Two 100,000 B. T. U. winter air conditioners have been installed in the local Church of Christ the past week.

The units are fully automatic and thermostatically controlled. The units are installed in storage rooms to the rear of the auditorium and the forced warmed air will enter the auditorium and return to the heating unis hrough grills located in the front of the uadiorium. The units are expected to give comfortable, even heat over the entire auditorium area even in extremely cold weather.
