Blackwell Defeats \$200,000 School Bond Issue

Blackwell school district's proposal for a new \$200,000 building and bond refunding program lost by a close margin in a special election there Saturday.

Vote was 61 for and 71 against. It had been pointed out that because of the large oil property valuations the bond issue would not necessitate an increase in tax rate.

The proposed bond issue was brought up to pay off about \$18,000 in outstanding debts and it was planned to build a new cafeteria, gymnasium, rest rooms and repair present buildings.

Last week was wonderfully spent, sightseeing in Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming. The trip up was nice, as the wind was cool even riding over the Texas highways.

We spent several hours sightseeing in Denver, Colo., where the famous Historical Museum houses all these pre-historic animals that roamed the country over 30 million years ago. Not only are there these ancient type of things but every kind of animal, bird and mammal, that you have ever read about. This was not only interesting but educational.

From Denver on, we could see the lovely snow capped mountains. We could hardly wait until we drove into them. Finally we did and I had promised my young son that when we got to them, I would ride the chair lift which goes to the top of the snow mountains.

When we arrived at Berthoud Pass, which was a skiing sports area, we stopped and watched many ride the chair lift up and then ski down. This was quite a sight for none of us had ever seen any skiing done before. The son and I wrapped up, head and ears and carried blankets to wrap up in, and climbed the steps to buy our tickets for the chair lift ride that I had promised him for many miles. I purchased them and was waiting for it to come down; the more I looked at that tall snow covered mountain, the higher it became.

My heart went to pounding and I could just see me falling out or maybe the thing breaking down and us sitting out in that cold open space with snow everywhere you looked.

I turned to the son and told him that I couldn't do it and asked for my money back. I hated to be a slacker but just got cold feet. I can say this, that my son was not very happy with me.

After leaving here, we started toward Rocky Mt. National Park and were in a terrible snow storm. I wish I were able to paint a picture of how beautiful this was. All the huge pines were hanging with it. They looked like they had been sprayed for Christmas. We were unable to go through the park on account of snow, so we took another route into Yellowstone.

This was where the men in my family got to fish to their heart's content. We ate trout each day we were there. It was very good and does not have the taste of ordinary fish. We ate it fried, made it into croquettes and had trout salad. All of this tastes much like it was made with salmon.

One day while in the park we were sightseeing and were on our way to see "Old Faithful" when

we were stopping all along the road to see the bears and many were out taking pictures (including me). Two boys were out trying to get very close to one bear when it made a run for them. If I never ran fast before in my life, I did then. I practically knocked the car door off getting in. From then on, I made my pictures from the car.

On the way back we went through some of the most gorgeous canyon drives. Words cannot describe their beauty.

The Rocky Mt. Park was opened and closed at intervals all the week, but fortunately it had not snowed the day we were along and it was open, so we were permitted to go through.

The snow was 30 feet deep in places. If you think that is not a lot of snow piled on the ground, then you should see it, for that is exactly what it was... a heck of a lot of snow. We stopped all along the 67 mile drive and played in it but due to the high altitude, you just didn't last long, as your breath would get so short. Besides that, it was "cold outside."

We made many pictures and I brought home pine trees to try to get to live, not knowing what the outcome will be.

The weather was perfect. It was so cold all the time we spent in the mountains and lasted on down to Childress, Texas; from then on it was just cool and pleasant.

My vocabulary doesn't permit me to give the picture that I would love to, but nevertheless, it was all wonderful and enjoyable. We cut that part of our vacation several days short so we might spend a few days visiting with everyone in Bronte, and I hope that when you get this paper, I will be roaming the streets and shaking the hands of all our old friends.

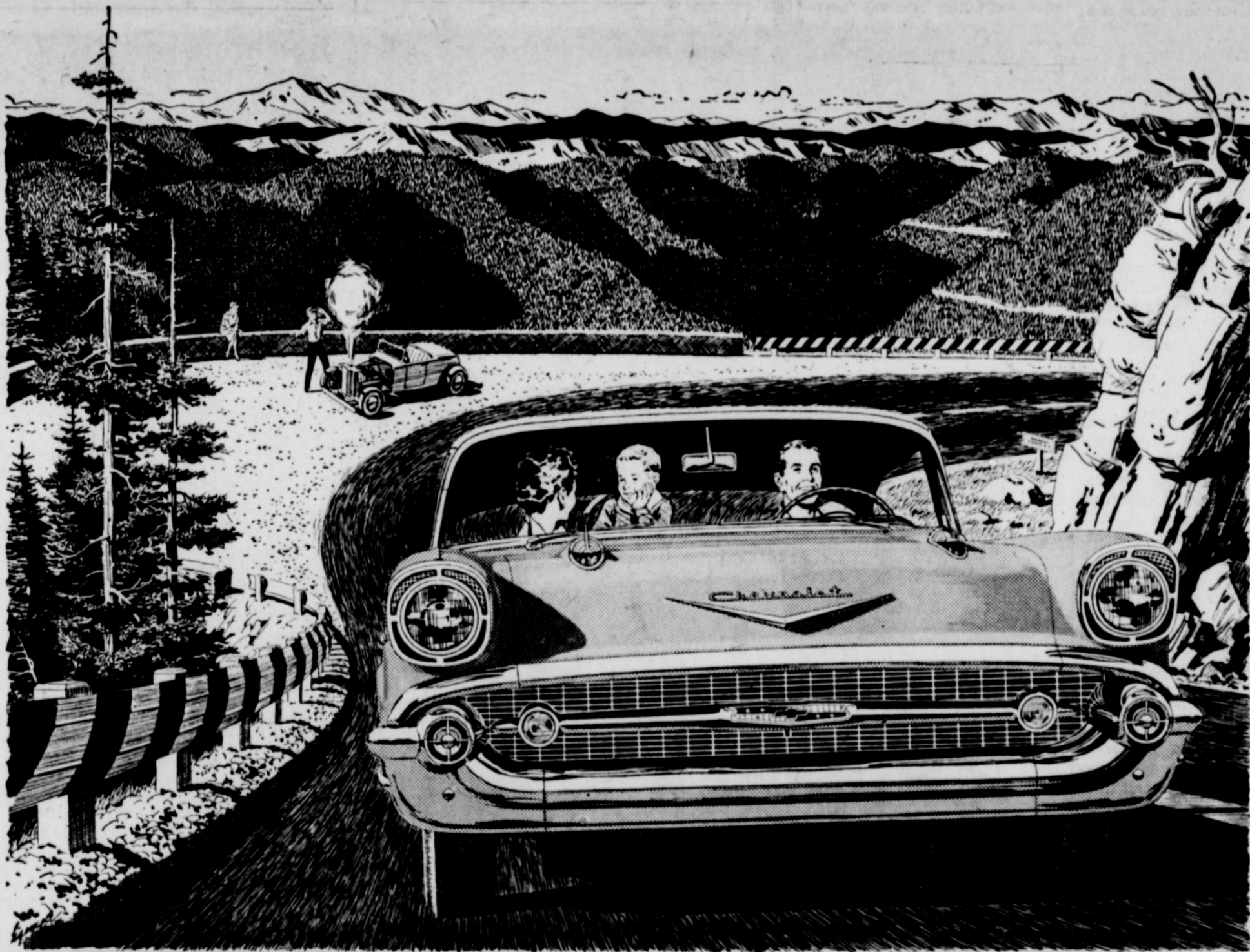

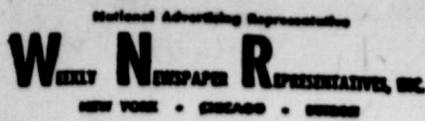

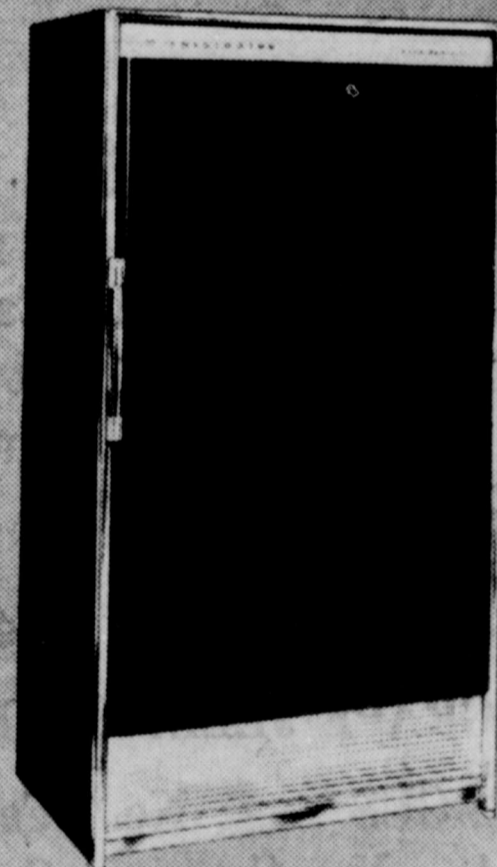

Coke County Farm Report

Many people who are in the poultry business in any way will be affected by the new egg law recently passed by the Texas Legislature. The Extension Service is conducting a meeting to inform the people of the provisions of this new egg law. The meeting will be held in San Angelo, July 11, beginning at 1:30 p. m. in the Cottillion Room of the Town House Hotel. All egg producers, egg dealers, egg retailers, egg brokers, feed dealers, and anyone else interested is invited to attend this meeting.

All farmers who sent in for a gasoline tax refund last year will send a copy of Form 2240 which applies only to the 3 cents Federal tax on fuels used for farming between July 1, 1956 and June

30, 1957. These claims must be submitted after July 1 and on or before September 30, 1957. All new users of farm fuels who for some reason did not send in for a tax refund last year will be able to pick up a copy of Form 2240 at the County Agents office.

To all beef cattle producers in Coke County, this is to announce a field day to be held on July 10 at the Gerald Hartgraves Ranch in Schleicher County. This field day will cover work being done on beef cattle performance testing Beef cattle producers who are interested should contact the County Agents office.

The National Safety Council has announced a proclamation by President Eisenhower designating July 21-27, 1957, as Farm Safety Week. Medical Science has decreased the national death rates, but accidental deaths and injuries continue to increase. Accidental deaths and injuries on farms and ranches place farming as the third most hazardous occupation in our Country today. We spend much time on improved production practices, yet we all admit that people are the most important crop on any farm.

Safety isn't just another "word to the wise;" it is a way of life. Safety practices must become ha-

bit forming in order to be effective. Farm Safety Week is a good time to start such habits.

A veterinarian will be in the County July 12 to vaccinate all cats and dogs for rabies. Exact time and place will be in next week's paper. He will be in Silver, Robert Lee and Bronte, so we can catch all the cats and dogs on one day.

All of you have noticed I am sure that we have many more insects this spring than we have had the last few years. We are likely to have a lot of sleeping sickness in our horses. We would be happy to schedule a day in July to vaccinate horses and blood test cows if enough of you feel that it is worth while. Sleeping sickness vaccine must be given between the layers of the skin. This makes it pretty delicate and I think it would be worth a lot in peace of mind to have this done by a veterinarian. Let this office know your feelings on this.
