Absentee Voting To Start Monday

Absentee voting for the July 26 primary election will start next Monday, July 7, according to County Clerk J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler.

State law provides that absentee voting shall be in effect from 20 days prior to election up until 3 days before election day.

Persons who expect to be away from home or who are unable to go to the polls may vote by absentee ballot. Applications for ballots should be addressed to the county clerk, or voters may call at the court house and mark their ballots while there.

Deposits Down Slightly Since Last Bank Call

Deposits at the First National Bank in Bronte were down only slightly since the last call for a report was made by the Comptroller of the Currency on March 4. The present call was made on June 23.

Deposits March 4 totaled \$2,325,858.85, while on June 23 the local bank had \$2,309,787.18.

Loans made by the First National were up a little, as compared with March. A total of \$574,470.85 was out on loan March 3, and on June 23, the total reached \$576,566.54.

The First National Bank had capital accounts totaling \$239,758.42 on June 23. Capital stock is \$50,000 and \$100,000 is carried in the surplus account. The remaining \$89,758.42 is in the undivided profits fund.

Coke County People Contribute \$870 To Continue the Fight Against Cancer

Coke County residents contributed \$870.63 to the American Cancer Society during the recently completed crusade. This report was announced by A. J. Kirkpatrick, Robert Lee newspaper publisher, who served as chairman of the campaign.

It was the most successful Cancer Crusade ever staged in the county and exceeded last year's contributions by \$50.00. Coke County's quota for 1958 was \$575, and this amount was exceeded by 151%.

Entire success of the drive was due to volunteer workers, many of whom have associated themselves with this worthy project for several years. Some areas of the coun-

ty were not too well organized, but all in all it was a fine showing.

The sum of \$140 was raised from the Walnut, Divide and Wildcat communities with the solicitations being made by Mrs. Fred McCabe and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Fred McCabe, Jr. It is strictly a ranch and farm territory, and they were proud to have received \$25 contributions from two parties.

Silver also rallied strong to the need for funds to fight cancer, raising the sum of \$211.25. Chairmen were Mr. and Mrs. T. W. The Bronte Hospital was awarded a polished wooden plaque Tuesday when representatives of Blue Cross from Dallas and San Angelo were in Bronte.

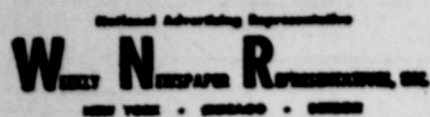
The local hospital has been affiliated with Blue Cross for more than ten years.

John C. White Is Candidate For Re-Election

AUSTIN, Tex. — A major advance for the Texas Department of Agriculture was claimed by Commissioner John C. White this week with the announcement that Texas now stands first among 12 southern states in the amount and enforcement of farm legislation.

"Since 1951, we have jumped from seventh to first position in modern farm laws," said White. "These legal provisions have enabled us to increase our services in Texas by as much as 300%. As a result, Texas can no longer be regarded as an agricultural dumping ground for inferior products from other areas."

The 33-year-old commissioner, who is seeking re-election to the top farm job in Texas, added that "ten years ago we were a convenient 'garbage pail' for the nation. Today, we can put more trust in our own production and know that farm goods shipped into the state must meet certain quality standards."

Commissioner White cited his re-organization of the Department

as a major factor in modernizing and increasing farm services. It marked the first big overhaul in its previous 47-year history and helped put many programs on a self-supporting basis.

"Our goal during my past seven years in office has been to increase state services without making constant demands for new tax money," White stated. "The clean-up of the state grain scandals, better seed laws, more effective insect controls and establishment of a market news service are just a part of the accomplishments under this system," he added.

White is actively campaigning to continue the programs he inaugurated after taking office in 1951. He defeated two opponents without the necessity of a runoff in 1952 and 1956 and was unopposed in 1954.

Born and raised on tenant farms in North Texas, White said that

"the challenge today is for even greater progress in our most vital industry — agriculture. It calls for devoted and experienced leadership in the future."

Before election to office, Commissioner White was head of the Department of Agriculture at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls. He and his wife and three sons now live in Austin.

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Hays live on the farm pictured as last week's Mystery Farm. The place is located three miles northeast of Bronte.

Mr. and Mrs. Hays moved to the farm in 1917 and since that

time have made it their home. The farm consists of 245 acres, 120 of which are in cultivation.

Mr. Hays bought half the place, 122½ acres, in '17 from Charlie Keeney, and later purchased the other half from J. L. Keeney.

Mr. Hays has the farm rented

out to Marvin Mackey of Norton, and is taking things easy now. He still has a few cattle and chickens around, but does not do any farming now.

During the past 41 years that Mr. Hays has lived on this place he has been largely in the stock farming business and used practically all of his cultivated land to raise feed. The other 125 acres is still in native pasture.

Conservation practices include a couple of tanks, one near the house and the other out in the pasture, and a large diversion terrace to carry excess water to the creek.

Mrs. Hays is the former Annie Ash. She and her husband are regular attenders at the First Baptist Church in Bronte. Mr. Hays is also a member of the Bronte Masonic Lodge.

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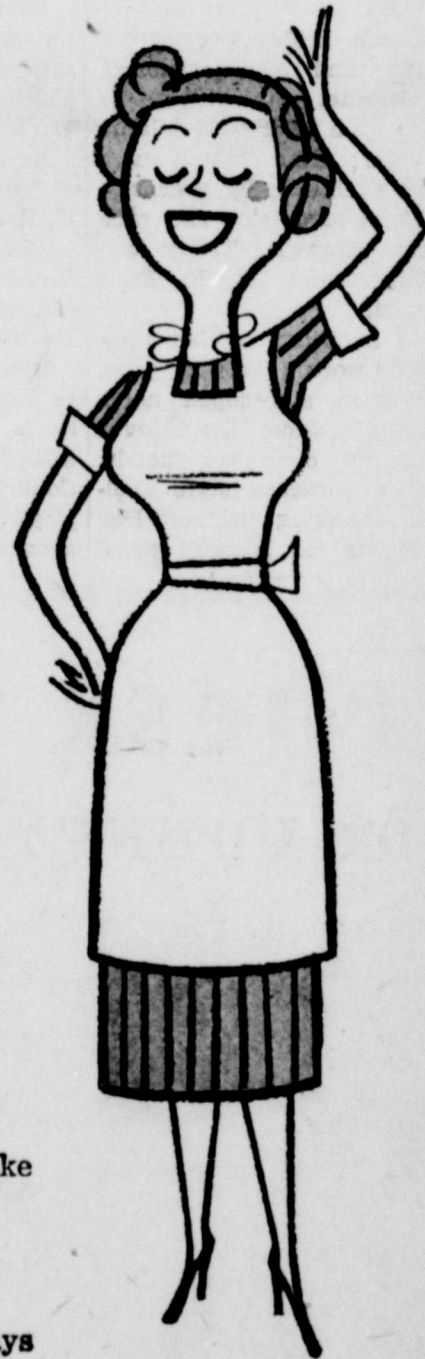

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —

C. N. Webb, chairman; **Robert Walker**, Vice Chairman; **D. K. Glenn**, Secretary and Treasurer; **Bryan Yarbrough** and **W. E. Burns**.

O. T. Colvin of Blackwell and **D. A. Dumas** of Robert Lee have had their contracts approved for the new Great Plains Conservation Program.

To participate in the program a farmer or rancher must have a workable plan of conservation operations that incorporates needed land use changes, needed cropping and grazing systems, and needed soil and water conservation practices in proper combinations. The plan must be technically sound and acceptable to the Secretary of Agriculture. USDA soil and water conservation technicians will help a farmer or rancher make his plan on request. Soil and range site maps and other information will be provided.

The amount of cost sharing depends on the cost of doing the needed work and the rates established at state and county levels. The maximum cost-share rate will not exceed 80 per cent of the average estimated cost of installing each practice. Some cost shares set up for Coke county are:

Constructing Diversion terraces—70%.

Pond Construction—50%.

Brush control—50%.

Range Seeding—80%.

Application for participation in the program may be made at the Soil Conservation Service office in the court house.

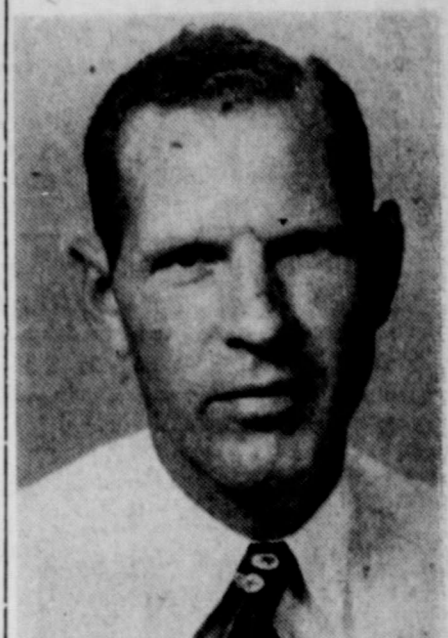
