## Murder Trial Moved to Lubbock

The murder trial of Roosevelt Wiley, 26, has been transferred to Lubbock. The case was called for trial in 51st district court in Robert Lee Monday at 10 a.m.

Immediately after court was convened by Judge Joe L. Mays, defense attorneys filed a motion for a change of venue on grounds that the case had been discussed too much here and that a fair and impartial jury could not be selected.

Judge Mays ruled that the motion was valid and shifted the case to 72nd district court in Lubbock which is presided over by Judge Victor H. Lindsey.

Aubrey Stokes and Royal Hart, court appointed lawyers for Wiley, filed the motion. District at-

torney Justin Kever had not known in advance of this move, he said.

Colorado City and El Paso were suggested as possible places where the murder trial might be taken, but both were ruled out. Colorado City because of its nearness and El Paso on account of the expense of sending witnesses a distance of 400 miles.

The case of Willie McDade, 17, also indicted for the stabbing death Oct. 24, 1958, of L. H. (Shorty) Canada, 58, San Angelo creamery truck driver, was not called up and the special venire of 72 jurymen was dismissed.

Judge Mays was due back in Robert Lee Wednesday to oversee the selection of a jury panel for the new court term which begins in February.

Orders will also be taken ahead of time for tamales, Mrs. Fuentez said. She said persons may call her at GR 3-3192 to reserve the food ahead of time.

The tamale sale is an annual event to raise money for the March of Dimes and a good sized amount is raised each year by the Bronte.

Latin-American residents of Matthew Caperton, drive chairman for Coke County, said a road block will be set up Saturday to raise money. This event was very successful last year. All motorists are stopped and asked to contribute before they are allowed to pass through the blockade.

Bronte preachers will be in charge of this money raising project. Young people from their churches will assist.

The annual Tad Richards March of Dimes Dance is set for Saturday night, Jan. 31. A San Angelo band has been engaged to play for the affair. An advance ticket sale for

the dance is now underway.

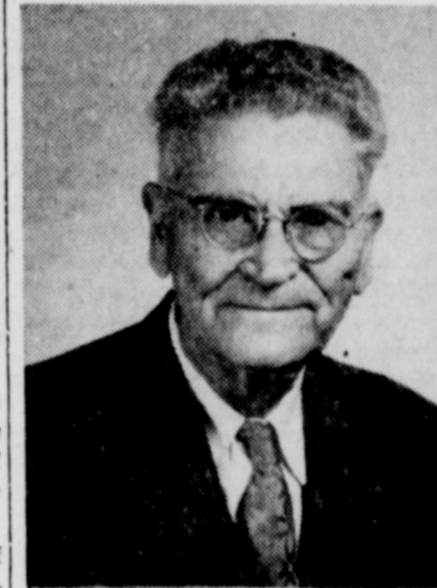

Caperton and other workers for the Dimes drive urged Bronte area residents to contribute generously to the campaign. They pointed out that much money is still needed to care for patients who have had polio, and that the National Foundation is undertaking research on other diseases this year, for which money is badly needed. Included in this new research are birth defects, arthritis and rheumatism and other diseases which affect the nervous system. Money is also needed to carry on an educational program to encourage people of this country to take Salk vaccine shots.

## Commissioners Plan To Raise Salaries

In a legal notice in this issue of The Enterprise announcement is made of the intention of the Coke County Commissioners to raise salaries of the members of

the court, the county treasurer and the county clerk.

The proposed raises, which would be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1959 would raise the four precinct commissioners and the county treasurer \$1,500.00 per year, while the county clerk would have his salary raised \$200.00 a year.

The new salary scale would raise the commissioners and the treasurer from their present pay of \$4,000.00 to \$5,500.00 per year, and would increase the clerk's salary from \$5,800.00 to \$6,000.00 per year.

No date for a hearing on the matter is mentioned in the legal notice; however, it is generally understood that it will come up at the court's meeting in February.

Meetings of the various press associations always do us good. We meet some old friends, get some new ideas and find other people with the same problems that we have.

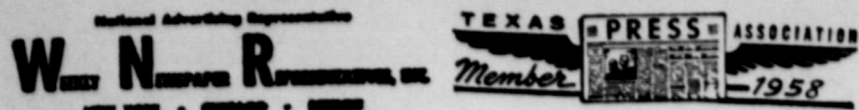

I didn't know it till I read this piece in the paper last night that the Government ever month stores away millions of dollars worth of stuff that would be essential in case of war.

I'm in favor of this system of stockpiling a little all along instead of the way it did during the last war. We got caught with our

stockpiles down in that one and it was somepun to see them Congressmen flopping around like a chicken with his head cut off trying to git things fer the war.

I recollect they come up with a War Production Board and some of the things they done was out of this world. Fer instant, they put tombstones on the non-essential list. That didn't upset the home front too much on account of most folks lives with their nose on the grindstone and they ain't got much objection to using it fer a tombstone when they passes on.

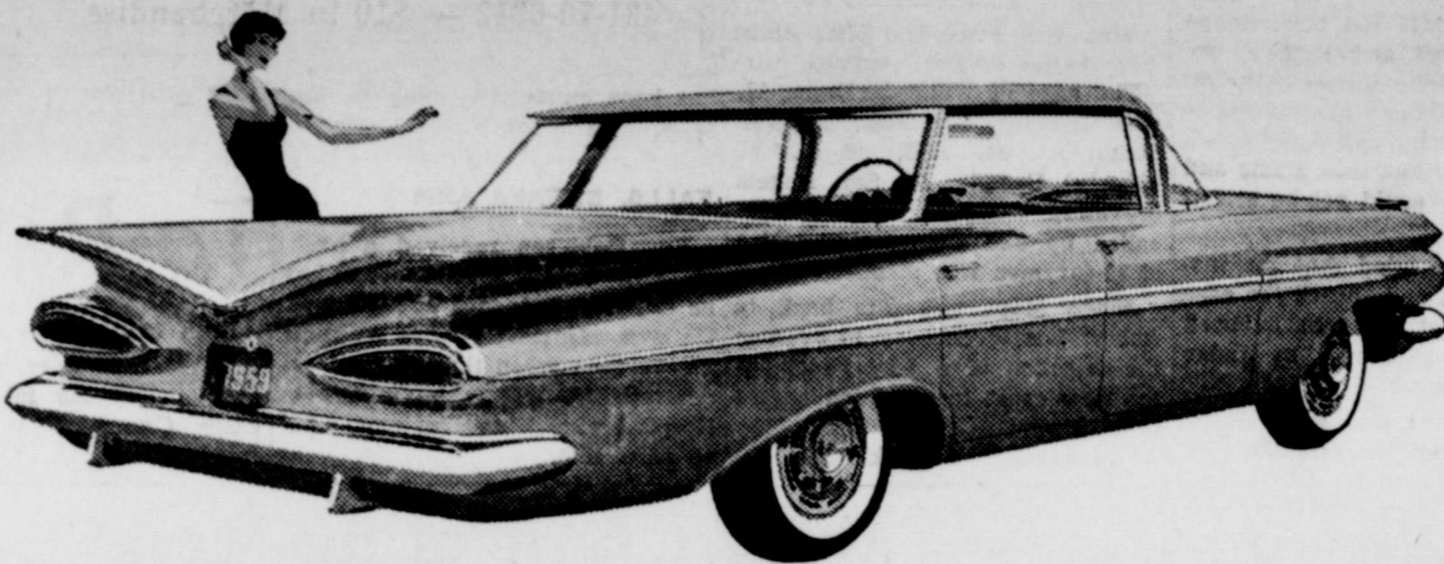

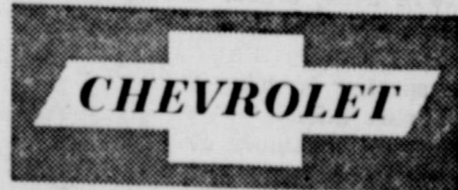

## Farmers Must File Social Security Reports by Jan. 31

Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, reminds farm operators that the report of wages paid to employees in 1958 must be filed with the Director of Internal Revenue no later than January 31, 1959. If, in 1958, a farm worker was paid \$150 cash wages, the employer must send in a report of the wages paid, along with 4½% social security tax (2¼% deducted from the worker and 2¼% paid by the employer).

The same report (and tax) is due regardless of the amount paid to the farm worker if he worked for at least 20 days for cash wages computed on a time basis—that is, so much an hour or so much per day.

Anyone wishing further information concerning old-age, survivors, or disability benefits may see the Social Security Representative when he makes his regular trips to Bronte, Jan. 22, Feb. 19 and March 19. He will be in the City Hall at 9:30 a.m.

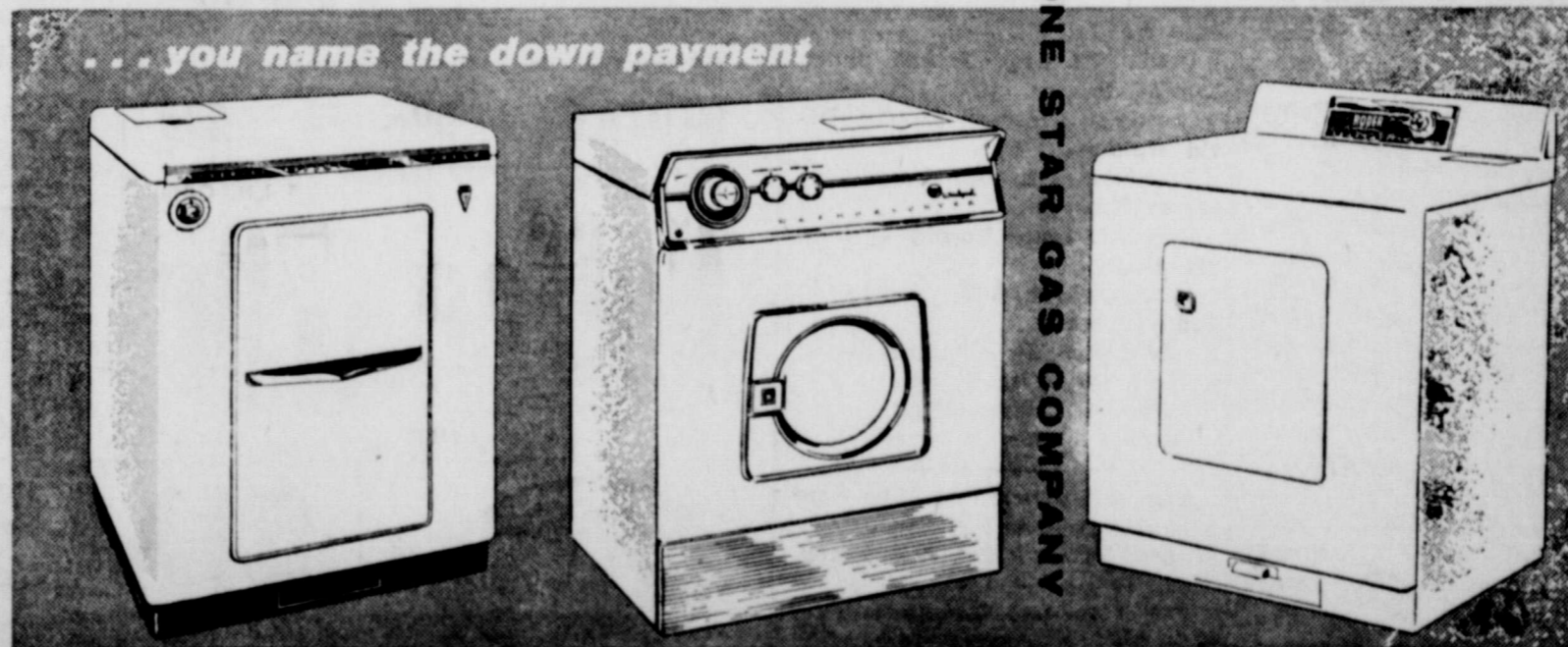

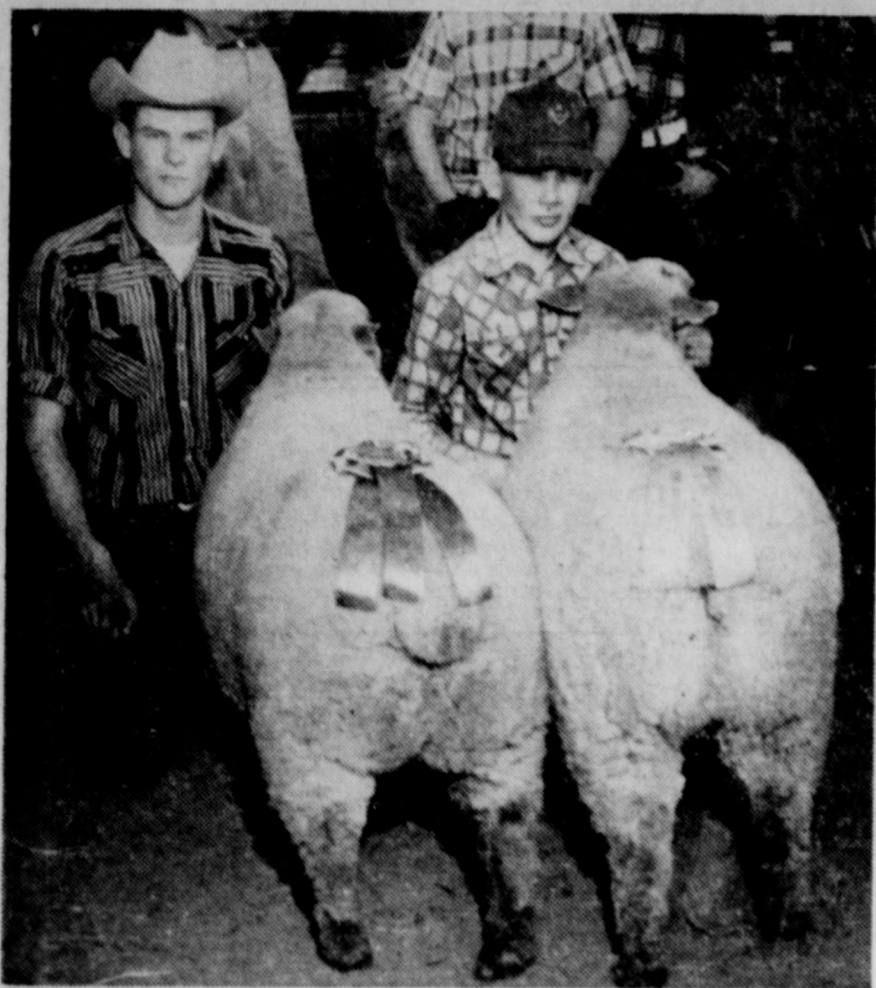

## Hunting Season Ended Jan. 16th

AUSTIN, January 21. It's completely over. The 1958-59 hunting season except for rabbits and squirrels in some counties, ended with the close of the quail season January 16. Duck and goose season ended January 14.

It was the heaviest season since controlled hunting, according to the Director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

"More people killed more quail and deer than in years," the Director said. "Despite this heavy kill our wardens also report an abundance of game still in the field. Our concern now is for the carry-over. Rats are responsible in many areas for a tremendously

heavy loss of quail. In some areas they have destroyed the food and the quail are literally starving to death."

A heavy freeze or prolonged bad weather might also be damaging to the deer population, where there is a surplus, or where the feed crop is insufficient, the Director warned.

He also reminded hunters that wardens still will be busy in the field and that arrests will be made for out-of-season hunting.

Glen Crooks of Robert Lee, game warden for Coke, Sterling and Runnels counties, says deer, turkey and quail hunting in this area was very food the past season.

This was the second straight year Coke County had been open

for hunting, and game seemed more plentiful than last season.

The game warden reports a number of hunting violations, but none were of a serious nature.

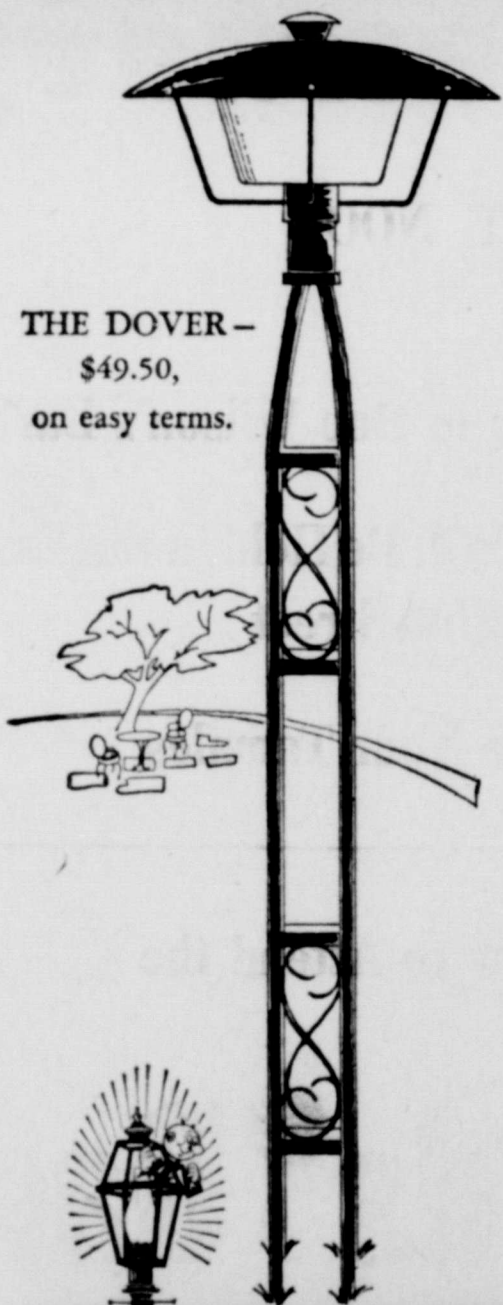

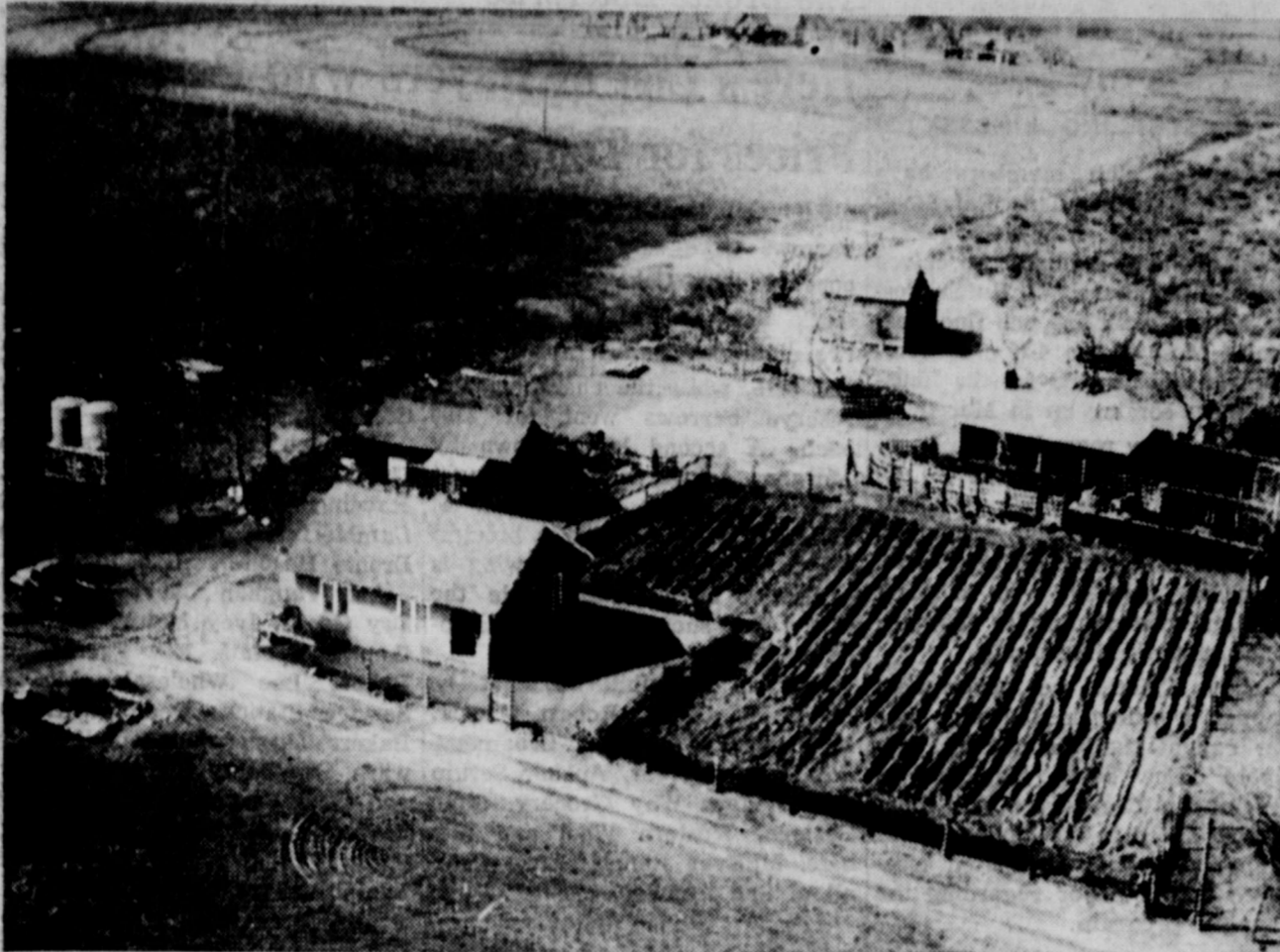
