Longhorns to Play Trent Gorillas Here Tonight

Plenty of good football will be on tap tonight at the Bronte Longhorns will host the Trent Gorillas at Stephenson Memorial Stadium at 7:30.

As in the past, the Longhorns will be encountering another Trent team that will deal the Longhorns a rough time on the gridiron. Since the beginning of the series of games between Bronte and Trent, both teams have emerged with

the same number of victories. The Longhorns have never defeated the Gorillas on the local field while Trent has yet to beat Bronte on the Trent gridiron. The Gorillas will be trying to continue their streak over the Longhorns while Bronte will be out to break the jinx held by Trent at the local stadium.

Trent started the season with a bang as they won their first three outings. They opened the season by walloping Aspermont 62-8. They followed up by defeating Knox City and Jim Ned. In district play, the Gorillas have failed to mark up a victory in two outings. Loraine downed the Trent team 14-8. Eldorado holds a 20-6 win over the Gorillas in their other conference game. Last week, Trent downed Roby of Class A, 30-20.

The Longhorns are below the Gorillas in the season's standing, but rougher competition has been handled by Bronte. Bronte has won two, lost three and tied one. The Longhorns hold victories over Wylie and Colorado City B while they have tied Eden. Losses came at the hands of Woodson, Hermleigh and Loraine. Last week, the Longhorns were knocked off by a tough Loraine team 18-16.

The Longhorns will be playing without the services of Reyes Olivias and Danny Scott. Olivias received a knee injury in the Loraine game while Scott was injured early this week. Stover Taylor, Bronte tackle, is still out with a foot injury.

It's somewhat of a paradox that just about everybody in Texas is saying that we should do everything possible to attract tourists and new industry to the state, and at the same time it is impossible to spend any money advertising what we have to offer.

Everybody knows that advertising is the best known method of selling anything, and we believe this axiom holds true on selling the opportunities for visitors as well as new permanent residents in our state.

At the present time it is impossible to spend state money for advertising. This hand-tying proposition was brought about some 82 years ago when our present out-dated constitution was adopted. Virtues of the provision at that time are of little interest today, but let us say that this article was included so as not to encourage carpet-bagging Yankees to migrate to the state. We believe those days are over and that the provision has served its usefulness.

Now, on Nov. 4, you will have an opportunity to remove this muzzle from Texas. Constitutional amendment No. 7 provides that the Texas Legislature shall be authorized to make appropriations for use of advertising the virtues and resources of the state.

We hardly think our lawmakers will go overboard in spending money for this purpose, but we do believe a few well spent dollars for well placed advertising would pay off in rich rewards for the entire population of the Lone Star state. Forty-five other states have found that it will.

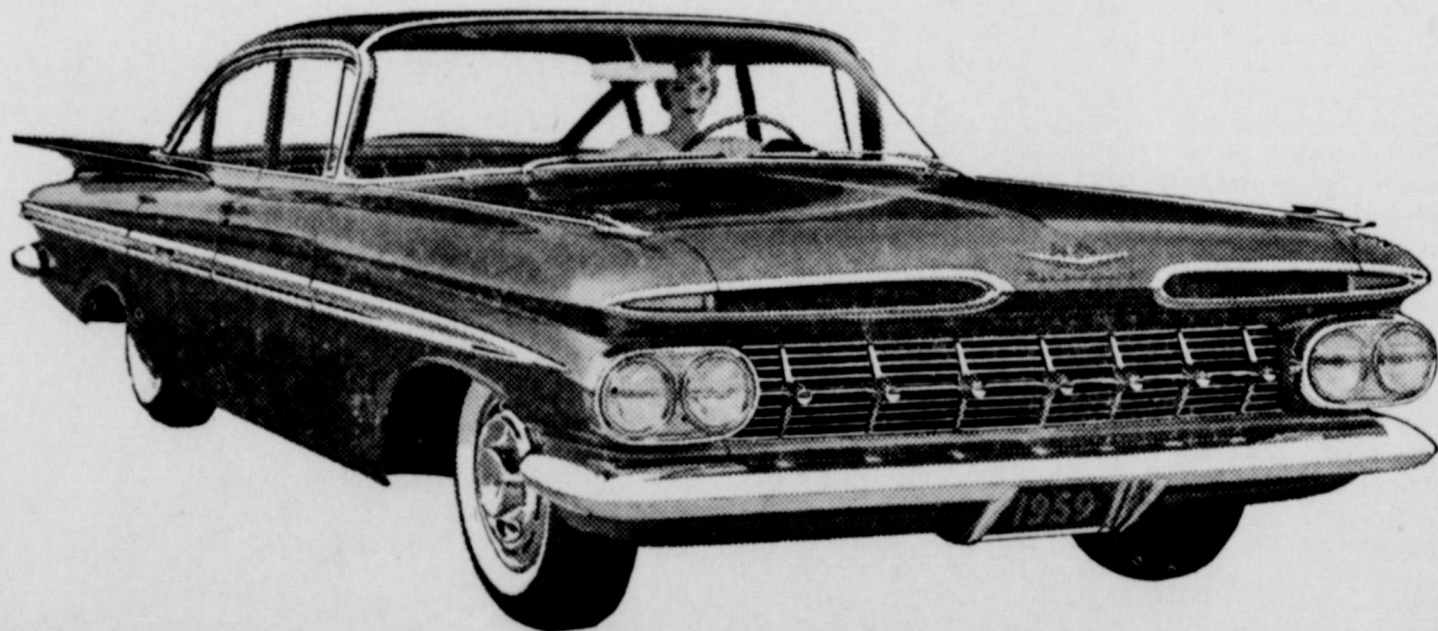

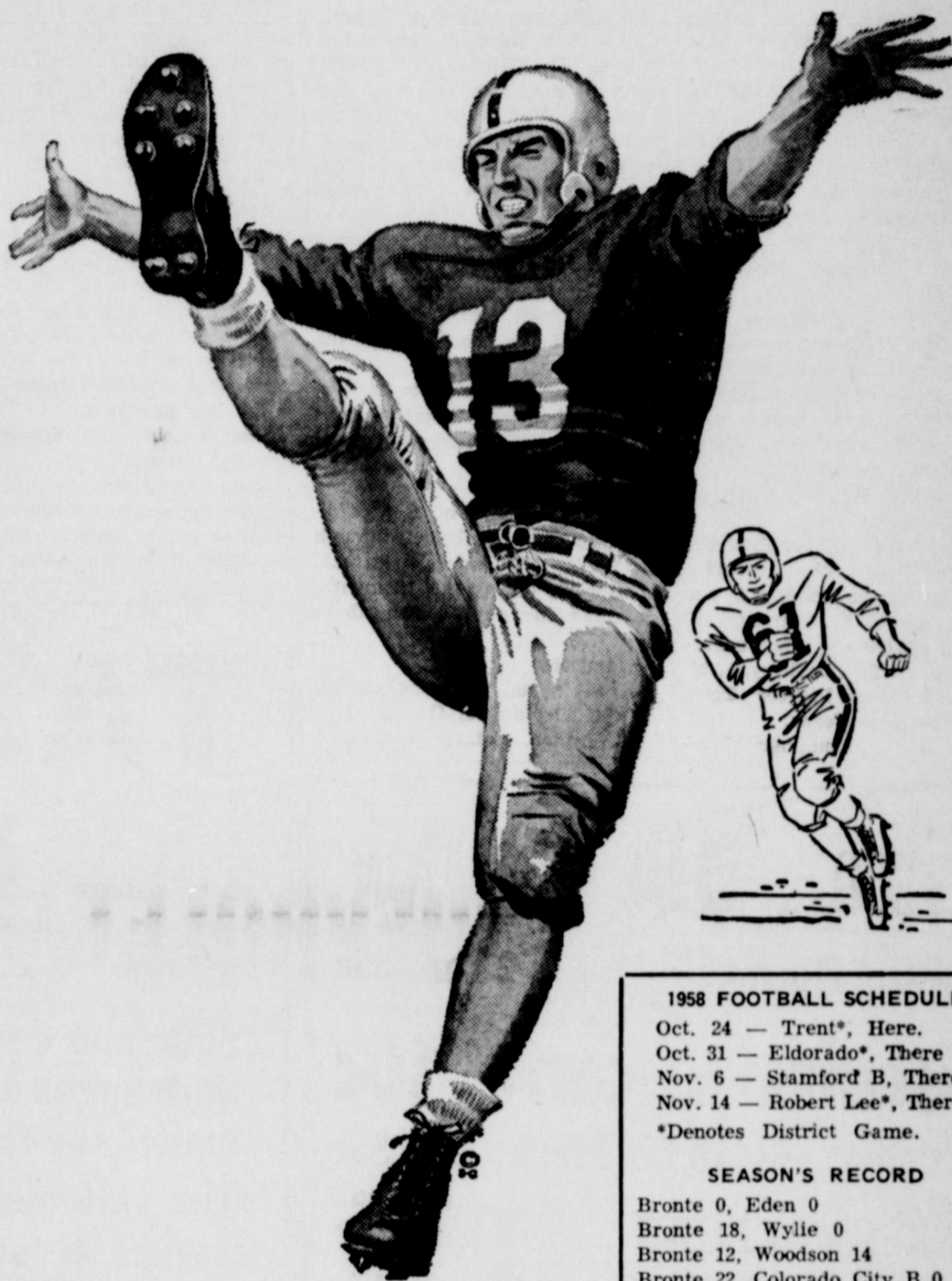

Lorraine Downs Longhorns, 18-16

Practically all hopes for a shot at the District 6-B title for the Bronte Longhorns were shattered Friday night as a rough shot Bulldog team from Lorraine dealt the Longhorns an 18-16 defeat. The loss was the second district defeat for the Longhorns while the win was the second in district play for Lorraine.

After taking a Longhorn punt on their own 19 yard line, the Bulldogs marched 81 yards to the Bronte 1 yard line before being halted. Gary Parnell brought the crowd to their feet on the first play from scrimmage by scampering 53 yards to the Longhorn 28. From there, the Bulldogs used a steady ground gain to go to the one foot line before meeting a stout defense thrown up by the Longhorns.

Being forced to punt, the Longhorns got off a short kick that set up the Bulldogs first touchdown. Taking the punt on the 29, the Bulldogs used three plays to cross the double stripe. Parnell carried 21 yards to the one and from there, Bob Rankin hit the center of the line for the score. The try for extra point was missed on a running attempt.

After taking the ensuing kickoff, the Longhorns needed but four plays to go 52 yards for their initial score. After Benny Corley was

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held to a one yard gain, Albert Grace found Corley in the open and connected with a five yard pass. Another attempted pass fell incomplete and the Longhorns were faced with a fourth down situation on the 45. The Longhorns gambled and won as Grace hit Reyes Olivias with a pass behind the Bulldog secondary for 45 yards and the score. Lanny Denman pounced on a fumble in the end zone to give the Longhorns an extra two points to put them out front 8-6 at the end of the first half.

Taking the kickoff to open the second half, the Bulldogs used power up the middle and speed around ends to march 65 yards for another score. Parnell and Rankin were the big guns for the Bulldogs as they slowly but surely ate up the necessary yardage in 13 plays. Parnell blasted over from the one for the score. Again the extra point was missed and the Bulldogs led 12-8.

After intercepting a Bronte pass at the start of the final quarter, Lorraine, behind good blocking and a sure ground gain, went 70 yards for their final score. With Rankin and Parnell doing the heavy work, the Bulldogs advanced to the Longhorn eight where Parnell connected with Charles Reed with a pass in the end zone for the six counter. The extra point attempt failed as the Bulldogs took an 18-8 lead.

Late in the final period, Dee Arrott recovered a Bulldog fumble on the Bronte 45 to set up the Longhorns final score. After failing to gain, the Longhorns were set back to the 40 at the expense of a penalty for delay of the game. On the next play, Corley hit Alonzo Robbins with a short pass that cleared for 60 yards as Robbins out distanced the entire secondary of the Bulldogs. Arrott ran the conversion to make the final score 18-16 with Lorraine outfront.
