Bronte Business Firms, School To Close for Thanksgiving

Bronte will close up next Thursday, Nov. 28, for the Thanksgiving holiday. The bank, post office and business houses, with the exception of some cafes and service stations, will be closed.

Bronte schools will be dismissed Wednesday afternoon and will resume classes on Monday morning at the regular time, giving students a two-day respite from classes.

Merchants, too, will enjoy the one day rest before the rush of the Christmas season. Bronte merchants this year are sponsoring a "shop Bronte first" campaign, designed to keep as much of the Christmas trade as possible at home this holiday season. Savings stamps, special prices and other savings are being offered by merchants here.

With Thanksgiving coming on the last Thursday in November this year, local merchants also

He said he wished it were possible for every boy and girl in the nation to participate in this important program, which permits young people to become acquainted with the importance of the soil and its products, livestock, arts, crafts, home economics, etc.

Jerry Jameson of Silver was master of ceremonies during the program. He is chairman of the County 4-H Club Council. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Santa Fe Award to Mary Beth Schooler. Leland A. Turner, Santa Fe agricultural director, came from Amarillo to present the award in person. Robert Lee - Wink Bi-District Playoff Will Be Here Tonight

Bronte has been chosen as the site for the Bi-District playoff between Robert Lee and Wink. The game will be played tonight. Robert Lee is the winner of District 6-B while Wink took top hon-

ors in District 5-B. Kickoff time has been set at 8 o'clock.

The Robert Lee Steers enabled themselves to get in the playoffs by downing Bronte in the final district game played last week. Actually the Steers share the cham-

pionship with Hermleigh, but their victory over the Cardinals permits them to play Wink. In regular season's play, the Steers have rolled to seven victories, while being defeated three times. Robert Lee holds victories over Baird, Melvin, Eldorado, Menard, Hermleigh, Loraine and Bronte. Their three losses came at the hands of Stamford B, Santa Anna and Trent.

Wink, playing one of the roughest schedules of any Class B team, has rolled to six wins and has been defeated four times. Included in their season's play, the Wildcats played one AAA team, three AA teams and two Class A ball clubs. In district play, they went undefeated in the three conference games. Their wins came from Jal, New Mex., Ft. Stockton, Crane, Van Horn, Grandfalls and Rankin. Losses were suffered to Sonora, Pecos, Denver City and McCamey.

In the scoring column, Wink holds the edge over the Steers as they have tallied 227 points, while Robert Lee has chalked up 168. On the defensive side of the story, the Wildcats have had 168 points scored against them while Robert Lee has held its opposition to 96 points. Overall, a great game is in store for all fans attending and from The Bronte Enterprise may we say welcome to both teams and may the best team win.

Word has been received here that U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough will be in Bronte today (Friday) at 2:45 p.m. The junior senator from Texas is touring West Texas and will go from here to Robert Lee, then back to San Angelo where he is scheduled to make a TV appearance tonight.

Sen. Yarborough sent word that he would like to meet as many Bronte people as possible in the limited time he will have here. He said he will stop on Main Street and will visit the Enterprise office. He invited everyone in this area to be on hand to give him their views on matters of national political scope.

Sen. Yarborough was elected last year to fill the unexpired term of Price Daniel, who resigned the senate post to assume his duties as governor of Texas.

Clothing Drive For Needy Set Dec. 2-6

Beginning Monday, Dec. 2, local school children will bring bundles of used clothing to school during World Clothing Week. According to Superintendent of Schools Garland Black, the Sorosis Study Club will sponsor the drive which will continue through Friday, Dec. 6, and is part of a nation-wide campaign to raise 3 million pounds of used clothing, shoes and bedding for orphaned and needy children and adults in the United States and overseas. World Clothing Week is conducted by the schools in cooperation with the Christian Children's Fund, Inc., an international charitable organization to assist orphans and other needy persons in the United States and thirty-three countries overseas.

Sorosis Club president, Mrs. Royce Lee, had this to say when announcing the drive: "We expect World Clothing Week to be one of the finest service projects ever conducted by our schools. The clothing collected is used in handicapped areas of America by C. C. F. to help needy children — some of whom can't even attend school regularly because they have no coat or shoes. It goes to aid orphans and other needy person in the United States and overseas. Also, free clothing and bedding is distributed during disaster emergency situations. Every student will be given literature to take home explaining the purpose of the drive and asking the cooperation of parents and friends."

The Christian Children's Fund reports that good used clothing is one of the most vital needs of children and adults the world over.

Shop Early--Shop Bronte First For Those Gift Items

Robert Lee Rolls By Longhorns 25-7 To Take District Honors

A four year winning streak came to an end last Friday night as the Robert Lee Steers outclassed the Bronte Longhorns for the first time since 1953. The win, a 25-7 margin, gave the Steers the chance to represent District 6-B in the bi-district game against Wink, the winner of District 5-B. After capitalizing on a Longhorn fumble, the Steers were never in trouble as the Longhorns were unable to move against the much smaller but faster club. For the Steers, Bub Burson, 130 pound halfback, and Freddie McDonald kept the Steers on the go while Robert Moore played the outstanding game of the year for the Longhorns. Furnishing the offensive punch for the Longhorns were Moore, Reyes Olivias, also a defensive standout, and Albert Grace.

After receiving the opening kickoff, the Steers were forced to punt, giving the Longhorns possession on the Bronte 39. Two plays later, Tommy Gibson pounced on a Longhorn fumble on the 39. Burson carried for 11 to the 28 and McDonald carried twice for nine more yards. Burson carried for two up the gut and then swept left end for 17 yards and the initial touchdown. McDonald ran the extra point to put the Steers out front 7-0.

After the Longhorns received the kickoff following the score, they were forced to punt after three plays failed to gain any yardage. Taking the punt on the 50, the Steers ran up against a stone wall and they, too, were forced to punt. On the first try from the line of scrimmage, the Longhorns fumbled and Charles Calder fell on the loose pighide on the Bronte 35. McDonald was thrown for a two yard loss while Ronnie Sims gained the lost yardage back. Tom Sawyer then carried for 16 to the 19. Burson was stopped for no gain and then he skirted end and went the distance for the tally. The try for the point after was missed and the Steers held a 13-0 lead at the end of the first period.

The second period was scoreless as both teams battled back

and forth, using the punt as a very effective weapon. Late in the second stanza, the Steers took a Bronte punt on their 29 and started a drive that was brought to an end with the ending of the first half. McDonald carried for nine and Burson followed in like manner with a nine yard carry. Five more running plays produced 21 yards to put the Steers on the Bronte 32. Sawyer then connected with Freddy McDaniel with an aerial good for 22 yards. McDonald carried for one yard to the nine as the first half ended.

Taking the kickoff opening the second portion of the contest, the Longhorns ran four plays and failed to gain a first down, being forced to punt. Benny Corley got off a good kick that carried for 51 yards to the Robert Lee four yard line. The Steers were held at that point and kicked to the Steer 39. Latham carried for four to the 35 and then the going got rough as the Longhorns were pushed back to the 47 yard line by the hard charging Steer defense.

Taking over at that point, the Steers marched 53 yards to their third score. McDonald carried for six and Burson added seven. Sawyer again found McDaniel in the clear and connected with a five yard pass. McDonald went for 11 more yards and Burson managed four. McDonald went to the eight on an 11 yard scamper and then slanted off tackle to go eight yards to pay dirt. Moore blocked the conversion try and the Steers led 19-0 at the end of the third quarter.

Taking the kickoff on their 38, the Longhorns succeeded in marching to their lone touchdown in 10 plays. Moore produced four yards and Grace carried for 14 yards. Moore picked up seven and Grace added five to the Steer 37. Olivias gained 12 and Grace picked up 14 more yards to the nine. Moore then outdistanced the Steer defense as he went around end to score standing up. Moore also added the extra point to make the score 19-7.

The final Steer touchdown came late in the final period after taking a short kickoff on the midfield

stripe. Again McDonald and Burson paved the way as the fifty yards were covered in eight tries. McDonald brought the drive to an end by scampering over from the eight yard marker. Again the try for the EP was missed and the Steers were leading 25-7 as the final whistle blew.

The WMU of the First Baptist Church met in an all day meeting on Tuesday to study "Continent in Commotion," a story of life and turmoil in Africa.

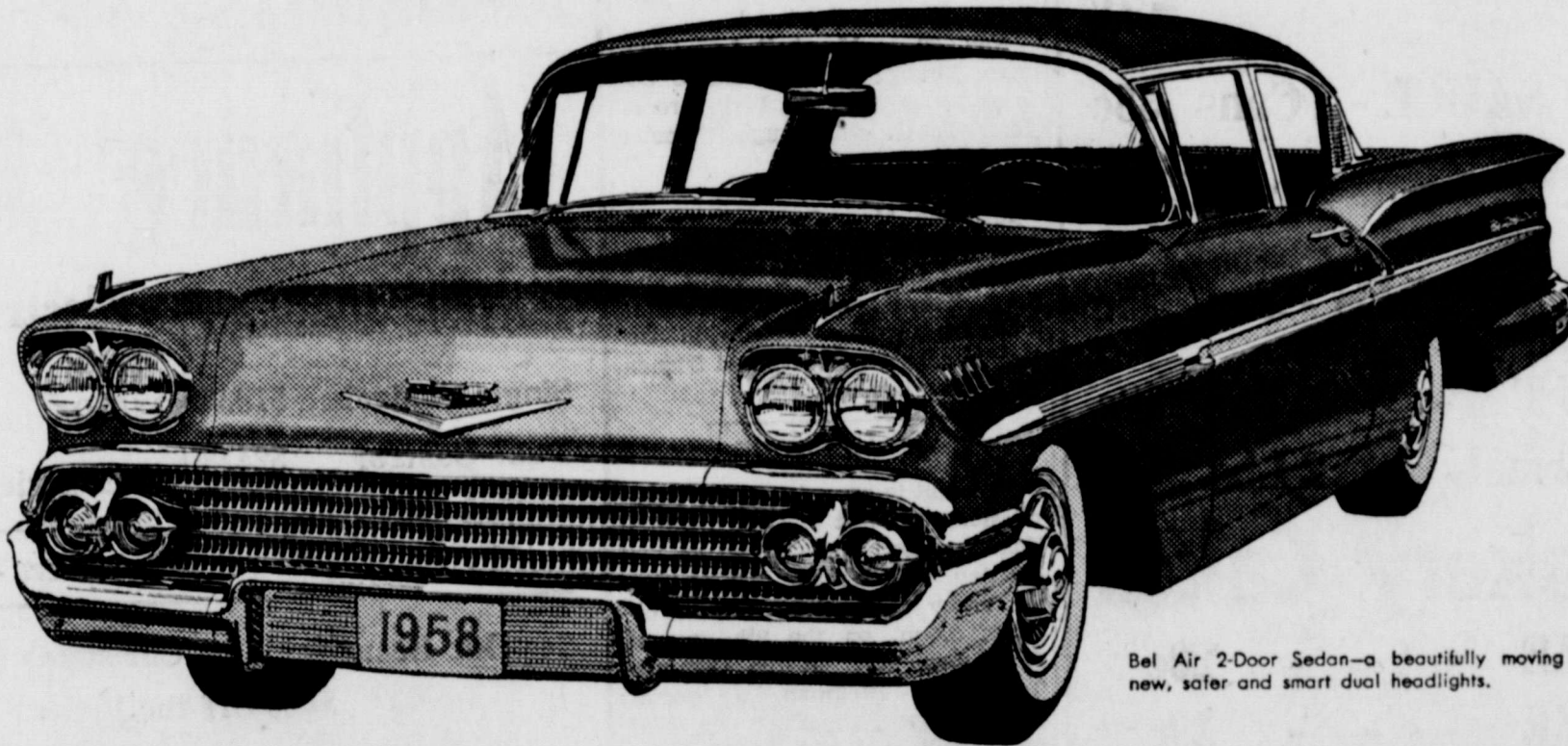

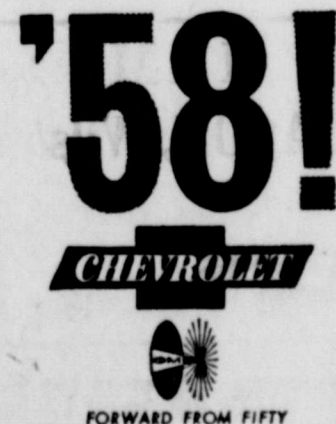
