WTU to Construct Multi-Million Dollar Generating Plant on Oak Creek Lake

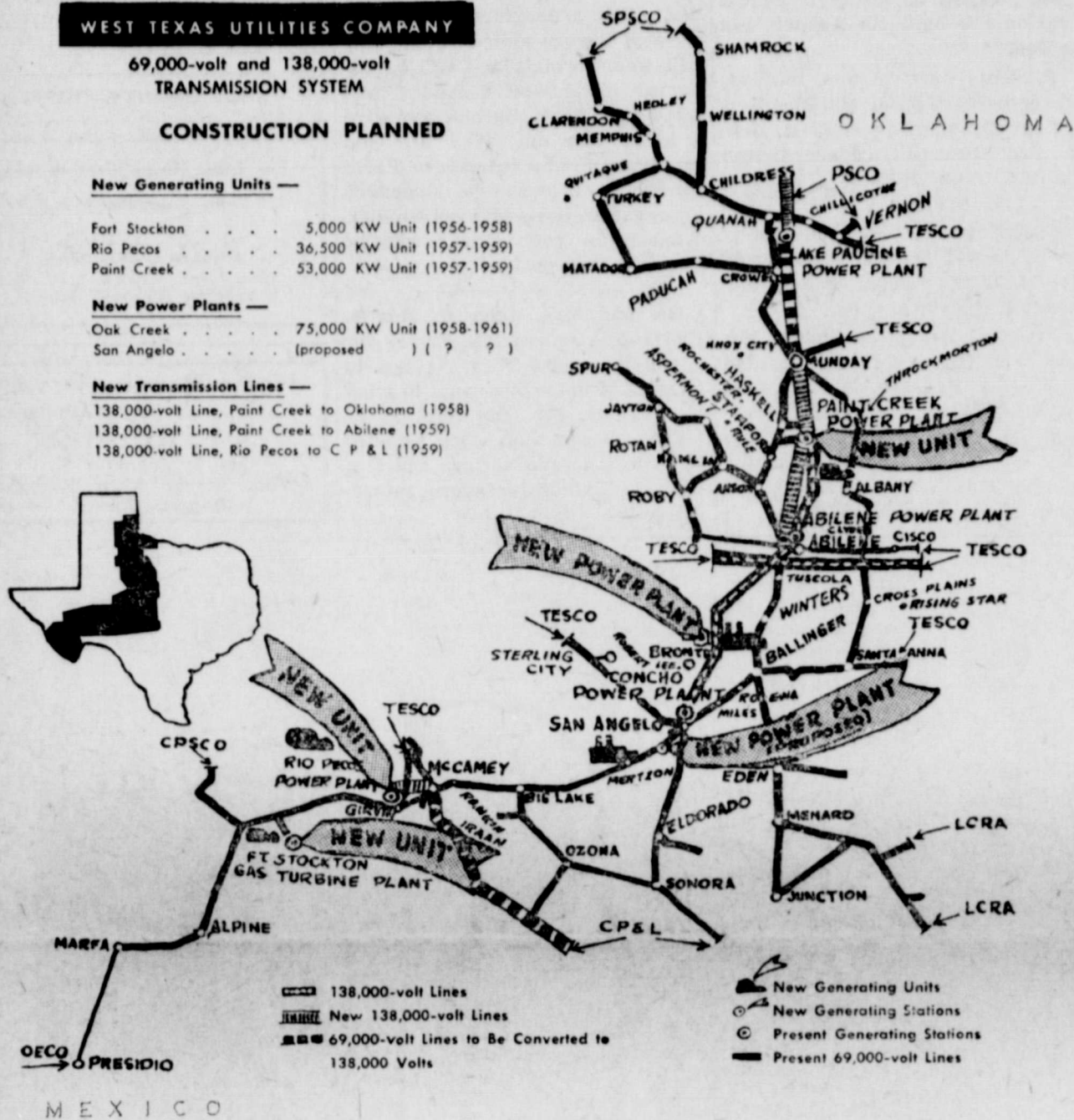

A new multi-million dollar power generating plant will be constructed on Oak Creek Lake 11½ miles north of Bronte, it was announced Thursday by officials of West Texas Utilities Co. Construction of the huge plant will begin early next year and the first 75,000 kilowatt unit is scheduled to be in operation in 1961. Ultimate capacity of the plant will be 225,000 kilowatts.

The new plant in Coke County is part of the \$51,000,000 expansion program which West Texas Utilities has planned for the next five years.

A crew of 23 men will be required to operate the plant when it is completed. No announcement was made concerning housing for

them and their families, but only two houses were built at the site of a recently completed plant on Paint Creek. One of them was for the assistant chief engineer and one for the maintenance foreman. Presumably, the same pattern will be followed on the Oak Creek project, leaving 21 men to live in nearby towns and communities.

The 117-acre site selected for the plant is on the west shore of the lake and is immediately adjacent to Highway 70. A 57-acre portion of the site has been purchased from the City of Sweetwater, and the company is negotiating with Charles Copeland, Coke County ranchman, for the additional 60 acres to complete the tract.

This new plant to be located eleven and one-half miles north of Bronte and three and one-half miles south of Blackwell, will be approximately in the geographic center of the company's system. Being almost equidistant from Abilene and San Angelo, the plant will be well situated to supply the additional power requirements for both cities and the surrounding areas.

The 138,000 volt transmission connecting Abilene and San Angelo, which is now nearing completion, extends within two to three miles of the new plant location. A 138,000 volt transmission loop will connect the new plant to the Abilene-San Angelo line.

WTU has purchased water rights on Oak Creek Lake from the Gulf Oil Corporation. Gulf had previously purchased the rights from the City of Sweetwater, owners of the lake. A contract between the utility company and Sweetwater regarding future use of water from the lake has been completed.

Cal Young, WTU president, said the company's expansion plans were based on recently completed surveys and studies which indicate that West Texas will greatly increase its use of electricity by 1961.

"Most of the proposed five-year outlay will go for the construction of new plants and installation of additional generating equipment, new transmission lines and expanded distribution facilities," Young said.

New generating equipment for WTU, including the new power plant, is expected to cost over \$22,500,000 and will increase by more than two-thirds the company's system generating capability.

WTU plans to spend almost \$15 million during the next five years for the construction and improvement of distribution facilities. Another \$11,500,000 has been allocated for the building of new high voltage transmission lines connecting WTU power plants and load centers. The remainder of the planned expenditure will be used primarily for general construction and improvement of

Little Progress on Burglary Case

Sheriff Paul Good said Wednesday that very little, if any, progress had been made toward solving the burglary of Pruitt's Store in Bronte Monday night of last week.

The burglars entered the grocery and dry goods store through a rear window, opened a door from the inside and loaded their loot, estimated to be worth \$300 to \$500.

Sheriff Good said he has a suspect being held in Snyder. The man was picked up by Scurry county authorities and was found to be possessing a large quantity of cigarettes, one of the items which was taken from the local store.

Trousers, shirts, shoes, gloves, towels, lunch meat and several other items were taken by the burglars. They also took eight silver dollars which were in the cash register.

Good said he has been in communication with all the sheriffs' offices in this area and has been assured of their cooperation in detecting the burglars.

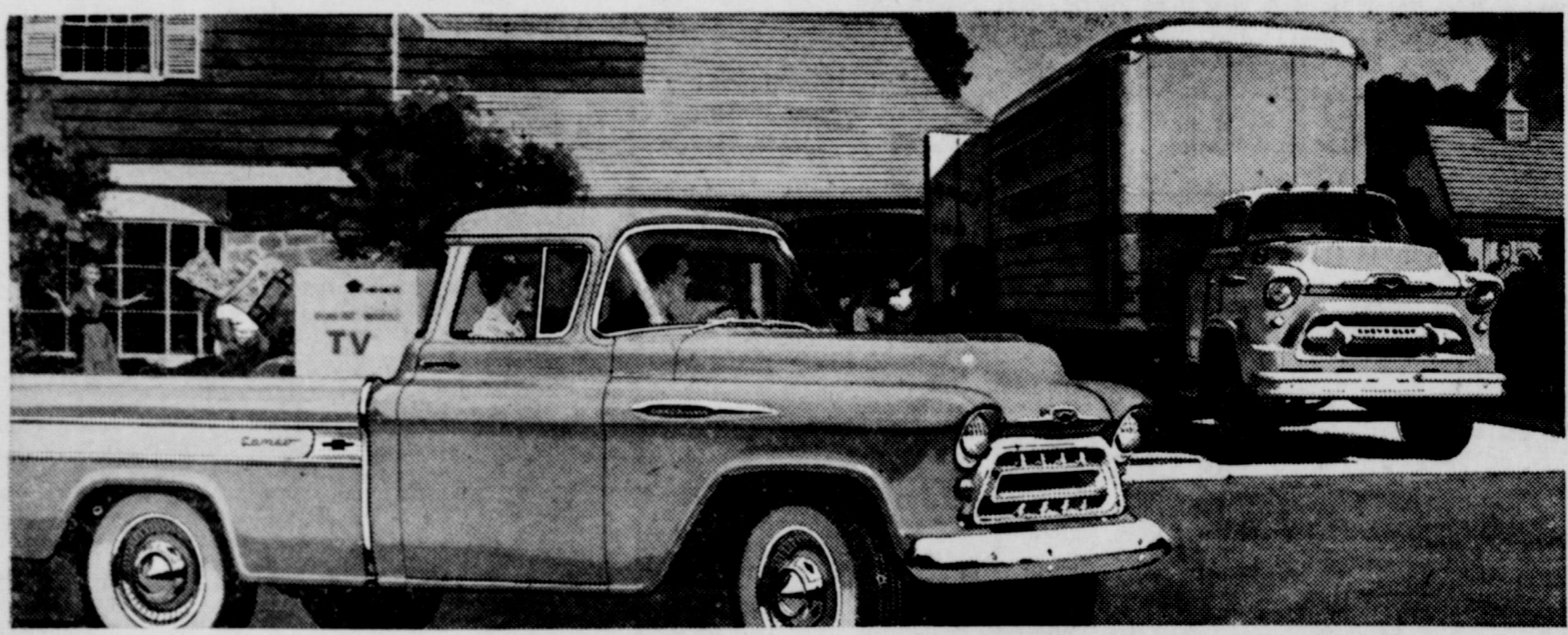

WTU facilities.

"Electric power consumption is an accurate barometer of the health and prosperity of any area. Our undertaking this comprehensive construction program is indicative of our continued confidence in the future of the area we serve," Young said. "We are determined to do whatever is necessary to maintain a dependable and adequate supply of economical electric power for the anticipated industrial expansion of the area as well as for the expected increase in requirements of our domestic and commercial customers."

The announcement of the construction plans begins the second decade of the long-range expansion program begun at the end of World War II. Since then, WTU has invested \$60 million for new facilities and for enlarging existing facilities to provide power for West Texas.

Since 1946, the number of electric customers has increased 43 per cent, from 72,860 to 104,000, increasing from 73,400 kilowatts to 243,500 kilowatts. During the decade, the company's generating capability has almost tripled, increasing from 88,180 to 250,500 kilowatts.

Estimates of future growth indicate that by 1961 the peak load will increase to 366,000 kilowatts. The new generating facilities covered by this five-year construction program will add 170,500 kilowatts to the company's system generating capability. Upon completion of the program in 1961, the company will have available a total generating capability of 421,000 kilowatts, almost 70 per cent greater than the current generating capability.

It was pointed out that since World War II, not only has the number of residential customers increased by almost 47 per cent but individual customers, by adding electrical appliances such as ranges, dryers, air conditioning units, television, etc., have doubled their use of electric service. It is estimated that by 1961, the residential customer's usage will have increased another 50 per cent.

WTU is also interested in the development of nuclear power. Paralleling the present \$51 million power development program, the company is participating in nuclear research activities.

Young said that in the immediate future it was not likely that nuclear fuels would become economically competitive with natural gas for electric production.

WTU's construction is already underway. Work of installing a 5,000 kilowatt gas turbine unit at WTU's gas turbine station northwest of Fort Stockton began earlier this year. The new unit will be in service in 1958.

Construction for the addition of team units at the company's Paint Creek and Rio Pecos plants will begin this fall.

A 53,000 kilowatt steam turbine unit will be added at the Paint Creek plant on Lake Stamford in Haskell County. Construction will begin next and the unit is scheduled to be in operation in May, 1959, increasing the plant's capability to 126,000 kilowatts.

Work is also scheduled to begin this fall at the Rio Pecos plant near McCamey on a 36,500 kilowatt steam unit, which will give that plant a capability of 59,500 kilowatts.

The increasing of generating capability is only one part of providing electric power. Transmission lines, substations and distribution systems must be expanded and increased in size, capacity and quantity in order to get electricity to towns and customers.

To supplement and strengthen the present 2,652 miles of high voltage transmission lines serving West Texas, WTU plans to have in operation by 1960 a continuous 138,000 volt transmission line from the Oklahoma border near Quanah to San Angelo and another 138,000 volt line from the Rio Pecos Plant at McCamey to Val Verde County in southwest Texas.

The transmission line from Oklahoma to San Angelo will provide continuous 138,000 volt interconnection for WTU's Lake Pauline Plant, the Paint Creek Plant in Haskell County, the Abilene Plant, the new Oak Creek Plant and the Concho Plant at San Angelo. This line will also connect with the Public Service Company of Oklahoma's system to provide an additional source of power.

The line from McCamey to Val Verde County will connect at the northern boundary of Val Verde County with Central Power & Light Company's system, providing additional power from that area.

The Oklahoma-San Angelo line will be in service in 1958 when construction of the northern segments of the line are completed. New 138,000 volt lines will be built between Paint Creek Plant and Munday and from Lake Pauline to the Oklahoma border. The existing 69,000 volt line from Lake Pauline to Munday will be converted to 138,000 volts.

In 1959, construction of a second 138,000 volt line from Paint Creek to Abilene will begin.

In that same year, ten miles of 138,000 volt line will be built from the Rio Pecos Plant to McCamey and the present 69,000 volt line from McCamey to the Central Power and Light Company connection in Val Verde County will be converted to 138,000 volt line.

These 138,000 volt lines will be operated in connection with the 69,000 volt system which interconnects with the Southwestern Public Service Company on the north, the Texas Electric Service Company on the east and west, and the lower Colorado River Authority on the south, in addition to the interconnections with the Public Service Company of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Company. These interconnections with other utilities provide for a flow of electric power either into or out of the system as needed.

Not included in the present five year construction budget, but an integral part of future planning, is a proposed new plant in the San Angelo area. Under terms of sale of the water system to the city of San Angelo in 1950, WTU retained water rights sufficient to add approximately 90,000 kilowatts of capacity at the existing Concho Plant in San Angelo or at one of the city's lakes. Current plans indicate the possibility of a new plant being constructed on the Three Rivers Reservoir when completed Young said that he was confident that satisfactory details could be worked out with the City of San Angelo.

The company also owns water rights for additional generation facilities at the Lake Pauline Plant and at the Paint Creek Plant.

The Abilene and Concho Plants will continue to be staffed and maintained as operating units of the company's generating system.

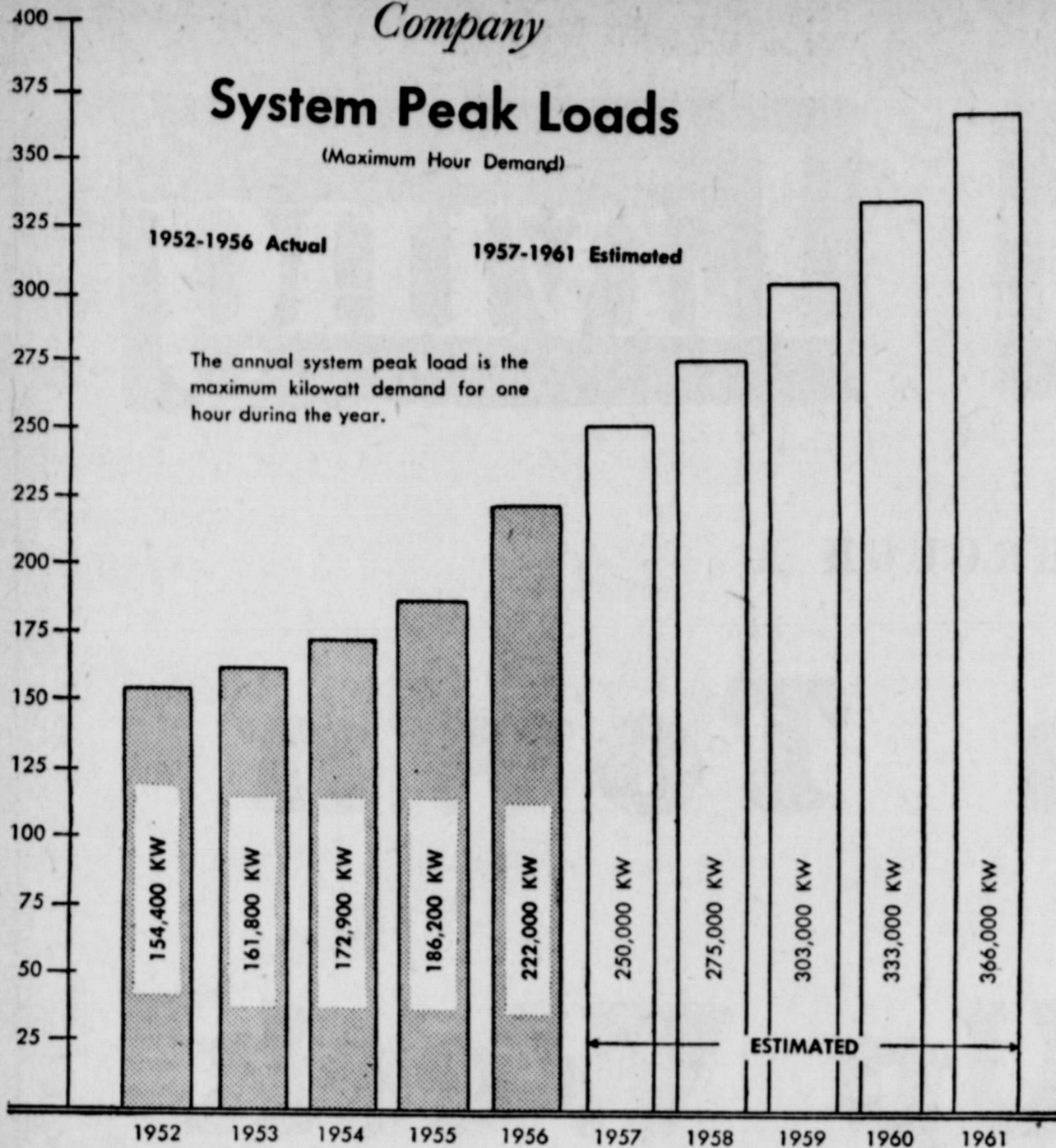
Additional distribution facilities such as main feeders, additional street lighting, capacitors and conversion of distribution systems to higher voltages account for the balance of the five-year program.

Horse Trading Still in Style, WTU Proves

Horse trading is not a lost art in West Texas.

The West Texas Utilities Company needed a site for a new power plant in the Abilene-San Angelo area. Sweetwater owns Oak Creek Lake which is almost half way between Abilene and San Angelo. The Gulf Oil Corporation had purchased water rights to assist Sweetwater in the building of Oak Creek and to provide additional water for its refinery operations in Sweetwater.

A trade was made. A three-cornered deal, mutually beneficial to all participants was worked out. The West Texas Utilities Company purchased one half of the Gulf Oil Corporation's water rights at the lake, approximately one and a half million gallons per day.

Since WTU's new plant will be of the circulation type, which takes water in one side of the plant, uses it to condense steam and discharges the water will actually be used at the Lake and Sweetwater will be relieved of its contract obligation to the oil company of pumping one and a half million gallons of water daily from the lake to the city limits.

When the utility company has completed the installation of 150,000 kilowatts of generating capacity at the new plant and when there exists a public necessity for additional water from the lake the utility company will furnish Sweetwater with funds not to exceed \$75,000 for the construction of a weir in the spillway at Oak Creek Lake.

The construction of the weir will increase the capacity of the lake from its present size of 40,000 acre feet to 50,000 acre feet. The utility company will be reimbursed with water payments.

The utility company obtained a central site for a plant on a 40,000 acre-foot lake adjacent to an existing 138,000 volt transmission line.

Power from Plant Near Here Will Travel Many Miles Over WTU Lines

From Twitty to Presidio it's a long, long line. Just how long the line is the folks at West Texas Utilities Company can best tell, for they maintain the 2,652 miles of high voltage transmission lines connecting the two towns.

WTU serves a long, narrow segment extending across Texas from Twitty, in Wheeler County near the Oklahoma border north of

Shamrock, Texas, down through Abilene and San Angelo on out to Alpine, Marfa and to Presidio on the banks of the Rio Grande.

By highway this route is 628 miles long or just a little farther than from Chicago to Washington, D. C.

Actually the area WTU serves doesn't end at the Rio Grande. While the highline actually ends at a two pole structure on the banks of the Rio Grande, power from the WTU system is fed across the Rio Grande to the Compania de Luz and Fuerza de Ojinaga, S. A. The Mexican electric company serves the town of Ojinaga, population about 5,000.

While the area the company serves is larger than the aggregate area of seven eastern states, WTU officials point out that the company is a relatively small operating company.

On the basis of the number of customers served and electric sales, WTU is the fourth smallest of the twelve major privately-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas.

There are more electric customers in the city of Fort Worth than in the entire WTU service area.

Currently, the company is serving 104,000 customers in 166 towns and communities and rural areas in West Texas, or about 2 customers per square miles.

Commenting on the size of the company, Cal Young, WTU President, said, "Ours is a growing company serving a growing land. West Texas is a land of tremendous natural resources and the people of the area are its finest asset."

"We believe that the area we serve 'The Center of the Great Southwest' is one of the modern industrial frontiers. Here flourishing communities with the enthusiastic and progressive spirit of the people who settled the land and built the towns and cities will continue to develop. It is our intention to grow with the area."

Texas Egg Law Effective Aug. 22

Two night meetings have been scheduled in Coke County to discuss new egg laws. County Agent Sterling Lindsey and Associate Agent James Coffman will be present at each meeting. Next Tuesday night, August 20, a meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. at the Court House in Robert Lee. The next meeting will be on Thursday night, Aug. 22, at 7:30 p. m. at the Ag building in Bronte. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

The new Texas egg law, which becomes effective August 22, provides that no person can buy or sell eggs within this state for subsequent resale without first obtaining a license from the Commissioner of Agriculture.

The exceptions to this law are those who sell from their own flock and claim no grade; hatcheries which buy eggs for hatching; public eating places where all eggs purchased are served by the establishment; food manufacturers purchasing eggs to be used only in their products; and agents employed and carried on the payroll on a salary basis by persons licensed under this act.

To provide a fund for enforcement of the law, each person securing a license shall pay a license fee. Annual fee for dealers, wholesalers and processors will be determined according to average weekly volume of the month in which the person handled the most eggs in the preceding 12 months ending on May 31. Proceeds of the license fees will be paid into the State Treasury by the Commissioner of Agriculture in a fund to be called the Egg Law Enforcement Fund.

Deadline for obtaining licenses is October 20 of this year. Actual enforcement of the law will begin Feb. 17, 1958.

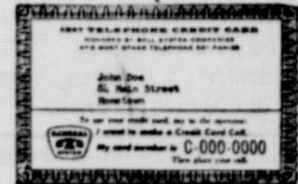
