Swimming Pool Opens Saturday

At 9 a. m. this Saturday, May 11, Bronte's new swimming pool in the County Park here will be open to the public for the first time. A formal opening date for the park and pool will be set at a later date when a community program will be worked up. The concession stand will also be open this Saturday and Sunday and will continue all summer.

Aubrey Denman, caretaker at the park, announced the following hours for the swimming pool: Until school is out the pool will be open weekdays from 4 until 8 p. m. except on Wednesday, when the pool will be closed at 7 p. m. Af-

ter school is out swimming time will be from 1:30 until 8 p. m. with the Wednesday closing time 7 p. m.

On Sundays the pool will be open from 1:30 until 5:30 o'clock. Denman said that the closing time would not always be strictly adhered to — that if a good crowd is present at closing time, he would allow the pool to stay open until the crowd clears out.

Admission price is 15c for students and 35c for adults. Season tickets are available at \$5.00.

Denman also said arrangements could be made for private parties to be held in the morning. Cost for private parties will be the regular admission prices plus the cost of the life guard. Regular swimming parties can be held any time, he said, but strictly private parties can only be held in the morning.

Arrangements are being made for a life guard to be on duty and it is planned by Red Cross officials here to offer a Red Cross Swimming Course later in the summer.

Some picnic tables and barbecue pits are ready for use and the park will be open to the public each day until 10 p. m.

We had a most enjoyable day last Sunday as we had Bronte folks visiting us. There was only one thing wrong. I couldn't hear everything that was said as everyone was talking at once.

Maybe you read the same article that I read the other day which said: "A pain in the neck is a pain in the neck." Seems as though the author thought when you get irritated at your husband, it causes the tightening of a certain gland in the neck and you really have a "pain in the neck." So it all boils down to mean that if your husband is a pain in the neck to you, well—you'll get a pain in the neck. From now on when anyone tells me that they have a crick in their neck, I will know what is wrong—a fight with the husband. From now on, no one will ever know when I get a "pain in the neck."

I am giving you a recipe this week that was served at a Country Club luncheon here recently. I also served it to the Bronte folks here last Sunday and they seemed to like it, at least, they said they did. This makes a large quantity.

Cubed Jello Salad

5 pkgs. of jello, lemon, orange, lime, raspberry and cherry.

Prepare the 4 packages, reserving the lemon until last. Use only 1½ cups liquid to each package instead of the usual 2 cups. Remove ice cubes from refrigerator tray and place each flavor separately in a tray. The trays are used as they are ideal size.

When these are set, prepare the lemon with only 1½ cups of liquid. When it is real thick and syrupy, beat until fluffy.

Whip 2 cups of whipping cream or one large can of evaporated milk and fold the lemon jello into it. Cut all the four colors into tiny cubes and fold into this.

Grease two good sized pans with Wesson oil and sprinkle lightly with graham cracker crumbs mixed with a small amount of butter. Pour mixture onto this. Sprinkle top with crumbs. When set cut into squares. It will serve about 24 people.

This may also be used as a dessert. Don't let this scare you away because it is lengthy as it is very attractive as well as good.

Outlook for New Crops Improving

A team of agronomists with the Texas Extension Service say that research people are working frantically to develop new crops for dry West Texas. Crops showing the most promise at this time are guar and sesame. Both of these crops have some disadvantages at this time. Guar is a summer legume that should make a crop in this area when grain sorghum makes a crop. This crop is a good soil builder and excellent results along this line were received two years ago in Tom Green County where cotton followed guar as compared against cotton following cotton in the same field. Our real need though is not to increase cotton production as much as it is to develop new cash crops. We import guar seed from South America at this time. The latest quoted price on guar seed is \$4.00 per hundred. Foreign seed cost around \$6.00 per hundred. When our supply becomes large enough to support an adequate marketing system, we can expect better prices unless of course we over produce our demand.

Sesame is another new crop which is receiving a lot of attention. Until the last two years, this crop had to be harvested by hand. High labor costs in this country placed us at a disadvantage with foreign countries with cheap labor. A new combine variety was released by the Experiment Station last year which eliminated the hand labor. Quality of this variety is not up to the old varieties which require the hand labor, but progress in improving the quality of the combine variety has already been made and another improved variety will be released next year. Neither of these crops promise to take the place of cotton as king of the South, but both of them might prove to be equal or better than grain sorghum as a cash crop, and the soil building qualities of guar could make it a very useful crop for Coke County markets, and cultural practices for anyone who might be interested in trying either of these crops.

Sorghum Alum has received a lot of publicity recently and a lot of seed have been purchased for use in this county. This grass was developed in Argentina by crossing Johnson grass and sudan. It crosses very readily with Johnson grass and when planted in a field with a lot of Johnson grass, it will produce seed which show more and more of the characteristics of Johnson grass each year. This situation could result in a field of Johnson grass in a period of 5 years. It is adapted to our area, easy to get up to a stand, and produce a lot of grass. Recommended seeding rate is 3 to 5 pounds per acre. Results of experiment station test indicate that it is a good grass but that it will not live up to the claims made for it by some business interests who are promoting it.

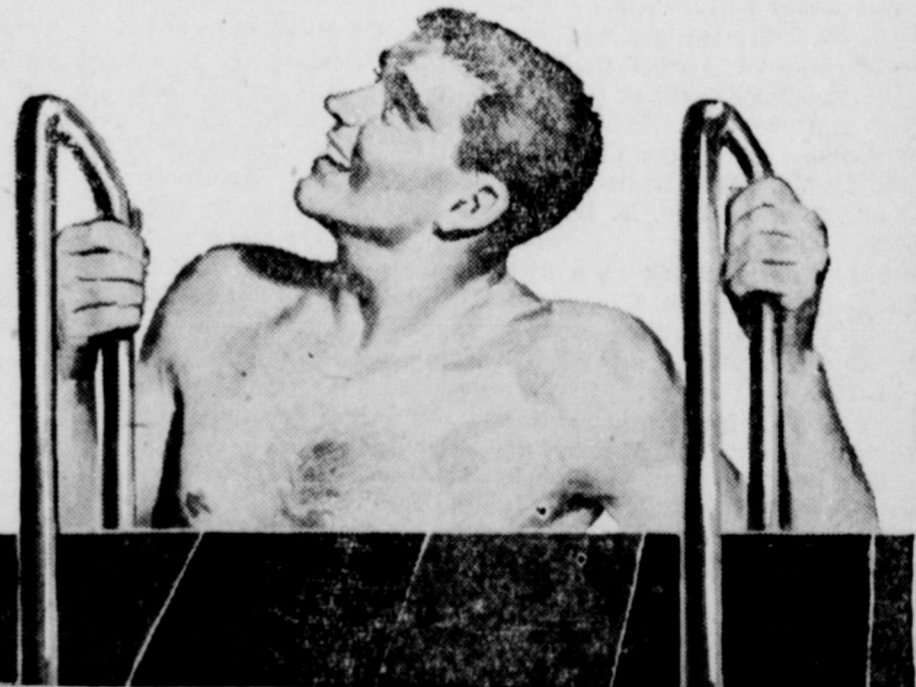

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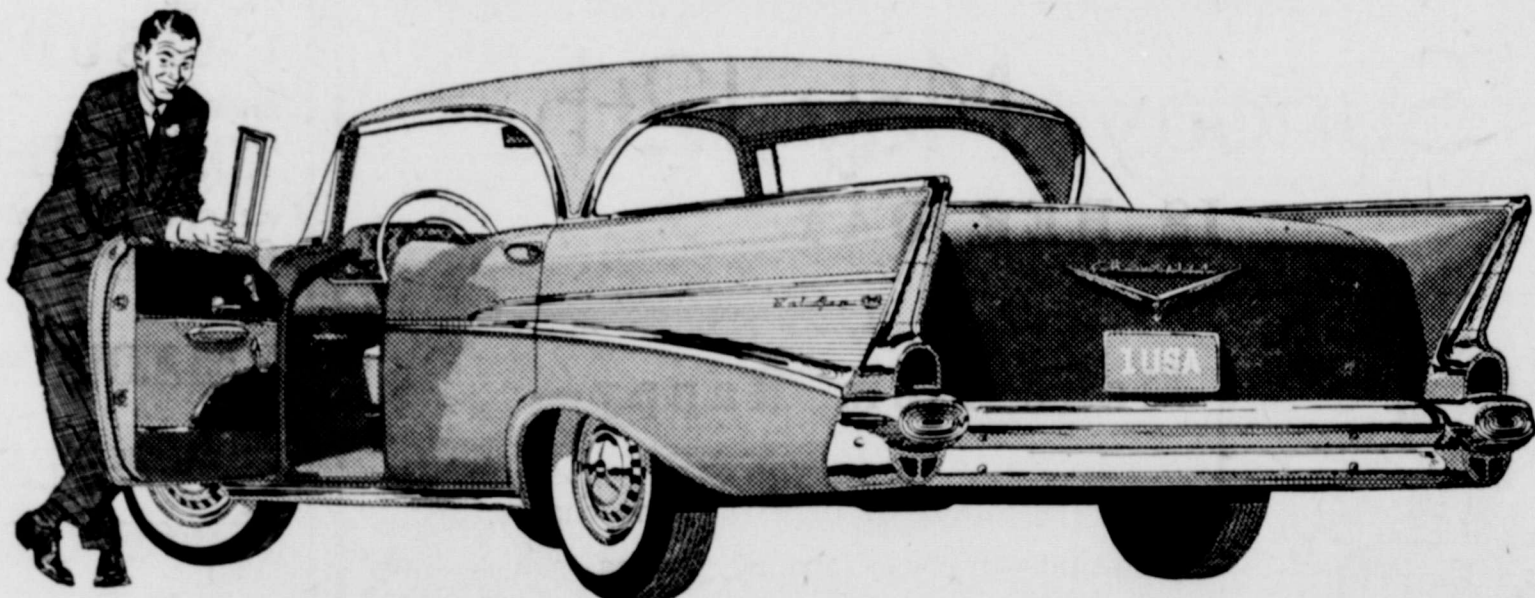
