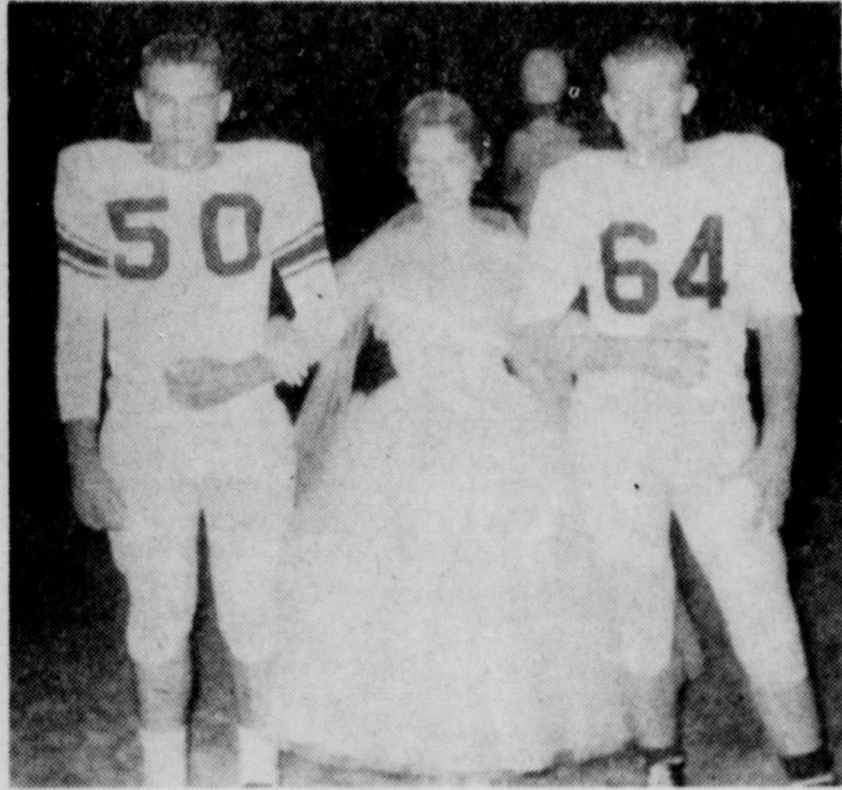

## Longhorns Travel to Eldorado Tonight for District 6-B Game

The Bronte Longhorns will travel to Eldorado tonight to take on new competition in District 6-B play. Opening kickoff will take place at 7:30 with the host team holding the favorite spot.

This is the first year that the Eagles have competed in this District as they have been dropped back from Class A football. The Eagles will be supporting a strong

team that has lost only one conference game while they have won two. Their lone loss came at the hands of the district leaders, Robert Lee. Eldorado holds decisive victories over Trent and the rough Loraine Bulldogs. In non-conference games, the Eagles have downed Richland Springs and Big Lake while they have been defeated by a tough Rankin team and Class A Sonora.

The Eagles will be using a team made up of 13 returning lettermen. Overall, the Eldorado squad is a large team with plenty of speed and an exceptional passing attack.

Bronte, who has been hit hard by injuries, will not be in tip top shape again this week as they are still riddled with injuries. Reyes Olivias is still out as is Stover Taylor. Danny Scott will be a doubtful starter as he is still recovering from injuries.

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)**—Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

## General and Special Elections Set for Tuesday, November 4

A general election will be held in Coke County Tuesday, Nov. 4, for the election of national, state, county and precinct officials. This election in Texas is only a formality in most places, as officials nominated in last summer's Democratic Primaries are considered elected. However of particular interest to Coke countians is the special election to separate the sheriff and tax assessor-collector offices and the voting on nine amendments to the constitution of the State of Texas.

The Republican party has candidates up for governor, U. S. Senator, supreme court justice, place 1, and for agriculture commissioner. The Constitution party has a

### Write-In Legal On Constable Job

Voters in precinct 2 should write in their choice for a constable in the general election next Tuesday. This was the opinion given Thursday morning by County Attorney Franck C. Dickey, Jr.

Even though there is no place on the ballot, he said that he believed it would be proper to write in choices for this job, since a vacancy does exist.

The vacancy in the constable's position was created when T. F. Sims, Sr. died Sept. 23. Mr. Sims had two more years of his term remaining at the time of his death.

Dickey said that it would be necessary for voters to write in the ballots the following notation:

"For Constable, Precinct 2." This phrase will then be followed by the name of the person desired.

The write in should be put in the last column on the ballot which is headed "Write-In."

Mr. Dickey said he was unable to find a case exactly like the one here in precinct 2, but as best as he could determine the procedure outlined above would be proper.

more complete ticket than the Republicans, having nine names on the ballot for various offices. Perhaps a small handful of votes will be cast in this county for the Republicans, and no danger to the Democrats is expected over the entire state.

Considerable interest has been stirred up over the state in the voting on the constitutional amendments. Amendment No. 7 has received much publicity in its favor. It provides for allowing the State to advertise its resources in various ways in an effort to attract new industry and tourist trade. Likewise No. 1 has received large amounts of publicity, but from the opposite direction. A movement headed by Sen. Dorsey Hardeman seeks to defeat this change in the constitution which would allow a pay increase for legislators and provide for annual sessions. Hardeman has made an active drive against the passage of No. 1 and

has traveled over the state filling speaking engagements. The other seven amendments have not been so widely publicized and people of this area seem to be more or less lukewarm in their attitude toward them.

The special election to separate the sheriff and tax assessor-collector offices was called to be held in conjunction with the general election in order to save expense of holding a special election. Coke County Commissioners Court called the election after a petition was presented several weeks ago asking that voters be given an opportunity to vote on the matter.

In case Coke County voters decide that the offices should be separated, it will remain as it is until 1960, when candidates would be voted on for both positions. Sheriff Paul Good will retain the dual position until two years from now, regardless of the outcome of the election.

The 1958 Halloween queens of Bronte high school and elementary school were not known at press time Thursday but were scheduled to be announced at coronation ceremonies held last night, Thursday, in the school auditorium. Balloting was to continue until 7 p. m. Various school classes remained busy Thursday in a last minute attempt to put their candidates out front in the voting.

Also on the schedule for last night was a costume contest, to precede the coronation, at 7 p.m. An all-school program, to entertain the queens, was scheduled for 7:30 with the coronation climaxing the evening.

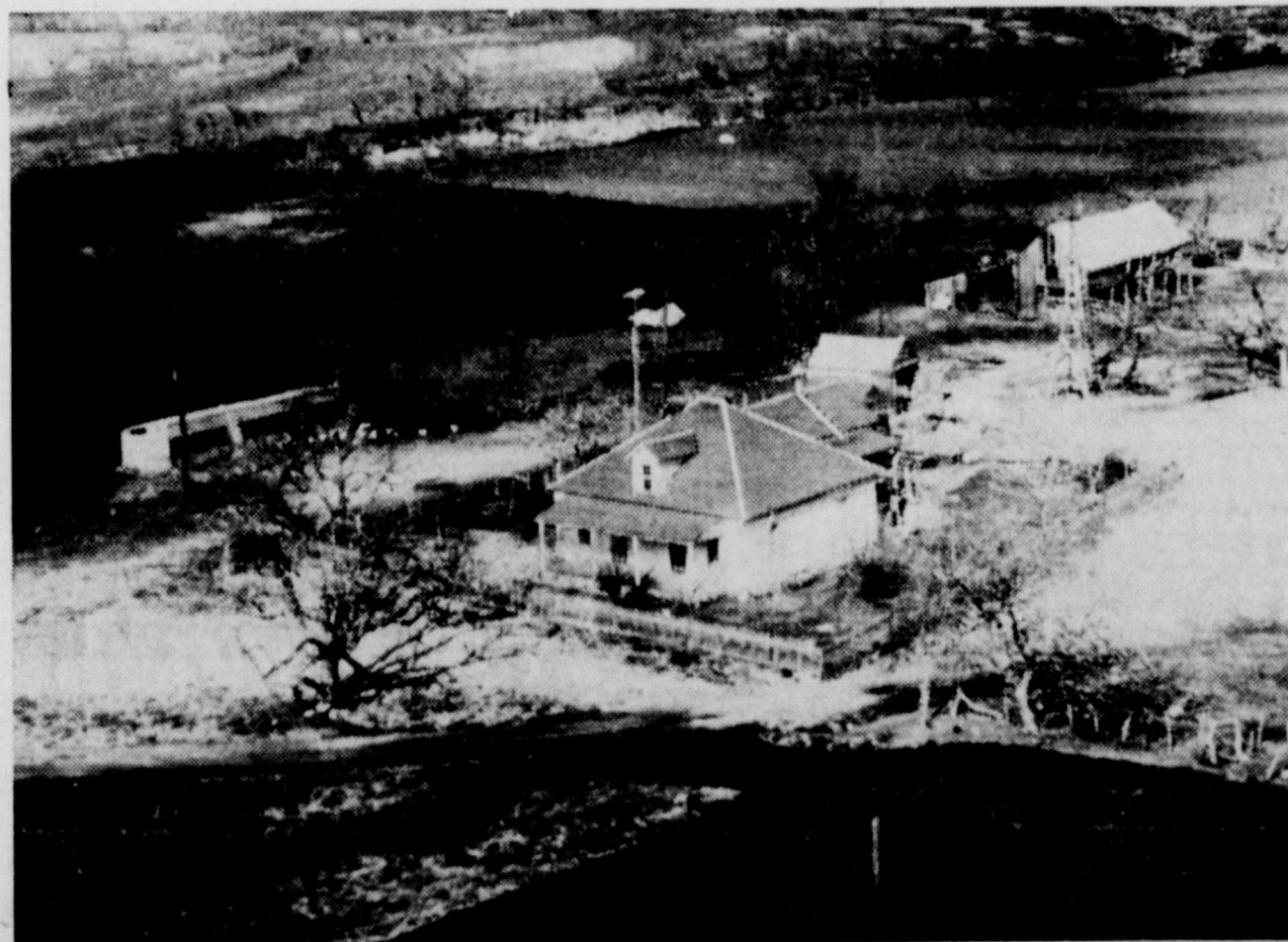

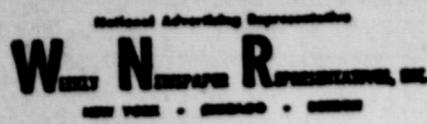

The annual Concho FFA District range judging contest was held Saturday, Oct. 5, on the Cumbie Ivey ranch 2 miles east of Robert Lee. The contest was jointly sponsored by the FFA District and the Coke Soil Conservation District. Teams from Ozona, Eldorado, Garden City, Sterling City, Lakeview, and Robert Lee took part in the event. Awards were presented by Mr. Runge, who is a supervisor from the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District.

F. S. Higginbotham, chairman of the Kickapoo creek watershed steering committee, reports that good progress is being made in obtaining the easements needed for the planning phase of the project.

Kenneth Lackey has a good stand of native grass and Sorghum alum on 56 acres that he drilled last spring. The native grasses in the stand include Lovegrass, Sideoats grama, and Blue grama.

Another good stand of drilled native grasses has been found on the R. B. Allen farm south of Silver. Grasses in that stand include Weeping lovegrass, Switchgrass, Buffelgrass and K. R. Bluestem.

J. S. Walker is in the process of dozing approximately 84 acres of mesquite on his place southeast of Silver.

Present moisture conditions make this a good time for mechanical brush control practices where seeding is not necessary because a higher percentage of the roots can be pulled out when the ground is somewhat moist.

Seven net wire diversions totaling 2,157 feet have been staked for construction on the Olin Blanks ranch northwest of Robert Lee.

# Longhorns Drop Third District Game to Trent Gorillas 28-12

The dispute for the cellar position was settled last Friday night as the two bottom teams of District 6-B met on the local gridiron. Trent emerged the victor over the Bronte Longhorns, 28-12.

Up until then, both teams were holding a 0-2 district record. After their victory, the Gorillas moved one game ahead of the Longhorns with a 1-2 record while Bronte holds a 0-3 record. Both squads still have two conference games to play. Bronte still must encounter Robert Lee and Eldorado, while Trent still has Hermleigh and Robert Lee to play.

An injury riddled Longhorn team put up a valiant battle, but the Gorillas made too many breaks for the Bronte lads to overcome. A good passing attack and a strong pass defense spelled victory for the Gorillas. They kept the Longhorns open with a passing barrage that picked up 86 yards, set up one touchdown and counted for another. In the other statistics departments, the injured Longhorns surpassed the Gorillas as they gained 177 yards to 172 for Trent and they picked up 15 first downs to the Gorillas' 13.

Trent jumped to an early lead after receiving the opening kickoff and marching to the Longhorn 20 before Bob Wrinkle recovered a Gorilla miscue at that point. On the first play from scrimmage, the Longhorns passed and Johnny Heatly intercepted on the 32 yard line and returned it all the way for the initial score. Heatly also ran the extra point to give the Gorillas an 8-0 lead in the opening moments of the game.

After taking the ensuing kickoff on their 29, the Longhorns wasted no time as they marched 71 yards to score. Benny Corley picked up 11 yards and a first down on the 40 and Dee Arrott followed up with an 18 yard gallop to put the Longhorns on the Trent 42. Corley again carried and behind beautiful blocking, another 15 yards was added to the Longhorns drive. Arrott again carried and moved the ball to the 18 on a nine yard pick-up. Corley carried to the 10 yard line from where Arrott went off tackle and into the end zone for the score. The try for extra point was missed and the Gorillas held an 8-6 lead at the end of the first period.

Mid-way in the second period, the Longhorns and the Gorillas exchanged fumbles with the Gorillas making better use of the Longhorn miscue. Recovering on their own 45, the Trent team needed ten plays to go the distance. Two incompletes passes left the Gorillas with a third down and still needing 10 yards for a first down. A third down pass clicked for 28 yards and a first down on the Longhorn 27. David Claborn moved inside the 15 with a 15 yard scamper, but a 12 yard loss set the Gorillas back to the 24. A 21 yard pass from Claborn to Jerry Williams put the Gorillas in scoring position on the 3 yard line from where Claborn went across the double stripe on a quarterback sneak. Heatly ran the extra point and the Gorillas had a 16-6 lead as the first half ended.

Early in the third stanza, the Gorillas picked up another Longhorn fumble and marched 90 yards to score. The Gorillas marched to the Longhorn 37 with a heavy ground attack. Trent then opened the Longhorn defense up with a

pass from Claborn to Williams that cleared for 37 yards and the touchdown. The try for conversion was missed on a running play. The score stood at 22-6 with Trent still upfront.

As the Gorillas kicked off to the Longhorns, Albert Grace brought the crowd to their feet as he took the ball on the ten yard line. Behind outstanding blocking, Grace cut to the south sideline and headed east to go 90 yards for another Longhorn touchdown. Again the Longhorns attempted to run the extra point and failed as they cut the Trent lead to 22-12.

Early in the final quarter, the Gorillas used a strong ground attack to march 67 yards to score. Overall, the Trent eleven used 12 plays to drive across to paydirt. Williams and Heatly were the big guns for Trent as they alternated on carrying the pigskin for the Gorillas. Heatly brought all scoring to an end as he counted six points from 10 yards out. The conversion try failed on an at-

tempted pass. Final score read Trent 28, Bronte 12.

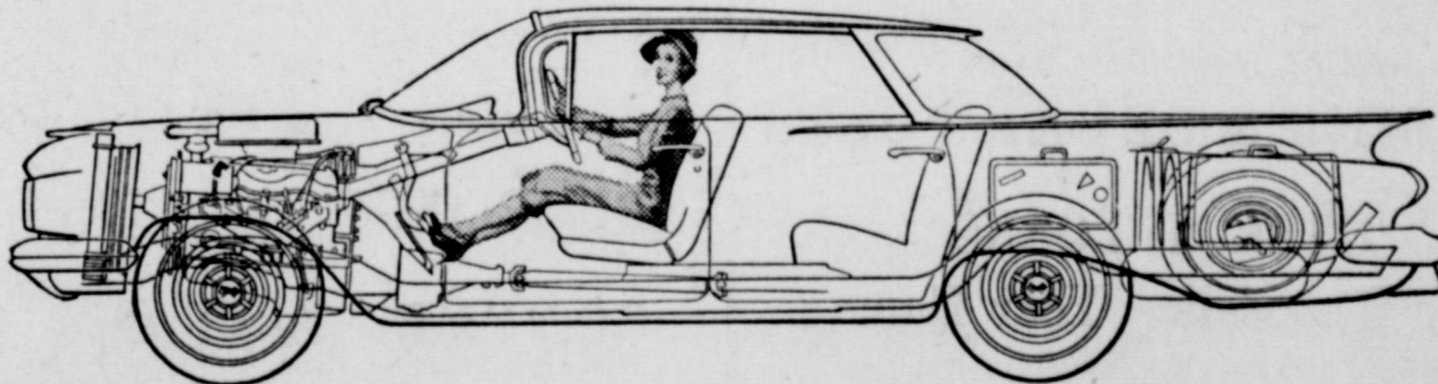

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)**—Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability, and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 30)**—Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)**—Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48)**—Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 17)**—Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas.

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4)**—Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)**—Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to

and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 3)**—Authorizes the legislature to create a hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas and a county wide hospital District in Wichita County, Tex., and Hospital District in Jefferson County, Texas.
