Longhorns Win Increase in School Taxes a Must, Trustees Tell Local Residents

The Bronte Longhorns went wild last Friday night, defeating the Robert Lee Steers, 31-8, in their only conference win of the season. In addition to being the game of the year in football competition, the contest was played before a record crowd of Robert Lee Home-comers.

The Longhorns took to the air for most of their yardage against the Steers, completing eight of 23 passing tries. Quarterback Albert Grace tossed most of the aerials, but some outstanding passes were completed with Grace pitching out to Dee Arrott who

then tossed to downfield receivers. The Longhorns were clicking in every department and spectators were loud in their praise of the Bronte line.

Bronte seniors who took the field for the last time were Albert Grace, Dean Black, Stover Taylor and Steve Colvin.

Other than the terrific passing yardage accumulated by Bronte, the game was about even statistically. First downs were even at nine each, and Robert Lee edged the Longhorns in the rushing department 143 yards to 131.

Bronte scored in every period, and the outcome of the game was never in doubt after the Longhorns pushed over the first touchdown of the game midway through the first quarter.

The score was set up by a bad snap from center on a Robert Lee fourth down punting situation. Sam Skipworth, the punter, retrieved the bad snap back but was smothered by four Bronte linemen on his own nine yard line. After an incomplete pass on first down, the Longhorns hit paydirt on their next attempt when Arrott took a pitch-out from Grace and passed complete to Neil Black in the end zone. Danny Scott missed on his extra point kicking attempt.

Mid-way through the second period Freddie McDanald, the Steers scoring threat, fumbled and Bronte recovered on the Robert Lee 23-yard line. Alonzo Robbins ran for three, and then Arrott circled left end for 15 to advance the ball to the five yard line. An offside penalty against the Steers placed the ball on the one, and on the following play Robbins burst through a gaping hole over left tackle for the touchdown. Scott missed again and Bronte led 12-0 at halftime.

Meeting Tuesday To Study Home for Elderly in Bronte

A committee was appointed by the Bronte Lions Club at its meeting Thursday at noon to further study possibilities of setting up a home in Bronte for elderly people. The home would be a Golden Age home and would be sponsored by the San Angelo District of the Methodist Church. The committee includes Rev. Jimmy Campbell, pastor of Bronte Methodist church, chairman, L. T. Youngblood, B. E. Modgling, Joe Carter, C. E. Bruton and D. K. Glenn.

Work was begun on the project several months ago and a committee from the San Angelo district came to Bronte to discuss

the proposed home.

The Lions committee got together immediately after their meeting and decided to call a meeting of the general public for next Tuesday night at the school auditorium. Time has been set for 7:30.

Purpose of the meeting Tuesday night is to determine if Bronte can meet these minimum requirements.

Rev. Campbell pointed out the following requirements which must be met before a town can even be considered as a site for such a home:

The town must (1) Furnish a minimum of 20 acres of land; (2) Furnish one-fourth of the cost of construction; (3) Have utilities connections available at the site; and (4) Have adequate medical facilities available.

Campbell told the Club that benefits of such a home to the town would be invaluable. He pointed out the large number of visitors the some 65 occupants of the home would have continuously and the money they would spend here. The staff for operating such an institution would provide a sizeable payroll. Then, too, he added, the actual food, clothing and other material required for the operation of the home would amount to thousands of dollars each year.

He urged that everyone in the Bronte area who is interested in seeing the home located here to be present for the meeting Tuesday night.

Groundbreaking Set for Sunday At Kickapoo

Rev. R. W. Blackmon, pastor of the Kickapoo Baptist Church here, said this week that a groundbreaking ceremony will be held at the church at 2:30 p. m. Sunday.

The ceremony will kickoff a building program for the church which will add seven Sunday school rooms, a fellowship hall and kitchen to the present church plant.

Materials for beginning construction on the project are already at the site and actual work will begin in the next few days.

Rev. Blackmon said the public is cordially invited to be present for the ceremonies Sunday.

patrons. Condo O. Richards, a member of the board, presented the situation to the approximately 100 persons present.

Richards said that as the board saw the problem, the people of the Bronte school district have three choices:

1. They can close the school.
2. They can vote a tax rate increase.
3. They can have an equalization board to increase valuations in the district.

Richards told the audience that Bronte School is faced with a \$33,000 deficit at the end of the current school year. He emphasized that an increase in school income is necessary to retire this debt, as well as to prevent a recurrence of deficit.

The speaker said that the school board had figured out that a \$1.50 tax rate will be necessary to carry on present operations and retire the operations deficit and an additional 40 cents will be necessary to retire the bonded indebtedness on the new elementary school building.

It was indicated in the course of the evening that the board would try to bring the tax increase to a vote some time next spring.

Burglars Take Small Amounts In 2 Break-Ins

Amateurish burglaries here the past week have resulted in small losses to Bronte School and Spencer Grocery and Station. The office of High School Principal Joe Simpson was broken into Tuesday night. Simpson said the burglars took \$13.25, but left a larger amount of money in the vault. They entered by opening a window of the building and then entering the office through the transom.

Garland Spencer, owner of the station and grocery, said his place was broken into Thursday night of last week. He, too, said the burglars were not to ambitious, and took only 75 to 100 pennies which he had left in his cash register, some cigarettes and cold drinks. He said candy and other small items might have been taken but it was hard to say for sure.

Both Simpson and Spencer said the break-ins were apparently the work of youngsters.

Charlie Boecking, operator of Bronte Motor Co., also reported that he recently lost \$10 and some change. His loss, however occurred in day time when the business was open, unnoticed, the safe was entered and the \$10 plus was taken.

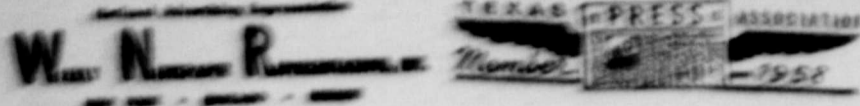
STREET MAN HIRED

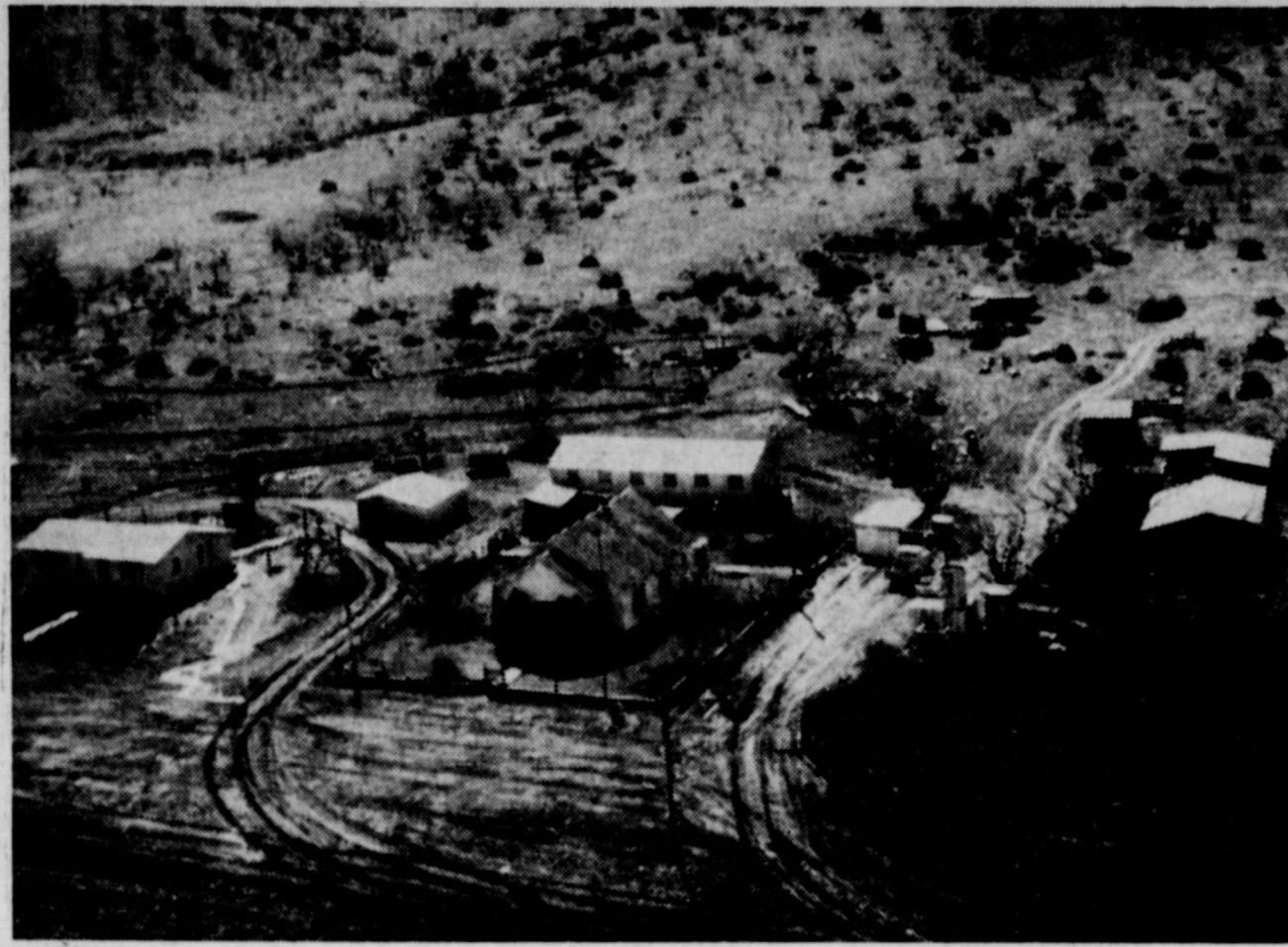

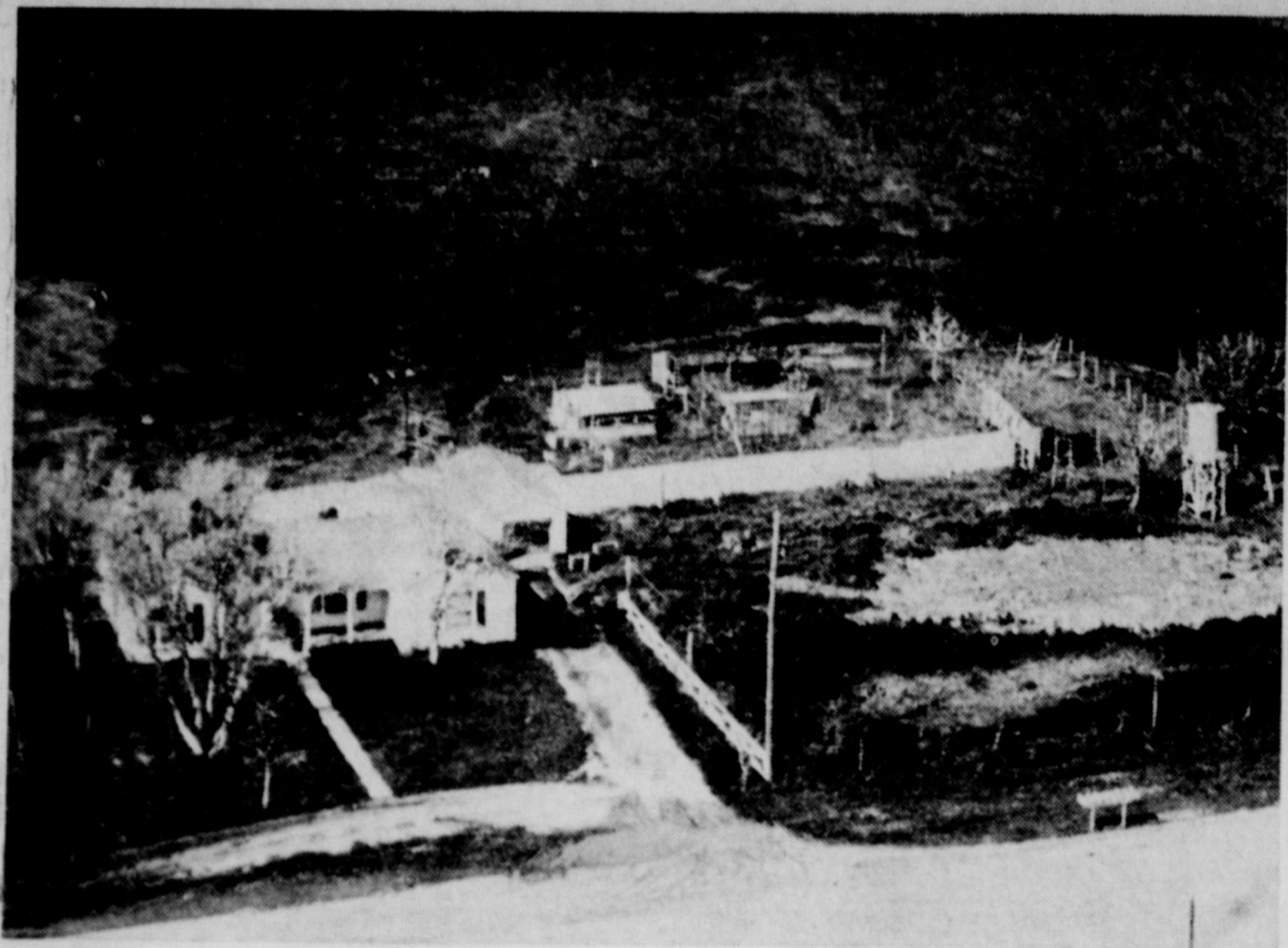

Postmaster Urges Early Mailing for Christmas Parcels

Postmaster Noah Pruitt, Jr. said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early for Christmas' Campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully — make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas card. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to everyone in keeping mailing lists up-to-date.

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferable well before Dec. 10, and those for nearby points should be mailed by Dec. 15, or at least a week before Christmas.

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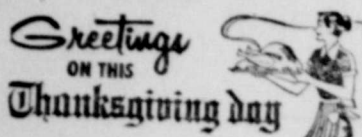

qualified voters of a school district, provides for separation of school taxes for operation and maintenance and for retirement of bonded indebtedness. It's approval by voters would allow a higher tax rate than is legally possible under the present tax setup of the school.

Reason for the school's deficit was pointed out as being due to a decrease in available state money, an increase in teachers' salaries and a decrease in local taxes due to lowering of oil property valuations. These three factors were discussed in last week's Enterprise.

Richards pointed out that the meeting Tuesday night was not called to try to high pressure voters into passing a tax increase, but rather to present the facts honestly and accurately.
