Cases on the docket for trial include a divorce suit of Robert Hickman vs. Patricia Hickman and a lawsuit of Garlan H. Green for title and ownership of 160 acres of land, 10 miles southwest of Silver.

Samples were taken at the Humble Camp, west of town, at the Gulf Service Station, the City Cafe, and the Coffee Shop Cafe.

Bronte's water supply which comes from Oak Creek Lake, has been of good quality for the past several years.

City Council Names Board Of Equalization

In its regular monthly meeting last Friday night the Bronte city council named a board of equalization to work out tax valuations on city property for this year. Members of the board are Bob Cavin, Noah Pruitt, Sr. and Bill Clark.

The council also decided that the city would build its own drainage structures from U. S. Highway 277 to the East Kickapoo Creek. The Texas Highway Department had told council members that they would build the structures as part of their highway reconstruction job coming up soon. However, the council felt they could get the work done cheaper than it could be done through the Highway Department's contractor.

It is understood that the structures will be storm sewers to carry water which accumulates on Main street. Need for such structures has been evident for some time, since the drainage culvert across the highway from the bank corner is not adequate to carry the water which accumulates on Main Street.

Denman also said that plans are being made to offer intermediate lessons later in the summer but that the dates haven't been set.

Wilkins, a qualified Red-Cross swimming instructor, has taught the classes at the pool the past two summers. He will be a junior student at Texas Tech in Lubbock next September.

He will be assisted by a staff of 16 instructors, plus additional help from the "McMurry Maidettes," petite twirling artists of the college band.

In addition to concerts and other scheduled performances of the school, one other feature will be McMurry's new Band Hall. It will be used for the first time during the two-week school.

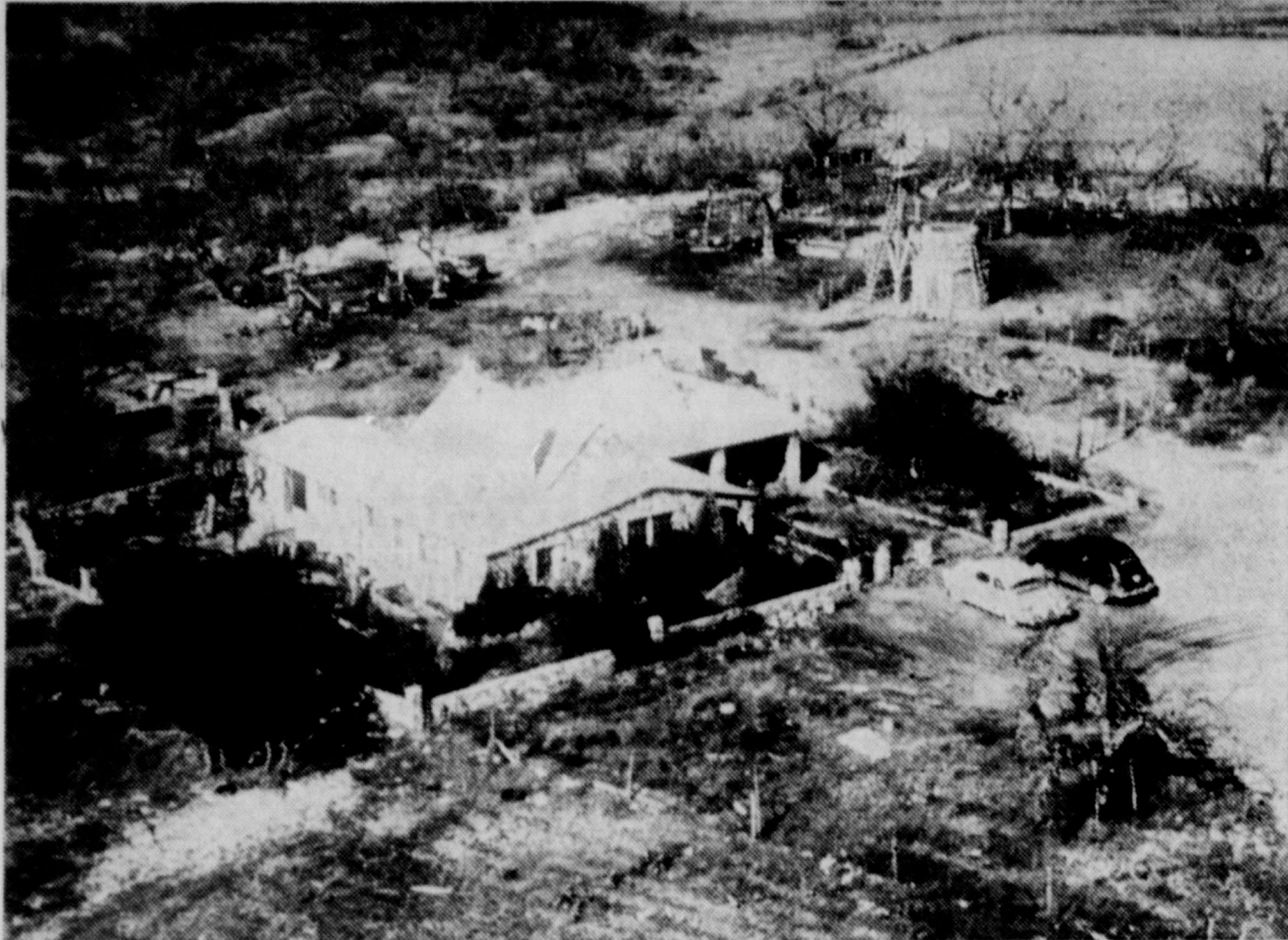

The Mystery Farm home pictured here is the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Saunders of Blackwell and located 1½ miles north of the Fort Chadbourne depot. There are 120 acres in the farm, known as the George Allen place. Mr. and Mrs. Saunders bought the farm in 1926 from Wes Carlisle.

The house pictured was built in 1948-49. The Saunders hauled native rock with their trailer and tractor and their oldest and youngest sons, Pete and Rex, built the house.

The Saunders operation is mostly stock farming, and their principal livestock are sheep.

Mrs. Saunders is the former Bertie Cade, and they were married in 1912. They have seven children including: J. W. (Pete) Saunders, Cortez, Colo.; Mrs. Florene VanZandt, Maryneal; Mrs. Evelyn McRory, San Angelo; H. F. Saunders, Nolan; Mrs. Francis Sneed, Fort Worth; and J. H. and Rex Saunders, both of Blackwell.

CANNING TIME

It's almost canning time and the latest method for canning vegetables is a one-step cold-pack method, according to Extension Foods Specialists.

Directions are simple — as an example, take snap beans. Begin by washing all jars in hot soapy water and rinse well. It is not necessary to sterilize jars since the pressure canner must be used in canning all non-acid vegetables. Use only fresh, young, tender beans. The bean should just be beginning to form in the pod. Wash thoroughly, trim ends and cut into 1-inch pieces.

Thus far there is nothing different from the old method of canning snap beans, but you will notice that the fill is different.

Pack raw beans tightly into clean jars to ½-inch of top. Cover with boiling water, again leaving ½-inch space at the top of the jar. Add ½ teaspoon salt to pints and 1 teaspoon to quarts. Close jar with two-piece lid and place it in the pressure canner. Exhaust canner for 10 minutes, close petcock and process at 10 pounds pressure — pint jars 20 minutes; quart jars 25 minutes. Remove canner from heat, let pressure return to zero and remove the jars.

This new one-step method can also be used for canning fresh lima beans, carrots, cream style corn, whole kernel corn, black-eyed peas and summer squash.
