Supt. Garland Black Re-Elected Head of Bronte School System

Supt. Garland Black was rehired for another year by the Bronte School board when the members met in regular session Thursday night, Feb. 13. The board expressed their satisfaction with Black's work when they commended him for the job he has done with the entire school system. He has been superintendent the past three years.

The board called an election to be held Saturday, April 5, for the purpose of electing two school trustees. More information will be found in a separate story in this week's Enterprise.

Other business attended to included the following:

Approval of the purchase of a new school bus for the Tennyson route. It was brought out that the school is able to purchase one new bus a year with transportation money received from the State of Texas.

Expression of appreciation to Caperton Chevrolet Co. for selling the school a new 1958 pickup at actual cost. This vehicle is

for use of the vocational agriculture department. The local Chevrolet dealer allowed \$500 trade-in for the old pickup, which had been in use for nearly five years.

Approval of the purchase of band equipment as follows: two flutes, one small bass drum, one trombone and 12 music stands. This equipment was considered by the board to be necessary for the continued improvement of the school band.

Appointment of Hurlin Lee, Joe Rawlings and Allen Sherrod as a committee to inspect the roof of the bus shed and vocational ag. building and decide if repairs are needed at this time.

2 Elections Called in Early April

City Ballot Still Needs Candidate For Councilman

The status of the city election ballot remained the same this week, Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, reported Thursday. Two candidates have announced for mayor and two have announced for the three council posts.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 1, at the city hall in Bronte.

Deadline for filing for any of the city jobs is March 1, or 30 days prior to the election. Anyone who is a bona fide voting resident of the city of Bronte is qualified to run. Candidates must file their names with the city secretary in order to be included on the ballot.

J. A. Stephenson and Dr. John R. Harris are seeking the office of mayor. Ernest Ivey, the incumbent, is not running for another term, since he is a candidate for county judge of Coke County.

Billy Gene Thomas and Ben Oglesby are candidates for seats on the council. Both presently hold the offices. Thomas has served one term and Oglesby is completing his second term. The other incumbent on the council, Charlie Boecking, is running for county and district clerk, and consequently is not a candidate for re-election.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge at the city election. He will secure the necessary clerks.

Longhorns Beat Christoval for First District Win

Bronte's Longhorns rolled to their first district victory last Monday night as they downed the Christoval Cougars 51-37 on the Cougars home court. Despite the victory, the Longhorns virtually finished last in district play with Wall and Miles being tied for the top position.

The Longhorns jumped out front 6-2 early in the first period and then slowed things down by playing keep away type basketball.

Toward the end of the first quarter, both teams picked up and as the period ended, the Longhorns held a 14-11 advantage over the Cougars. In the second stanza, the Longhorns held on to the ball and managed to pick up six points from the charity line as the Cougars started to foul in an attempt to get possession of the ball. Bronte moved out front 22-11 late in the second quarter and at intermission time, they held a 26-14 lead.

Being consistent with their stall, the Longhorns managed to hang on to their 12 point lead as both teams matched each other on baskets throughout the third period. At the end of the third period, the Longhorns led 38-27. The final period saw the Longhorns net 13 points while they held Christoval to 10 points as the Longhorns rolled up their 51-37 victory.

Benny Corley was high scorer for Bronte with 13 while team mates Ronnie Cole and Albert Grace netted 12 and 11. Wayne Solomor of Christoval was the high scorer of the contest with 15.

School Board Election April 5; 2 to Be Named

An election will be held Saturday, April 5, to name two trustees to the board of the Bronte Independent School District. The election was called by the school board at a meeting Thursday night, Feb. 13.

Terms of Jacob B. Morrow, present president of the board, and Allen Sherrod expired this year. The board voted to place the names of the incumbents on the ballot for re-election.

Hurlin Lee, board secretary, said Thursday that Sherrod's and Morrow's were the only two names which had been turned in to him as candidates for the positions.

Lee said that anyone who wishes to run for school board must submit his name either to him or to the county judge's office at least thirty days before the election. The deadline this year will fall on March 6.

A candidate's name may also be placed on the ballot by a petition signed by five local voting citizens. The petitions should be turned in to Lee or the judge's office before the deadline.

Balloting places will be set up at the Bronte city hall and at the W. T. Green store in Tennyson. D. K. Glenn will be election judge at Bronte, while Mrs. Green will be judge at Tennyson.

18 Speeders Picked Up Here Saturday Night

Justice of the Peace C. E. Bruton said this week that complaints had been filed against 18 persons for speeding near here Saturday night. All were apprehended with the use of radar to check their speed.

The offenders hailed from Abilene, Sweetwater, Trent, Stamford, Lubbock, San Angelo and Odessa.

Total fines and costs amounted to \$369.00, or \$20.50 for each offender.

Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m., with the meeting starting at 9.

Fifteen teams were invited to enter, but only six entries were received by Norman Porter, Director of the tourney and coach of the Bronte team. Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place winners and the consolation winners. The All-Tournament team will consist of five players selected by the coaches.

The support of Bronte fans is asked by directors of the tournament as they endeavor to get the Bronte tournament back in action for the first time in several years. The admission price will be 50 cents and 25 cents each session. The tournament will cover three sessions.

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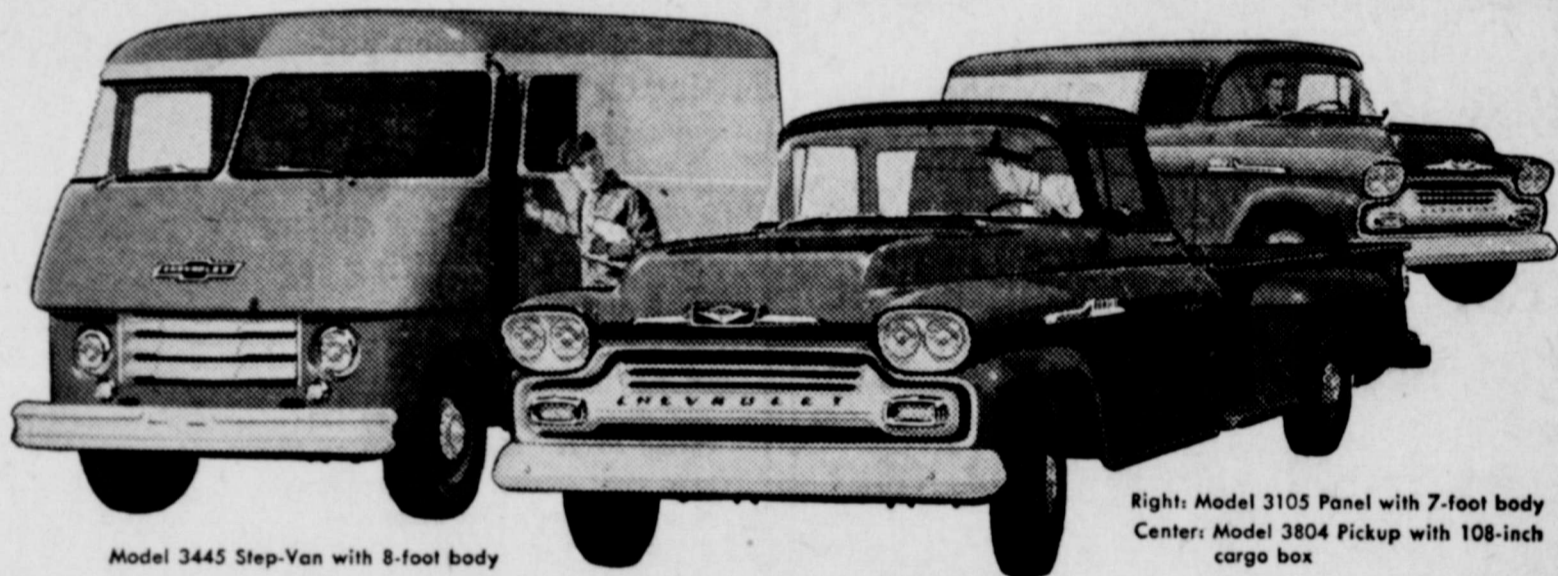


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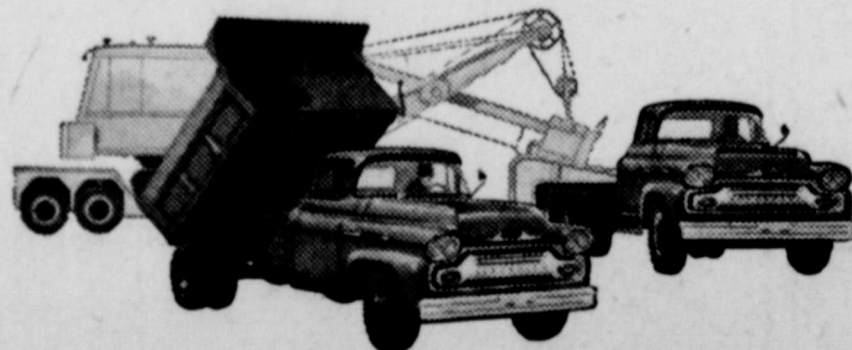
