Considerable talk has been circulating about putting in a sewer system in Bronte. Everybody seems to think it's just what we need, except for the price tag that goes on it. The fact of the matter is that you have to pay for anything that's worthwhile. We think it would be worth the money, both from a personal standpoint and from a community standpoint.

We doubt very much if it would cost much more to pay off bonds for a sewer system than it costs to maintain the hundreds of cesspools and septic tanks in the city.

And, from a community standpoint, there can be no doubt that it would increase the desirability of this town as a place to live. First, it would improve health conditions immeasurably; second, we might have a chance to attract some small industries if we were able to provide them with a method of disposing of waste. A sewer system is just about as important to a manufacturer looking for a site as is the school system and water supply. They simply are not going to locate where there is no sewer system.

We'd like to know what you think about this matter and will welcome any letters you care to write to this paper regarding it. We might even print some of 'em. Be sure to sign your name to them.

School Trustee Election Called For April 6; Must File by 27th

Saturday, April 6, is the date for the school trustee election to be held in Bronte. Three vacancies on the local Board of Education will be filled in the election. Terms of L. L. Wilkins, Luther McCutchen and Marvin Corley are expiring this year. Two of the men, Wilkins and McCutchen, are filling unexpired terms of resigned members while Corley is winding out a full two-year term.

No announcement has been made by McCutchen and Corley as to whether they will seek re-election. L. L. Wilkins said that due to business reasons and lack of sufficient time to devote to the position, he would prefer not to be a candidate at this time. However, he said, that he was happy to have been able to fill out the unexpired term of Osmo Black, who resigned

when Mrs. Black was elected as school nurse.

Candidates for positions on the board must be submitted to Supt. Garland Black of County School Superintendent Jeff Dean by Mar. 27, which is 10 days prior to the election.

Balloting will take place in the City Hall at Bronte and at Tennyson at the W. T. Green store. D. K. Glenn will be presiding judge with Mrs. Otis Smith as election judge at Bronte, and Tom Green as election judge at Tennyson. Election judges will secure two clerks to help them, if needed.

Holdover trustees who have another year to serve, are J. B. Morrow, Hurlen Lee, Edward Cumbie and J. W. Teague. Teague was recently appointed to fill the unexpired term of T. F. Sims, Jr., who resigned.

LIONS BROOM AND MOP SALE TODAY

A mop and broom sale, sponsored by Bronte Lions Club, is being conducted today by the Texas Blind Shops Caravan. The Bronte Lions will receive 25 percent of the proceeds for local projects and the remainder will go to the blind persons who manufactured the merchandise.

On the caravan will be corn brooms, ironing board covers and pads, door mats and mops. They are made by Texas Blind Workers in Blind Shops or Light-houses. The Blind Shops are non-profit organizations and work for the rehabilitation of blind personnel.

The caravan will be located on main street and will be easy to find for those wishing to purchase the merchandise.

Annual Red Cross drive in the Bronte area has been going good this week, according to Claude Word, campaign chairman. He said that workers have been lined up and some soliciting has been done.

Auditor Cecil Kemp said that \$172.72 had been turned in to him.

Word said that he hopes to complete the drive within the next week or so. He urged that everyone turn in contributions to him or some other worker as soon as possible.

Mrs. Hurlin Lee, who is soliciting contributions in the south part of the area, completed her drive this week and turned in some \$45. She is the first of the Red Cross workers to complete their territory.

Workers have also been named on the west side of the county and it is expected they will be soliciting funds in the next few days.

New Grade School Dedication Held

"I believe that the greatest need of this age is the proper development of the youth of our land," said L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker and former chairman of the Bronte board of school trustees, who made the dedicatory speech for the new elementary school building. The dedication took place in the new school auditorium Monday night in a program which also observed Public School Week.

Youngblood pointed out the responsibility of teachers saying, "No school can be greater than its teachers, no program larger, no training better," and "the education of children is also a matter for the citizenship at large. Many of the children will finish their school work in Bronte and go out to earn their own way and rear families of their own. They are entitled to receive all this community and school can give."

He pointed out the tremendous strides in our economy, in our government, in our standard of living and in our schools during

the past 50 years. He disagreed with the common belief that people are getting worse as the years go by and said, "The greatest army on this earth that marches is the one that goes to Sunday School every Sunday."

Mr. Youngblood advocated a central school purchasing committee, standard high school affiliated credits and expressed the belief that schools today, as a rule, are placing too much emphasis on sports, saying he thought sports were a fine part of the school program but that "the tail shouldn't wag the dog."

He stressed strict discipline, the development of manners, honesty and good morals in students, and admonished parents to see that children take advantage of opportunities offered.

Rev. R. W. Blackmon, Kickapoo Baptist pastor, said the dedicatory prayer.

Supt. Garland Black opened the program with a welcome back to school to patrons. Two spelling contests were held with both students and the audience taking part.

Following the dedication speech adults were "taken back to school" and parents followed the routine of their children in an ordinary school day, with 10-minute class periods.

The new home economics department was also on display to the audience.

Five Persons Ill From Gas Fumes

Five members of the Church were hospitalized Tuesday after becoming ill while attending Ladies' Bible Study during the morning. None of their conditions was described as serious by Dr. John R. Harris, local doctor, and most were expected to be released on Thursday.

Hospitalized were Owen Cosgrove, minister, Mrs. Elmer Hudman, Mrs. H. A. Springer, Mrs. A. F. Wynn and Mrs. Lark Rogers. The first four named were admitted Tuesday morning and Mrs. Rogers was admitted later Tuesday.

The meeting was held in the new portion of the building where a gas heater was lighted. Members began feeling ill and Cosgrove dismissed the class early when he began to have a severe headache. Mrs. Cosgrove told the Enterprise that as members reached the fresh air, they fainted or became violently ill.

School principal Joe Simpson saw the need for help from the school next door and rushed to the scene. Dr. Harris was called and the four were taken to the Bronte Hospital. Twelve ladies were present and the others complained of headache and nausea.

It was believed the combination of fresh paint in the new part of the building and either escaping gas or lack of ventilation caused the illnesses.

Tuna-Macaroni Buffet

Arrange 2 cups cooked macaroni, 1 cup mushroom soup or 1 small can mushrooms, 1 tablespoon chopped onion, 1 can tuna in a casserole.

Put these in layers and pour the following sauce over it:

- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- 1 cup grated cheese.

Simmer milk, salt and mustard and add cheese until it melts, about 1 minute. Pour over casserole and bake in moderate oven for 20 minutes. If you prefer, noodles may be substituted for the macaroni.

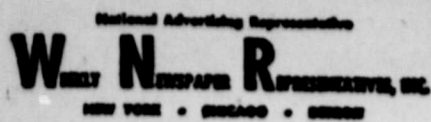

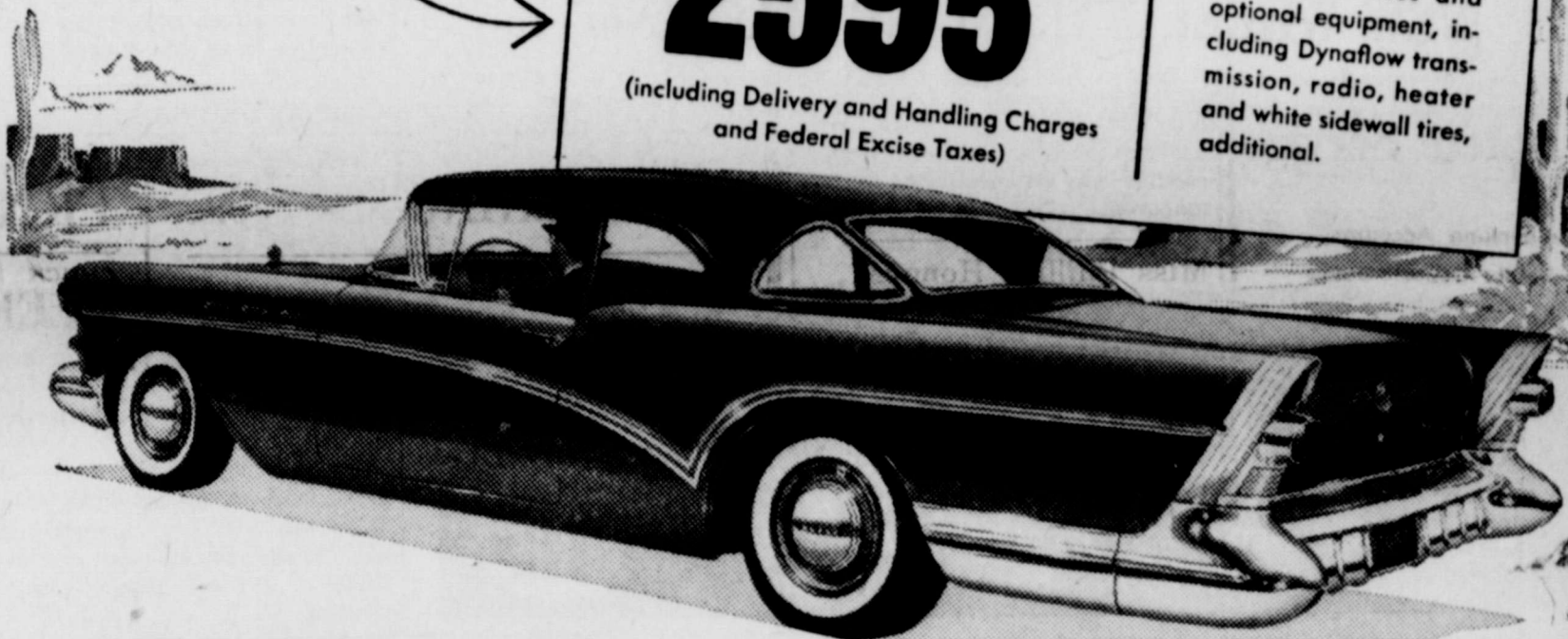

EIGHTH GRADE MAKES GRADUATION PLANS

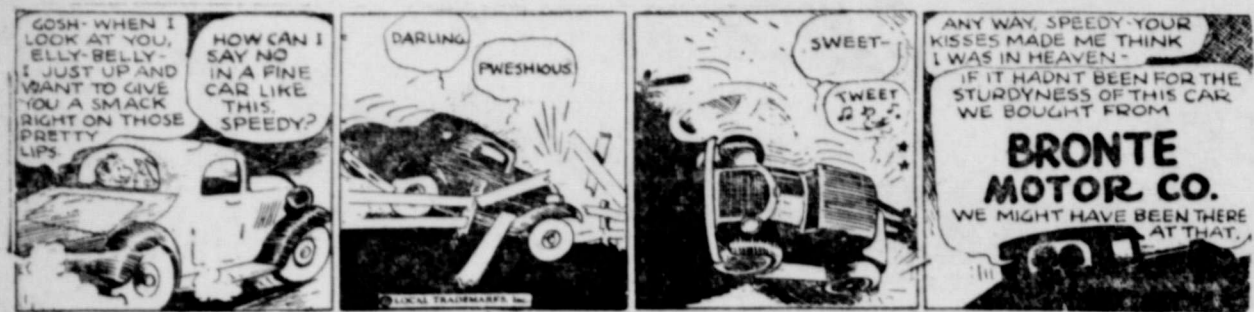

Funeral services were held in Moundville on Monday, Feb. 18.





Rabid animals are attracted by both movement and light. Be very careful when you go out at night. Rabid animals have no fear and they are extremely aggressive.
