> Gene Sherrod, speaking on delinquency, emphasized that young people are basically good, that they obey what they are taught whether it is right or wrong, and that money, since many juverile delinquents come from well-to-do homes, can't buy love and discipline necessary from parents. He defined delinquency as "a neglect of duty" and concluded that much of it is actually "adult delinquency."

Bette Blackmon's subject was 'Home and Family Relationships' and she also brought out the need for parents' love and suggested that parents should make children responsible at an early age, giving them chores and commanding their respect. When young people respect and love their par ents, she said, the young people will always stay within the bounds set for them.

Robert L. Moore spoke to the group concerning honor systems in school and life. He concluded that life begins and ends with honesty and that if a child is taught to be honest from the very beginning, he will never be dishonest. Teachers and parents, he said, should show trust in youth. 'A lack of trust causes inferior feelings, a loss of will power and maybe, sooner or later, dishonesty."

Linda Henry, in discussing 'Bronte vs. Its Youth," pointed out that recreation facilities here include movies, picnic areas, swimming pool, tennis, basketball and croquet courts. But she feld there is not enough supervised inside recreation. She told of a lack of sponsored clubs and other special events for youth only.

Albert Grace told the group of the importance of good recreation, saying that Bronte youth turned mostly to the school for winter recreation. He said the worst recreation situation in Bronte is the hot rodding and fast driving and added that good leadership in all recreation is the most important factor in building

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

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
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

was built. It was then named the Karen-Gayl Hospital and was built by J. M. Rippetoe. The original structure had seven patient beds, and the doctor set up his office in a small room in the hospital.

In 1948, the doctor leased the hospital from Rippetoe and purchased it soon after. By 1950, the tiny office had grown too small and was moved to a new building adjacent to the hospital. The business office and part of the lab were also moved to the new office and the John Harris Clinic came into being.

By 1951, conditions at the hosnew wings were added, giving it a bed capacity of fifteen, and it was renamed the Bronte Hospital. At that time refrigerated air conditioning, a new operating and delivery room and a new kitchen were also added.

By 1956, the hospital again was feeling the pinch of "too little room," and the formal opening of another new wing was held in May. That addition, which brought the hospital to its present size, added a larger operating room, a nurses lounge, and eight new patient rooms, making it possible to care for at least 23 patients.

#### **20 Young Doctors Have Trained Here** Under Dr. Harris

Dr. Dean Adams was first introduced to Bronte when he came here as a preceptee in November of 1955. He is one of 20 preceptees who have trained here under Dr. John R. Harris. The 21st one is due to arrive in March of this year and will begin training.

The preceptee program began when all senior students from the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston were required to go out to various places in the state to practice medicine under the supervision of an experienced physician. For a three months period, these students are placed only with qualified doctors who atend post graduate courses in the latest and best methods of medical techniques and who do the required amount of study-hours each year. Failure to comply removes that doctor from the preceptor rolls.

One of the preceptees who trained here wrote the following concerning his experiences here:

"One of the first lessons learned is that mercy is the mission. pain is the problem, and health is obtained in medical school, judg- state's hospitals.

ment refined by year of experience and independent study. The attitude in the small town is vastly different from the large medical centers in that every patient here is a friend and personal acquaintance, whereas in the centers he is merely a medical problem.

"The second lesson learned is that everything is relative; there are no absolutes when dealing with the whole man. The absolutes taught in school are simply the base lines of knowledge from which we are supposed to travel to wisdom. Lacking the numerous tests and aids of the large centers, we learn how the general practitioner must sharpen his diagnostic acument, showing the graphic difference in a techinician and a physician.

"The third lesson is that the doctor is an integral part of his community, and after years of isolation in the cloisters of learning, this is a revalation, indeed. We learn that he is a citizen as well as a scientist.

"So we leave with a greater feeling of humility as the scope of our profession has been broadened far beyond the indication given in Cecil's Textbook of Medicine.

The practice of medicine is a way of life anywhere it is done; and the practice of medicine in the small town, that is, being a country doctor, has certain inherent qualities which makes it even more unique. At least that is the conclusion of the publisher of The Enterprise.

We believe that doctors, if they are good ones, have to give more of themselves to their profession than do most people.

From all indications, this has been and is being done. Not only are our local doctors willing to give everything they have when some person's life is hanging in the balance, they have been willing to gamble their futures by settling and investing in a small town.

In the fall of 1950 Dr. Harris moved his office from the hospital to a frame building just north of the hospital. This was no big thing. It was first called, again, an office; but then there were ideas of it's just being an office and seeing patients that were afraid to walk into a building where people were extremely sick. But about that time there were some opinions about "country clinics", that were becoming popular and maybe some local people went along with the tide. New techniques and diagnoses were coming out, and they wanted to give the service people deserved.

The practice of medicine is usually a routine affair. But suppose they pick up one case of early cancer, diabetes or a latent heart disorder (the acute ones are fairly easy to dignose). Who says "what's it worth?" We have recently seen our own area hospitals being criticized, but we feel that the saving of one life is worth the price of them.

One of the most intelligent physicians of the past century was Sir William Osler. Some of his views and opinions are being printed here. Dr. Osler died in 1919 but the editor feels that his observations are of value today.

Osler said: "The environment of a large city is not essential to the growth of a good clinical physician. Even in small towns a man can, if he has it in him, be-



Self-centered, selftaught, he leads a solitary life, and unless his ever-day experience is controlled by careful reading or by the atrition of a medical society it soon ceases to be of the slightest value and becomes a mere accretion of isolated facts, without correlation. It is astonishing with how little reading a

he may do it."

Dr. Osler was speaking to a young group of doctors when he continued: "May this be the destiny of a large majority of you. Have no higher ambition! You cannot reach any better position in a community; the family doctor is the man behind the gun, who does our effective work. That his life is hard and exacting that he is underpaid and overworked; that he has but little time for study and less for recreation - these are the blows that may give finer temper to his steel, and bring out the nobler elements in his character.

"And the master-word is Work, a little one, as I have said, but fraught with momentous sequencees if you but write it on your hearts. But there is serious difficulty in getting you to understand the paramount importance of the work-habit as part of your organization. You are not far from the Tom Sawyer stage with its philosophy that work consists of whatever a body is obliged to do, and that play consists of whatever a body is not obligated to do.

"Many seek peace, few pursue it actively, and among these few, we are not often to be found. In one sense every one of us may

The physician, like the Christian, has three great foes - ignorance, which is sin; apathey, which is the world; and vice, which is the devil. One of the most important parts, room in the hospital has been ing of pain is admitted to the hospital or clinic, tests are run not only as diagnostic procedures, but to determine the seriousness and cause of the iliness. To find whether the pain is due to an infection, a white blood count is done-as the body defends itself by speeding up production of these cells which destroy harmful bacteria.

> A high count means an infection somewhere in the body. A red blood count and hemoglobin determination tells the doctor whether the infection or illness is a chronic thing, whether or not there has been a steady loss of blood, a drop in blood production, or a lack of materials out of which blood is made, producing what is known as anemia

This also tells him if the body is strong enough to fight this infection. Te questions of how extensive this disease is and whether or not tissue is being destroyed is anwered with another test, a sedimentation rate. Determining the rate at which cells fall through the fluid vehicles of the blood, while a simple procedure, is a very important adjunct in ascertaining where to point the guns of disease control.






