## Farm Bureau Queen Contest To Be Held Here Next Tuesday

Four senior entries have been received in the Coke County Farm Bureau Queen contest which will be held in the Bronte school auditorium next Tuesday night, Aug. 11. There will be three divisions in the contest according to age

groups: for girls 6-10, from 11-15, and from 16-22. Only the senior winner will be allowed to compete in the district contest.

Only requirements for entrants is that they be single and daughters of Farm Bureau members.

Winner of the contest will receive an expense paid trip to the district contest at Big Spring. The district winner will be sent on to the state contest and the state winner will receive \$500 for a trip to the American Farm Bureau Federation contest in Chicago in December.

Edward Cumbie of Bronte, district Farm Bureau representative, will be master of ceremonies for the Coke County contest. Out of town judges will select the winner, and prizes will be awarded in all three divisions.

Any eligible girl who wishes to enter the contest should contact Mrs. C. E. Arrott, secretary of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

## New Teachers Are Announced; Two Vacancies to Be Filled

Six new teachers as well as a new superintendent had been elected up to this week to serve on the faculty of Bronte schools for the coming school year. Supt. C. B. Barbee said Tuesday that two teachers are still needed and that the board has hopes of filling these vacancies in the near future. Still needed are a first grade teacher and a science teacher.

Included among the new teachers is Elementary School Principal Edward L. Hopson. He has a bachelor's degree from North Texas State College at Denton and

seven years teaching experience. He has been teaching at Meridian the past several years. In addition to his regular teaching duties, Hopson has been an instructor the past four summers at the Lions Club Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville. He is not married and will room in the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Cumbie. Supt. Barbee said he is expected in Bronte about Aug. 22.

New head football coach is Bob Howard, who comes to Bronte from Cisco Junior College. He has a bachelor's and master's degree

from North Texas. He has had ten years coaching experience and has worked at Comyn, Boyd and Bynum, as well as Cisco. Howard is married and the father of three children, ages 4, 7, and 10. He has rented the Luther Hester house in the northwest part of Bronte. He will be here Aug. 15 to start his coaching duties. He will also teach social sciences in high school. This summer, the new coach is on the staff of the Corpus Christi Summer Recreation program.

Prentiss Wendell Gideon, who is a graduate of Winters high school, is the new Bronte School band instructor. Gideon has just completed work for his bachelor's degree at McMurry College in Abilene. He is unmarried. Barbee said he is expected to arrive in Bronte next week.

James Michael Anderson is the new elementary coach. He will also do departmental teaching in the seventh and eighth grades. Anderson is a graduate of Blanket high school and Howard Payne College at Brownwood. He is married and has made arrangements to live in a rent house south of the First Baptist Church, belonging to Joe Carter. Anderson recently married and his wife has had experience in Baptist youth work.

Mrs. C. B. Barbee has been elected as third grade teacher for next year. The wife of the school's superintendent, Mrs. Barbee has had seven years experience teaching in elementary grades. She is a graduate of Howard Payne College and has done graduate work at Sam Houston State College. Mrs. Barbee, who is the mother of four children, is from Munday where she graduated from high school.

Miss Maureen Brewer, whose home town is Lubbock, will be the new English teacher in Bronte high school. She is a graduate of Enloe High School and received a B. A. degree from Texas Tech. She is doing graduate work at Stephen F. Austin State College this summer. Miss Brewer has taught at Ropesville and Wellman. She made plans to room in the home of Mrs. Mattie Glenn during the coming year.

## Pruitt Receives Permanent Appointment As Postmaster

Announcement was made last week of the appointment of Noah Pruitt, Jr. as permanent postmaster for the Bronte Post Office. His nomination for the position was approved by the U. S. Senate recently. Pruitt has been acting postmaster since February, 1957, when he succeeded Mrs. Paul McGuire as acting postmaster. His will be the first permanent appointment

to the position since the resignation of Mrs. Carrie G. Williams.

Prior to his appointment as acting postmaster, Pruitt was in the grocery business here with his father. He is a veteran of World War II, having served 33 months in the army. More than two years of the time was spent in the Pacific theater of operations.

Pruitt is a graduate of Bronte high school. He is married to the former Dorothy Fay Scott and they have a daughter, Norma Lynn, who is in the second grade.

Bronte's post office is a second class office which means that its annual gross receipts run in excess of \$8,000.

## 174 Coke Residents Collect \$198,067 For 1958 Incentive Wool Payments

(From Robert Lee Observer)

Wool incentive payments for 1958 were mailed July 10 to Coke County sheep men. Checks numbering 174 and amounting to a total of \$198,067.22 were handled through Coke County ASC office.

In addition there were 117 checks for unshorn lamb payments which amounted to \$23,463.21.

About one-half the wool payments ranged from \$100 to less than \$1,000. There were 85 in this group and the total was \$35,925.13. Thirty-three growers got less than \$100 for a total of only \$1,631.99.

Payments from \$1,000 to just under \$3,000 went to 38 persons for a total of \$59,029.45. More than half the money went to 18 wool growers who claimed \$101,480.65. Largest check was for \$17,217.17.

This is not the Coke County total since several big sheep raisers filed claims in other counties.

Payment on unshorn lambs resulted in 69 persons receiving less

than \$100 each, the total being only \$3,017.48. The sum of \$12,994.77 was split among 43 ranchers in amounts from \$100 to just under \$1,000. Five checks in amounts between \$1,000 and under \$3,000 made up a total of \$7,560.96.

J. E. Quisenberry, County ASC office manager, reports only two votes were cast in the July 23 wheat referendum, although 43 persons were eligible to vote.

No marketable wheat was produced in Coke County this year because of the dry winter and early spring. A bigger acreage is expected to be planted this fall. Any farmer may plant up to 15 acres of wheat without an allotment.

Coke County has between 6 and 7 thousand acres of cotton this year, and the prospects are exceptionally good. All fields have been measured, Mr. Quisenberry said, but the acreage has not been totalled.

Mrs. Homer H. Clark, 68, of 1014 S. Abe, San Angelo, died at 4:32 p.m. Thursday at Shannon Hospital.

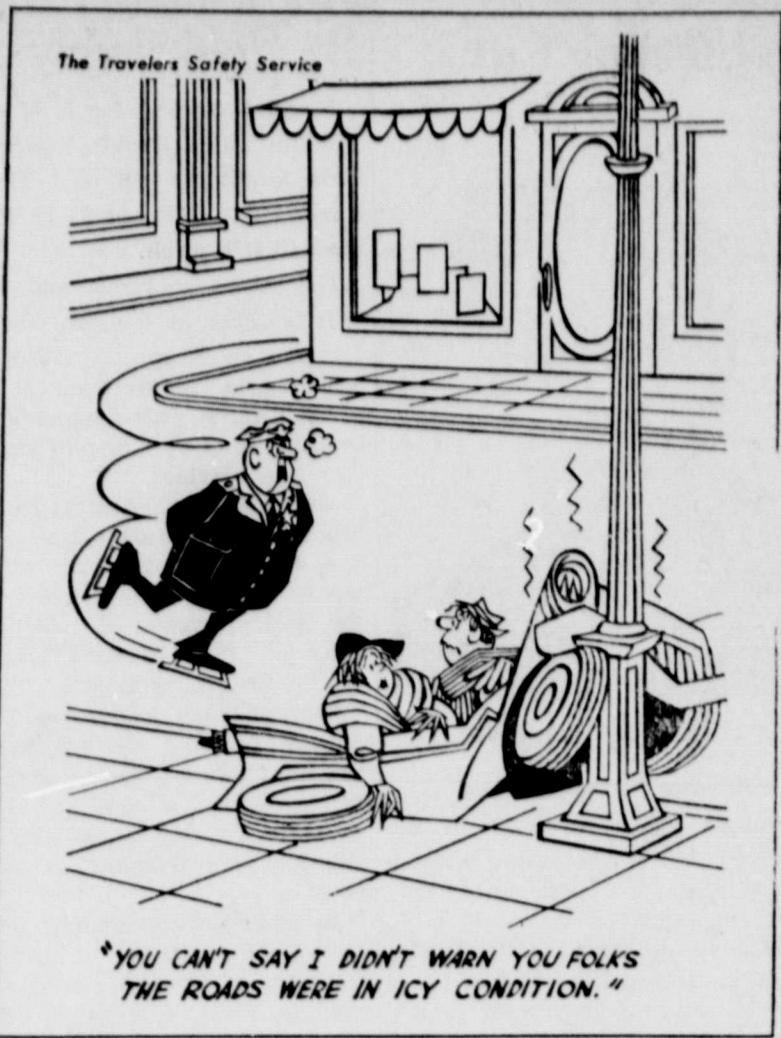
