

Rules Announced for F-B Queen Contest

A queen for the Coke County Farm Bureau will be selected Aug. 26 at Robert Lee. Winner of the contest will compete in district competition at Big Spring Aug. 29.

Only the senior group will be eligible to compete for district queen, but two younger age groups will participate in the county show. The youngest age group

will be those girls from 4 to 9 years old; the middle group will include girls from 10 to 15; and the senior group will include girls from 16 to 22.

In order for a girl to compete she must be the daughter or sister of a member of the Farm Bureau. Senior contestants must have been at least 16 and not more than 22 years of age Sept. 1. All contestants must be unmarried.

Girls will be judged on appearance, poise and personality. Each entry will be asked a few questions about the Farm Bureau and will be required to talk for one minute on "Why I Am Glad My Family Belongs to Farm Bureau."

All contestants will wear formal dresses in the competition.

The winner of each age group will be awarded as prize, as well as the senior winner being permitted to enter the district contest.

Mrs. C. E. Arrott, secretary of the Coke County Farm Bureau, said Wednesday that any girl who wishes to enter the contest should see her or a member of the queen's race committee. This committee is composed of Mrs. James L. Coffman and Mrs. Fay C. Roe, both of Robert Lee, and Mrs. J. B. Mackey of Bronte. Mrs. Arrott said that membership in Farm Bureau are still being accepted from relatives of girls who wish to enter the contest, and who are not eligible because their father or brother is not a member.

The public is invited to attend the contest.

"Courtship and Marriage" Clinic Here Aug. 22

A clinic on "Courtship and Marriage" will be conducted at the Bronte School Aug. 22. In charge of the session will be the four ministers of Bronte.

Subjects to be discussed are: "Courtship," Lin Loeffler; Preparation for Marriage," R. W. Blackmon; "Marriage Relationships," Douglas Brown; and "New Testament Teaching on Sex and Marriage," Owen Cosgrove.

All classes will be taught simultaneously, three periods. Each class will be 25 minutes in length. The class on "Marriage Relationships" will be limited to married couples and those contemplating marriage in the immediate future.

Those in charge of the clinic would like to get some idea as to local interest in the clinic. They are asking that everyone who is interested in it speak to his pastor next Sunday.

Burglars Loot Pruitt's Store Monday Night

"No arrest has been made," Sheriff Paul Good said Thursday morning, when asked about the Monday night robbery of Pruitt's Store in Bronte. An estimated \$300 to \$500 worth of merchandise and a small amount of cash was taken sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning when one or more persons burglarized the grocery and dry goods store located on Main Street in Bronte.

Sheriff Good and Deputy O. B. Jacobs went to Brownwood, Coleman, Austin and other Central Texas points Wednesday running down leads on the burglary, but reported no success.

"We think it was somebody from out of town," the sheriff said when interviewed Thursday morning. "We were checking on two stolen cars, too," he added, indicat-

ing the possibility that the two robberies might have some connection.

The burglars entered the store through a rear window and then opened a back door, removing the two by four which held it shut.

UP TO 1 INCH RAIN FALLS

From an inch down to a sprinkle of rain fell in the Bronte community Monday afternoon. The rain became lighter as it moved westward, with resident of the west part of town getting only about .2 inch. Just east of town up to 1 inch fell.

Farmers were glad to see the shower, but said a general rain would have done much more good for crops in the area.

Telephone Pioneer F. A. Rogge Dies

Ferdinand Albert Rogge, 68, a retired telephone company employe and brother of Herman Rogge, Bronte telephone manager for many years, died last Thursday in San Angelo.

Widely known in this area, Mr. Rogge was a native of Jefferson County.

He moved with his family to Nolan County in 1906 and to San Angelo in 1910 and was employed by the San Angelo Telephone Co. shortly after.

For several years he and his brother, Herman, using a team of horses for transportation, repaired and built telephone lines.

The two brothers also built the first long distance telephone service between Eden and Menard.

Funeral services were held last Saturday at San Angelo and interment followed there.

Complete fingerprint investigations were made, but apparently the robbers were wearing gloves, Good said. In fact a pair of gloves was found which were probably worn by one of the men.

Assisting Good in the investigation Tuesday morning were Deputies Jacobs and Frank Keesee, Constable T. F. Sims, Sr. and two detectives from San Angelo.

Good said that a list of the miss-goods had been compiled so far as was possible. "We expect that they will be finding more stuff missing all the time," he said.

The list was as follows:

Twenty-four 1-lb. cans of Hormel lunch meat; 20 cartons of Camel and Lucky Strike cigarettes; eight silver dollars, taken from the cash register; 1 1936 man's class ring from Bronte High School; 5 men's sport shirts; 1 brown plaid bedspread in plastic bag; 15 pairs khaki trousers, all sizes; 15 pairs boys' trousers; 30 pairs men's shorts; 10 towels, Cannon brand, all colors; several pairs tennis shoes and small sized men's dress shoes; several pairs gloves.

Fourteen pairs of men's trousers were carried to the back of the store but were left scattered on the floor. Several shelves were ransacked and men's hats were scattered about the area.

The culprits were evidently hungry, as evidence showed that they snacked while performing their job and drank at least one carton of milk.

Noah Pruitt, Sr., manager of the store, said the loss was not covered by insurance.

Sheriff Good said his office is doing everything they know to do to find the burglars and their loot.

Highway 277 To Be Widened

Meeting in special session Tuesday afternoon, Bronte's city council passed an ordinance which provides for a contract between the city and the State of Texas regarding rebuilding of U. S. Highway 277 through the city limits of Bronte.

The city will have to furnish a small amount of right-of-way and the agreement calls for the city's being liable for any damages which might grow out of the construction and maintenance of the

highway.

The State Highway Department will return re-construct the highway from its intersection with Main Street north to the city limits. From there the re-construction will be carried on north of Bronte to the Sweetwater-Abilene Y, about nine miles north of here. U. S. 277 from the Y on toward Abilene has already been rebuilt.

The portion of the highway in the city will be made into a four-lane highway. One of the major

jobs in the construction will be rebuilding the bridge in north Bronte into a four-lane crossing.

During the time the bridge is out, traffic will be detoured over the county road which turns east at Main Streets and comes out in front of the James Allen house. The unpaved part of this road will be treated with asphalt before traffic is directed over it.

The portion of Highway 277 south of Main Street will be re-constructed at a later date.

TEXAS WOMAN'S UNIVERSITY LISTS FEATURES FOR FALL

DENTON, Texas — Texas Woman's University (formerly TSCW) will enroll students from nearly every county in the state this fall. The school always has had statewide appeal, according to Francis W. Emerson, dean of admissions-registrar. The session opens Sept. 17-18.

The Texas Legislature's action changing the name to Texas Woman's University officially goes into effect Aug. 19.

With reference to this change, President John A. Guinn explained that "the institution which was known for more than 50 years as CIA and later as TSCW thus enters a new era in which it will enjoy the advantages of a designation appropriate to its true character."

TSCW is the only college or university in the entire South which offers the doctorate in all major subject matter areas of home economics. To date, 19 Ph.D.'s have been conferred, mainly in the fields of nutrition and textile technology.

Its research programs, which include research services available to state hospitals and special schools as well as other state institutions and establishments, are supported by industrial, governmental and private grants which in the past five years have totaled more than a half-million dol-

lars. TSCW's occupational therapy school has the only such degree program for undergraduates in the Southwest. Its enrollment of freshmen occupational therapy majors is expected to be the largest in the nation.

The School of Library Science was the first in Texas to be accredited by the American Library Association and has been so designated ever since.

TSCW's College of Nursing, which utilizes the clinical facilities of Parkland Memorial Hospital in nearby Dallas, has grown to where this fall it will have more than 250 students in the four collegiate levels.

The Department of Journalism is the only one in a woman's college ever accredited by the American Council on Education for Journalism. This accreditation began in 1948 and was renewed in June of this year.

Four new buildings of modern functional design were opened on the campus during the past year and several other important specialized buildings will be started in 1958.

Break fresh eggs in cup or bowl to be sure "alls well." They may be separated or frozen as a whole egg. Stir with a fork to mix well, strain through a sieve. To one cup whole eggs or 1 cup yolks (about 5 medium) add one of the following: 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 tablespoon corn syrup, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Nothing is added to the whites if frozen separately.

Eggs can be frozen in any amount you choose — one whole, two or three or more together. Muffin tins, small bowls, cups or
