



ARTIFICIAL KIDNEY — Elvon DeVaney arrived back in Dimmitt Friday from Parkland Hospital in Dallas, where he had both kidneys removed and underwent five weeks' training on the operation of this "artificial kidney," a blood-dialysis machine, which has been installed in a bedroom of his home. Assisted by his wife, Sue — who also has been trained in the machine's operation — DeVaney under-

goes nine-hour treatment sessions three nights a week on the intricate machine, which cleanses and purifies his blood as well as a pair of healthy kidneys. DeVaney said he will resume his full work schedule as Texas operations manager for Western Vegetables, Inc., and will continue as a justice of the peace here. He is still scheduled for a kidney transplant in six months.

20 girls competing for title

Twenty beautiful girls from Texas and Oklahoma will present a fast-moving variety show Friday night, then will grace the stage in swimsuits and formals Saturday night as they compete for the "Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation" title in Dimmitt High School auditorium.

IT'S A NEW kind of pageant this year, expanded to two nights to enable pageant-goers to see all the contestants' talent acts. Each \$3 adult ticket and \$1.50 student ticket is good for both night's performances.

Curtain time is 7:30 p.m. both nights.

With a \$1,000 college scholarship at stake for the winner, the 20 girls will compete for the right to succeed Karen Lafferty of Farmington, N.M., as the new Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation.

EVERY contestant in the pageant is a previous beauty-contest winner.

In addition to the new Miss Grain Sorghum, as many as four other girls will also be winners in the pageant, with a \$500 scholarship going to the first runner-up, a \$250 scholarship to the second runner-up, and a \$50 bond to the talent winner and to the girl elected "Miss Congeniality" by her fellow contestants.

The girls — 18 from North Texas and two from Oklahoma — will compete in personal interviews, talent, swimsuits and formal attire. They will be judged on beauty, personality, poise, figure and talent.

THE WINNER will represent the grain sorghum industry at conventions, field days and other activities to promote the use of grain sorghum. The red-grain industry, has tripled in production and exports in the last decade.

Master of ceremonies will be Millard Shivers of Dallas, agricultural representative for the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Insurance Companies, who has been associated many years with the Miss Texas pageant.

The workshop will be conducted by Dr. Wesley Becker and his staff from the University of Oregon. Sessions will start at 9 a.m. daily in the high school cafeteria.

Faculty meetings are scheduled Aug. 17, with the general faculty to convene from 9 to 10 a.m. The separate faculties of Dimmitt's four public schools will meet in their respective buildings from 10 to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Elementary students will register Aug. 18 from 8:30 to 12 noon. Students in Head Start, pre-first, first, second and third grades will register at South Elementary School; and students in the fourth through sixth grades will register at North Elementary School.

Plane crashes; pilot is unhurt

A local spray plane crashed Wednesday morning east of Surrency, but its pilot was not hurt.

A PIPER Pawnee plane owned by Hart Aerial Sprayers and piloted by Ronnie Elder reportedly hit a power line at the Roy Lilley farm at 8:45 a.m. and crashed in a nearby field. Elder was spraying Parathion insecticide.

A spokesman for the crop-dusting firm said Elder "got some chemical in his eye but washed it out right away" after walking away from the crash.

Extent of damage to the plane was not known at press time. IT WAS the second spray-plane crash in the Surrency area in recent weeks. A Plainview pilot, Bob Gaines, was fatally burned when his plane hit an irrigation standpipe and crashed July 7 on the Tom McGill farm three miles east of the community.

Burglar takes \$50 from Von's

A burglar took \$50 in bills Friday night from Von's Cafe on US 385 east.

CHARLES VAUGHAN, owner of the cafe, told police the burglary occurred sometime between 11 p.m. Friday and 4:30 a.m. Saturday.

Police Chief W. W. Jones said the burglar gained entry by breaking a window on the south side of the cafe, went directly to where the cash was hidden and took \$50 in bills while leaving a sack of change untouched, then left via the front door. The burglar didn't bother any of the cafe's coin-operated machines, Jones said.

Financially, it's touch-and-go for the Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation Pageant.

PAGEANT officials have always been able to depend on contributions from the grain sorghum industry — seed companies, cooperatives, associations and related firms — to underwrite much of the cost of choosing a queen for the red-grain industry.

But Mrs. Dorothy Magness, Chamber of Commerce secretary, reported this week that only \$350 has been contributed so far.

The saving grace of this year's pageant is likely to be a new 44-page program book, chock-full of goodwill advertisements by local business firms. The book, which contains pictures of all 20 contestants, will bring in more than \$1,000.

"ALTHOUGH contributions are running far behind last year, the addition of the program book this year has brought our pre-pageant income pretty close to what we had this time last year," said Bo Bryant, Chamber of Commerce president.

The third source of income, contestants' entry fees, totals \$500 this year.

Ticket sales for the two-night pageant are expected to bring in \$2,000 or more, which would make the event's total income to at least \$3,850.

Whether this will be enough to pay for the pageant's expenses remains to be seen.

The biggest single expense is the scholarships for the lucky winners — \$1,000 for the new Miss Grain Sorghum, \$500 for the first runner-up, \$250 for the second runner-up, and a \$50 bond each for "Miss Congeniality" and the talent winner, for a total of \$1,825.

Also, \$375 in scholarship money is still to be paid from last year's pageant, and the money must come from this year's income, since last year's event lost money.

OTHER expenses — publicity, printing, mailing, stage decorations, rooms and meals for the judges and emcee, stage lighting, will hike the pageant's total cost to almost \$4,000.

The key factor now, Bryant explained, is ticket sales. If the pageant is well attended, it will break even or make money.

"We just hope we can break even," he said. "If we can do that, then the pageant is well worth the effort to us."

Roundup Week will move to Dimmitt Tuesday with a public square dance at 9 p.m. on Jones Street, south side of the courthouse square.

THE PARADE will form up at 2 p.m. next Thursday near the

A city police car and the big red fire engine will head up the parade. Parade floats and entries will be judged between 2 and 3 p.m.

The three-night rodeo will include bareback, saddle bronc and bull riding, calf and team roping, barrel races, pony express races, and a "rescue race" between the Jaycees and Young Farmers. Entry books for the rodeo will open at 8 a.m. Wednesday at Dimmitt Gin and will close at noon next Thursday.

A western dance will be held at the Panhandle Compress on East Halsell Street after each performance of the rodeo. Music will be provided by Charlie Phillips and the Sugar Timers.

THE SECOND performance of the rodeo is the only event on tap Friday, Aug. 14, but on the following day, children's games and races and a pet show will be held on the courthouse lawn, to be followed that night by the final rodeo performance and dance.

The annual Roundup will have a big finish Sunday, Aug. 16, with the annual Dimmitt Jaycee Air Show at the municipal airport, featuring stunt flying, sky-diving, flour bombing and spot landing contests, plane rides and a glider demonstration.



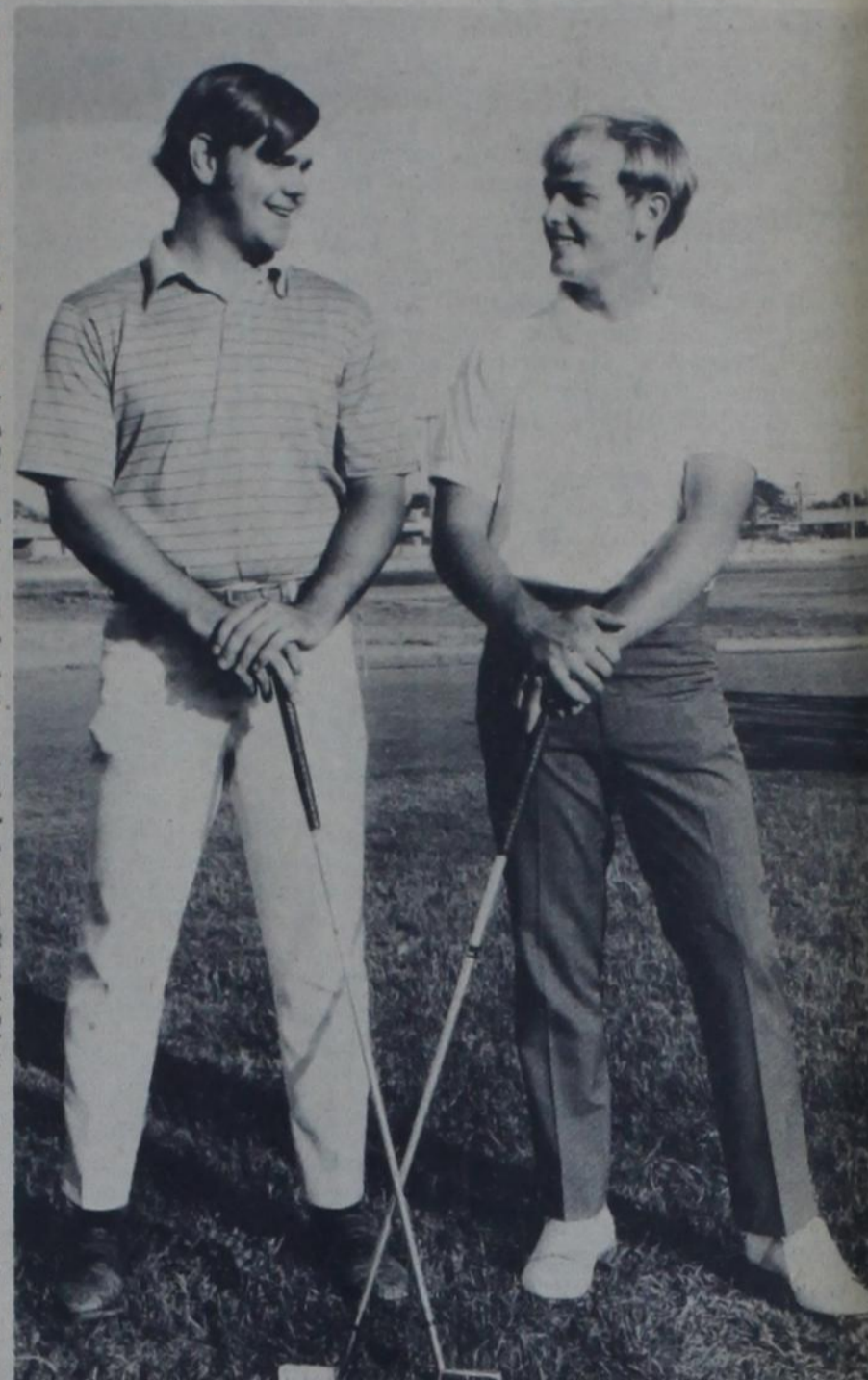

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HD notes

Here's August's garden calendar

By IRENE KEATING

It is again time to share the monthly garden calendar.

1. AUGUST is frequently hot and dry so be prepared to irrigate flower beds, lawns, and especially spring-planted trees and shrubs when needed. Use a mulch or shallow cultivation to conserve moisture. Azaleas, camellias, and flowering dogwoods are extremely susceptible to drought injury at this time, due to their shallow roots.

2. Plant iris rhizomes this month. Prepare beds at least two weeks before setting out rhizomes.

3. Prepare beds for September plantings of Shasta Daisies and Day Lilies.

4. Start planting Peonies.

5. Plant the following vegetables for fall crops: snap beans, butter beans, beets, carrots, cucumbers, cabbage, collards, rad-

ishes, turnips, spinach, and lettuce.

6. Start a new compost pile and turn the material in the old pile. Be sure to keep decomposing materials moist.

7. PLAN NOW for those major landscape changes you may need.

8. Collect materials for interesting fall and winter dried bouquets.

9. Check plants (especially narrowleaf evergreens) for spider mite damage. Use controls listed in L-199.

10. Inspect lawns for late summer insects as chinch bug, sod webworms, and army worms. Apply necessary controls if needed.

11. Control leaf spot on mums. Use materials listed in MP-574.

12. If Camellia flower buds are sufficiently enlarged, thin to one flower per shoot for quality blooms.

13. Prune hydrangeas after they have completed blooming. Do not cut back unflowered shoots. Next seasons flowers will be formed in late summer and early fall.

14. Do not forget to arrange for lawn and garden care before leaving on vacation.

15. Select and order spring flowering bulbs for planting next month. Tulips should be placed in the refrigerator as soon as received and held for December planting.

16. Bulbs to plant now include Madonna Lilies, Sterbergias, Lycoris, Zephyranthes, Freesias, and Oxylis.

MARILYN SMITH has some favorite recipes she'd like to share with you. Those of you who like rhubarb may enjoy this jam. The Cole Slaw recipe is one that freezes well, therefore it gets its name "Frozen Cole Slaw." Marilyn says it is very good fresh or frozen.

RHUBARB JAM

5 cups rhubarb
4 cups sugar
1 family size Jello (raspberry)
2 1/2 cups rhubarb and sugar. Let stand overnight. Cook 10 minutes. Take off fire and add Jello. Pour in jars or glasses.

FROZEN COLE SLAW

1 medium cabbage, shredded
1 carrot, grated
1 green pepper, chopped
1 teaspoon salt
Mix salt with cabbage and let stand one hour and squeeze out extra moisture. Add carrot and pepper.
1 cup vinegar

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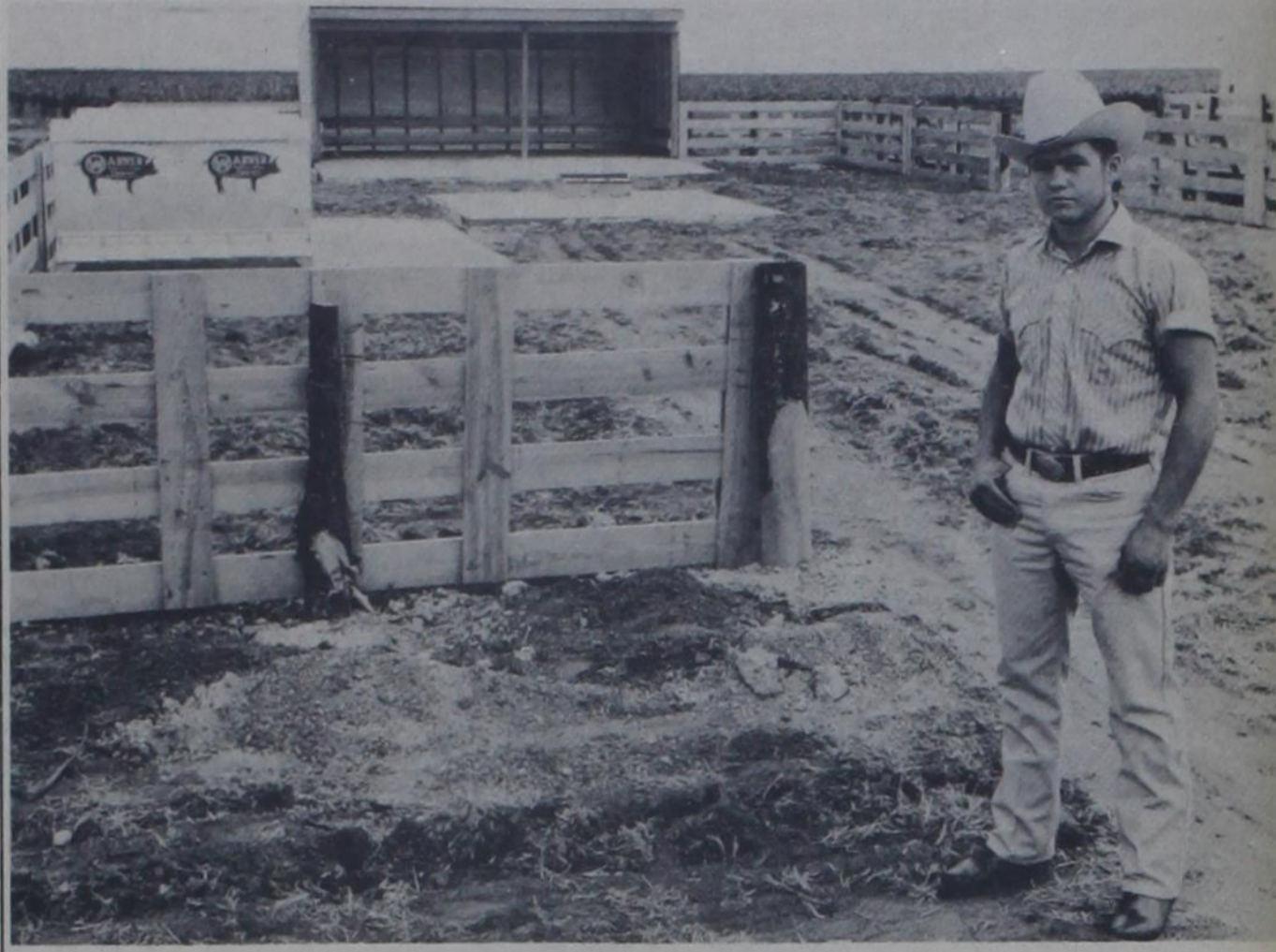

Hart boy, 16, launches hog feedlot operation

If cattle can be fed here in large numbers for maximum efficiency, why not hogs, too? RICKY FARRIS, 16-year-old Hart lad, intends to prove it can be done profitably.

His hog feedlot, he said, will be as different from the traditional sow-pig operation as our giant feedlots here are from cow-calf ranches.

Ricky, who will be a senior in Hart High School this year, will buy 40-pound shoats and feed them up to market size of 190 to 240 pounds.

Each pen will hold 125 head. Each is equipped with three four-unit self feeders, a self waterer with an automatic de-freezing device for winter, a large open-front metal barn and an automatic 'fogger' which sprays a continuous mist to keep the hogs cool in the summer.

When he buys new shoats, Ricky will isolate them on the Farris home place for 21 days before putting them into the feedlots, a pen at a time.

partners in livestock feeding for many years. Ricky has 103 cattle of his own in the family feedlots, where he and his older brother, Renrie, help his father feed out 1,200 head.

THE NEW hog feedlot is Ricky's own, independent gamble. However, he will have the use of the feed blender on the home place, where he will mix the ration for his hogs, and also the trucks to deliver the feed.

Ricky will feed his hogs a 16 percent protein ration of milo, corn, bone meal and soybean meal. He is growing much of his own feed grain on the half section where the feedlot is located, and on a section of irrigated farmland near Dalhart, in which he shares a one-fourth interest.

When he buys new shoats, Ricky will isolate them on the Farris home place for 21 days before putting them into the feedlots, a pen at a time.

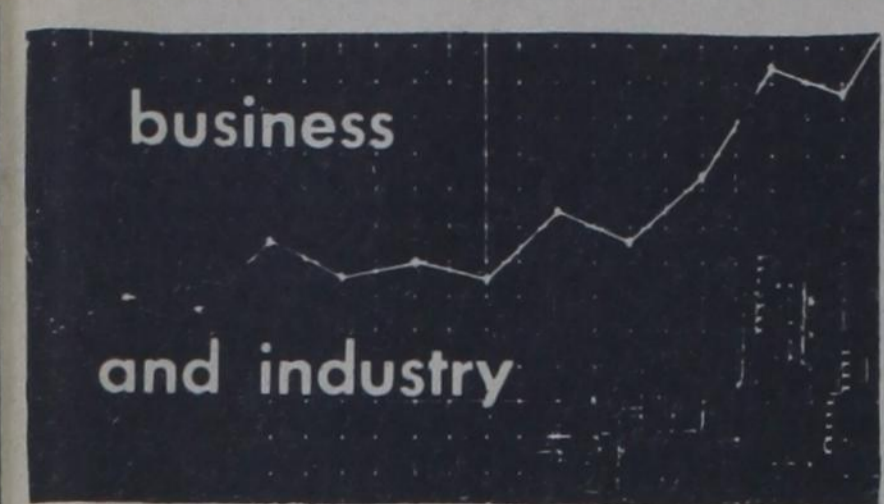

But between now and then, he's likely to get a pretty good practical course in business and finance through his ambitious hog-feeding operation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: (a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under

(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal. (13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."
