Has everybody forgotten about the proposed sewer system for Bronte? We were reading in the Eden paper last week where they have already got their loan application processing in Fort Worth. They are asking for a \$165,000 loan and a federal grant of \$20,000. The loan would be repayable over a period of 50 years at 3½ percent interest.

HB 3497 is the number of the bill under which the federal loan is sought. It is an emergency recession bill and has already passed the Senate and is now before the House.

The bill has a dual purpose — that of helping small towns make municipal improvements and providing work for unemployed as an anti-recession measure.

We don't know whether or not the people of Bronte want a sewer system, but if they do, this means of financing should be investigated.

## Two More Candidates Enter County and District Contests

So far as Coke County is concerned only two more persons with political aspirations showed up since last week's story about politics was written. Parker Nunley of Coleman announced he would oppose A. J. Bishop for State Representative, and W. W. (Bud) Thetford of Bronte entered the race for county judge, making that contest a three-way affair.

The only unopposed county candidate is Claude Ditmore, who is running for re-election as Commissioner of Precinct 4 (Tennyson).

Opposition for Congressman O. C. Fisher and State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman failed to show up, assuring them of another term in their respective offices.

Nunley visited The Enterprise office last Friday and said he would have an announcement to make to the people of this area in the near future. Thetford's announcement for judge appears on another page of this paper.

The official ballot will list the following candidates for Coke County offices:

For County Judge: Ernest Ivey, Jeff Dean and W. W. Thetford.

For County and District Clerk: Charlie Boecking and J. L. Tinkler.

For County Treasurer: Mrs. Gertrude Gray, Mrs. Lillian Caraway and Mrs. A. L. Forehand.

For Commissioner, Precinct 2: Howard Brock and C. E. McGuire.

For Commissioner, Precinct 4: Claude Ditmore.

For Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2: Pete Nutter, C. L. Knierim, B. G. Timmons, George Wrinkle and Jess Liles.

No candidate had announced for Justice of the Peace in Robert Lee.

The first Democratic Primary is scheduled for July 26. The county Democratic Committee, headed by R. C. Allen of Silver, will meet Monday to make election plans and figure out costs of each candidate in conducting the election.

## Coke Club Ladies Observing Home Demonstration Week

More than 36,000 Texas Home Demonstration Club women will be among the 6½ million homemakers throughout the nation who will observe their 13th National Home Demonstration Club Week May 4-10.

TODAY'S HOME BUILDS TOMORROW'S WORLD is again serving as the national theme, according to Maurine Hearn, State Home Demonstration Leader of the Agricultural Extension Service.

During the week, most of the 2,000 Texas Home demonstration clubs plan special activities to highlight their programs. Special exhibits, community programs feature stories, radio and television programs, and tours are planned to inform other homemakers and families of the purposes of home demonstration work and show its contribution to family and community life. Coke County H. D. Clubs have exhibits in windows in Robert Lee and Bronte. This year they chose to use Family Economics and its part in good management of the home as the story to tell in the window display during the week.

The home demonstration program is planned by homemakers and carried on cooperatively by the Extension Service, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the land-grant colleges and county governments. New research information in all phases of home-making is brought to women and families through specialists, home demonstration agents and local leaders. Club members also conduct special programs in civil de-

A total of 65 pictures were on display at the show and included oil paintings, pencil sketches, ceramics and other media.

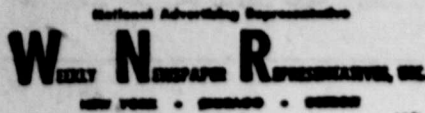

## Bud Thetford Candidate For County Judge

A third candidate in the race for Coke County Judge is W. W. (Bud) Thetford of Bronte, who filed as a candidate just ahead of the deadline Monday night.

Jeff Dean is running for re-election and the other candidate in the three-cornered race is Ernest Ivey, former Bronte mayor.

Mr. Thetford grew up in the Edith locality, coming there with his parents from Matador when he was two years old. He attended grade school at Edith, Pecan and Green Mountain and graduated from Robert Lee High School. He is 40 years old.

After one semester at Texas Tech he returned home and helped on the farm. His father died about 20 years ago. His mother, Mrs. Nannie Thetford, resides much of the time now with her son in Bronte and with a daughter, Mrs. Douglas Snead, and her family in Bronte.

Bud entered the army in February of 1942 and served 4½ years during World War II. He spent 27 months with the Signal Corps in Alaska and later was stationed on the West Coast. While in the service he met and married Miss Madeleine Bourque, a member of the WACS, who was a medical technician at Fitzsimmons General Army Hospital.

Both were discharged in the fall of 1946 and returned to Coke County. Mr. Thetford enrolled at Texas Tech the next February and obtained a bachelor of science degree in 1949. He then accepted a position as vocational ag teacher at Jayton, a position he held seven years. He took summer college work and earned a master degree in Education in 1952. While at Jayton he was given an honorary Lone Star Farmer award by the Future Farmers of America.

Bud resigned at Jayton and moved to Bronte two years ago where he has been teaching social studies in high school and is coaching girls basketball and boys base ball. Mrs. Thetford, who had previous nursing and medical lab training has been em-

ployed at the Bronte hospital.

The Thetfords have three children, Terry, 11, Linda Sue, 10, and Douglas, 9 years of age.

Mr. Thetford is a member of the Methodist Church.

He announces that he plans to conduct a clean and vigorous campaign and hopes to personally meet every voter prior to the Democratic primary election July 26. However, he said his activities would be limited until the present school term ends.

## Cotton Insect Control Meeting Set for Friday

A Cotton Insect Control meeting will be held in the County Court room on Friday morning, May 9, at 9:30 a. m., by the Agricultural Extension Agents and Mr. Frank Garner, Extension Entomologist at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Mr. Garner will present information and show slides of interest to all cotton producers of the county. Special emphasis will be placed on the major cotton insects and the recommended insecticides used to control them, stressing early season control as well as late season control.

With moisture conditions the best in several years, the agents say it is important for all cotton producers to be prepared for insects. If the rainfall continues, a heavy infestation could follow. It is important, they say, for farmers to

know what to look for and to know how to control it.

All interested persons, whether they are cotton producers or not, are welcome to attend the meeting. Mr. Garner will be glad to answer questions on other insect problems as well.

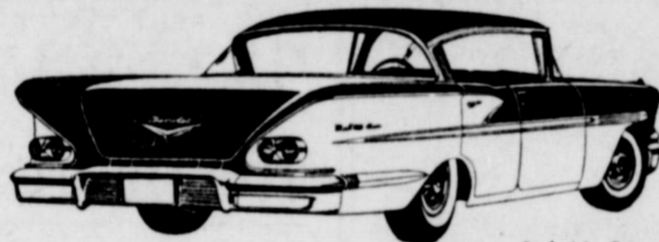

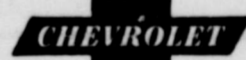

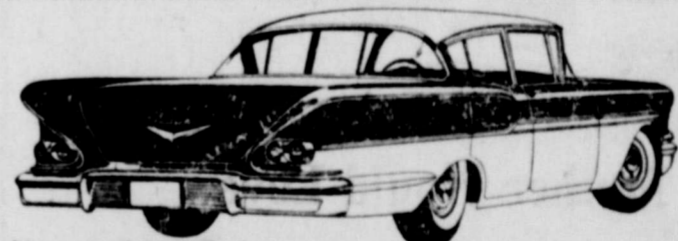

### County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

We have received several calls about spraying pecan trees to control the nut casebearer. It is still too early to spray to control the casebearer. The insecticide would lose its strength before the casebearer egg hatches and the larva becomes exposed.

I imagine the last week in May will be the best time to spray in this area. It is still too early to tell. The casebearer is presently feeding in the tender limbs and will make a complete cycle before he emerges again to enter the nut. This cycle takes from 20-50 days.

I will be checking some trees along and try to keep you informed on what we are able to determine.

Some of you may have missed James or me during the past two weeks. Week before last I was out of the county assisting in judging the District Rural Neighborhood Progress Program. I was fortunate to have the opportunity to see the various communities in action and to view the countryside of the District this spring. Both were pleasures. Some of communities showed considerable progress and showed unlimited community spirit. We judged communities in Real, Blanco, Llano, Coleman and Runnels Counties.

James attended a livestock marketing school in Ft. Worth last week. He had an enjoyable stay there and picked up valuable information on livestock marketing.

We have been weighing some of the litters lately belonging to the 4-H club boys in the County Swine Improvement Program. Some of the boys had outstanding weights from their litters. A couple of the boys had small lit-

ters that kept them from having higher litter weights.

The top two litters weighed so far belonged to Dee Arrott, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Arrott, Tennyson, and Gaylon Pitcock Sanco. Dee's 10 pigs weighed 423 pounds at 56 days of age and Gaylon's nine pigs recorded the nearly unbelievable weight of 507 pounds, over 56 pounds per pig.

We will give a complete list of the weights when all the litters are weighed.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Mr Editor:

Here are some things that I have found that I think need correcting, some by LAW and some maybe otherwise.

There are a number of people that were cut off telephone service around Bronte when the dials were installed. The reasons set forth by General Telephone Co. was that the lines had to be repaired, that the old lines were not suitable to operate dial phones, the prices asked by General Telephone Co. in most cases were too much for most of us to be able to pay. In my observation, most of the repair the Co. did was in some cases to put in new treated poles with the old wire as was.

There were three of us that were cut off together on April 22, 1957, because General Telephone asked us \$1,400.00 to repair or rebuild 2.3 miles line. We could not talk to them on any other terms at that time.

We have since that time tried to get considered for the new Norton R. E. A. exchange, and have been informed that "Section 201, Title 11 of the Rural Electrification Act of 1936, as amended, provides that in a State in which there is no regulatory body legally authorized to issue certificates of convenience and necessity to an applicant, no telephone loan shall be made unless the Administrator shall determine, setting forth his reasons thereof in writing, that no duplication of line, facilities or systems, providing reasonable adequate services, will result therefrom.

This state is one of a very few that does not have a regulatory body to take care of such things, in other words, the Towns and Cities make contracts with the Telephone Companies and the Rural people have to take whatever services and conditions the Telephone Companies wish to impose. I think there is a very great need for such a body.

I am asking all readers to join with me in requesting senators and Representatives to pass such legislation as may be needed to correct such things as above set forth.
