## Lions Honor Men Responsible For Kickapoo Water District

Bronte Lions Club held a dinner last Thursday to honor public officials and others who have worked and been responsible for the formation of the Kickapoo Water District. Thirty-eight persons were present for the occasion held in the Methodist Church.

Among those especially mentioned who were present were all the

members of the board of directors: F. S. Higginbotham, president; D. K. Glenn, vice president; J. A. Percifull, secretary; Preston Davis and Austin Sandusky, members.

County officials present who were cited for their support and work on the project included County Judge W. W. Thetford; Commissioners Howard Brock, Fern Havins and Claude Ditmore, and County Attorney Frank Dickey. Others receiving recognition for their contributions to the project were C. N. Webb, chairman of the Coke County Soil Conservation District; Cy Richmond, District Conservationist; and W. E. Jacoby, work unit conservationist with the Coke County District.

Judge Thetford made a short talk and the above-named men were recognized for their part in getting the district created.

The water district was created by the State Legislature a few weeks ago and officers were named at a recent meeting in Robert Lee. It is expected that a planning party for making preliminary survey of the project will be here some time in the next few weeks.

## Best July Rains Ever, Farmers of Area Say

Farmers and ranchmen of the Bronte area who said all last month they "never saw it so good" in June are saying the same thing about July. Since last Wednesday more good rains have fallen over this entire area of West Texas.

Measurements right here in Bronte in most gauges ran right at three inches, while many spots in outlying areas received more than that amount.

A bountiful feed harvest is in prospect for this entire area of

West Texas, and cotton farmers think their chances for a bumper crop are just about the best ever. Likewise, ranchmen are bragging about their fine prospects. One rancher said, "We've got lots of grass growing now — it's not all weeds like it was last year."

The detour route of Highway 277 was closed last Friday night after high water threatened the bridge on the low water crossing on the route. Traffic is now being allowed to travel over part of the highway under construction and the new bridge in the north part of town.

The weatherman Wednesday predicted scattered thundershowers for West Texas.

## City Council Okays Curb

The city council of Bronte has approved plans to curb Highway 277 south from Main Street. Plans were submitted to the council by the Texas Highway Department and explained at a recent meeting. Members of the council passed an ordinance approving the plans.

Council members say the only way the curbing can become a reality is for each property owner along the highway to pay his pro rata share of the cost of laying the curb. Practically all of the property owners along the route have already agreed to pay their part, the council said.

With the curbing being paid for out of local funds, the Highway Department will make the new highway 64 feet wide from curb to curb. The state will also take over maintenance of the curb as well as the street itself. In addition the state will curb along Highway 277 where it abuts on the triangle in the south part of town.

Members of the council are hopeful they will receive 100 per cent cooperation from property owners, so that all plans will be complete when the contract is let to pave the section of Highway 277 south from Bronte's Main street.

### WATER SAMPLES OKAY

In spite of the peculiar taste to Bronte water these days, three samples taken July 15 were okayed by the Texas Department of Health laboratories. The samples were collected by Bronte water superintendent B. D. Mackey at the Humble Camp, Cactus and Coffee Shop Cafes.

## Runnels Well Is Completed

A Runnels County lime discovery has been completed five miles northeast of Bronte near the Runnels-Coke county line.

The wildcat is E. B. Clark Drilling Co., et al. of Wichita Falls No. 1 Kitty Sue Gaddy, et al. L. N. Taylor Survey 2.

Daily potential was 44.8 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil. The well is pumping from 20 perforations at 5,166-70 feet where the formation was ruptured. Casing is set at 5,219 feet and the hole bottomed at 5,422 feet.

Royce Lee reported this week that the Karl Hohlitzelle No. 1A Lucius Evans, east of Norton, looks like a good producer after recovering 920 feet of oil and 107 feet of mud cut oil on a drillstem test from 4320-30 feet in the Goens lime. Gas surfaced in 7 minutes.

Two earlier tests also indicated production in the Palo Pinto and Fry sand.

duced from \$3.00 to \$2.50.

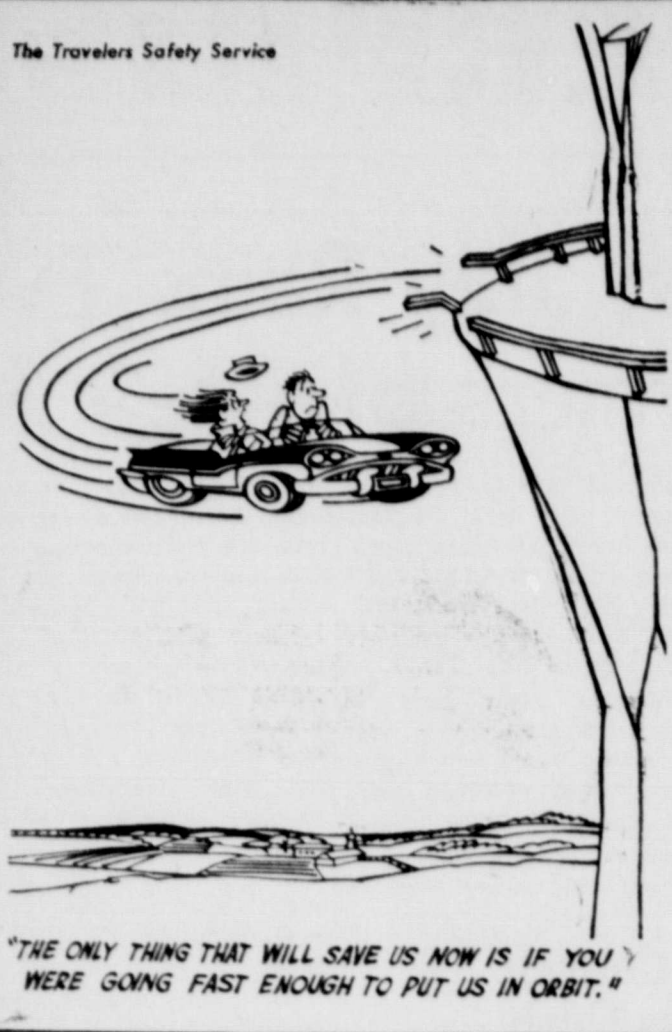

Recent rains have been doing great things for grasses that were seeded this spring. The 106 acres that Cumbie Ivey pitted and seeded earlier this spring has a good stand of Green sprangletop with a scattering of Sideoats grama and Blue panicum. D. K. Glenn of Bronte pitted approximately 40 acres this spring and Green sprangletop is showing up as the strong grass with a scattered stand of Sideoats and Blue Panicum.

Chemical prickly pear control using a sprayed mixture of deisel oil and 245-T is being carried out on some rough stony hills on Foster S. Price's lower ranch west of Robert Lee. It is too early to tell the final results but it looks good as a method of pear control.

The President has proclaimed July 19-25, 1959 as National Farm Safety Week with the purpose in mind of preventing accidents among farm families. National Farm Safety Week is sponsored jointly by the National Safety Council and the United States Department of Agriculture and is endorsed by all leading farm organizations.

A 1957 survey shows that 4,806 man years were lost on Texas farms due to accidents that year. These accidents cost farm families \$6,471,108.00 in doctor bills, repairs and lost time. In order to reduce accidents we must first know the major causes of farm mishaps. A national survey shows that 34% of all fatal farm accidents is caused by machinery of some sort. Drownings in farm ponds account for 15% of all farm fatalities; firearms 12%; falls 9%; blows and burns 11% and animals 5%. It is interesting to note that animals caused 12% of the non-fatal disabling accidents in Texas in 1957.

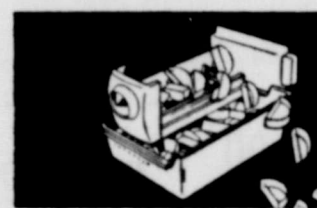
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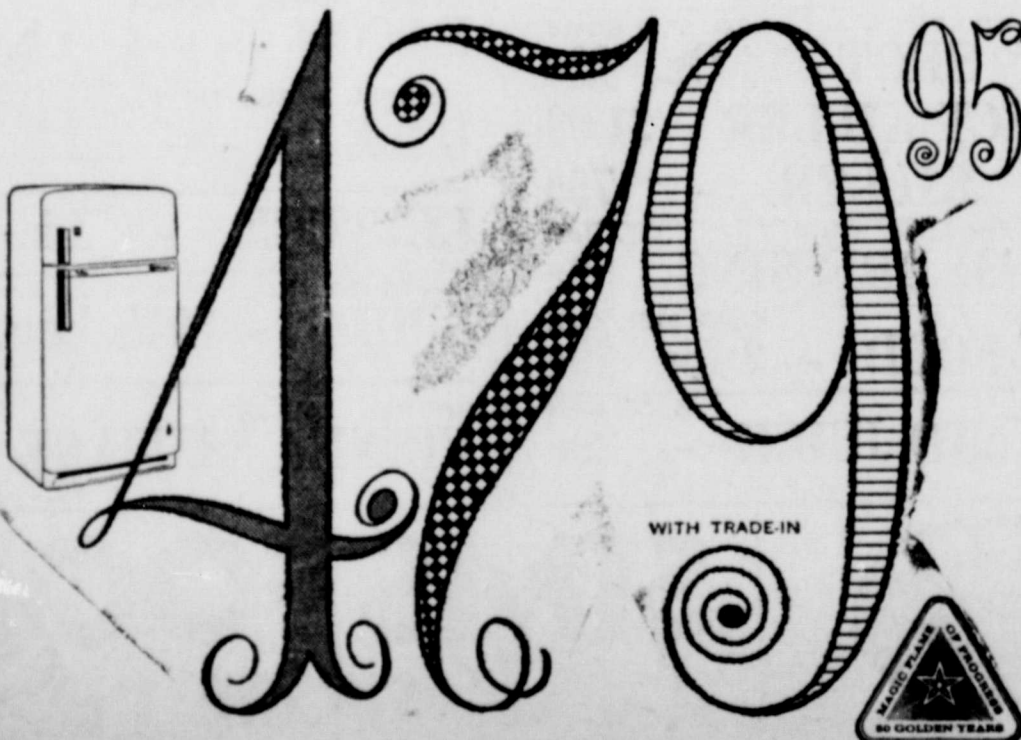
