## Two Teachers Elected To Complete Faculty

Two new teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Porter, were elected to complete the Bronte school faculty for 1957-58 at the regular session of the Board of Trustees last Thursday night. In other action, Mrs. Virgil Cole was elected to a bus driving job, subject to becoming a licensed bus driver. The new teachers were selected from several applicants.

Mr. Porter was elected elementary principal and elementary boys coach. He is presently in school at Southwestern State Teachers College in San Marcos, where he is working on his master's degree.

He previously taught at Burbank Elementary School in San Antonio and the past year was elementary coach and a teacher at Pleasanton, Texas. He received his bachelor's degree from Southwestern and has also attended Trinity University. He served three years in the army as an in-

structor, part of the time serving overseas.

Mrs. (Iris) Porter has a master of education degree and was chosen to be home room teacher for the 7th grade and she will also teach departmental subjects. She is also attending school at San Marcos this summer where she is working on a counseling certificate.

Her experience includes two years at Corpus Christi and three years at Burbank High School in San Antonio. She will also serve as elementary girls' coach.

Members of the board also discussed the new accreditation plan for high schools and inspected the new science department which has been moved from the top floor of the high school building to the old home economics department. The room was remodeled. Supt. Garland Black said the move was advised by the State Committee on Secondary Education which inspected the school some time ago. He also said that all the requirements set forth by the committee had been met.

In discussing the requirements the board noted that high schools which are rated first class, which the Bronte school is since meeting the requirements set forth by this committee, and which use 12 teachers are not in any danger of losing the high school. Black said that, including special teachers, 20 were used last year and it is planned to use 19 this year.

More than 10,000 persons attend the convention each year. The BGCT represents 3,717 churches and 1,475,127 members over the state.

We went to a little eating place here and ate a delicious, unpronounceable dish. They were miniature pancakes (about the size of a half dollar) and they were buttered and rolled in powdered sugar. The most unusual thing about them was to watch them being made. Two men made them, and they had a stove with 200 little indentations, and one man poured the batter, and the other ran a

fork between the little holes to make them separate. Then the other man flipped them over with a fork at the speed of lightening. It was fascinating to watch, and good to eat!

The next day we went to Amsterdam which is literally full of canals and bicycles. We took a boat trip of the city and saw the homes of the merchants of the 17th century. Few of them are still private homes now, and a few of them have been turned into museums, including the house of Rembrandt. On top of all these houses is a steel hook that was used to unload the boats from the canals directly into the top of the house. Amsterdam has 500 bridges (and the streets are narrow and torture to drive through), and it has 1,000,000 people and 500,000 bicycles. I think we saw them all—the bicycles, I mean.

We went to one of Amsterdam's museums, the National Gallery. The building covers 2½ acres and was founded in 1808. We saw some pictures by Rembrandt, van Gogh, Potter, Steen, and many, many others. Also, we saw the main attraction, Rembrandt's "Night Watch." Also there was furniture china and the loveliest collection of crystal and jewelry that I have ever seen!

We ate at a famous restaurant there twice — and for lunch we had one of their specialties which is thick pea soup with sausages in it. The waiter tried to get me

to take the small one, but I didn't intend to eat anything else and insisted on the big one, and I couldn't even eat half of it. I never saw so much pea soup! The place is called Port van Cleve, and it attracts businessmen, artists, writers, and bohemians, and its atmosphere takes you back to the gay nineties. It looks like a cheap lunchroom, and the waiters yell your order from one end of the huge room to the other and it is then relayed by another shout to the chef below. That evening we had their other specialty of beefsteak. Each steak is numbered and we were served nos. 4,566,213 and 4,566,214. A great surprise awaits the customer who orders the five-millionth steak.

From Amsterdam we went to Scheveningen, a resort on the North Sea. We stayed there 3 days and made side trips from there. One was to the fishing village there. I never saw so many fish, and costumes were really in evidence there — we saw so many women with wooden shoes, billowing matriarchal dresses (under which some of them wear no fewer than 12 petticoats), aprons, and the different white caps. Very picturesque. Scheveningen is sort of a suburb of The Hague, so naturally we went there; however we didn't do much but drive around and look. We also went to

Haarlem which is in the center of the flower district, and although we were too late for tulips, we saw many lovely fields of other flowers. We also went through the Frans Hals gallery, which houses a fine collection of masterpieces by this famous Dutch painter and other artists who worked there in the 16th and 17th centuries.

Another very interesting place was Delft which is the home of the famous blue and white Delft china. This was really a charming place with two beautiful churches. The Old Church was built in the 13th century and its tower leans frighteningly to the west, although the experts say this was deliberate and is quite safe. High in the belfry is a huge bell rung only on momentous occasions, lest too frequent use should damage either the tower or the bell. The New Church was built in the 14th century and was 100 years in the building. It is the last resting place of the builder of the Netherlands into a nation, William the Silent, and his descendants of the House of Orange.

Well, I could truly go on and on about what we saw, and we could have spent at least a month seeing more of what we wanted to see. I hate to sound like a pig, but I must tell you a little more of the food. I'm sorry we did not try one thing that is quite popular — "new herring." It is sold from a pushcart on the street,

and the people hold it aloft by the tail and gobble it with zest. Somehow, we couldn't find the pushcart at the times we were in the mood for it. One delicious thing that we ate from the little street shops were friend pies filed with meat and Chinese vegetables. The Dutch breakfast consists of tea or coffee, a variety of breads, slices of cheese and jam, and a boiled egg. Very good.

As you know, Indonesia was once governed by the Dutch, so naturally Holland has quite a lot of their influence. Billy was stationed there once, and had so often told me of this one meal, so naturally we jumped at this chance to have it. It is called rijsttafel (rice table) and it is a gargantuan meal in which you use steamed rice in a layer on a big sup plate and on top of this you put small helpings of from 10 to 30 other dishes. We had 20 with ours and naturally tried them all — really delicious!!

When we left Holland we spent one day in Belgium. We stopped in Brussels and really didn't have time to see very much, but we managed to see the famous outrageous statue known as Manneken-Pis. I'm sure everyone has seen this little boy at the fountain. We saw some beautiful lace, for which Belgium is famous, and we saw a memorial plaque for Everard 't Serclaes. I had never heard of him but he was behead-

ed nearby, and the custom is to touch the arm of the statue or the head of the dog and it will bring you good luck throughout the day. The whole thing was dark from age but the arm and dog's head shone like gold.

We also went through a large store in Brussels. It was just a typical large store with furniture, clothing, et cetera; but the food section was unusual to us, because I never saw such a varied selection of prepared foods, unprepared meats, vegetables, wines, bread, cakes, cookies, sauces, cheeses (at least 1000), and odd things that I don't know the names.

On the way home we went through many interesting towns such as Aachen with its many bombed and shelled buildings. Also we stopped in Cologne, Germany, to see the cathedral there and all I can say it that it is beyond description — the loveliest thing (and largest) I have ever seen. It is supposed to be among the 4 prettiest in the world, and

I believe it.

All I can say about our trip, was it wasn't near long enough, and I wish you could have had the pleasure of making it also.

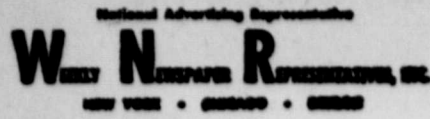

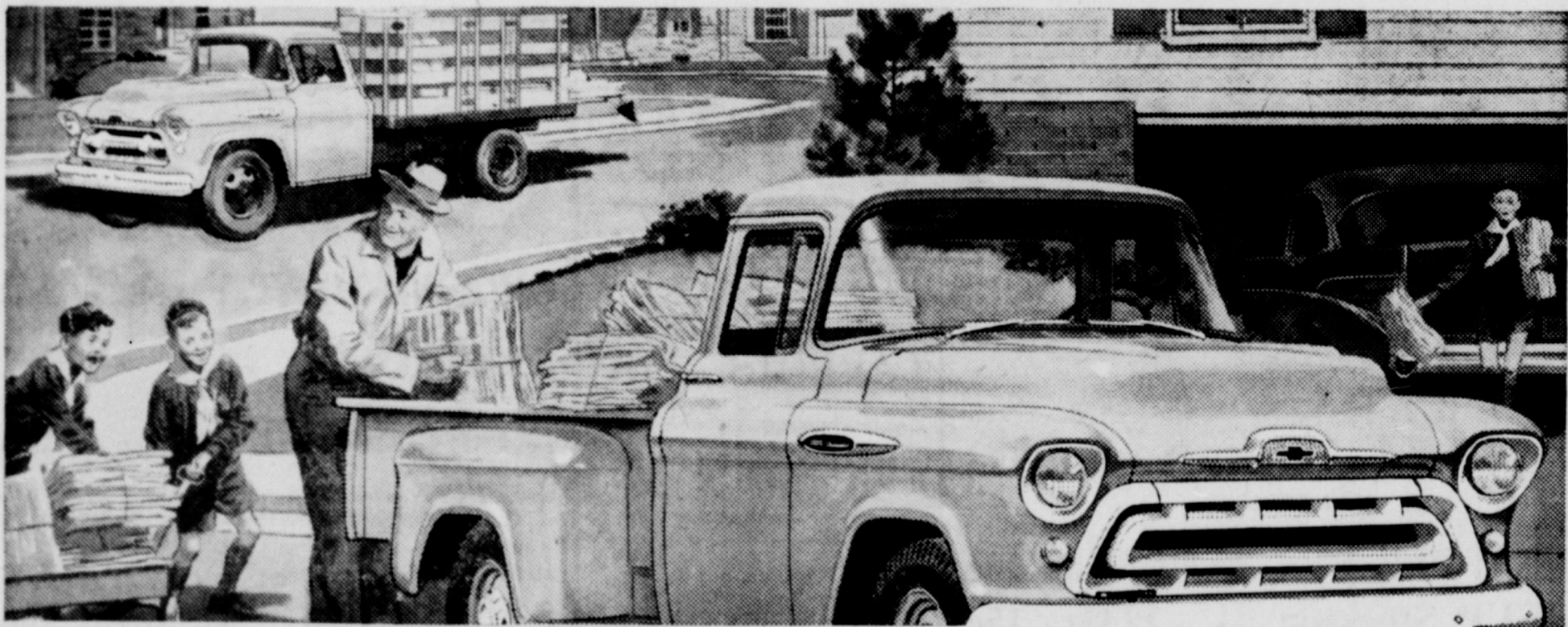

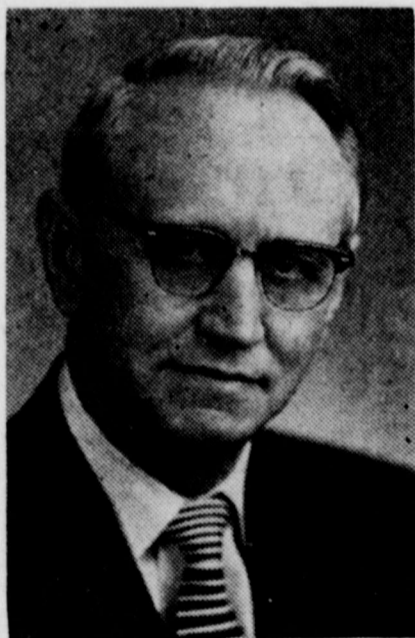
