## Little League Practice Begins Here; 30 Boys on Two Teams

Little League baseball play will get started in the near future with Bronte having two teams in the Colorado River League. Practice has already begun and league play will find Bronte playing against two teams from Robert Lee and one from Norton.

Jack Bailey of Bronte, president of the league, said this week that a franchise has been received which will enable local teams to advance as high as national competition if they are good enough to go that far. The local teams will take place in several area tournaments and winners will advance up toward state and national competition.

At the present time Bronte's Yankees, under managers Clyde Lee and J. W. Jones, are working out on Tuesdays and Fridays. The Giants, under Bailey and Sid Eubanks, practice on Monday and Thursdays. Kenneth McCutchen is also helping the Little Leaguers

with their practice sessions.

Bailey pointed out the fine work done by the Little League in providing recreation for boys four nights a week. "The character building aspects are important, as well as the fact that boys are kept off the streets and other places while they are playing ball," Bailey noted.

Douglas Snead and Vernon Glenn will manage a minor league club during the season for boys who do not make the regular teams.

Bronte boys are indebted to lots of people for providing them with the necessary equipment, Bailey said, "and we especially want to thank the First National Bank for permitting us to use their photo-stat machine in making copies of the boys' birth certificates." He also expressed appreciation to parents of the boys for bringing them in to play ball.

Bailey said a great deal of work and equipment are still needed to provide the local Little Leaguers with the facilities needed, and a drive for funds will be made in the near future. Any person who wishes to contribute may mail his check to Box 29 at Bronte, or hand it to Royce Lee, secretary-treasurer of the League.

A Saturday working party will be planned in the near future, according to Bailey. "We need to get our field leveled off and we already have a volunteer to do the welding on building a new backstop," he said. Post-hole digging equipment will be needed more than any one thing.

Little League mothers are planning to open a concession stand during season play this year. Proceeds will be used to aid the Little League program. Parents of the boys playing will also be asked to buy a new suit for their player, and it will be understood when the suit is purchased that it will go to the League after the boy is through using it.

Bailey said a schedule of games will be announced in the near future.

## Clean-Up Week Set for May 11-16

Next week, May 11-16 has been designated as "clean-up" week by Mayor J. A. Stephenson and the Bronte City Council. Trash will be picked up and hauled off for persons who do not have any means for disposing of it.

Everyone is asked to cooperate in the effort to get the town cleaned up, fire hazards removed, and weeds and trash disposed of. Trash will be picked up from the alleys on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week.

## Commissioners Defer Action on Water District

County Commissioners deferred action last Saturday on the formation of a Water Control and Improvement District in the watershed of the Kickapoo Creeks in the Bronte vicinity.

A hearing on the matter was held and no objections were brought before the commissioners. County Attorney Frank C. Dickey objected to the legal procedure being used to form the district. He stated that he would advise the Commissioners Court not to form the district as it was set forth.

Attorney Carl Runge of San Angelo represented the committee which is working to get the district formed. Main purpose for formation of the district is to build dams to prevent flooding in the watershed, including the City of Bronte.

## Fire Destroys Two Blackwell Businesses

A fire, fanned by 15 to 20 mile winds, destroyed Tucker's Welding Shop and Roy Sanderson's Service Station in Blackwell Monday afternoon. The blaze started shortly after 1 p. m.

Tucker and Sanderson estimated the loss at better than \$10,000, not including the building. R. H. Jordan owned the building and had some insurance on it. Neither Tucker nor Sanderson carried insurance.

The fire started when a spark from a welding job being done by Louis Conradt caught a gasoline tank afire. An explosion followed, but Conradt was not hurt. Persons at the scene of the fire almost had it put out with an extin-

guisher, but the extinguisher was emptied before the flames could be completely brought under control. Bronte's volunteer fire department was the first to arrive and trucks from Winters and Sweetwater also answered the call for help. Mrs. Charles Ragsdale, correspondent for The Enterprise at Blackwell, said residents there gave Bronte's firemen much credit for the fire not spreading to other buildings in town. She said a number of Blackwell residents asked her to convey their thanks to the Bronte firemen.

Some smoke and water damage occurred to the post office, but it was not serious. Volunteers removed mail and fixtures of the post office into the street during the fire. The southerly winds tended to blow the flames away from the post office. Another service station to the north probably would have burned, had it not been of sheet iron construction, observers said.

Tucker lost all of his welding equipment. Also lost in the building were his welding truck, a tractor belonging to Jordan and a jeep owned by Alvin Estes.

## Good Rain This Week

More than two inches of rain have fallen in this area during the past week. The spring rains started last Thursday when about a half inch of moisture, accompanied by small hail, fell in a very short time. Another half inch was gauged on Friday night.

From 1½ to 2 inches fell in this area Monday night. About 1½ inches was gauged here in Bronte, and other sections got 1¼ to 2 inches.

Farmers are getting everything ready for row crop planting. They believe the season now in the ground will bring up their crops and get them off to a good start.

The rains the last week are the best that have fallen here in many months.

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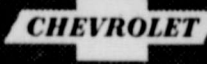
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## Bronte Team Beats Miles

**Notary Public Commissions To Expire Soon**

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reappoint persons now holding notary public commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1959 and June 10, 1959.

Steakley emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the County Clerks to approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1959. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.
