Pruitt said Thursday that work on the new building will begin as soon as possible. The addition will consist of seven new Sunday school rooms, fellowship hall and a kitchen.

The Kickapoo Church, which is located in the southeast part of town, built a new church in 1955, but the membership has outgrown the facilities. The new building was opened on Easter Sunday in 1955.

## Boy Scout Drive Has Over \$200 in Cash and Pledges

More than \$200 in money and pledges has been turned in for the annual fund drive for the Boy Scouts. Noah Pruitt, Jr., chairman of the drive, said Thursday that he had received \$127.00 in money and \$108.00 in pledges to be paid through the year.

Only four workers have completed their collections to raise this amount.

Pruitt urged that other workers complete their canvass of persons assigned to them within the next ten days. "I would like for all the money to be in so we can end the drive by Monday, Nov. 17", he said.

## Coke County Voters Decide To Separate Sheriff-Tax Office

Coke County voters have approved the proposition to separate the sheriff and tax office. The issue was decided by a vote of 406 to 240 on a separate ballot submitted at Tuesday's general election.

It means that effective Jan. 1, 1961, a county tax assessor-collector will take over his duties, and that the sheriff will cease to be ex-officio tax assessor-collector.

Candidates for both offices will be elected in 1960.

## Large Turn-Out Here In General Election

An unusually large turnout for a general election in a non-presidential election year turned out to vote in Coke County Tuesday. Reason for the large turnout was not to vote on candidates running for various offices but for voters to have their say on some special propositions which were balloted on along with the general election.

Besides voting on precinct, county, state and some national offices, voters in Texas had a chance to approve nine amendments to the constitution. Then, Coke County voters were all interested in the proposition of separating the sheriff and tax assessor collector offices. Voters in Precinct 2 had additional incentive to go to the polls because of a

write-in election for constable of this precinct.

Almost 700 Coke County voters approved all the Democratic nominees for offices, approved of three of the nine amendments, and voted to separate the sheriff-tax office. A. E. (Pete) Gentry was the high man in the constable election.

Gov. Price Daniel led the state ticket with 608 votes, compared to 46 polled by his Republican opponent, Edwin S. Mayer. The latter received 19 votes in Robert Lee, 9 at Bronte, 8 at Walnut (Water Valley), 6 at Silver, 4 at Sanco and 9 other scattered votes.

Ralph Yarborough got 581 Coke County votes in his successful bid for his first 6-year term in the U. S. Senate. His Republican opponent received 57 votes. They included 11 at Silver, 12 at Sanco, 5 at Walnut, 4 in both Robert Lee and Bronte.

Congressman O. C. Fisher, Senator Dorsey Hardeman and State Representative A. J. Bishop were re-elected without opposition, as were W. W. (Bud) Thetford for county judge, J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler, county and district clerk, Mrs. Gertrude Gray, county treasurer, and Commissioners Howard Brock in Precinct 2 and Claude Dittmore in Precinct 4. The vote for each of the district and county candidates was from 667 to 669. Brock's vote was 235 and 63 persons cast their ballot for Dittmore.

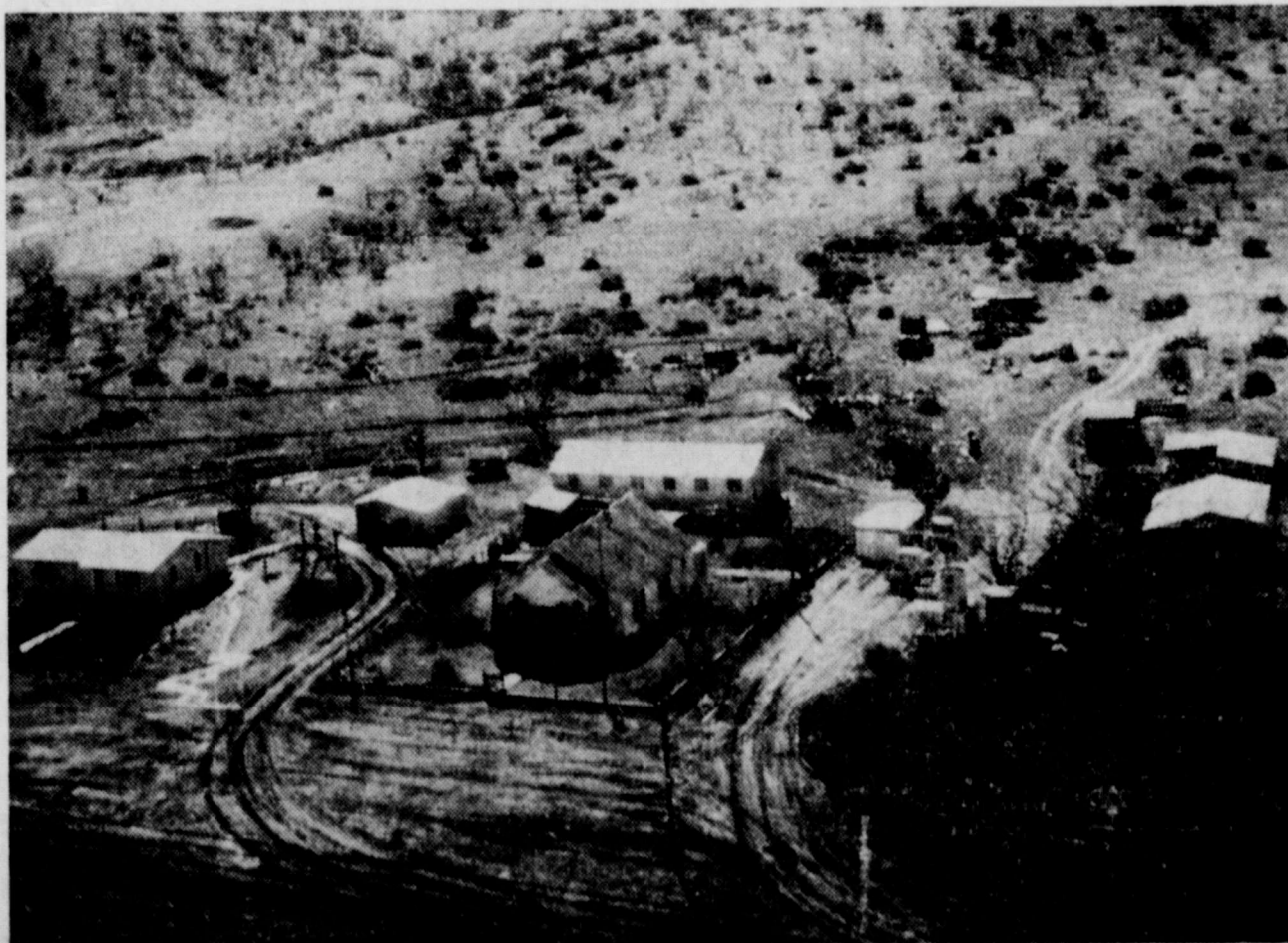
Roy P. Ross was elected justice of the peace in Precinct 1 without opposition. He polled 292 votes. Jess Liles was elected for the same office in Precinct 2 and got 234 votes.

Voters favored the measure to separate the sheriff and tax offices by a vote of 406 to 240. A break down on the vote appears in another article.

In the constable race the vote was as follows: Gentry, 70 at Bronte and one at Hayrick for 71; George Wrinkle, 62; T. E. Tidwell, 34; B. G. Timmons, 49 and George Eubanks, 8. A few other scattered votes were also cast. All the votes except the one from Hayrick were cast in the Bronte box, as no Olga voter cast a vote in this race. The write-in election was necessary to name a successor to fill the unexpired term of the late T. F. Sims, Sr. Gentry will hold the office until 1960, when it will come up in the regular Democratic Primary.

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# Longhorns Lose 37-14 Game To Tough Eldorado Eagles

The Bronte Longhorns suffered their worst licking of the year last Friday night as a rowdy team of Eagles from Eldorado ran wild to a 37-14 victory.

The Eagles took an early lead after capitalizing on a Longhorn fumble and never relinquished the lead as more fumbles aided the Eagles in their win. Eldorado rolled to a touchdown in each of the first two periods and then scored another in the third quarter. The fourth period saw the Eagles ice the game with three more touchdowns.

The Longhorns staged a last period comeback, but the large lead built up by Eldorado was too much for the Longhorns to overcome. All of the Longhorns' scoring came in the final period behind the brilliant running of Alonzo Robbins and Albert Grace.

Early in the initial period, the Eagles pounced on a Longhorn fumble that gave Eldorado possession of the ball on the Eagle 40. Nine plays later, the Eagles had marched the 60 yards necessary to give them a 6-0 lead. Parker romped 21 yards to paydirt. The extra point try was stopped short by the Longhorns.

Midway in the second period, the Eagles again took advantage of a Bronte miscue as they marched 70 yards for their second crossing of the double stripe. Only five plays were used as the drive was climaxed with a 44 yard pass from Nixon to end Waldron. Again the EP was missed and the half time score stood at 12-0 with the Eagles outfront.

Fumbles continued to play a big role in the game as the Longhorns failed to hold on the pigskin and in turn, the Eagles converted the miscue into another touchdown. After the Longhorns had recovered an Eagle fumble on the 34, the Eagles needed only three plays to retrieve the ball from Bronte. This time, the Eagles marched 74 yards to paydirt. Nixon went into the end zone from ten yards out to give the Eagles an 18-0 lead at the end of the third period as the conversion was blocked.

In the opening seconds of the final period, the Eagles backed the Longhorns back to the goal line where fumbles played another big part in the scoring pattern of the Eagles. After pushing the Longhorns back to the nine, a large, hard rushing Eagle line swarmed over quarterback Albert Grace and jarred the ball loose and into the end zone where tackle L. D. Williams fell on the loose pigskin for the score. Again the point after touchdown was missed and the Eagles had a 24-0 lead.

After taking the ensuing kickoff, the Longhorns fought back to march 52 yards to score. Alonzo Robbins opened the drive with a 24 yard scamper to the 28 yard line where a five yard penalty put the ball on the 23. Dee Arrott added six yards for the Longhorns and Kenneth McCutchen added three more to the 14. Albert Grace skirted end for 14 yards and the touchdown.

A running try failed on the extra point.

Four plays after the Longhorns kicked off, the Eagles continued their onslaught as they went for their fifth touchdown. Dan Mittle went 47 yards and Parker added 14 to the 15 yard line. Parker hit off tackle for 15 yards and paydirt. Bellman kicked the EP and the Eagles led 31-6.

Fighting hard, the Longhorns never said die and after receiving the kickoff, they used five plays to score. In marching 52 yards, the Bronte lads used a 14

yard pass from Arrott to Grace to set up the scoring play on the 26. Robbins rambled around end for the necessary 26 yards to cross the double stripe. Arrott threw to Jerry McCutchen for the extra point and the score stood at 31-14.

Two plays after the kickoff, Mittle ended all scoring as he thrilled the crowd with a 53 yard scamper into the end zone standing up. Extra point was missed and the Eagles had a 37-14 victory.

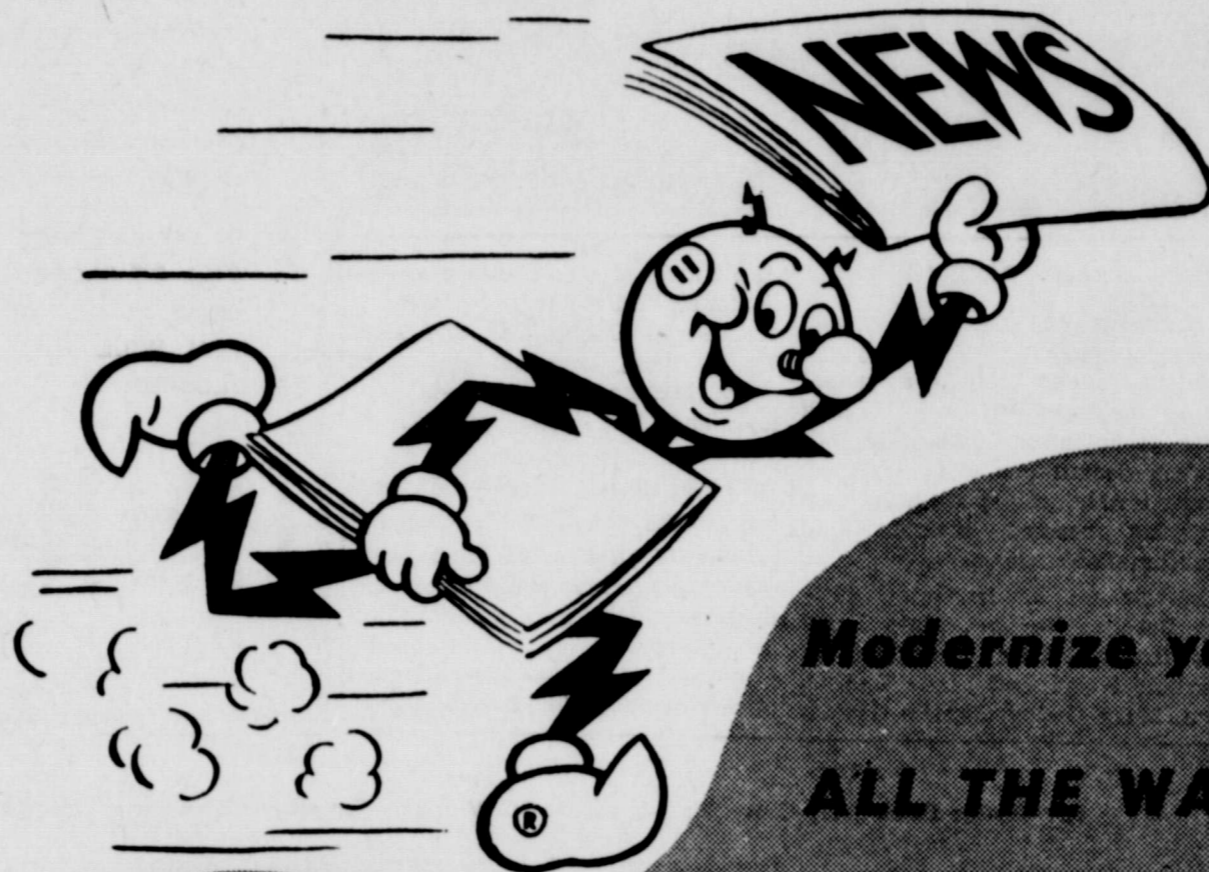

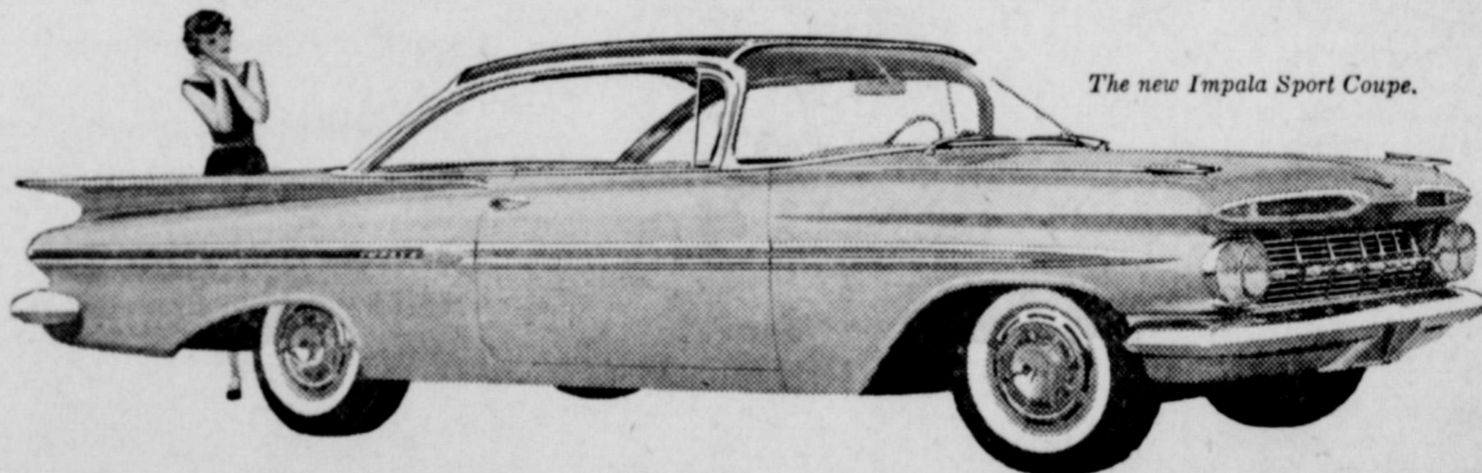

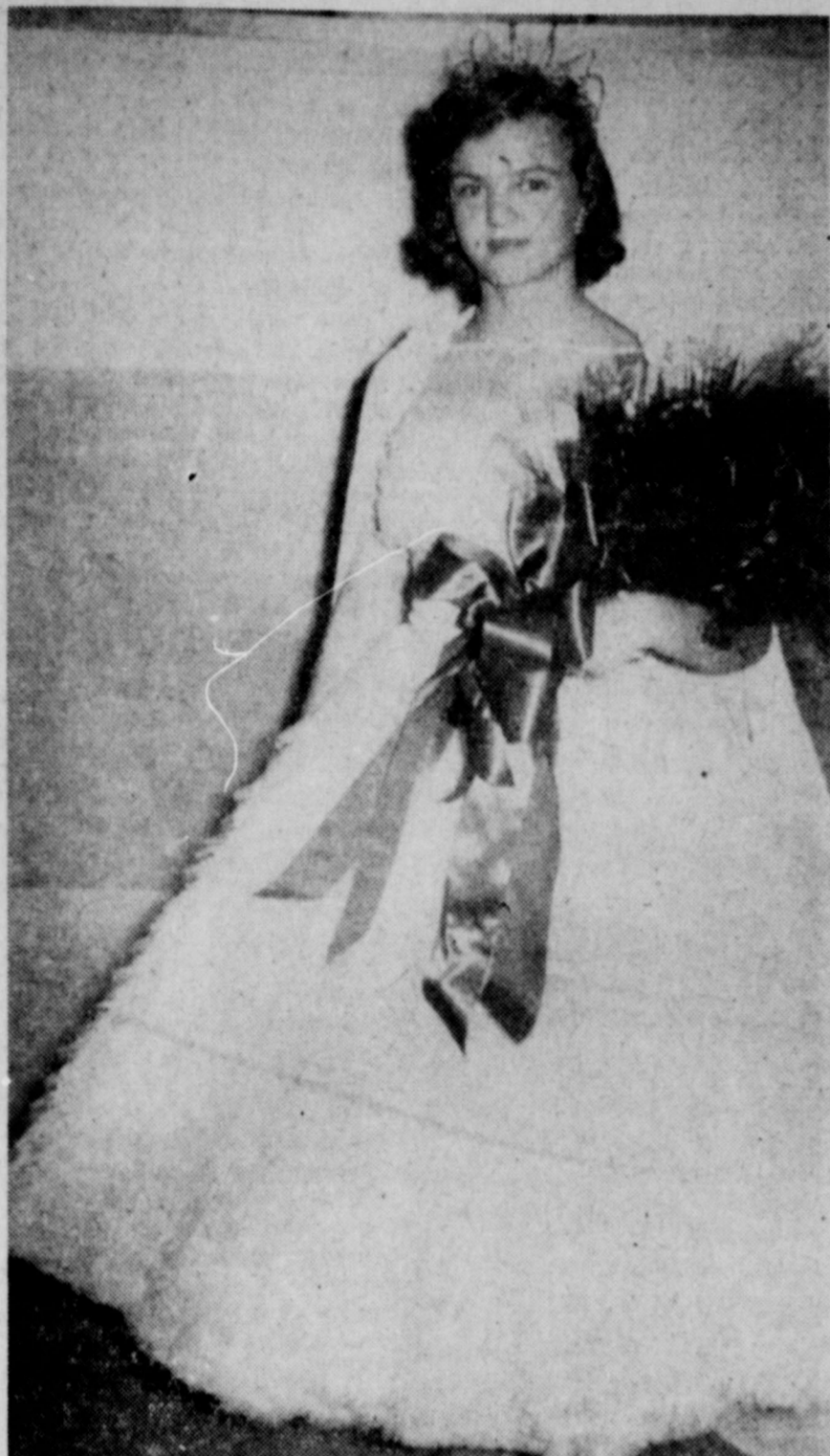

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Applications for assistance under the Great Plains Conservation Program were received from the following land owners during the past week: Preston Davis and W. D. McDonald of Bronte, O. B. Jacobs and Marvin Simpson of Robert Lee and William C. Hixson of Christoval. To date 26 applications have been received for assistance under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Pastures are showing good improvement following good general fall rains. Approximately 45,000 acres of rangeland have been deferred this year.

Otis Campbell has a good stand of Blue Panic on his fields north of Sanco. These fields are in the Conservation Reserve. Blue Panic is a perennial warm-season bunch grass which is adapted to most of the soils in the district. Blue Panic is excellent pasturage and hay crop. Good results have been obtained with both row and broadcast plantings using about 2 lbs. of commercial seed per acre in rows. Blue Panic has also proved successful on root plowed areas using from 2-4 lbs. commercial seed per acre.

"Any watershed protection undertaking involves much more than structures and earth moving. It calls for agronomic, and other measures along with engineering devices. You have to have conservation land treatment to reduce peak of runoff and to cut down on sedimentation. So the land-treatment part of the watershed program is the best insurance for the effectiveness and long life of the structures."—Aug. 17, 1957, D. A. Williams.

## Game Management Group Enjoys Big Feed at Bronte; Hears Good Speaker

Over 100 persons heard Harley Berg, state wildlife conservation educator from Waco, speak at the annual meeting of the Coke County Game Management Association at Bronte Monday night.

Berg spoke on the subject of the "balance of nature."

In his talk, he said that certain animals, reptiles, and birds evaluate the number of wild game birds, animals and even fish in the world.

Such animals as the red fox, coyote, and even rattlesnakes keep down the number of rats and mice in a given area.

Actually, he said, only one-fifth of the hawks in the state are harmful to poultry and the like. The rest are birds that are beneficial in one way or another to the farmer and rancher.

Rattlesnakes were one of the most dwelled upon subjects by the farmers and ranchers. Members of the association voted to establish a bounty on rattlers if the resolution would be passed by the county commission.

Berg said that one of the characteristics of the pit vipers (rattlesnakes, copperheads, and water moccasins) is two to three sets of extra fangs which will replace the original fangs if they are pulled out. He said the fangs would appear overnight and were just as poisonous as the originals.

Newly born rattlesnakes are just as poisonous as their parents, he pointed out, except they don't have as much venom.

Berg advised parents to tell children not to put their hands or fingers in any kind of hole where a snake could get to it. Snakes can not stay in the ultraviolet rays of the sun. They will hide in small holes or any kind of protective shade.

In the event a person is bitten by a pitted viper, Berg advised that he not run or drink whisky as the old timers did in the early days. Instead, they should remain quiet.

Berg went on to say that there are more deer in the United States today than ever before in recorded history. He said there are more than nine million deer in the U. S. now with more than a million of them in Texas alone. Over 100,000 were killed in the state last year.

It is the general opinion of the farmers, ranchers and wild life people that there are more game

birds (excluding turkeys) than there ever was before.

Officers elected to the association for the coming year are D. K. Glenn, president; Finnell Smith, vice president; and Sterling Lindsey, secretary. Directors for the organization will be held over for the coming year.

The meeting was preceded by a barbecue served by the Bronte Lions Club.

More than 80 members signed for the 1958-59 Game Management Association program.

G. C. Allen was president last year, while Mr. Glenn held the office of vice president. J. E. Quisenberry declined re-election after serving as secretary-treasurer four years.

It was decided last year to set the association up on a membership basis, with annual dues at \$1 per person.

An invitation from Walter Stapp to hold next year's meeting at Oak Creek Lake was accepted.

### DIVERSITY CLUB MEETS
