week that the organization will take a census of everyone in the county below 50 years of age to determine how many persons have taken Salk vaccine shots.

The National Foundation is making a concerted effort to get everyone below 50 to take the shots. Figures show that approximately 20 percent of the country's population have had the shots and that polio was decreased by about 30 per cent. By figuring the same ratio, officials of the foundation believe if they can get 80 per cent of the people in the U. S. to take the shots, they will be able to completely wipe out the disease.

Marvin Corley and J. P. Arrott have already taken on the job of making the survey in Precinct No. 4, which includes Tennyson community and all the area in the east part of the county which lies south of the Colorado River.

Plans are in the making to get someone to take the census in the Bronte area and in the west part of the county.

Plans are underway, after the survey is completed, for the Coke County Chapter to provide free shots for everyone up to 20 years of age who has not already had them.

A spokesman for the local chapter said the purpose of the survey is to get an accurate count, so the National Foundation will know just how many persons have had the shots, and to insist that everyone under 50 take them.

Free shots have been provided by the Bronte Hospital since the vaccine first became available, for everyone who could not afford to pay for them.

It is hoped the census campaign will greatly increase the number of persons who take advantage of the vaccine.

- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 1/2 cup nuts

Mix together, roll out in small balls and place on ungreased baking sheet. Flatten slightly with a fork. Cook in a moderate oven about 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about 40 cookies.

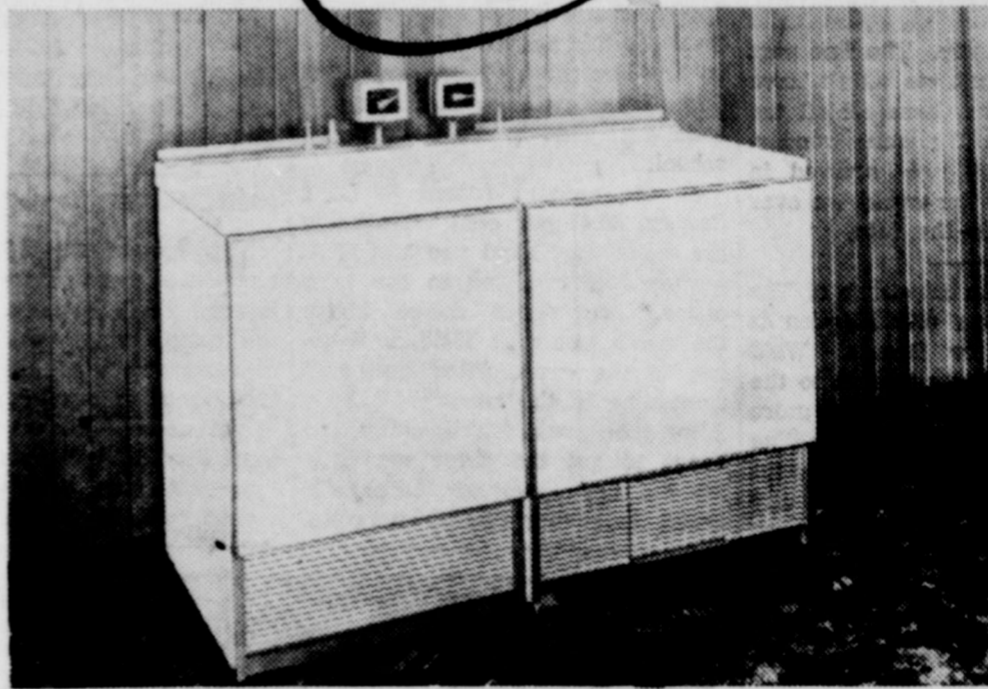

Early Shopping For Inspection Stickers Urged

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, prevailed upon Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year in an effort to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers at the close of the 1957 motor vehicle inspection period. The deadline is April 15.

On information received from George W. Busby, chief of the department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, the state police director said only one-third of the state's four million vehicle owners have obtained their 1957 inspection stickers to date. He urged motorists to have their cars and trucks inspected now, as a means of saving time for themselves and to avoid a last minute congestion at inspection stations throughout Texas.

Last year, as was true in most preceding years, vehicles overcrowded inspection stations during the last week of the inspection period. More than a million auto-

mobiles were caught in the last minute rush, resulting in a loss of even more millions of man-hours for the owners of those vehicles.

Garrison called upon the motoring public to adopt a "shop early" policy in this year's inspection program as a means of saving time and to afford better convenience for the vehicle owners involved.

Coke County residents may get their inspection stickers at Ivey Motor Co. or Vaughan Chevrolet Co. in Robert Lee, or at Home Motor Co., Bronte Motor Co. or Capertn Chevrolet Co. in Bronte.

School Board Buys Vehicles, Hears Reports

Members of the Bronte School Board in a meeting Thursday night, Feb. 14, approved the purchase of a 1951 Chevrolet station wagon and a Minneapolis-moline tractor equipped with mower and grading attachment. The board also heard a report from the architect on condition of the new elementary school building.

The station wagon was purchased from the Texas Surplus Properties of San Antonio for \$94.50. It will be used as a small school bus by various departments of the school when only a few persons need to be transported.

The board voted to make application for two new school buses, thereby assuring that the school will be successful in acquiring at least one new bus by the next school year. The application is made to the State Board of Control for School Transportation.

The tractor, which is medium size, will be equipped with equipment for mowing and grading. It will be used mainly to maintain

the school grounds, and will be kept by the vocational agriculture department.

The tractor cost the school \$140.69, which is about seven per cent of the \$1984.20 value set by the Texas Surplus Agency. Some more surplus property purchased included teachers lounge furniture, reading desks for the third and fourth grades and various materials for the science classes, vocational agriculture classes and the school clinic.

A report was given the board on the one-year new building inspection made by a representative of the architectural firm, Wilson & Patterson, who supervised construction of the new elementary school. A few minor repairs were recommended to the bonding company, the Houston Fire and Casualty Co. One recommendation, the installation of a new school clock, has already been carried out by the sub-contractor, IBM Corporation of Lubbock.

As a whole the inspector said the building needed very little repair. As a rule, he said, most new buildings need more corrections than he found here.

The school board held a panel discussion relative to advocated consolidation of smaller schools in

Texas and how it might affect the schools in Coke County. Supt. Garland Black explained how the local high school for the past two years on the New State Recommended Accreditation Plan. This means the following courses are offered in the local school:

Four years of English; Four years of science; four years of mathematics; three years of history; four years of business courses and three years of vocational agriculture. It also means that the school has a librarian and a school nurse.

The nursery guaranteed all its plantings and the work is being done at a cost of something over \$500 to Coke County.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of Texas to be affixed this 15th day of January, 1957.

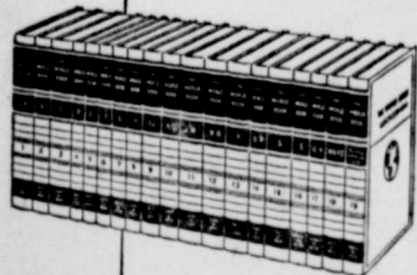

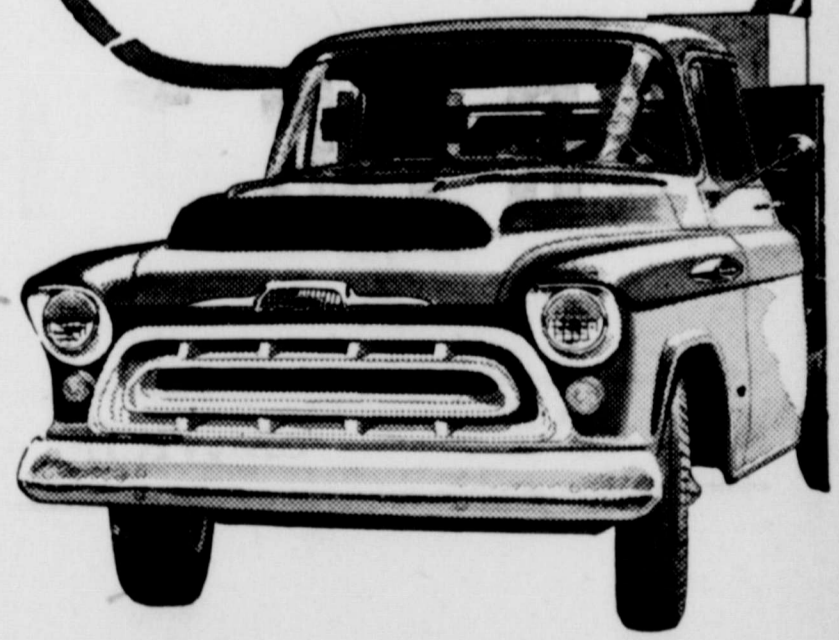
