Various ideas as to how to carry off the water faster have been hashed over in this office this week Some people think the west creek should be widened and cleaned out; some think the old highway bridge over by the Woullard house is holding up the water and should be blasted out, so the water can go on down the creek at a more rapid pace; still others think the bridge on Highway 158 should be lengthened so that water can pass under it more rapidly.

Any one, or all, of these things might be a good idea to help get rid of water.

The thing in our mind is this: Who in West Texas wants to get rid of water? What we need to do instead of HURRYING the water on down the creeks into the Colorado River is to SLOW IT DOWN where it falls.

If we could slow down the water which comes rampaging down the two Kickapoos, we would accomplish not only our acute need for flood control, but we could save the water and we could save the thousands of tons of topsoil which go with any large water runoff. In other words, we could kill three birds with one stone.

The theory of helping the water get away faster solves nothing but possibly the immediate need of keeping our property from being



Butane Service was the only firm to report damage, other than the time and expense involved in cleaning up the mess. Robert H. Sims, owner, estimated he had a \$400 loss to merchandise which got wet. Other places where water entered business houses were Home Motor Co., Cumbie Food Mkt. and Best Service Station. Gulf Service Station had some water get in their wash and grease room, while a small amount of water sloshed into Bronte Ice Co. and the city hall.





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

We feel very badly when we see our own or our neighbor's house or business damaged by flood waters. We even think that it's bad that our roads and other public improvements are damaged, but that's not quite so bad, since tax money will be used to repair and replace them.

We need to bring ourselves around to the realization, however, that both of the above losses are minor compared to the loss of our soil which accompanies excessive rains such as we had last weekend. By our failure to stop this waste of our most precious resource, we are dooming our children and their children to poverty which they have not caused and which they can do noting about. We, right here in the Bronte community, are doing our share to decrease the cultivable acreage of our country, and thereby, helping the U.S. to turn into a place which we wouldn't recognize - one where plentiful food supply is unknown and where hunger and malnutrition are everyday companions.

After reading the above paragraph over, we feel like we had just stepped down off a soap box, but that's exactly the way we see the situation. And, we believe, if you will give it a good look, you will agree with us.

So what is the answer to this terrific problem?

We believe the construction of dams and other soil and water saving devices at the point of the water's origin is the only answer. They would provide controlled runoff for excessive water and do away with problems like we had Sunday morning.

We realize it will take the cooperation of every landowner and other citizen concerned to bring a project of this kind to successful completion. But the cost would be so small compared to the excessive price we are now paying.
