

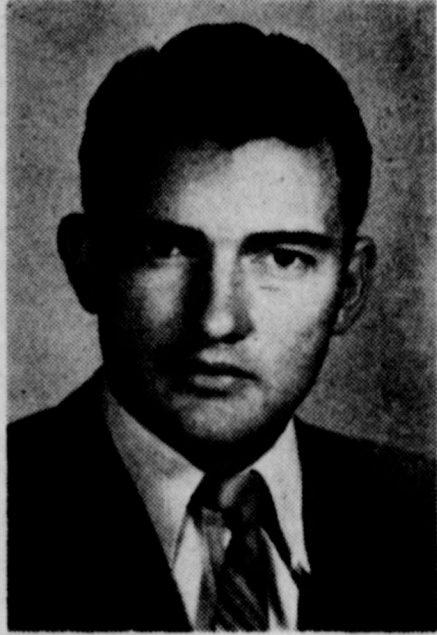

Bob Franklin Is Nominated For Press Honor

Bob Franklin, sports editor of the Artesia Daily Press, has been nominated as one of the finalists in the annual poll to select the outstanding sports writer in New Mexico. Franklin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Nutter of Bronte.

He and four other outstanding sports writers of New Mexico were selected to enter the final contest. The outstanding writer will be selected Aug. 25.

This contest is sponsored by DiMizio's Italian and American Restaurant of Salisbury, N. C. The contest determines the outstanding writer in each state and then the top man for the nation is picked from that group.

Franklin has been on the staff of the Artesia paper for the past seven months. He has also written sports for the San Angelo Standard-Times, Abilene Reporter News and the Bronte Enterprise.

Little Interest In Aug. 23 Runoff

R. B. Allen, chairman of the Democratic Coke County Executive Committee, has agreed with the plan of having only four voting boxes for the primary election runoff set for Saturday, Aug. 23.

Polling places for Precinct 1 voters will be at Robert Lee and Silver, and for Precinct 2 the boxes will be open at Bronte and Olga (near Blackwell.)

Runoffs for justice of the peace nominations in these precincts will attract some attention.

Mr. Allen advises that all other qualified voters in the county may vote wherever they wish, since their only choice will be in naming a justice of the supreme court, Place 1.

However, if a person votes outside his own box, it may be necessary for him to have his poll tax receipt or swear in his vote.

Little interest has been created thus far in absentee voting. Applications for six absentee ballots had been made up to Thursday morning for Precinct 1 and only two for Precinct 2.

Absentee voting will be permitted in the County Clerk's office through Aug. 20.

With only a light vote predicted election boards will be cut down for the runoff.

Drivers Education Not To Be Offered

Supt. Garland Black said this week that Bronte School will not be able to offer driver education in its curriculum during the 1958-59 school year. Supt. Black said school officials have tried every means they know how to acquire a teacher qualified to teach the course, and they have been unable to do so.

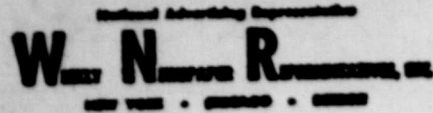
School officials have also tried to get two of the present teachers into a driver education instructor school, but have been unsuccessful due to the fact that there are only a few such schools held in Texas.

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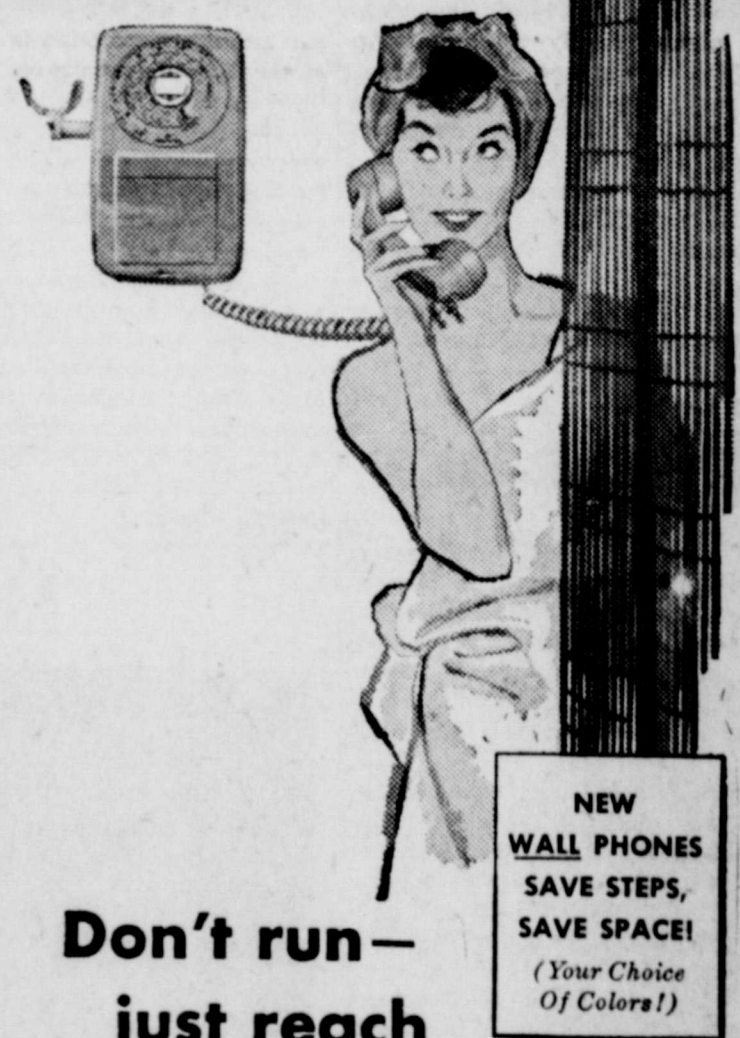

The collision occurred at Tennyson, 9 miles south of Bronte on Highway 277.

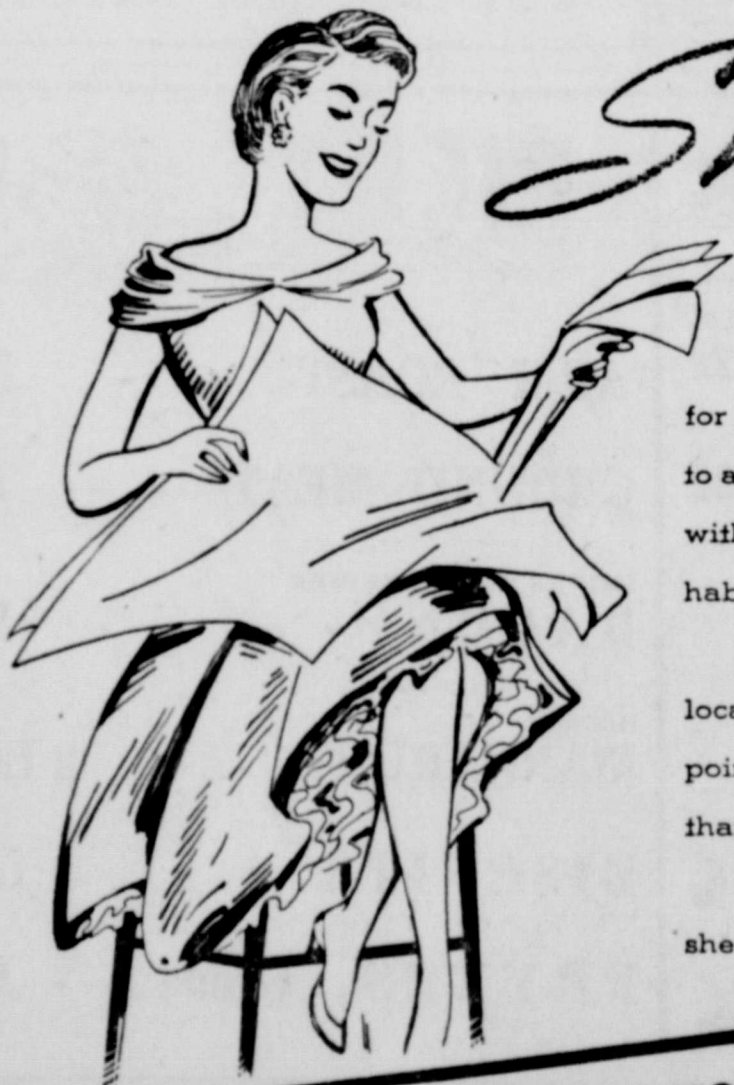

Coke Farmers Urge Passage Of S. B. 4071

Several members of the Coke County Farm Bureau have sent telegrams to Washington urging support of Senate Bill 4071, which is the farm bill being backed by the American Farm Bureau, Edward M. Cumbie, district representative of the Farm Bureau, said. Wires have been sent to Sen. Lyndon Johnson, Congressman O. C. Fisher and Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn.

The bill passed the Senate by a 62-11 vote but bogged down in the House. Reports from Washington indicate that a farm bill of one kind or another may come up in the House before Congress adjourns, but if no farm bill is passed, American farmers stand to suffer considerably.

Cumbie said the bill as passed by the Senate would allow cotton farmers a choice of using his allotted acreage and high price supports or increased acreage and lower price supports. It would also take acreage allotments off of corn, put feed grain price supports on a comparative basis with corn. An amendment to the bill would also extend the Wood Act of 1954 for another four years.

If no bill is passed there will be a 26 per cent cut in cotton acreage and a 40 per cent cut in rice allotments. The wool program will revert to a high support loan program, he added.

Cumbie said his organization is supporting S. B. 4071 because it is a move away from government restriction and high price supports. "It will allow farm products to seek their competitive levels and give farmers and ranchers more freedom in their operations," he said.

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

The emergency flood program for rebuilding flood damaged structures has about been completed. The following is a list in amounts of reconstruction which have been completed this year under the program for Coke County:

- Terraces both new and rebuilt: 416 miles
 - Diversions both new and rebuilt: 27 miles
 - Stock Ponds both new and rebuilt: 44
 - Erosion Control Dams rebuilt: 36
- The program has been well received and is of great benefit to the Coke District.

Wildlife Report: From all indications dove and quail are more plentiful over the district than they have been for several years. The fact that rain this past winter and spring was above normal for the past few years has helped in providing the needed food, water and cover for wildlife increases. Deer and turkey have also been reported ranging over a wider area of the Coke District this year. Wildlife improvement and range management go hand in hand. Under proper range management wildlife will be found in abundance, but as range conditions go down—wildlife begins to disappear.

Last week representatives of the Soil Conservation Service watershed planning party looked over the Kickapoo Creek watershed for the purpose of estimating the cost of planning for the project. The estimated planning cost figure was set at \$18,500. The cost of planning is based on size of watershed, terrain in which structures are to be built, amount siltation and other problems which are expected to be encountered during the actual planning.

"A successful watershed program calls for the closest cooperation of all the community's leaders—agricultural, business, sportsmen's municipal, county, state—to make it work. That is why, under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act so much emphasis is being put out on determining at the outset not only which local people are interested in such watershed programs, but how much they are interested.—D. A. Williams"

Hale-Aikin Study Results Revealed

Results of the study made by Hale-Aikin Committees in all 254 counties of Texas have been revealed by state authorities. Opinions of the Coke County committee parallel those of the entire state to a large extent. The committees over the state came up with the general opinion that Texas schools need more money, more teachers, more subjects, more buildings and more of just about everything if they are to keep up with modern times.

The committee members saw a need for 20,657 new classrooms between now and 1962-63. These rooms will cost an estimated \$376,008,338—or \$75,01,000 each year. In order to finance this classroom building program a majority of the committees favored getting the money from state sources, while a few said the money should be raised locally, and even fewer thought federal aid was the answer.

A large number of the committees thought more time was needed in the classroom, more subjects, particularly electives, should be offered, and better provision should be made to help gifted students get ahead. Driver education was strongly recommended by a majority and 116 committees recommended that some program of education be provided by local schools.

The survey revealed that 46,165 teachers will be needed in the next five years to handle the increased enrollments, for replacements and to staff new programs. Most of the committees recommended higher

pay, better working conditions and better living conditions as incentives to draw young people into the teaching profession. The median minimum to attract new teachers was recommended at \$4,000 per year. Now it is \$3,205.

GASOLINE TAX REFUND

This is just a reminder that farmers and ranchers can get a Federal gasoline tax refund on gasoline used on the farm or ranch during the period July 1, 1957, through June 30, 1958. The refund will amount to 3c a gallon and should be reported on Form 2240. If Internal Revenue did not send you form 2240, we have them available at the County Agents office and we will be glad to help you fill out the form. Care should be taken to keep gasoline tickets or other supporting evidence to verify the number of gallons you report for tax refund. The deadline for filing this claim is Sept. 30, 1958.

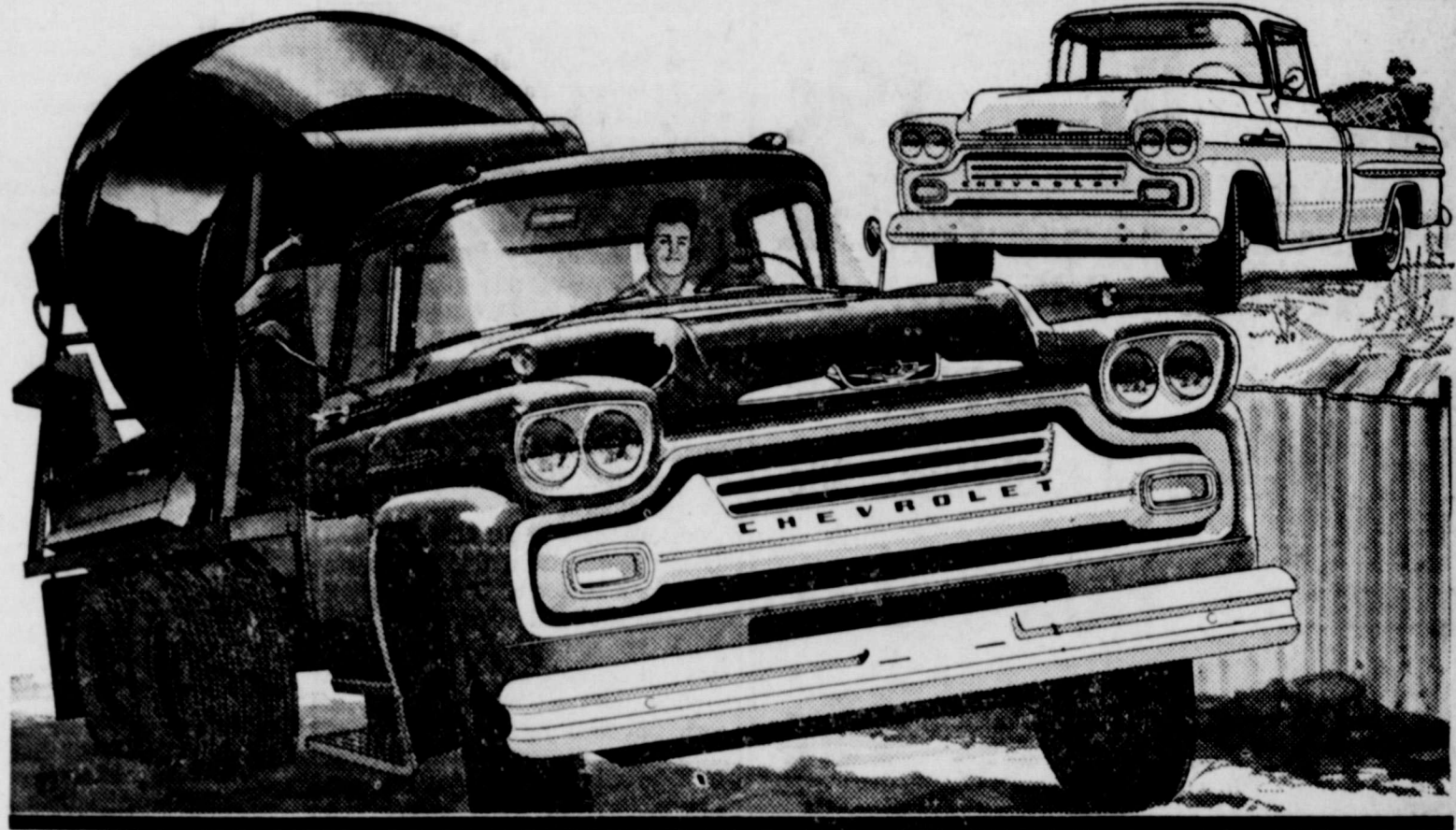

"Vacancies in the office of judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct; providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is

guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by law or by resolution of the county or precinct, and provided that the recipients of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication of the same.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the first Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to Each House.

"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'

"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for office in public quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 3. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:

"Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

Lawyers Hired For Collection Of Back Taxes

(Robert Lee Observer)

Taxing districts comprising Coke County, the Robert Lee Independent School District and the City of Robert Lee have engaged a San Angelo firm to collect delinquent taxes.

Final action in the matter was taken at a joint meeting of county, city and school officials at the court house Monday. The city of Bronte and the Bronte school district will have an opportunity to also join in the effort to collect past due taxes and foreclose on property unless tax payments are brought up to date.

A one year contract was voted to Messrs. R. P. Lynn & W. A. Johnson, delinquent tax specialists, with the understanding that the contract can be renewed from year to year.

For several years these men have handled delinquent tax collections for the City of San Angelo and Tom Green County.
