Free Polio Shots Will Be Given Next Week In Coke County

Free polio shots for all persons under 20 years of age will be available to Coke County residents.

Robert Vaughan, chairman of the Coke County Infantile Paralysis Chapter, said a portion of the funds raised in the recent March of Dimes campaign, will be used in an all-out effort to get our people to take advantage of the Salk vaccine.

Arrangements have been made for free shots to be given from 3 until 5 p. m. next Tuesday and Thursday, April 16 and 18, at the John Harris Clinic. Free shots will also be given at Coke County Memorial Hospital in Robert Lee from 1 until 2 p. m. next Tuesday and Thursday.

Both Dr. John R. Harris of

Bronte and Dr. J. D. McDaniel of Robert Lee are offering their services free in this effort to get the entire county immunized.

A survey of the entire county has been completed on both sides of the county, and records show who and when persons received Salk shots, and the number of shots they have received.

Statistics are not complete for the county. However, it is apparent that a big percent of children in school have received the vaccine. The record for preschool children and those from 18 to 20 years old is not so encouraging.

Parents are urged to see that their children under 20 who have not had shots, be present at the clinic next Tuesday or Thursday.

Cancer Crusade Underway Now

A meeting at the school house Monday night inaugurated the 1957 Cancer Crusade here. Mrs. J. B. Mackey, chairman for the fund campaign on the east side of the county, has announced several benefits during the next two weeks which will be cancer fund benefits.

J. M. Rippetoe and C. E. Bruton have been appointed as a committee to make a canvass of the business district. On April 27, the Saturday before Easter, a giant cake will be auctioned off about 3:15 p. m., just before the merchant's drawing.

On Monday, April 29, the W. H. D. club here is planning a bake sale and waffle supper. The sale, to be conducted during the day, and supper, that evening, will be

held in the former Dot's Beauty Shop building on main street. Ladies of the town are urged to keep the date in mind and send pies or cakes to the sale, as well as plan their buying for that Monday.

More interest than usual is being evidenced in the county this year. In 1954 Coke County raised \$300; in 1955, the total was over \$400 and last year the county gave more than \$700. This year's quota is .600 and officials are hoping that the quota can be exceeded.

Runnels Co. Residents Hope To Build Big Lake on Colorado

Last Rites Held For Mrs. Sandusky, Former Resident

Funeral services for Mrs. Nellie Sandusky, 90-year old Merkel resident, were held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday in the Merkel Church of Christ with Claude C. Smith, minister, officiating. Burial was in the Rose Hill Cemetery, Merkel, under direction of the Starbuck Funeral Home.

Mrs. Sandusky died at noon Thursday, April 4, in the Bronte Hospital after an illness of two years.

She was the former Nellie Koger and was born March 26, 1867 in Kentucky. There she married the late E. S. Sandusky on Aug. 30, 1888.

They moved to Hunt County, Texas, in 1892 and lived in Ballinger and Bronte later. They came to Bronte in 1905 and moved to Merkel in 1915.

Survivors include one brother, Elijah Koger of Kentucky; six sons, Dewey, William and Eddie, all of Merkel, Jessie of Bromide, Okla., Elmer of Harrison, Ark., and Austin of Bronte; four daughters, Mrs. W. N. Watson of Duncan, Ariz., Mrs. L. W. Beaty of Bronte; Mrs. Annie Balckaby of Greenville, Mrs. Oralie Hines of Coolidge, Ariz.; 21 grandchildren, 28 great-grandchildren and 4 great-great-grandchildren.

Bronte will be at the back door of a huge lake if plans being made by Runnels County citizens go through.

Tentative plans are for the dam site to be located 14 miles west of Ballinger on the Colorado River. The proposed dam would create the largest lake in West Texas, up to 800,000 acre feet.

The project is being sponsored by the Runnels County Improvement District, which was created by the Texas Legislature. Officers of the organization include Ray Fuqua, chairman; John Brad-

ley, vice chairman; and Joe Simmons, secretary-treasurer.

Ballinger residents are particularly interested in the project for ever it is much too large for one city and finance and potential customers over West Texas are being sought by the board.

It was pointed out that such a project would use practically all of the now unused waters of the Colorado River. This lake would be the only one between Lake J. B. Thomas in west Scurry County and Lake Buchanan.

Much preliminary work remains to be done before any sort of estimate can be made as to the cost of the project. It is estimated it would run into millions, however.

The big lake would cover an estimated 20,350 acres. It would have an average depth of 40 feet and would be up to six miles wide. The 16-mile length would back water up beyond the bridge south of Bronte. Studies indicate that approximately 300,000 feet of water per year flow through the river in the vicinity of the damsite.

Roughly, the lake would be about the size of Possum Kingdom and Lake Buchanan.

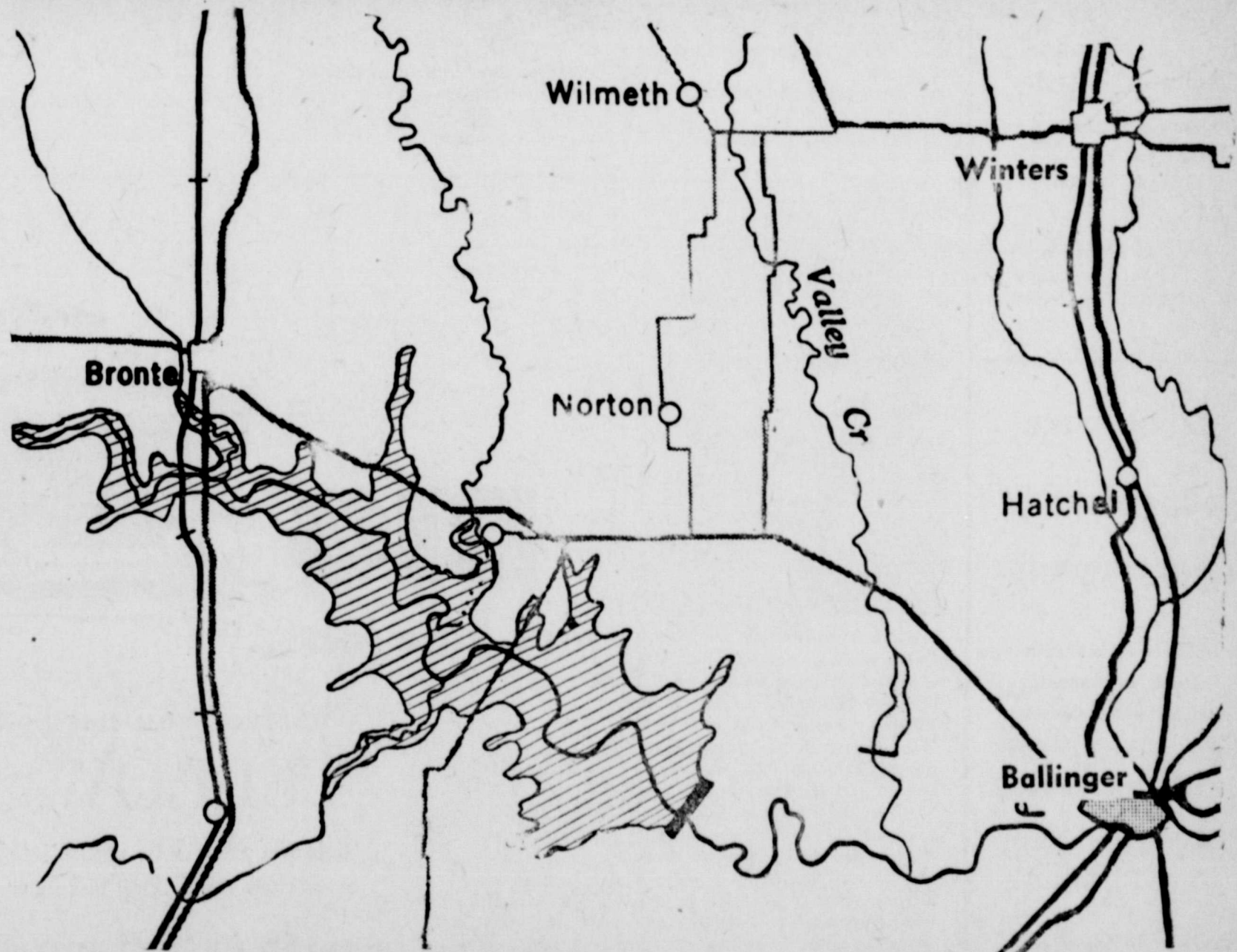
Runnels county folks point out that they have a very advantageous damsite under consideration. The dam would have to be only 1.8 miles in length and would join two cliffs, the south one on the Gross Ranch and the north one on the Cicero Smith Ranch. A natural spillway at this particular site would make it even more desirable, they say, as it would eliminate this cost.

Post Office to Close Saturday

Postmaster Noah Pruitt, Jr. said Thursday that unless he receives further word from Washington, the Bronte post office will be closed this Saturday and on Saturdays in the future. A five-day week is being initiated in order to economize in the operation of the Post Office Department.

Pruitt said that mail would be put in boxes but that the window would be closed and no routes will be run.

The department's request for additional funds to operate on the rest of this fiscal year was drastically cut by Congress and the department does not have money to operate as formerly. The Saturday closing is one of many cuts in postal service ordered by Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield. Other cuts in postal service have been ordered in order to economize, Pruitt said.

You will notice a map and story on this page concerning a large lake which is being backed by residents of Runnels County and which would back water up almost to Bronte.

We have been hopeful during the nearly nine years we have lived at Bronte that a lake similar to this one could be built in Coke County to impound the waters of the Colorado River. It has been determined by the Upper Colorado River Authority that such a lake in Coke County would not be practical, because there was no assurance the project would pay itself out.

Like any other investment, some assurance is needed that a project of this nature will at least pay back its cost, and the UCRA members spent many hours of hard work trying to sell the project to potential customers.

Despite their work, they have been unsuccessful figuring out how it could be managed.

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the UCRA, told us this week that he is afraid the same problems will be encountered by the Runnels County folks in their plans to build the lake on further down the river. Youngblood said he was for them and would do anything he could to help, but he went on to say that they were going to have to get some big water customers before they even had a

Basic Coffee Roll

2 cups Bisquick.

You may sprinkle chopped pineapple and cherries over the dough or you may prefer cinnamon. Then you may grate orange rind and use instead of the other two.

Roll this as a jelly roll and place in a round pan that has been greased slightly. With a knife make slits around in the roll. Cook until brown.

Remove from the oven and have ready:

1 cup powdered sugar
¼ cup hot water.

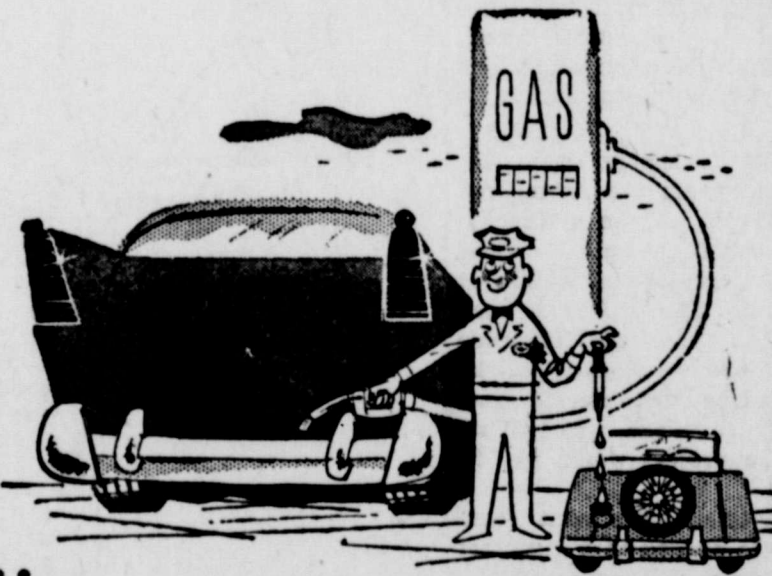

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Statistics Indicate 11 New Cancer Cases In Coke County May Develop This Year

An estimated six residents of Coke County will die of cancer in 1957 and eleven new cancer cases will be diagnosed, a report made public by the local Unit of the American Cancer Society said today.

In issuing the report, ACS chairman A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee said that one of the grim facts about cancer today was its predictability.

"In this forecast of cancer rates for our community," he declared, "we must face these hard facts and make sure the forthcoming Cancer Crusade will receive every bit of support it asks to carry out its life-saving programs."

The annual ACS appeal will be launched immediately. The goal for Coke County is \$600 in a nationwide campaign for \$30,000,000.

Based on a population of 4,000, the report estimates that there will be 18 cancer cases under medical care here this year. About four persons will be saved from cancer in Coke County in 1957.

The report says that according

to present rates 1,000 residents of this country who are now living will eventually develop cancer.

The ACS chairman pointed out that dramatic progress in cancer control has been made, the ratio of lives saved from cancer improving from one in four to one in three now being saved.

"This improvement amounts to at least 30,000 more cancer patients being saved annually. But there is the tremendous task of saving an additional 75,000 Americans annually from cancer who are now dying only because treatment is not started in time.

"Of every six Americans who develop cancer today, two will be saved and four will die. One of the four who die will be lost needlessly. The other three who die will be lost to cancers which science cannot yet control.

"The American Cancer Society's three-point program of research, education and service is designed to meet the problems posed by cancer. With the continued support and cooperation of the public and

all interested agencies for the Cancer Crusade, we are confident that cancer can be eliminated as a major health problem."
