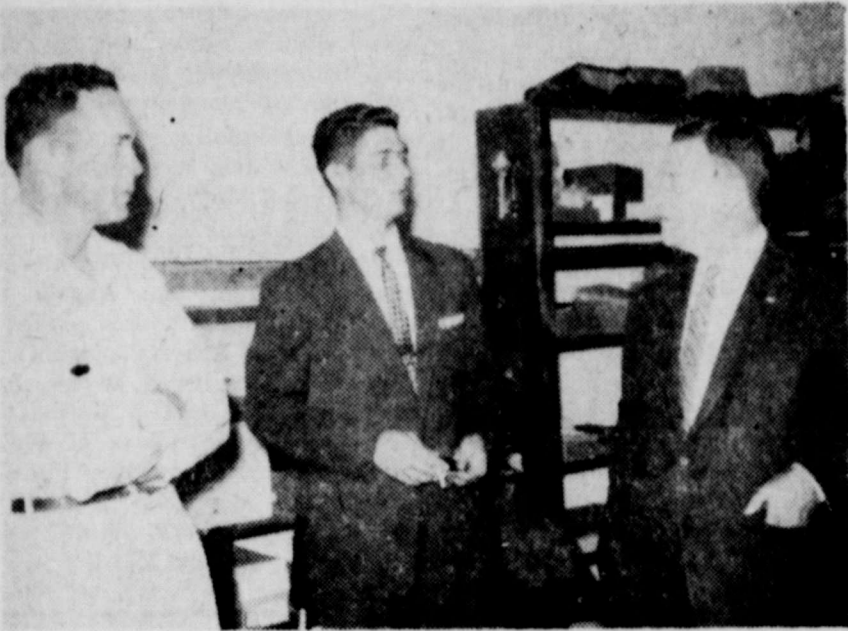

Longhorns Drop 1st Game to Divide

Basketball season got underway last Tuesday night as the Bronte cage team dropped its first outing to Divide, 53-38.

Outmanned by a much taller Divide five, the Longhorns never appeared to be in the contest as the boys from Nolan County controlled the backboards and the tops. Don Bird for Divide was high point man with 22 points while his team mate, Beall Orr, racked in 13. For Bronte, Lanny Denman netted 13 points.

This game opened the new season for the Longhorns under a new basketball mentor, Norman Porter, who succeeded Oscar Dorsey. The Bronte team is lacking in experience with only Sophomore and Junior boys taking the court for the Longhorns. At the present time, there are about 15 boys on the squad.

Will Stephenson, Bronte Farmer, Dies Suddenly

Willie Ray Stephenson, 69, long time Coke County resident, died suddenly at his home Tuesday at 7:45 p. m. Mr. Stephenson had spent the day working at his farm south of here and became ill late in the afternoon.

Funeral services will be held Friday from the Kickapoo Baptist Church, with the pastor, the Rev. R. W. Blackmon, officiating. He will be assisted by the Rev. Clyde W. Coleman of Grapevine and the Rev. R. H. Reeves of Dallas, both former pastors here. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery.

Mr. Stephenson was born Sept. 11, 1888, the son of the late J. H. and Nancy Bird Stephenson. He moved to Bronte from Mills County in 1900 and was a stock farmer. His farm, located south of the Colorado River, is one of the best in this area.

Mr. Stephenson was a deacon in the Kickapoo Baptist Church here. He attended Bronte High School, and was married to Miss Altha Wrinkle Dec. 15, 1912.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Hollis Ensor of Bronte and Mrs. Monroe Overman of Midwest City, Okla.; two brothers, Marshal Stephenson of Bronte and Orel Stephenson of Detroit, Mich.; one sister, Mrs. A. O. Vaughn of James Springs, N. M.; five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers will be Mr. Stephenson's nephews, and members of the men's Sunday School class at the Kickapoo Baptist Church will be honorary pallbearers.

Blackwell Plans For New Roads Are Competed

Two called sessions of the Blackwell city council were held recently to sign papers submitted by the State Highway Department to complete Highway 70 through town and to pave Main street to connect with farm to market road No. 1170, to be built through Blackwell, main street crossing Highway 70 on Del Rio street.

Highway No. 70 will be completely rebuilt for one mile through town and have a 40 ft. wide pavement. Plans of the Highway Department are to begin on the project as soon as feasible.

The farm to market road, No. 1170, to be built on main street from Highway 70, will be 26 feet wide to the west city limits and will be let by contract job.

Wink Wins Playoff From Robert Lee

The Wink Wildcats advanced to the Regional playoffs by downing Robert Lee Steers last Friday night 26-0. The local stadium was the site of the contest played in freezing weather and on a field partially covered with snow.

The Steers put up a valiant fight the first half, but after the opening of the third period, the Wildcats proved to be too much for the undermanned Steers. The first half went scoreless until late in the

second quarter when the Wildcats recovered a Steer fumble on the Robert Lee 19.

Near the end of the second stanza, the Steers were forced back to their 19 by a Wink quick kick. Two plays later, the Steers fumbled and the lads from Wink were in possession at that point. Five plays later, Cleveland Robinson, 130 pound Negro half back, went off left tackle to score from the five. Wink converted and led 7-0 at intermission.

On the first play of the third period, Charles Wilhelm broke in to the secondary and raced 53 yards to score. The try for extra point was missed.

Minutes later after receiving a short kick on the Steer 26, two tries produced the score and Wink was in command with a 20-0 lead. Moments later, end Joe Green intercepted a Robert Lee pass and raced 27 yards to score the final touchdown. The EP was missed and the Wildcats had a 26-0 victory.

In statistics, Wink scored 10 first downs to the Steers 7 and the Wildcats rolled up 167 yards rushing to Robert Lee's 79. Thru the air, the Wildcats completed 2 for 39 yards while Robert Lee connected with five for 17 yards.

Wink was scheduled to meet Baird yesterday (Thanksgiving) in the regional playoff at Big Spring. Baird team downed Rochester to gain the playoffs. Wink was favored in the contest.

Early Snows Falls Over This Area

One of the earliest snows on record for this area fell over the past weekend. Snow began falling in the night Thursday and continued all day Friday. Although hard freezes occurred both Thursday and Friday nights, the temperature was around 33 degrees all day Friday, with most of the snow melting as it fell.

The snowfall ceased late Friday afternoon. More snow flurries occurred in the night Saturday but this area failed to get the heavy snows which occurred south of here, in Concho and Tom Green counties. Eden measured 13 inches.

FHA BEAU AND FFA SWEETHEART

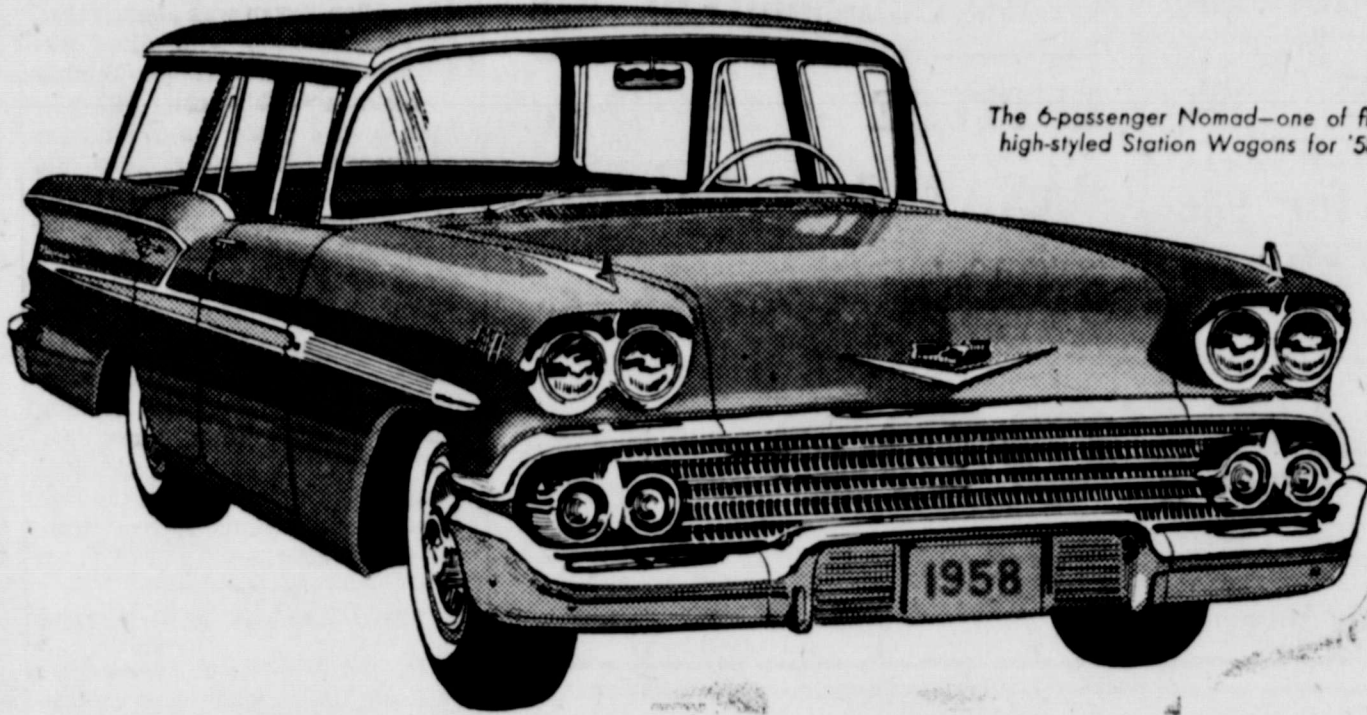
Deanie Allen was selected by Bronte Future Farmers as their sweetheart for this year. There will be a district banquet later

Future Homemakers have also elected the FHA Beau. He is Stover Taylor, Bronte High School Junior.

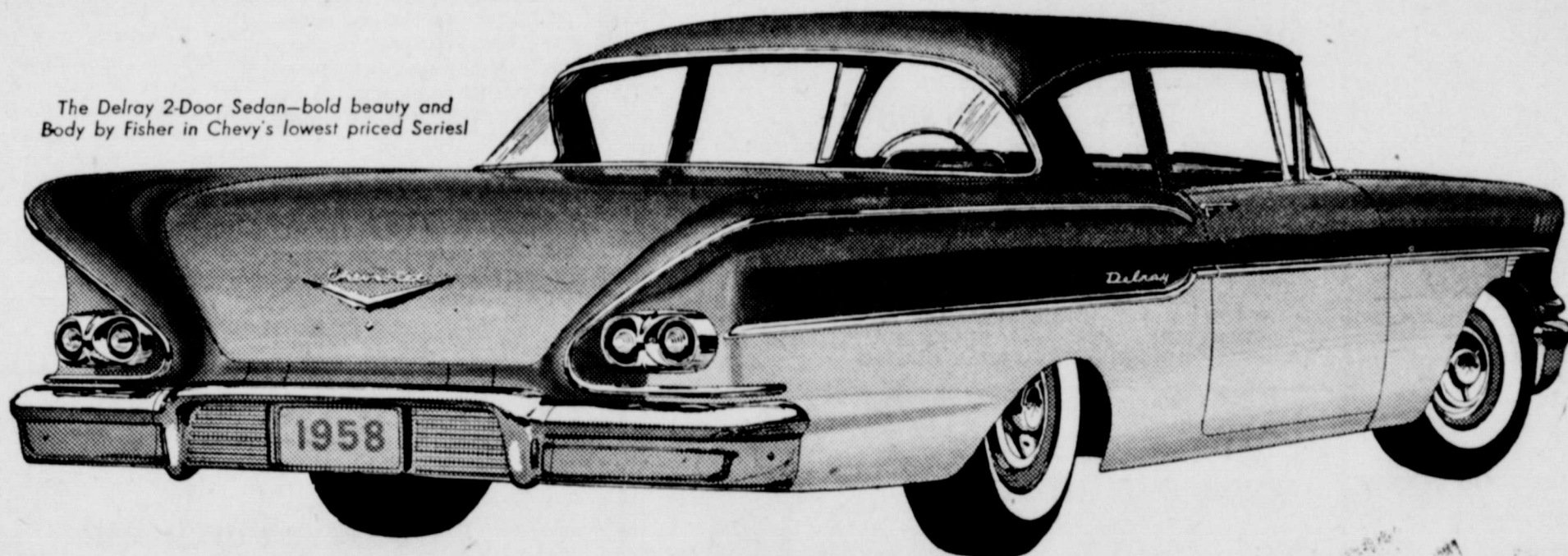

Early Mailing Helps Speed Up Xmas Delivery

Postmaster Noah Pruitt, Jr. said this week, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas."

The Postmaster urged special care in preparing gift packages for the mails and asked that all addresses be legible and complete.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where the package is mailed.

Pruitt said that when wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper, he said, for extra protection against shock and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place

a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipient's full name, street address, city, zone and state.
