Bronte's water supply got a clean bill of health from the Texas Department of health laboratories on samples collected July 1. A few complaints have been received by city officials because of the way the water has tasted the past few weeks, but according to the Health Department, the water contains nothing unhealthful.

Barrett Mackey, city water superintendent, explained that the water in Oak Creek Lake has a peculiar taste and odor because so much of the lake has water in it for the first time and that part has an abundance of brush and other matter that is decaying. He said he expects the condition to last for another six weeks or so.

Water samples which were sent to the state laboratories was taken from four different places in town, giving a fairly good picture of the overall condition of the water supply.

Water consumption in the city is rising every day, Mackey said. However, it has been lower so far this summer than in several years, due to the greater rainfall which has fallen this year. Bronte residents are having to water their yards and gardens now and water consumption is expected to be much higher during July than during June.

Water Safety Rules Adopted

Water Safety rules for Oak Creek Lake were adopted June 10 by the city commission of Sweetwater. Lakekeeper Walter Stapp has asked The Enterprise to publish the rules which are as follows:

1. All operators of boats and all water skiers must secure a recreation permit from the City of Sweetwater. Cost of said permits is the same as required for fishing. Any person possessing a fishing permit shall be permitted to fish, ski, or operate a boat.

2. All boats must be registered with the Lake Keeper, or person designated by the Lake Keeper to perform such registration on his behalf.

3. All registered boats must be identifiable with a number or a name painted, or otherwise placed on the side or stern of the boat in such a manner that it can be clearly seen from a distance of at least 75 feet.

4. No motor boat or water skier shall come nearer than 75 yards of the shore or nearer than 75 yards of any other anchored boat

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except after reducing speed by one half.

5. All boats shall carry life preservers equal in number to the number of persons actually occupying such boat.

6. No water skier shall be allowed upon the water unless he has an effective life jacket or life belt upon his body.

7. No boat shall be allowed to be loaded with more passengers than justified by its rated capacity.

8. All boats shall carry at least one paddle in good condition.

9. No boat shall ever be op-

erated in such a manner as is reasonable calculated to endanger life or property.

10. Failure to abide by these safety rules shall constitute grounds for the forfeiture of permit of any person violating such rules. The violator shall have his permit rejected for the day at the discretion of the Lake Keeper, or the City Manager, or the City Commission. Repeated violations shall constitute grounds for the permanent denial of permits authorizing the use of the lake recreation privileges.

Shredding Machines Available

(Soil Conservation Release)

The Board of Supervisors of the Coke Soil Conservation District had their regular meeting Tuesday, July 9. They purchased two, five-foot wide shredders to be used by the landowners of the district at a small rental fee.

These shredders will be located in Bronte and Robert Lee. Custodians will be named in the near future to take care of these machines. Until these custodians have been secured, landowners needing to use these shredders should contact D. K. Glenn in Bronte and Bryan Yarbrough in Robert Lee.

There are several fields of grain sorghum and sudan which should be shredded very soon, because the grain on these fields is beginning to mature. If this grain is allowed to mature, it will cause lots of trouble next year as a volunteer crop competing with the small grass plants. C. N. Webb, chairman of the board, explained.

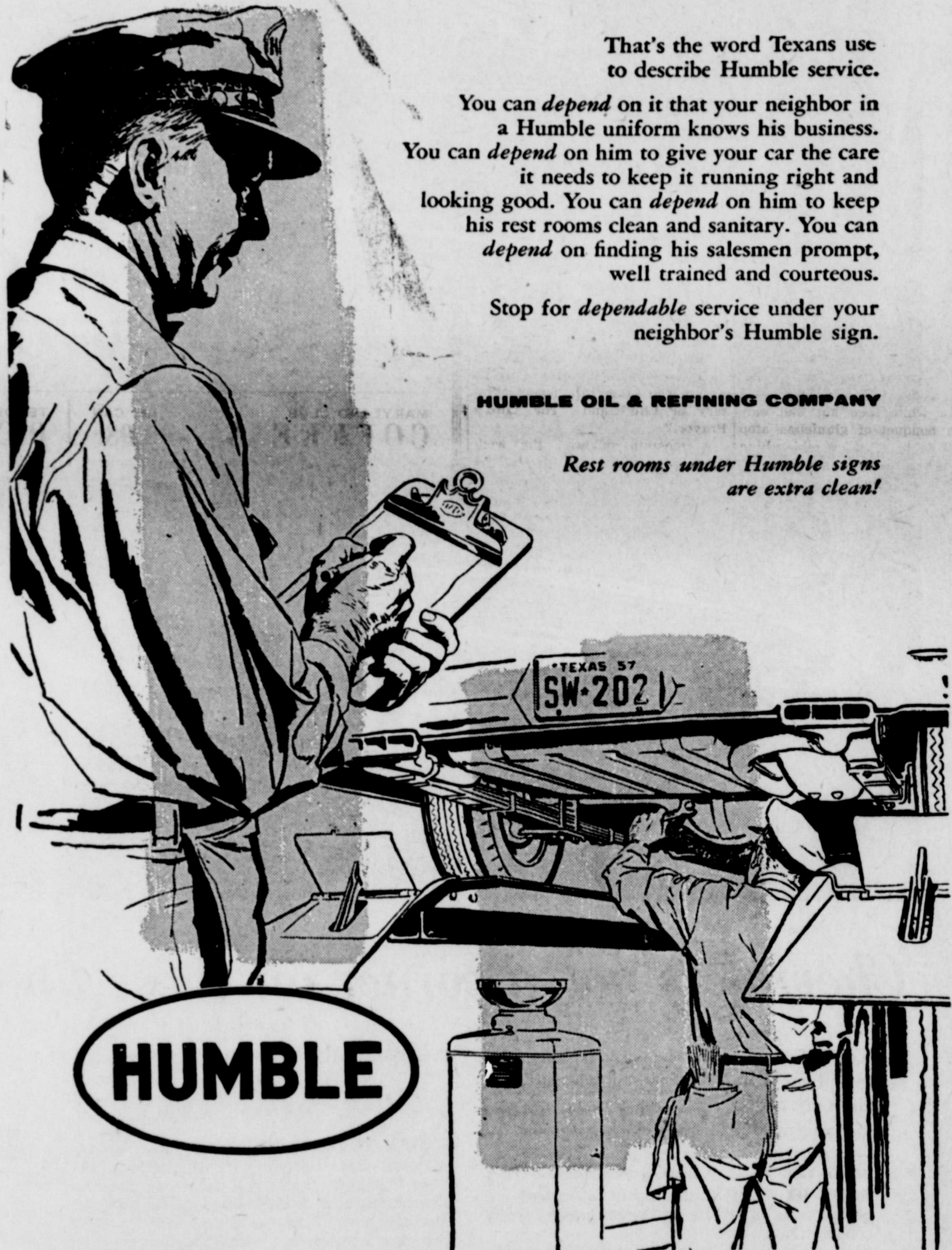

Pentecost of Sanco; Ronald Sims, Lanny Denman, and Malcolm Johnson, Bronte; Bobby Blaylock and Clark Godwin of Robert Lee. Mike Krall of Robert Lee has the boar to be used in the swine program this year.

These eight registered Duroc gilts and the one registered Duroc boar were given to 4-H club boys who agree to care for them under the supervision of the County Agent. In turn, each boy who has a gilt has to give the best sow pig out of the first litter back to the 4-H club to award to some other 4-H member next year. The Sears Foundation buys a new boar every year for the program. The Sear's Swine Program has proven to be very good for 4-H boys to make a little money and to gain some good interest and experience with hogs.
