Bumper Oats Crop Made Here

Thousands of bushels of oats are bulging the walls of barns and granaries in the Bronte area, as most of the farmers have completed harvesting one of the most bountiful crops in many years.

Some of the oats in this area made over 100 bushels to the acre, but the average ran from 50 to 65 bushels.

Combines have been running 18

hours or more per day trying to get the grain cut while weather conditions were favorable. The weather in this immediate vicinity has been perfect for the big harvest, but some areas north and east of here lost their crops to rain, hail and high wind the first of this week.

In addition to making a large volume on the crop this year, the

oats here have been running from 3 to 8 pounds heavy per bushel. One farmer said Wednesday he bought 400 bushels which averaged 41 pounds.

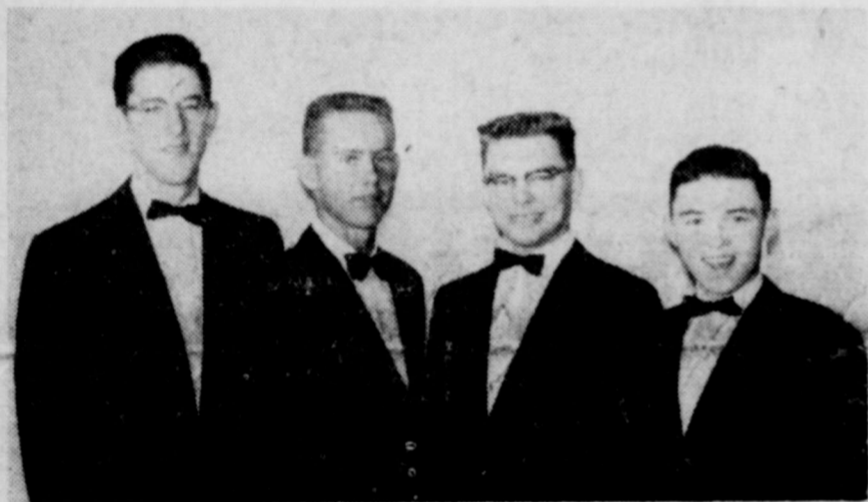
Various methods of disposing of the grain are being employed. Most everybody has his barns and all other available storage space full, and big piles of the golden grain out in the open are not an uncommon sight. Stock farmers remembering the long drouth through which West Texas has just passed, are reluctant to sell the grain. They seem inclined to want to keep it for stock feed next winter.

Some acreage of other small grain was planted in this vicinity, but oats was the principal crop. In addition to making a bumper grain crop, the fields furnished excellent grazing through last winter.

Teachers Assigned Positions In Bronte Elementary School

Supt. Garland Black announced this week teacher assignments in Bronte Elementary school for the 1958-59 school year. The assignments were decided upon by the school board at a meeting last Friday night, June 6. Other action by the board was acceptance of a report of the tax equalization board recommending a \$200,000 reduction in oil properties in the district.

Several changes were made in the grammar school set-up. Positions of two of the grade school teachers were switched, with Mrs. Homer Phillips going from the third to the fifth grade teacher's job. Mrs. R. N. Johnson, who has taught the fifth grade for several years, will teach the third grade.

Another change was in the sixth grade. Mrs. J. T. Henry, who has taught commercial work in high school for a number of years, was

assigned the position as sixth grade teacher. Another change was departmentalization of the seventh and eighth grades. Mrs. R. C. Lasswell and Mrs. Willie Mae Glenn will teach the two grades.

Supt. Black pointed out that the recommended tax valuation cut was somewhat lower than has been placed on many schools in West Texas. The reduction will mean that the school will have \$2,500 less revenue. This figure is based on calculating the tax at the \$1.25 tax rate in effect here.

The board voted to offer driver education in Junior High School next year, if at all possible. Additional action on this matter will be announced at a later date.

First grade, Mrs. Vetal Flores; second grade, Mrs. George Thomas; third grade, Mrs. R. N. Johnson; fourth grade, Miss Nannie M. Pearson; fifth grade, Mrs. Homer Phillips; sixth grade, Mrs. J. T. Henry; seventh and eighth grades, Mrs. R. C. Lasswell and Mrs. Willie Mae Glenn, grade school principal, Norman Porter. Mrs. Glenn is also school librarian.

Fire Chief Urges Caution in Burning Weeds and Trash

Fire Chief Bill Thomas this week urged citizens of Bronte to exercise caution when burning off grass and weeds, particularly when they are close to houses or other buildings. The local volunteer fire department has been called out three times in the last several days to help control fires which were endangering improvements.

Thomas pointed out that dry grass and weeds should be cleared away from buildings, but that burning it too close to the structures can be just as disastrous as leaving it.

The luxuriant growth of grass and weeds this year is now drying out and creates the worst fire hazard confronting Bronte citizens in many years.

The fire chief emphasized that local residents should call the fire department any time they are burning trash and feel that it is getting out of control.

Area Swelters Under 100-Plus Temperatures

Residents of the Bronte area this week joined thousands of other West Texans in trying to find a cool spot during the siege of 100-plus temperatures.

It was unofficially reported Tuesday that the mercury reached 106 degrees here. Highest reported temperature by the U. S. Weather Bureau in San Angelo was 104.

Despite the heat, farmers here consider themselves extremely lucky in having the dry weather during the time they have been harvesting a record-breaking oat

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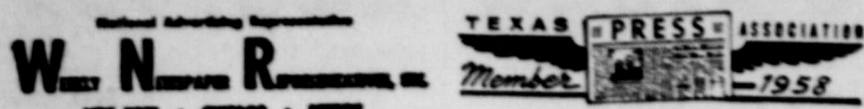

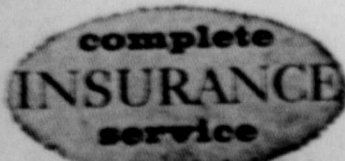

A Great Plains Conservation plan contract has been approved for the stock farm of D. K. Glenn, southeast of Bronte. The plan is for a period of four years and involves a conservation farming and ranching operation with federal cost share provided for needed conservation measures. Included in Glenn's plan are such practices as brush control, range pitting and seeding, cross fencing, water storage facility development and deferred grazing. Another Great Plains plan has been completed, but not yet approved on the D. A. Dumas farm south of Robert Lee.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a relatively new program in the Coke Soil Conservation District, but one which pro-

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mises to be of much importance to the district. In brief the program is designed to provide cost share benefits for needed conservation practices on farms and ranches where the owners or operators desire to enter into a complete program of soil and water conservation.

A contract is entered into by the farmer or rancher with the Department of Agriculture. The contract contains a complete schedule of land use treatments by fields and years for the period of contract. Contracts may be for periods of from 3 to 10 years depending upon the existing conservation problems and how fast the owner or operator wants to carry out the contract.

At present the Soil Conservation Service has taken some 12 applications for this program. Any interested persons are urged to contact the local soil conservation service, office located in the court house, Robert Lee, for further information.

The new assistant agent, Carole Hooper, was introduced to the council members.

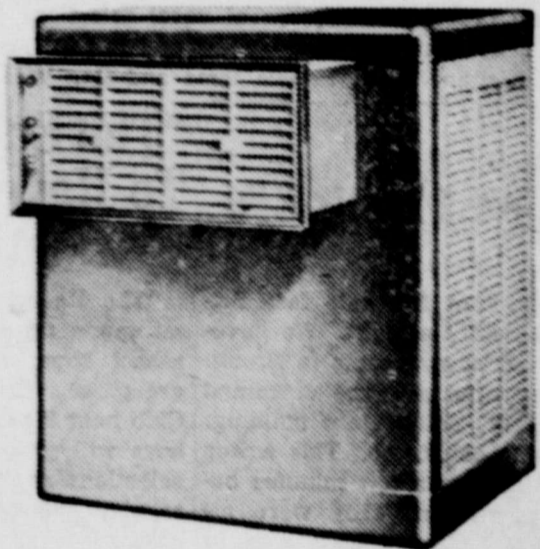

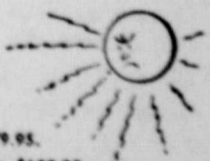

Oats Harvest One of Best In Many Years

From all indications, by mouth, by witnessing and by the grapevine, the oat crop being harvested is the best the county over that has been produced in several years. I have not seen such a crop before in the eight years I have been in this part of Texas.

Joe Rawlings used some fertilizer on part of his oats and is anxious to do further experimenting on his place with fertilizers. Fertilizers can be of great value on some soils and Joe is hoping to determine the increases he can gain through proper use of fertilizers.

How About Fertilizers?
If you are interested in fertiliz-

ing, I would suggest that you give thought to the following practices. 1. Have your soil analyzed to determine the kinds and amounts of nutrients needed. 2. Put your fertilizer down in time for it to be in suspension when the plants need it. 3. Place the fertilizer below (2" - 3") the roots of the plants. Make the roots go down to the food rather than come up. To do this it is necessary to fertilize prior to or at planting time.

There are other practices that will help you to obtain maximum use of your dollars invested in fertilizer, but the above three are the most important ones.

Several farmers and ranchers have been spraying weeds the past several weeks with varying results. Most of the weeds are now beyond the point in their development where spraying to control them is of economic value. Also, crops that are damaged by weed sprays are now up and growing.

WEED SPRAYING

If you should desire to spray weeds at this late date, I would suggest you consider the following practices:

1. Spray when there is little or no wind.
2. Do not spray weeds that are showing no growth.
3. Use as little pressure as you possibly can and still have the spray cover the area intended to cover — 8-10 lbs. pressure is best.
4. Up the recommended dosage if you have hard to kill weeds such as rag weeds or if the weeds are slowing up in growth.
5. Do not spray close to a cotton patch or a field containing other broad leafed plants.
6. Set your spray nozzles with your tractor operating at a certain speed then continue to operate at that speed.
7. Clean your spray rig immediately after you finish using it, preferably with a solution of household ammonia. Do not allow the weed spray to set in the machine.

GRASSHOPPERS?

Several farmers have indicated that grasshoppers are building up in numbers in the county. Clark Glenn has already dusted his cotton and one or two more operators have indicated they may start control measures soon. Watch your

cotton closely. If it is in a bottom or close to a tank, you may have them bothering your cotton.

GAS TAX REFUNDS

We have received inquiries about the federal gasoline tax refund forms for farm or ranch operators. We have not received a supply of them as yet. The reporting period is from July 1, 1957 to June 30, 1958, inclusive. The forms should be forthcoming soon.

Several people have inquired about vaccinating dogs and other animals to control rabies. The 4-H Clubs plan to have a rabies vaccination day in the near future. Watch the paper for the announcement. They will have a veterinarian present and will be glad to vaccinate any animals you may have that you wish to get immunized.

Jordan Ranch, Last Week's Mystery Place, Is Home of the W. A. Hickman Family

Last week's mystery farm had everybody right around Bronte guessing as to its identity, since it is located west of Blackwell. The farm is owned by R. H. Jordan of Blackwell and Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hickman live on the place when they are in Texas, and operate it.

The place is located 3½ miles northwest of Blackwell and was known as the John Jordan Ranch. It was bought by the elder Mr. Jordan in 1914 and the house shown in the photo was built in 1926. Bob Jordan bought the place from the estate of his father in 1944. Prior to ownership by the Jordan family, the ranch was part of the old Tuscon Ranch, which operated in the Blackwell area from the late 1800's until past the turn of the century.

The ranch consists of 4,000 acres of fine ranch land, with approximately 1,200 acres in cultivation. Eagle Creek traverses the place from northwest to southeast, furnishing water for the entire spread. Hickman said the creek runs except during driest seasons, such as this country has seen the last few years. However, it has a

good flow now, he added.

Hickman and his wife, the former Geraldine Jordan, and their children have made their home on the ranch for the past 12 years, except for the summer months, when they live in South Dakota. The children are Tommy, age 14; Suzane, 11; and Shirley, 8. The couple was married in 1941.

Ranching is the principal business of this place. Hickman said they ordinarily run 150 cows and 1,000 head of sheep on the ranch. The cultivated land is used for raising feed and winter pasture for the stock.

Hickman and his father-in-law have spent the past five years building a spreader dam system on the ranch. It was completed only recently, and covers the entire 4,000 acres.

In addition to the Blackwell ranch, Hickman operates 80 sections in South Dakota, where he runs from 2,000 to 3,000 cattle and 3,000 to 4,000 ewes. He said the South Dakota place would easily take care of 5,000 head of cattle. Other operations are located in Coke and Scurry counties.

Hickman recently invested in a

fine racing stallion which goes along with his hobby of raising horses. He is the son of Bob Hilckman of Bronte.

Mr. and Mrs. Hickman and children left Tuesday to spend the summer on their ranch in South Dakota.

Judge W. B. Hunt Seeks Position on Supreme Court

HOUSTON, Tex. — (Special) — June 13. The importance of the functions and responsibilities of the state's highest court was emphasized Wednesday by District Judge Wilmer B. Hunt.

Judge Hunt is a third generation Texas lawyer seeking the Position One post of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas to be vacated December 31 by St. John Garwood of Houston who is not running for re-election.

"The impact of decisions of the Supreme Court of Texas now and in the years ahead are of increasing vital concern to Texans in every walk of life," Judge Hunt said.

"It is therefore important that Texas voters weigh carefully the qualifications of those candidates seeking election to this high post," the veteran jurist added.

"During the course of this campaign it is obvious that there will be many voters whom I will not personally be able to meet to discuss my own qualifications for the office despite the fact that by

election time I will have extended my campaign into every part of the state," he continued.

"For the benefit of those I may not meet, I offer the record of my 19 years in the general practice of law and my 11 years service on the district court bench as the basis for my candidacy," the judge said.

The veteran jurist presides over the 133rd District Court in Houston where he has been re-elected three times since 1948 without opposition.

He was first elected a special district judge in 1946 in a special election held by the Harris County Bar Association to name a temporary successor to the late Judge Roy Campbell who was ill at the time.

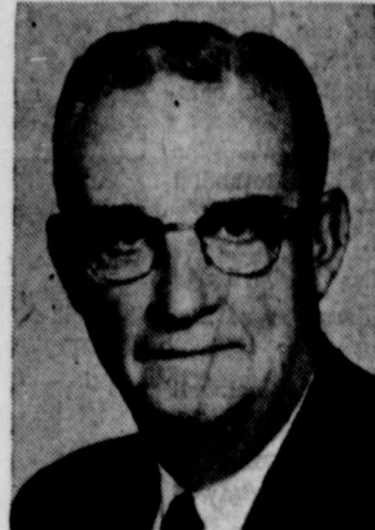
In 1947 Judge Hunt was appointed judge of the newly created 133rd District Court by Governor Beauford Jester.

Hunt received his BA degree at Georgetown University in Washington and his LLB degree from the University of Texas Law school.

He is a member of the State Bar of Texas, the American Bar Association and chairman of the legislative committee of the Judiciary section of the State Bar.

He was engaged in private practice of law for 19 years prior to becoming judge of the 133rd District Court.

WATER USAGE SOARS

B. D. Mackey, superintendent of the Bronte water system, said he pumped 262,000 gallons of water Tuesday. The average, he said, since June 1 has been about 230,000 gallons daily. These figures greatly exceed the amount pumped during May when 166,000 gallons on May 28, was the highest figure for any one day. Several of the cool, damp days in May saw less than 50,000 gallons of water being used by residents of the city.
