Bronte Federated clubs were honored last weekend when Mrs. A. J. House of Yoakum, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, visited here. A joint meeting of the three local federated clubs and the Junior Study Club was held in the Methodist Church Saturday night, with a large turn-out of club women. Bronte's three federated units are the Sorosis, Progressive and Diversity clubs.

Guests were served cookies and punch from a serving table laid with a green cloth and centered with daffodils. Other flower arrangements decorated the church.

Mrs. House was introduced by Mrs. O. H. Willoughby and spoke to the group on "Federation."

Hostesses representing the clubs were Meses. Joe Rawlings, J. B. Morrow, J. T. Henry, Cecil Kemp, C. C. Glenn and Edna Butner.

In addition to being president of some 100,000 Texas club women, Mrs. House represents Texas each year in Washington, D. C., where she served on the Board of Directors of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the largest group of organized women in the world, with members in each of the states, Alaska, Hawaii and 58 other nations. It represents an overall membership of more than 15 million women.

Some of her other recognitions include: appointment to the Governor's Water Planning Committee, the Board of Directors of the Texas Symphony Association, the Sam Houston Memorial Association, and the Texas Citizens Committee on the Hoover Report.

She is a member of the Texas Council for Adult Education, the State Library Association and represents her organization on the Texas Historical Survey Committee, and the Advisory Council of Civil Defense.

She is also a member of the National Association of Parliamentarians, the Texas State Song Committee, the Council of International Relations, the National Society of Arts and Letters and the Texas Society of Washington, D. C.

Mrs. House's administration theme has been "Abundant Living Thru' Service" and the project for her administration has been the Dorothy House Vieman Oriental Scholarship. Already, this scholarship has assisted three students from the Orient in the past two years.

She was a guest in the home of Mrs. O. H. Willoughby overnight.

Mayor, Three Councilmen to Be Named in City Election April 1

Tuesday, April 1, is election day in Bronte. Three councilmen and a mayor will be elected, all for two year terms. A rather large turnout is expected because of the number of candidates for the four vacancies. Two candidates are running for mayor and five for the three places on the council.

The city election will be held at the city hall, with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Anyone who has lived in the city limits for a period of six months or more and has a poll tax receipt or exemption is eligible to vote in the election.

Running for mayor are Dr. John R. Harris and J. A. Stephenson. Stephenson is a retired rural mail carrier and postmaster and Dr. Harris is owner of the Bronte Hospital.

The five candidates for councilman are Bill Thomas, C. E. Bruton, H. A. Springer, Ben Oglesby, and Joe George Wilkins.

Thomas is an employee of Humble Oil & Refining Co.; Bruton is owner of the local White Auto Store; Springer is local manager for West Texas Utilities Co.; Oglesby is publisher of The Bronte Enterprise; and Wilkins is a farmer and rancher. Thomas and Oglesby are presently serving on the city council, while the other three candidates have served on it during the past three years.

Neither Dr. Harris nor Stephenson has ever held a city office.

Present mayor, Ernest Ivey, is not a candidate for re-election, as he is running for county judge, and the other councilman whose term expires this year, Charlie Boecking, did not seek re-election, as he is a candidate for county and district clerk. Councilmen whose terms do not expire this year are Matthew Caperton and Bob Wilson.

The mayor's office pays \$7.50 per month, while councilmen draw \$5.00.

Local observers were doubtful if the turnout for this election would be as large as four years ago when a record number of 207 voted in city balloting.

ABSENTEE VOTES

Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said Thursday afternoon that two local persons had voted absentee in the city election. They were going to be out of town next Tuesday, the day of the election.

EASTER EGG HUNT

An Easter egg hunt is scheduled for Easter Sunday at the Bronte County Park. Aubrey Denman, caretaker of the park, announced that the egg hunters will be divided into three groups: children of pre-school age, children from six to nine years of age, and children over nine years of age.

Prize eggs will be hidden along with dozens of others. Denman invited all the children in this area to make their plans to be at the park Easter Sunday at 3 p. m.

March 31 Last Day To Buy Car Tags

Monday, March 31, is the last day to purchase car license plates. Cars may not be operated on public highways without new plates after that date.

Up to Wednesday noon the office of the tax assessor-collector in Robert Lee had sold almost 300 sets of the new plates.

New inspection stickers must be on the cars by April 15. John A. Marion, inspector with the Department of Public Safety, was in Bronte Thursday. He said that only 1437 of the total 2538 registrations in the county had been inspected. This is a percentage of 56.6.

He was born Sept. 4, 1901.

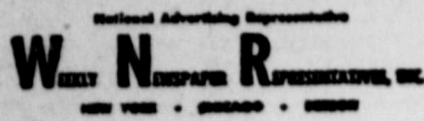

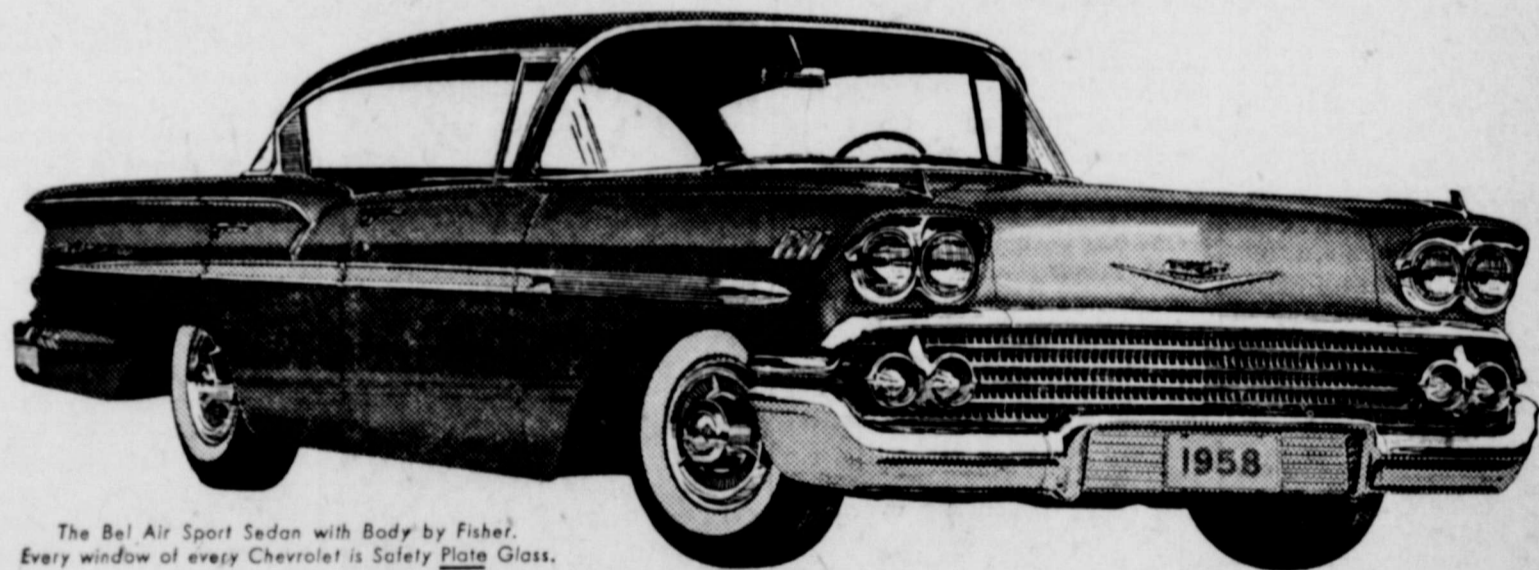

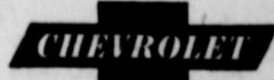

Phone Bills To Include Toll Tickets

A new service for all users of long distance has been inaugurated this month by General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Starting with the March telephone bills, customers will receive the original record, or toll ticket, for each long distance call charged to their telephone number.

These original toll tickets, which are made up by the operator at the time the long distance call is placed, will be enclosed with the regular statement. The total

charges for telephone service, including federal tax, will appear on the face of the bill, and the toll tickets will replace the itemized statement of long distance calls. This new service will permit subscribers to check details about each call charged to their number.

Adjustments for incorrect charges will still be handled, in person or by telephone, at the local telephone company business office, but the ticket in question must either be mailed or brought to the local office.

Before mailing the original ticket to subscribers, the telephone company will have recorded each ticket on modern micro-film, which will give the telephone company a permanent record of all long distance toll tickets.

The local district manager has asked the subscribers bear in mind, that the operators are instructed to spell names, that will appear on toll tickets, as they sound, rather than delaying the call to verify correct spelling. He emphasized that calls are charged against the telephone number and not necessarily the name appearing on the toll ticket.

Mark Cooper, public relations director for the company, stated that this new service is for the convenience of customers, and it

More Money Made Available for Those Who Wish to Put Acreage in Soil Bank

C. E. Arrott, chairman of the local county ASC committee, reports that most farmers who wanted to take part in the 1958 Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank, but could not file signed agreements because of fund limitations, will apparently be able to sign up at the county office in the near future.

Both the Senate and House have approved a supplemental appropriation of 250 million dollars to provide for additional Acreage Reserve participation.

This will bring the total to 750 million dollars for the 1958 program. Because agreement on some detailed program provisions must still be reached in House-Senate conference, congressional action on the supplemental appropriation is not yet complete.

Last Rites Held At Blackwell for Carl Whiteaker, 73

Funeral services for Carl M. Whiteaker, 73, long-time Blackwell farmer who died from illness Thursday night of last week in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, were held at Blackwell First Methodist Church last Saturday afternoon.

Rev. Jarrell Sharp, pastor of the church, officiated. He was assisted by the Rev. John English, pastor of Abilene First Methodist Church.

Burial followed in the Blackwell cemetery. Pallbearers were Emmitt Ware, R. Q. Spence, Dewey Nabors, Lee Lackey, Bill Ware, Henry Rainey.

Mr. Whiteaker was born Oct. 7 1884 in Bell County and moved to Nolan County as a child. He was married to Amanda Killman Slater at Sweetwater in 1904 and they had lived in Blackwell since that time.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Noble Whiteaker of San Diego, Calif.; one brother, Mark Whiteaker of Georgetown, Tex.; three step-sons — M. C. Slater of Sweetwater and Arthur L. and John D. Slater of Dallas; a grandson, Noble Dean Whiteaker of Los Angeles, Calif.; a step grandson, J. C. Slater of South Bend, Ind.; and two great grandchildren.

As soon as the final action is taken, the County Committees will get the go ahead for completing the sign-up. Preliminary steps have been taken by the State ASC Committee to prepare the way for immediate action when the supplemental funds are authorized.

In addition to farmers, who have already signed agreements, which were in general covered by the initial appropriation for the acreage reserve, other eligible farmers will be in position to take part in the enlarged program. These will include those whose names are on the waiting list registers at the County Office, and possibly others where there is evidence that they made an attempt to participate during the sign-up period.

While it is expected that in general funds will be available to take care of all farmers, who indicated that they would take part in the program if it was enlarged, there is a Legislative Annual Limitation of 300 million dollars for the corn Acreage Reserve. Because the total of signed agreements and other applications on waiting lists would call for more than 300 million dollars, if all the corn applications were completed, some adjustment will be necessary for this crop.

Public notice will be given when the County ASC office is ready to sign additional acreage reserve agreements.

Arrott says that in the meantime the county office will be prepared to furnish general information but that farmers should not attempt to sign up agreements until official announcements are made.

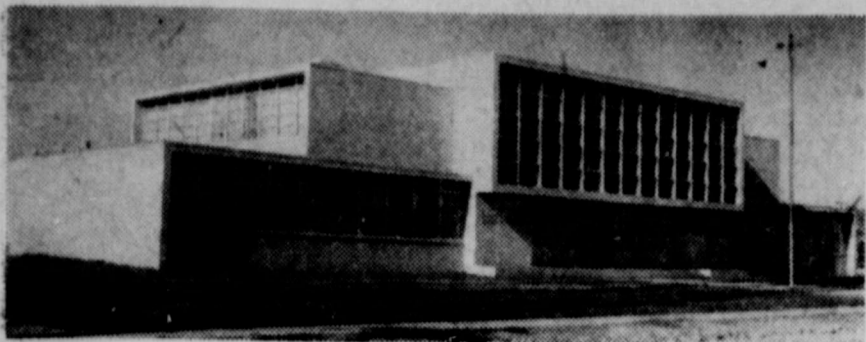

THANKS

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Bronte for their cooperation during the four years I have served as your mayor. Working with the past and present city councils and the people of Bronte has been a real pleasure to me and I think all the councils I have served with have done a wonderful job.

Since I announced for County Judge, some of my good neighbors have been telling people in Bronte, Robert Lee and other places in the county, that if I am elected judge I would ruin the county just as I had broke the City of Bronte.

I guess this is politics, but I think I ought to let the people know what the city council of Bronte has done during the past four years.

Through the efforts of your city council and county officials, Bronte has gained 132 blocks of paving, a nice swimming pool and park, street lights on practically every street in town, stop signs at every intersection on the highways and other dangerous corners, a 50,000 gallon water tower, \$4,044 worth of pipe and water meters, \$253 worth of fire hydrants, and a \$910 maintainer.

During this four years, we have made a debt of \$3,040 to purchase right-of-way for the rebuilding of Highway 277 through town. The state will pay us back right at \$900 of this amount, which will leave us owing only \$2,100. Plans have been made to repay this amount next November.

Here are some of the things we have paid on old indebtedness:

\$33,600 to the UCRA for our pipeline to Oak Creek Lake
\$20,435 on principal and interest on bonds and warrants
\$54,035 total paid.
\$ 2,100 Indebtedness taken on last four years
\$51,935 Indebtedness paid during last four years.

Also, three years ago, city employees were placed under social security and insurance was taken out on them. These two items have cost \$663.71 and \$500, respectively.

The balance the city had on hand on April 1, 1954, when I took office, amounted to \$5,686.86, and as of March 1, 1957, we had a balance of \$6,968.05 on hand—more than a thousand dollars increase.

During the last four years we have had no tax raise and the increase in the tax roll has not amounted to much.

All the figures cited here are a matter of public record and can be checked at the city hall in Bronte.

So you see the City of Bronte owes almost \$52,000 less than it did four years ago, besides having a new water tower and paying out several thousand dollars in connection with the street paving project and the swimming pool park project. That is how the city council which is now serving and has served during the last four years has broke the city.

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Grass seeding is the order of the day as farmers in the Coke Soil Conservation District are starting to plant their conservation land to perennial grasses. Approximately 20,000 acres in Coke County will be planted this year. Of this 20,000 acres almost one-fourth will be planted to drilled-in grass mixtures.

Austin Sandusky, who farms near Bronte, has completed drilling a mixture of Sand Love, Blue Grama, K. R. Bluestem, Side Oats Grama, Buffle, Blue Panic and Indian Grass on 100 acres of sandy and clay loam soils. 232 acres on Mrs. George Thomas' farm near Bronte have been seeded to a mixture of Indian Grass, Sand Love, Weeping Love and Sorghum Almum.

Delmir Sheppard has recently completed drilling 122 acres of conservation reserve land on the Raymond Schooler place west of Robert Lee. Sheppard drilled in a mixture of Blue Grama, Indian Grass, Weeping Love, Switch Grass and Sorghum Almum.

Many farmers have elected to use row plantings. Grasses being planted in rows include Blue Panic, Switch Grass, and Sorghum Almum. From the stand-point of present moisture conditions this should be an ideal year for getting grasses established.

The world's biggest crop is grass. Not only does it cover more than a fifth of the globe, but it is the most widely distributed of all plants. Grass is a land builder. It converts great stretches of marsh and tidal flats into productive meadowland in the coastal areas, it helps to create rich, black soils of the prairies.

Grass affords protection from floods, guards the water supply of our cities, furnishes our great cereal crops and supplies the forage of livestock. Of all the families of plants, grass is the one most essential to man's existence.

"All flesh is grass," Isaiah says in the Bible. Thus, the philosophers of ancient times, too, recognized the importance of grass.
