Condemnation Suits Coming Up Tuesday

A jury of view, composed of three Coke County men, will meet Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock and try to settle the dispute between the State of Texas and four landowners who live north of Bronte. The question to be settled by the jury concerns purchase of right of way for widening and straightening U. S. Highway 277 from Bronte north nine miles to the Abilene-Sweetwater Y.

It has been reported that condemnation suits will also be filed on two more small tracts, but Thursday morning the County Clerk's office in Robert Lee reported that it had nothing on file concerning the additional two suits.

Suits coming up Tuesday are styled with the State of Texas as plaintiff and the following as defendants: Gladys Mae Sims and husband, Edward M. Cumbie, and others, Fay M. Scott and others, and F. S. Higginbotham and wife.

According to information which The Enterprise has been able to gather on the matter, negotiations to purchase the land needed for the road change have been underway for several months. Judge Jeff Dean said Thursday that "this matter should have been settled a year ago." However, none of the attempts to agree on a fair price has been successful.

First thing done to get the proceedings started was the appointment of an appraiser from San Angelo. His work was completed and the figures turned over to the commissioner's court. That body, in turn, gave the figures to the State Highway Department, who sent an appraiser out to check the property in order to see if the county's appraisal looked equitable.

Apparently, the county's appraisal was all right with the state, as the state's figures were never revealed to any of the commissioner's court, nor to the land owners.

The land owners named in the suits were not satisfied with the appraisal, however, and rejected it. After prices offered by the county were turned down, the commissioner's court named a five-man board to study the situation. This board's findings were not to have any official significance, but were to be used by the commissioner's court as a comparison with the appraised prices. This board's figures were too high to please the commissioners and were not approved by that group.

After the five-man board was dismissed, Attorney Frank C. Diekey, Sr., was hired by the county to negotiate a settlement for the property satisfactory to the land owners and the county. He was unable to do this and condemnation suits were filed.

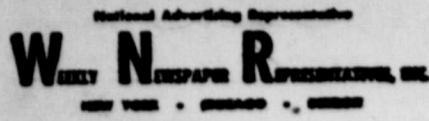

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION
DISTRICT NEWS

Many participants of the Soil Bank grass program are concerned about weeds in their field. Mechanical control by cultivating and mowing has proven to be very satisfactory on pastures seeded to grass.

Mowing for weed control should begin when the worst seeds are budding or starting to bloom. The height to mow depends on the type and stage of grasses seeded. For best results, mow as close to the ground as possible without injuring young grass plants.

The two types of mowers commonly used for pasture mowing are the conventional sutter-bar type and the rotary or shredder. Mrs. George Thomas, 2 miles north of Bronte, and Osmo Black, 7 miles northeast of Bronte, have

mowed their fields in the soil bank. The Coke Soil Conservation District has two shredders for use in the district.

V. V. Wojtek of Robert Lee and Hurlin Lee of Bronte are custodians of the shredders and anyone wishing to use them should contact one of these two men.

For further information on mowing of a particular field, see your local Soil Conservation Service located in the court house at Robert Lee.

Soil conservation is good farm management and results in additional income.

Montie obtained his bachelors degree in animal husbandry from Texas Tech College in 1952.

Oscar Dorsey Studying Under A&M Fellowship

Oscar L. Dorsey of Bronte is one of eighteen high school science teachers attending the third annual Summer Institute in Physics at Texas A & M College.

They are attending on \$300 Fellowships made available by industry because of growing concern over steadily decreasing numbers of science courses offered in high schools.

The first term of the Institute started June 2 and continues through July 11. The second term will be held July 14-August 22.

Purpose of the program is to help improve science instruction in high schools by strengthening the teacher's basic understanding in the science. General Physics is emphasized. Courses include basic instruction in astronomy, atomic and nuclear physics, chemistry and mathematics.

Contributors to the 1958 Summer Institute fund include Humble Oil and Refining Company, International Business Machines Corp., Magnolia Petroleum Co., Chance Vought Aircraft, Inc., Southwestern Gas and Electric Co., Texas Electric Service Co., Gulf States Utilities Co. and Texas Power and Light Co.

The program is under direction of Dr. J. G. Potter, head of the Physics Department, A & M.

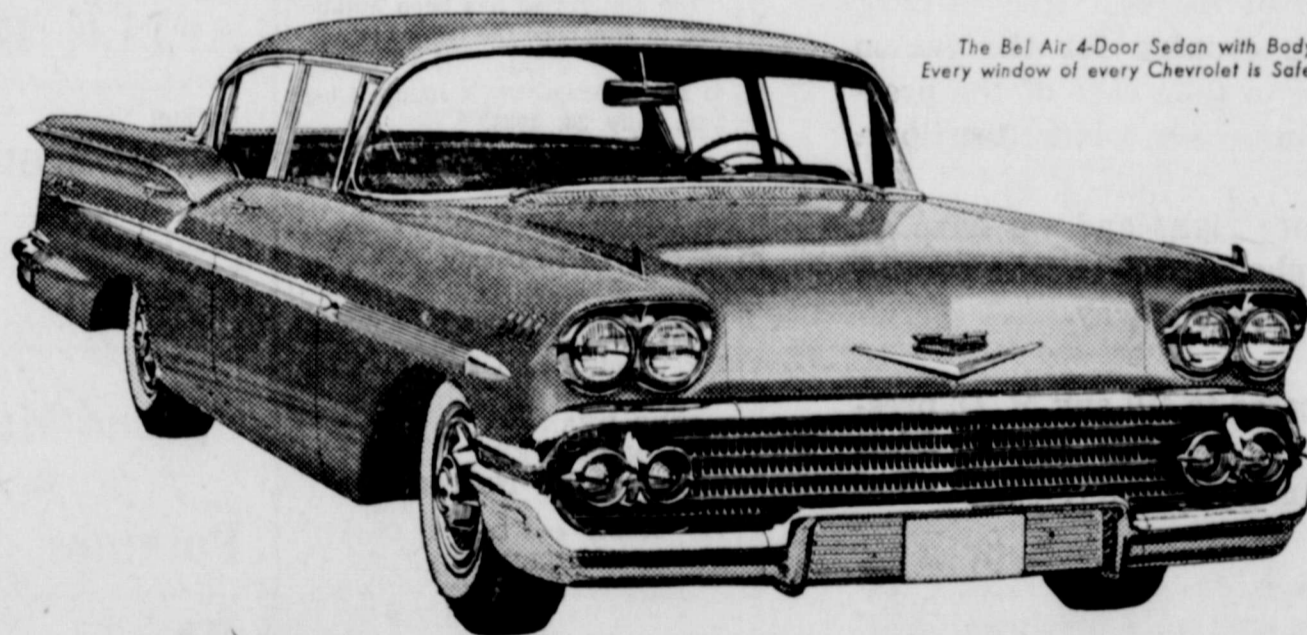

SCREW WORM CONTROL

Some of you have probably heard about the new sprays to control screw worms. They are not cure all by any means, but for some operators, they should be a big assist in fighting screw worms. From what I have been able to gather, they give 60 or more days protection or immunity. Operators that are unable to see their stock regularly may find such a spray very helpful in controlling screw worms. I hope they will be given a trial. If you should use one of

the screw worm preventive sprays, I would appreciate knowing the results obtained.

LAWN AND GARDEN INSECTS

We have had several calls to check on insects bothering lawns, trees, gardens and field crops lately. If you are troubled with insects and most lawns, fields and gardens have them now, drop by the office or call for one of the insect control bulletins. They show all the insecticides recommended to control the various insects common to our area. The insect control guide can be a useful tool in the hands of the gardener or farmer. It shows the various insects and the recommended sprays or dusts that will control them.

WEED CONTROL

Another new bulletin we have that may interest many of you is a bulletin on Weed Control entitled "Weed Control in Texas Pastures". The bulletin contains valuable information on how to improve pastures through the various methods of controlling weeds. Much of the information included will apply to field weed control, also, even though the pamphlet is written about pasture weeds. Let us know if you would like a copy.

CARE OF EGGS

The hot weather we are having is affecting or will affect the egg production of the poultry men are getting from their hens. If you are a poultryman you can help keep your hens cool and their egg production up by keeping the hens shaded and ventilated. If your poultry house is well ventilated, a foggee system or sprinkler system will cool them. Also keeping weeds and grass mowed around the house will help. And to give more

shade, make as much overhang on your poultry house as you think possible.

A must in keeping egg production up in hot weather is having a good water supply. Hens drink four or more pounds of water for each pound of feed they eat when the temperature passes 95 degrees. If the water is not available they will not drink it and of course will not lay as they should.
