CASTRO COUNTY 4-H CLUB BOYS ARE HIGH WINNERS IN SEARS SHOW

Castro county 4-H boys participating in the Sears Roebuck Pig program have the best hogs in the 22 county area served by Sears Roebuck out of the Amarillo retail store. This was proven last week at the 22 county Sears Roebuck pig show held in Amarillo when Donald Annen placed first with his Chester White gilt and Luke Acker placed second with his Chester White boar to make the best record of any county since Sears Roebuck started the show six years ago. The gilt owned by Donald Annen was bred by Edward Smithson of Dimmitt and the boar shown by Luke Acker was bred by Ed Heath of Hale Center. Both of these boys are members of the Nazareth 4-H Club.

In the Castro county Sears Roebuck pig show which was held on Thursday instead of Wednesday, the first day scheduled for the Castro County Fair, the following places were won according to the placing of Ed Heath of Hale Center, one of the nation's best Chester

White breeders: First: Donald Annen, Nazareth; Second: Lloyd Krling, Flagg; Third: Theron Hawkins, Hart; Fourth: Doyle Davis, Hart; Fifth: Oren Eubanks, Dimmitt. As a result of his winning first place Donald Annen was awarded a registered Jersey heifer by Sears Roebuck and it was with these heifers that Donald placed third at the Castro Co. Fair. The rest of the boys winning prizes at the Castro County pig show will be awarded either baby chicks or broad breasted turkeys according to their desire. As a result of his winning second with his boar at the Amarillo pig show, Luke Acker was awarded a registered Jersey heifer by Sears Roebuck and this heifer placed fourth at this year's Castro County Fair.

Castro County club boys have established a reputation as being some of the best hog feeders in Texas for they have won at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show in March, Plainview Show in April, and the 22 county Sears Pig show

PVT. R. T. DIRKS KILLED IN ACT.

Mrs. Katharine Dirks of Route 2 Happy, Texas, received a telegram October 2nd, informing her that her son, Pvt. Raymond T. Dirks was killed in action in Belgium, Sept. 11, 1944, where he was serving with the 745th Tank Bn.

Pvt. Dirks was born October 14, 1917 at Nazareth, Texas. He received his education at Nazareth and Blue Ridge schools. He was engaged in farming until his induction into the Army May 18, 1942. He received his military training at Fort Knox, Ky. and Camp Bowie Texas. He was sent overseas in August, 1943, landed in England and was later sent to France during the invasion of June 6th. He was then sent to Belgium about September 1st.

Raymond is survived by his mother, Mrs. Katharine Dirks, one sister, Mrs. Ed Hoelting, of Nazareth, two brothers, Sgt. Lawrence J. Dirks, now serving with the 460th Ord. Evac. Co. in France, and Jerry Dirks of Route 2, Happy. One sister-in-law, Mrs. Lawrence Dirks, one nephew, Billy Gene Dirks, of the Arney community, his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Dirks Sr. of Fredericksburg, Texas, and Mr. and Mrs. Nick Seurer of Hinton, Okla., and several uncles, aunts and cousins.

Electric Rates Are Slashed

Announcement of adjustments in residential and commercial rates for customers in most South Plains cities and communities was made today by Southwestern Public Service Company. The new rates are now in effect and will apply on customers' statements beginning with those rendered for October use.

This adjustment in rates downward is in line with the Southwestern Public Service Company's long established policy of reducing rates as rapidly as possible, consistent with adequate and reliable service. The Company assumed responsibility for electric service in the South Plains territory under War conditions in September, 1942, and this is the first rate change since that time. J. V. Peeler, manager stated today. This adjustment will save the electric customers on the South Plains an estimated \$42,100.00 a year on their residential and commercial lighting rates.

This adjustment brings the rates in the territory to a new low. The continuation of the Company's long established policy of reducing rates in the Post War era will enable everyone to enjoy all-electric homes when appliances become available again.

Having unbounded faith in the future of the territory served by the Company and anticipating the increased use of electric service throughout the system, the Company will, in the next twelve months, make major additions to lines, substations and generating plants.
