## Eden Given First Choice as Location For Church Home

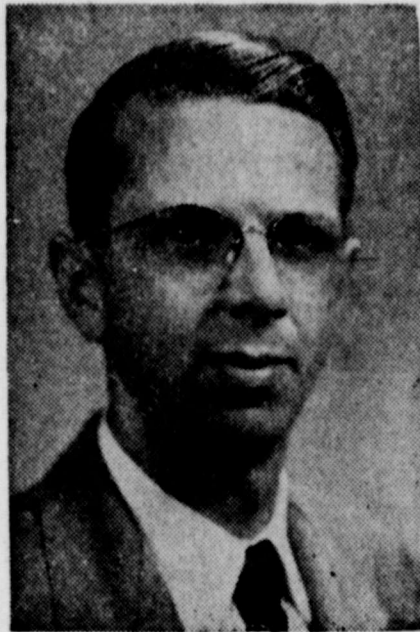
In a meeting last week of the Methodist district board of hospitals and homes in San Angelo, it was decided to give Eden first opportunity to qualify as the site for the Golden Age Home which is being sponsored by the San Angelo District of the Methodist Church. Eden was given four months to meet requirements set up by the committee.

Bronte's committee to make a bid for the home expressed disappointment at the change in policy shown last week by the Methodist board. For, at a similar meeting several months ago, the group voted to build homes in Eden, Bronte and Sonora, if and when any or all of the towns could meet requirements. After this commitment from the district board, a committee was formed by the local Lions club to push the project. The committee, headed by Rev. Jimmy Campbell, local Methodist pastor, went to work and raised approximately \$63,000 in pledges toward the required goal. The Bronte committee went into the meeting last week feeling that they had met all the requirements, lacking only a few thousand dollars.

The district board announced at the meeting last week that Bronte will be next in line for the home if Eden does not come up with requirements within the four months allowed. It is understood that Eden will try to carry a county bond issue to raise money for its one-fourth of the cost and also for building a hospital. Having an approved hospital is one of the requirements for locating one of the Golden Age Homes in any town.

The committee in Bronte had been very optimistic about raising money for the home.

## Revival Meeting Starts Sunday at Kickapoo Church

During the revival, services will be held twice daily. Morning services will be at 10 a. m., evening services at 7:30 p. m., preceded by a pray service at 7:00 p. m.

Noah Pruitt, Jr. will lead the song service during the meeting.

## School Tax Election To Be Held Saturday

Taxpayers of the Bronte Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday to vote on the proposition of raising the maintenance tax of the school from 75 cents per \$100 valuation to \$1.50 per \$100. Voting will be held in the City Hall at Bronte with D. K. Glenn acting as election judge.

Ballots will be printed with the following wording on them:

"For Maintenance Tax."

"Against Maintenance Tax."

Voters will scratch out the portion which shows how they do not want to vote, leaving their choice unmarked.

The Board of trustees of Bronte

School called the election after being petitioned by 45 taxpayers in the district. Need for additional funds on which to operate the school has been apparent for some time and patrons and board members have held several meetings to discuss the matter. The conclusion seemed to be that the only answer to the problem was to vote more tax money.

School board members say they anticipate that the deficit of the school will reach about \$40,000 by the end of this fiscal year, Aug. 31, 1959.

Board members and school administrative officials have listed the following reasons for the deficit:

1. A decrease in tax valuations in the district.
2. A decrease in money appropriated by the state for the local school.
3. A teacher pay raise voted by the last session of the legislature, cost of which had to be borne by the local school district.
4. A general increase in cost of commodities and services which are used to operate the school.

All of these factors combined have led up to the alarming deficit which has been building up the past two years, school men say.

Board members, in consultations with local patrons and oil company tax experts, decided that the proposed increase would not only take care of rising property costs and decreasing property valuations, but would provide enough money to retire the debt which is being accumulated. They feel that the increase will allow it to be retired in a reasonable length of time and thereby keep interest costs on the money to a minimum.

The election Saturday does not change the bond retirement tax on property in the district. This tax rate has been 50c per \$100 for some time and will remain at that figure.

Hurlin Lee, school board president, said the tax increase, if approved by voters, would not necessarily set the maintenance tax rate at \$1.50 for all time to come. It simply allows the school board the power to set the rate at any figure deemed necessary, up to but not above that amount. Lee said that at any time the board felt the school could be operated on less money, the rate could be lowered.

Members of the board were unanimous in urging that everyone in the district vote in the Saturday election. "We feel that carrying this election is of great importance to the Bronte School, and we would like to have a large turnout," Lee said.

A rabbit drive is being planned to take place at Maverick on Tuesday, March 10. More details will be given in next week's paper.

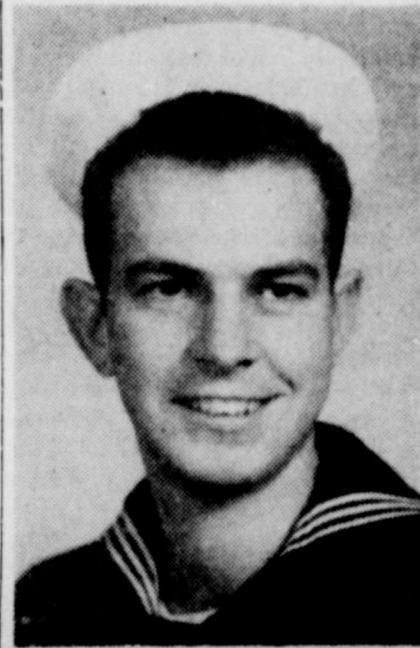

This farm was originally bought from the state of Texas about 1890 by the grandfather of Mr. Say-

ner, the late Sam Sayner. He and his family settled in the Tennyson community in 1882.

After his death, the place belonged to the late D. E. Sayner, who built the house pictured above in 1929. He operated the farm until his death. In 1951 Collins Sayner bought the place from his father's estate and has owned it since that time.

Mrs. Sayner is the former Maggie Hearrell. She is active in club work and is particularly well known for her ability to raise flowers.

## Commissioners Set Salaries

(Editor's Note: The following story concerning salary raises for Coke County officials and employees was run a couple of weeks ago in the Robert Lee Observer. We thought our readers would be interested in this information, which vitally concerns every taxpayer and citizen of the county.)

Coke County Commissioners in regular session Monday passed a final order increasing the annual salary of each of the four commissioners by the sum of \$1,500 annually. It raises their pay from \$4,000 to \$5,500.

Also given a similar salary increase was Mrs. Gertrude Gray, county treasurer, who had been drawing \$4,000 per year. The pay of J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler, county and district clerk, was raised from \$5,800 to \$6,000 annually. Salaries of no other elective officials were raised.

Notice of the proposed salary boost had been advertised three weeks in the county newspapers. A petition protesting the action was filed which carried the names of 35 Bronte people, but no objectors appeared in person at the Monday session.

Other salaries raised included: Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, chief deputy clerk, raised \$300 to \$3,000 per year; Mrs. Joyce King, county agent's secretary, raised \$300 to \$2,700 a year; Arthur Sitas, part time veterans service officer, raised \$10 a month to \$600 annually; county agent and home demonstration agent given \$200 more per year in travel expenses.

Salaries of other elective principal officers remain at the following amounts: Paul Good, sheriff and tax assessor-collector, \$6,040 per year; W. W. Thetford, county judge, \$5,000; Frank C. Dickey Sr., county attorney, \$3,400.

Wages paid other employees: O. B. Jacobs, deputy sheriff, \$3,600 and \$35 per month travel expense; Frank Keese, deputy sheriff, \$2,400 and \$35; Fagan Parker, court house custodian, \$3,300 per year, and Mrs. Parker, assistant, \$2,100.

Road hands will continue to be paid \$1.50 per hour with each precinct having a foreman who draws \$1.75. Road hands are allowed one week of paid vacation per year.

Jean Mathis and Garland Good, deputies in the sheriff-tax office, draw \$2,400 per year. Commissioners voted to pay 75% of their salaries out of the road and bridge funds, and the remaining 25% from the general fund.

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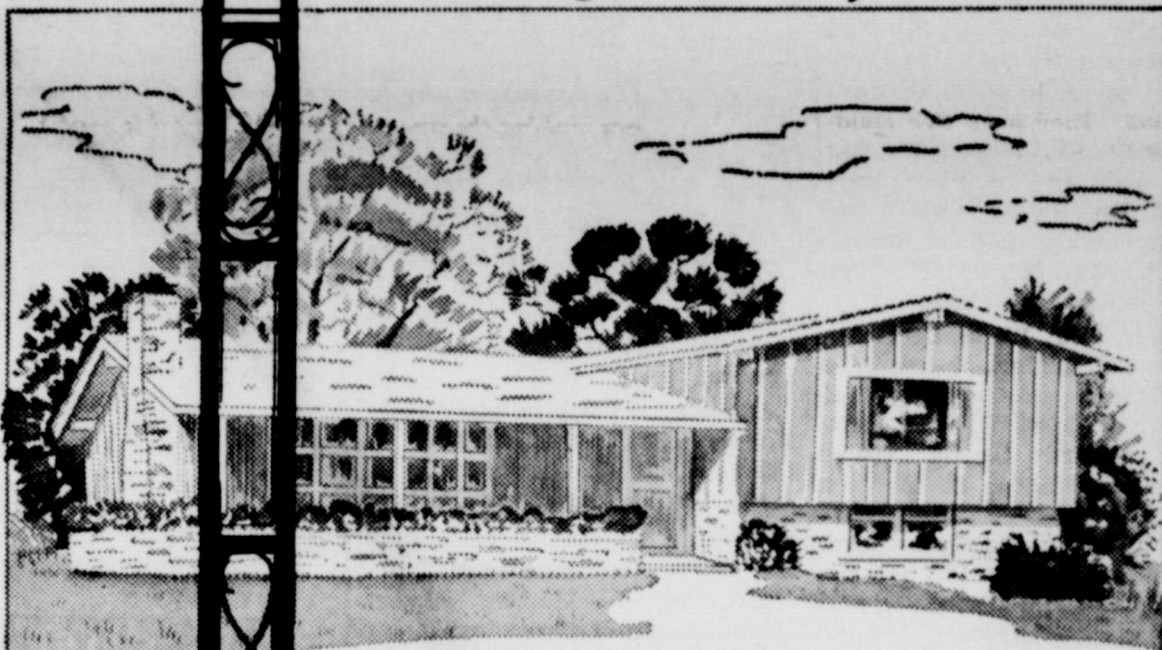


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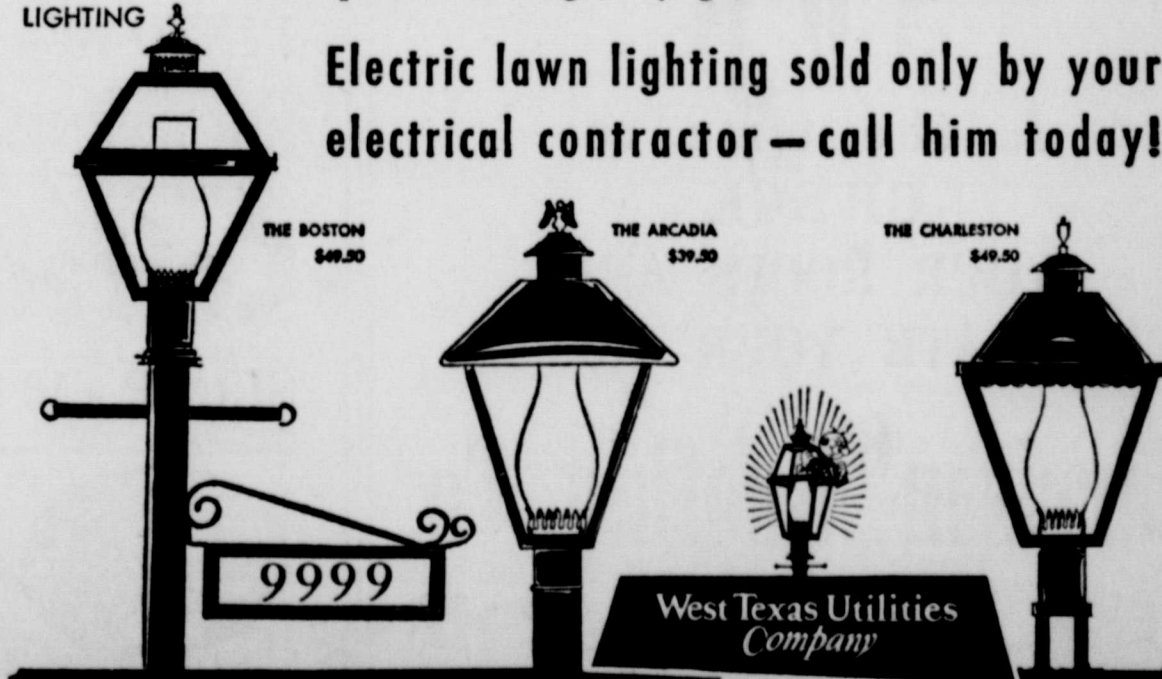

**Two Councilmen To Be Elected In City Balloting**

An election will be held some time in the first week in April for naming two members to the Bronte city council. Exact date has not been set because city officials are waiting for a legal opinion on whether or not they can hold the city election in conjunction with the school trustee election.

The council recently voted to have the election on the first Saturday in April, the date for the trustee election. However, the legality of such a move was brought up, since the time for city elections is set by state statutes as the first Tuesday in April.
