Chest X-Rays To Be Given Here Today

Today (Friday) is the day the mobile x-ray unit of the State Health Department will be in Bronte. Free chest x-rays will be made at the city hall from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. Every person over 15 years old is urged to take advantage of the x-ray unit.

A committee will be on hand to assist in registering persons. Mrs. Ben Oglesby is chairman of the committee.

The number of persons getting a chest x-ray will determine whether the machine will be brought back to the county. It was here about eight years ago when over 1800 Coke Countians took advantage of the free service.

A representative of the State Health Department, who was in Bronte making advance arrangements, said they are particularly anxious for older persons to avail themselves of the x-rays, since most cases of lung diseases, particularly tuberculosis, are found in persons over 55 years old. The unit operates on the theory that if the unknown cases among adults are discovered, the source of infection for children is eliminated.

A committee has also been named to provide transportation for anyone who needs it to get to the city hall. A call to the city office, number 7, will get transportation.

The machine will be in Robert Lee Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning of next week.

Results of the x-rays are confidential information and will be reported only to the individual. In case the x-rays show that further examination is needed, the results will be reported only to the doctor chosen by that person.

The x-rays only take a few minutes, as it is not necessary to undress. They are available to all over 15 years of age.

The 1854 School Law provided for the first Public School System in Texas. As the years passed our laws were strengthened to make sure that all children of school age shared in this opportunity for public education. Today the importance of education is not a debatable subject. Our job is to see that children of this generation get the best possible education we can give them.

By visiting the schools and familiarizing ourselves with the problems of teachers and students, we become more competent to safeguard and advance the institution that is so American — the public school.

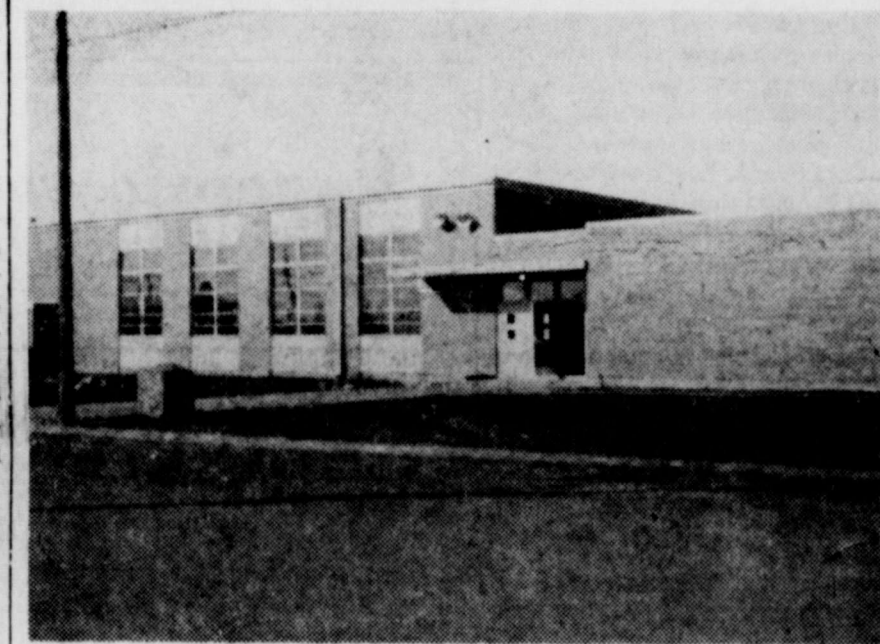
SPELLING BEE, TOO

Supt. Black urged everybody to attend the Monday night program. "This will give parents and others an opportunity to see just how the school functions and see the new building," he said, adding, "We want everybody in this community who is interested in the Bronte School to be present." A printed program will be given each person attending when he arrives.

The entire week of March 4-9 will be set aside for anyone who wishes to visit any class at school. "All classes will be open to visitors at any time, and the teachers will be glad to have you," Mr. Black said.

Lions Club Broom Sale Next Friday

Bronte Lions Club will sponsor a Broom Sale next Friday, March 8. The club is cooperating with the Texas Blind Shops Caravan in helping blind persons sell the merchandise.

The caravan will be in Bronte all day and probably will be located in the vacant area north of the post office.

In addition to helping the blind, Bronte Lions will receive 25 per cent of the gross sales for the day to use in their community projects here in this community.

Besides corn brooms, the caravan will have ironing board covers and pad combinations, attractive door mats and mops. All the merchandise is made by Texas Blind Workmen in Blind Shops or Lighthouses, which are non-profit organizations.

Officers of the Bronte Lions Club urged that everyone patronize the caravan, as assistance to the blind is one of the foremost projects of Lions clubs throughout the nation.

CHICKENS BOTHERING

Bronte's city council has been receiving complaints from local citizens the past several days about chickens running loose and scratching up flowers beds and gardens.

The council asked The Enterprise to issue a request asking owners to see that the birds are kept under fence. Bronte has city ordinances which prohibit livestock and poultry from running loose on the townsite. Council members said if the offense continues, measures will be taken to enforce the city laws.

Coke County Red Cross Drive Get Started; Quota Is \$1138

The annual drive for funds of the American Red Cross officially gets underway today, according to Claude Word, chairman of the drive for Bronte and the east side of the county.

County's quota is \$1,138. Quite a large number of workers have been lined up to carry out the drive in this area.

Mr. Word will be assisted by I. C. Oden in making the canvass of Bronte itself. Mrs. James Arrott, Mrs. Tom Williams and A. N. Rawlings have been selected to work the area south of the river, including the Tennyson community.

North of town, Conda O. Richards and A. J. Deans will work. J. T. Henry will work the Bronte school. Several other persons have volunteered to help with the canvass in Bronte. Cecil Kemp will serve as auditor.

A canvass of Bronte's business district is planned in the next few days, Mr. Springer said.

He added that he hoped all workers would do their soliciting early in the month in order to get the drive over with as soon as possible.

Mr. Springer said he had three workers lined up at Robert Lee but that a fund chairman is still needed in that area. Mrs. O. B. Jacobs, Mrs. B. W. Waldrop and Mrs. Sam Powell have agreed to help with the drive. Workers are also needed at Silver.

Springer Resigns As Chairman of Coke Red Cross

Red Cross Chairman H. A. Springer announced Wednesday that he is being forced to resign from the position because of his health. He told this reporter in his room at the Bronte Hospital, where he is being treated for a heart condition, that his doctors had advised him to give up all types of work possible. He said his condition is not thought to be serious, but "they said I'd better take it easy so it won't get that way."

Mr. Springer has been chairman of the Coke County Red Cross Chapter for about ten years.

What Are Our Building Needs In Texas Schools?

(Editor's Note: Below is a list of things that need to be done over the state to provide adequate educational facilities for the children of Texas. It might be interesting to check them against what has been done and what you think needs to be done in our local school.)

Replacement of obsolete school plants.

Enlargement of sites that are too small.

Modernization of old buildings.

Construction of new plants to accommodate an increasing scholastic population.

Buildings should be flexible and expandable.

Long range needs of the school should be considered.

Comfort, function, safety, and long-range maintenance problems of the school should be kept in mind.

The most important factor to be considered is the child's needs.

Further study of school building utilization, both on local and state level, would be helpful. Such a study should include consideration of the following possibilities:

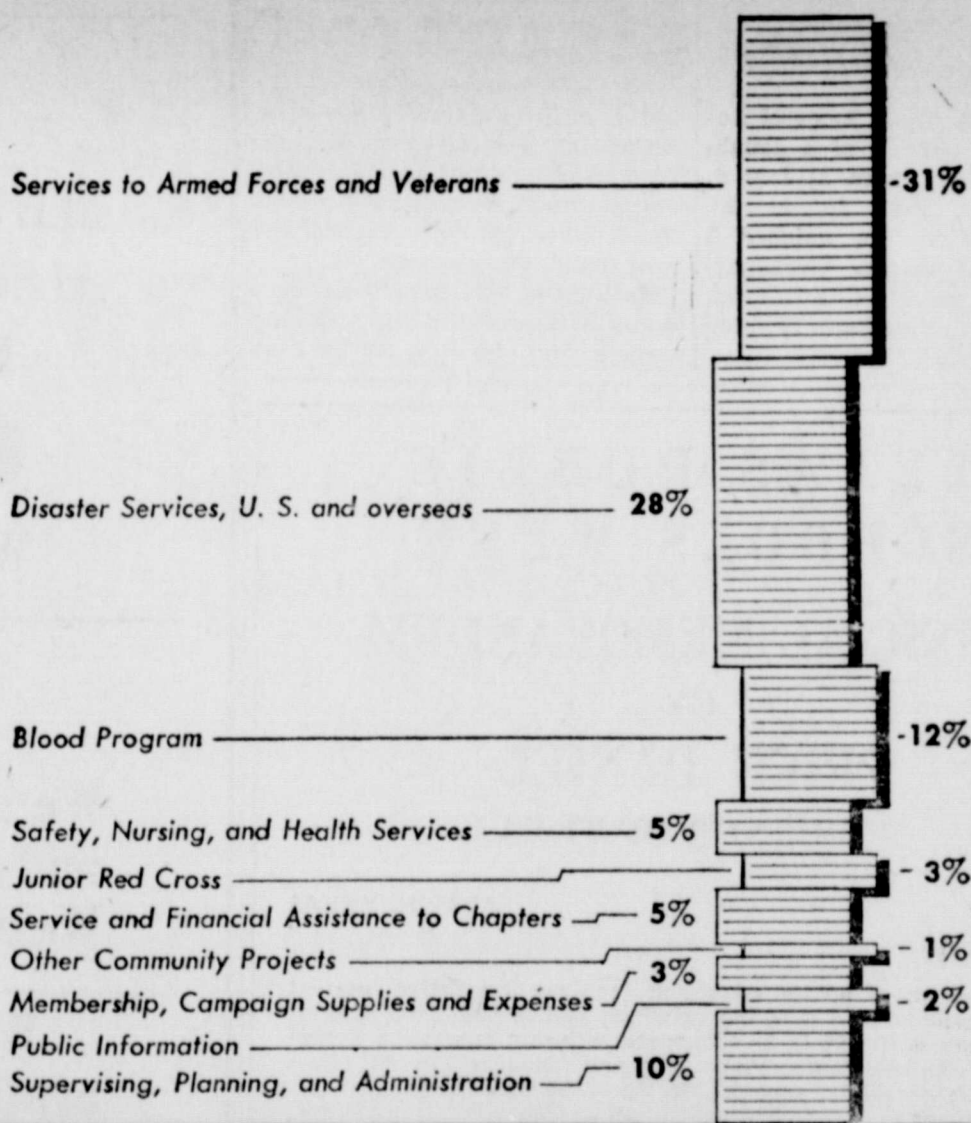

Two File for Jobs On City Council

Two Bronte residents have indicated they will run for the two vacancies which exist this year on the city council. Bob Wilson, who is now on the council, will run for a second term, and Matthew Caperton has allowed his name to be placed on the ticket.

Paul McGuire, the other councilman whose term expires this year, said he will not be a candidate for re-election. He has served three two-year terms on the city board.

Deadline for filing in order to have names printed on the ballot is Saturday, March 2. Any qualified voter who resides in the city limits of Bronte is eligible to

run for the offices. Those who wish to run should contact city secretary, Mrs. Helen Kirkland, and fill out the necessary filing forms.

The annual city election is held each year on the first Tuesday in April. This year the day falls on April 2. Laws of the state provide that all candidates file their names with the city secretary at least 30 days before the election.

Other members of the Bronte city council whose terms run until 1958 are Mayor Ernest Ivey and Councilmen Charlie Boecking, Ben Oglesby and Bill Thomas.

Trustee Election Set for April 6

An election to name three trustees for the Bronte School has been called for the first Saturday in April, which is April 6.

The terms of L. L. Wilkins, Luther McCutchen and Marvin Corley expire this year.

The election will be held at the city hall in Bronte and at the W. T. Green store at Tennyson.

Anyone who wants to run for one of the spots may have his name put on the ballot by filing it with Supt. Garland Black or at the Bronte Enterprise office.
