Grand Jury to Investigate Murder Charge Against Pair

District Judge Joe L. Mays has ordered the Grand Jury to be reconvened in Robert Lee next Monday at 10 a. m.

Main business will be investigation of the Negro pair charged with the brutal murder Oct. 24 of L. H. (Shorty) Canada, 58, Gandy creamery truck driver of San Angelo.

The men, Roosevelt Wiley, 26, and Willie McDade, a juvenile, confessed to stabbing the man to death after robbing him of \$800.

Schools to Conduct Annual Clothing Drive for Needy

Beginning next Monday, Bronte school children will bring bundles of used clothing to school during World Clothing Week. According to Supt. Garland Black, the drive will continue through Friday and is part of a nationwide campaign to raise enough used clothing, shoes and bedding to clothe one million orphaned and needy children and adults in the United States and overseas. World Clothing Week is conducted by the schools in cooperation with the Christian's Children's Fund, Inc., an international charitable organization to assist orphans and other needy children in the United States and thirty-six foreign countries overseas.

Supt. Black asked that school children bring clothing for either children or adults, or bedding. The bedding is distributed during disaster emergency situations, such as floods, tornadoes, or earthquakes. Every student will be given literature to take home explaining the purpose of the drive and asking cooperation of parents and friends.

The clothing will be packed and mailed by members of the Sorosis Study Club.

Methodist Conference Okays Golden Age Home for Bronte

The District Conference of the Methodist Church voted Thursday afternoon to accept the proposal of Bronte to build a Golden Age home here. Along with the proposal from Bronte, the conference accepted similar proposals presented by Eden and Sonora.

Acceptance of any of the three proposals is contingent upon the town's meeting specifications as set forth by the church. Main points in these specifications is providing 20 acres of land for the site, furnishing one-fourth of the cost of construction, and providing utilities connections and a

paved road to the site.

Rev. James W. Campbell, local Methodist minister, phoned the information to The Enterprise Thursday afternoon at the conclusion of the meeting which was held in McCamey. He said both Eden and Sonora propose to vote county wide bond issues to raise the one-fourth construction cost.

A committee from the Bronte Lions Club was appointed two weeks ago to work up Bronte's proposal to the Methodist Conference. This committee was composed of Campbell, chairman, D. K. Glenn, B. E. Modgling, C. E. Bruton, L. T. Youngblood and Joe Carter. Several thousand dollars had been raised before Campbell took Bronte's proposal to the meeting yesterday.

The tentative plans for the home at Bronte call for accommodations for 68 older adults, with units for 24 couples and 20 single persons.

Campbell said in his telephone conversation Thursday afternoon that "now is the time for everybody to get to work on this project if we are going to put it over. At least we have the okay to start on it now."

Frank C. Dickey Jr. has resigned as County Attorney to accept a position with the State Highway Department. His resignation was accepted by the Coke County Commissioners Court at their Monday session.

Mr. Dickey took up his new work immediately and has moved his family to San Angelo where they have leased a residence at 421 South Avenue.

He will be employed in a legal capacity as senior right of way agent in Highway District 7 which has headquarters in San Angelo. He will handle title and legal work for the district which is made up of fifteen or more counties in this area. A. J. Snell is the district engineer.

Mr. Dickey has served as Coke County attorney since Jan. 1, 1953 and had two more years remaining on his present 4-year term. No action was taken to fill the vacancy.

After four years of service in the Marines Mr. Dickey attended Baylor University where he obtained his law degree in 1952. He came to Robert Lee and engaged in the practice of law with his father, Frank C. Dickey Sr. The law firm of Dickey & Dickey will be continued.

Frank Jr. is married to the former Sheila Ryan of Minneapolis, Minn. They have three children, Robert 6, Debbie, 4, and Bill, 2 years old.

Them fellers in Washington figgers that us farmers and ranchers is sorter dumb, so they make us git up our income tax forms a couple months ahead of everybody else.

On account of me being so ignorant, I used to start on next year's forms as soon as I got this year's in the mail, but now

that they got them forms simplified down to about 20 pages of fine print I think I can start the first week in December and git it done in plenty of time. I don't know nothing that disturbs a man's peace and interferes with his thinking as bad as trying to rassle with his income tax forms and his conscience at the same time.

I started out the first of the year putting everthing down, so's I wouldn't have a headache with my report like I did last year. I did pritty good fer the first week or two. I entered everything, including the cost of that new spark plug I bought fer my tractor and the 16 cent I got fer 4 eggs my old lady didn't know I sold. But I've had a heap of bad luck with my records this year. County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

MORE ON BRUCELLOSIS

In continuing the article on brucellosis the first thing that should be done is to restate or describe the position that the State of Texas is allowing itself to get into, by not moving to control brucellosis.

Should no action be taken, by individual groups or by the State in the form of brucellosis control legislation, according to Secretary Benson's figures, only 3% of the Counties in the United States would have unrestricted markets for Texas cattle. And some of the 3% may have state imposed regulations that prohibit shipment of Texas cattle across their state line.

You may not, and most of Coke County operators do not, sell breeding, stocker or feeder cattle out of the state. You may not think the limitations will affect you and your operation. We believe it can and probably will if no corrective action is taken.

First, thousands of cattle are shipped out of Texas annually as feeders and stockers. Many others go out as breeding cattle replacements. These cattle are all high quality — good, choice and prime. The buyers do not buy the low quality cattle.

Should 80% or even 50% of this movement be stopped, where is the part that is kept at home going to be marketed? Whose livestock will they compete with and remember these are the high quality animals. They will naturally move into local marketing channels. And besides placing a load on the Texas market, the quality animals in question will demand the better prices.

Some wheels have been turning, some action has been taken to change the situation. Many suggestions have been made, some have even been presented to the legislature. The Texas Animal Health Council, composed of representatives of 21 Texas organizations interested in the problem, has probably done more and is doing more to curtail the situation. This group has been in session many times to discuss Texas Animal health problems.

To start a program of improvement in the handling of livestock disease problems, they have proposed the following:

1. Secure legislation for con-

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trol of brucellosis including provisions for area control plans based on voluntary petitioning or vote of livestock owners, with the aim of modified certified accreditation for all of Texas without delay.

2. Revise present disease control laws pertaining to sheep and swine to allow laws to meet present day conditions.

3. Necessary legislation to prevent use of virulent hog cholera vaccines within Texas and make full use of modified hog cholera viruses.

4. Legislation to modify name of Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission to one more nearly reflecting the functions of the agency.

5. Revise present animal tubercular laws to allow discharge of obligations of LSC as concerns re-accreditation of counties for this disease.

6. Revision of laws, or enactment of legislation, to allow control of movement of livestock and poultry into and within Texas, including establishment of ports of entry, in order to protect any gains made under expanded animal health program.

7. Vigorous educational efforts aimed at acquainting Texas livestock and poultry producers with needs and problems of animal health.

8. Adequate financing of Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission by appropriations from general reve-

nue funds.

Since no action has been taken by the State we believe it is to our interest to inform ourselves on the situation, and if possible set up a local brucellosis control program. A meeting will be held in the County Court room on Thursday night, Dec. 4, to discuss the situation and make control plans.

Dr. Pearey R. Turner, D. V. M. from Water Valley will be present to assist with the program and the making of plans. We hope that you can attend the meeting, whether or not you are a cattle producer. As was mentioned earlier, if Texas takes no action and if local groups within the State take no action, then it will only be a matter of a few years until the State's economy will be jeopardized.
