The March of Dimes annual drive for funds will reach its climax in this area Saturday when the annual Tad Richards dance is held at the Richards barn eight miles northeast of Bronte.

Matthew Caperton, fund chairman for Coke County, said Johnny Dutton's well known western band will furnish music for the occasion. Dancing will be from 8:

Golden Age Home Has \$61,588 on Goal of \$87,000

At a meeting Tuesday of the committee working toward raising money for the proposed Golden Age Home here, the chairman, the Rev. Jimmy Campbell, said a total of \$61,588 has been pledged. This leaves a little more than \$25,000 to go to reach the \$87,000 required to build the home in Bronte.

A deadline of March 15 was set for completing the drive to raise the funds. Several plans were discussed for contacting local persons to ask them for contributions. Members of the committee brought out that pledges of any size will be welcome. They also pointed out that contributors may spread their payments out over a period of a year if they wish.

In order to build the home at Bronte, local residents must furnish one-fourth of the estimated cost of the project. The \$347,000 project would provide a home for 68 elderly persons. It will be operated by the Methodist Church but admission to the home will be open to persons of all faiths.

Anyone who wishes to contribute to the home may see any of the committee members. They are D. K. Glenn, L. T. Youngblood, Joe Carter, Barney Modgling, C. E. Bruton, Noah Pruitt, Sr. and Campbell.

First Baptist Parsonage Is Being Remodeled

Extensive remodeling is underway on the parsonage of the First Baptist Church. Work was begun last week on the job that will cost approximately \$3,000. Otis Smith has the contract to do the work.

Included in the face lifting of the parsonage will be new windows, and siding on the outside. A carport will be built and new bathroom fixtures installed. The front porch will be reconditioned and the walls inside will be sheet-rocked and textured.

TAX DEADLINE NEARS

Jan. 31 is the deadline for paying 1958 property taxes. Taxes are delinquent after that date and a penalty assessed.

Coke Countians are also reminded that January 31 is the deadline for paying poll taxes. The middle of the week only a few more than 500 poll tax receipts had been issued in the county. This is an off election year and less than 700 poll taxes are expected to be paid before the deadline.

Objections Heard to County Salary Raises

Members of Coke County's Commissioners Court apparently stirred up a hornet's nest when they published a notice in last week's Enterprise and Robert Lee Observer that they intend to raise their own and the county treasurer's salary \$1,500 a year, and the county clerk's salary \$200 a year.

Petitions requesting the court not to raise salaries were circulating in Bronte this week and opponents of the pay increase say they will have petitions in Robert Lee and the west side of the county in the next few days.

The notice published in Coke County's two newspapers last week stated that the commissioners intended to raise the salaries the amounts listed above, and that the raises would be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1959. No date was given as to when the raises would go into effect.

However, another notice of the intention to raise salaries was turned in to be published this week.

It is being printed on the back page of this paper and states that the raises will go into effect on Feb. 9, 1959, the regular meeting day for the commissioners. No mention is made in this second notice about the raises being retroactive to Jan. 1.

The Enterprise was able to contact Judge W. W. Thetford and Commissioner Claude Ditmore to discuss the salary raises. They both said that no hearing is required on the matter. Reason for this, they said, was that the salary increases were included in the 1959 budget and that a public hearing was held on it. Consequently no hearing on this matter is necessary according to the law.

However, Judge Thetford said that a meeting of the Commissioner's Court constitutes a court of records and as such is open to the public. He said that any time a citizen of Coke County has something to present to the Court, the doors are open.
