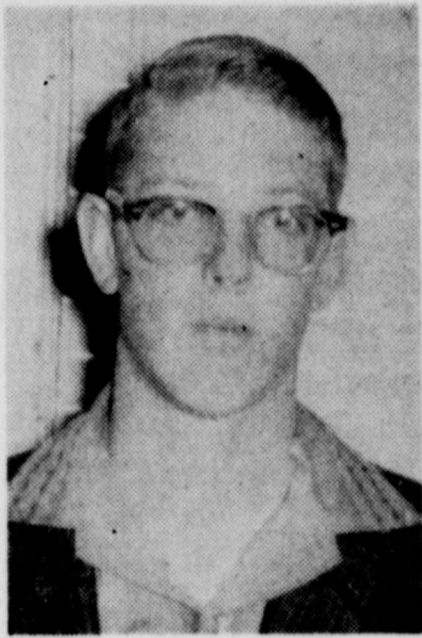

Eddie Glenn, Prescilla Wylie Receive 4-H Gold Star Awards

The Coke County 4-H Club girls and boys 1959 Achievement Program in the Robert Lee gym last Saturday night, Nov. 21, was attended by 175 club members, parents, leaders and guests. Fifty-five club members and leaders received a total of 110 county, district and special awards. One district award was presented the chairman and secretary of the County 4-H Council.

Topping the awards presentations were the girls and boys Gold Star awards presentations, made to Prescilla Wylie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Wylie Jr., of the Friendship community, and to Eddie Glenn, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn of Bronte.

Prescilla is a freshman student at Robert Lee high school and is

15 years old. Previous awards which she has won are: Clothing, Food Preparation, Girls Home Economics, Electric and year pins for five years. Her record placed first in the District Judging Contest in 1957 in Junior Food Preparation division and in 1958 in Junior Clothing. She was junior model from Coke County in 1958 at the District Dress Revue in San Angelo.

Besides being active in Foods, Clothing and Electric projects, she has a swine project. She is serving as Council delegate for the Robert Lee girls Senior 4-H Club this year.

Eddie is a 15 year old sophomore in Bronte high school with five years in 4-H club work. He is a previous winner of the Soil and Water Conservation award and received the beef award this year as well as the Gold Star award. Eddie has had three sheep demonstrations and two beef demonstrations in his five years of club work. He is his club's delegate to the 4-H Club Council. Eddie has been a member of Coke County's District winning Soil Judging team the last two years and was high point individual of the 959 district contest.

Coke County's record book of accomplishments in electricity was awarded first prize in the district. T. M. Wyle, leader of the Robert Lee Electric 4-H Club, presented the award to Dee Arrott and Prescilla Wylie, co-chairman and secretary of the County 4-H Council, who accepted the award in behalf of the 4-H clubs.

Wildcats Swamp Longhorns in Bi-District Contest

The Bronte Longhorns lost their bid last Friday for a bi-district championship, 40-14. The Longhorns played the fast and polished Wink Wildcats, winners of District 5-B, at Wildcat stadium in Wink. It was the first loss for the Longhorn team in 12 starts, as they won their last game of the season last year and went through the 1959 regular season's 10 games undefeated.

Bronte was working at a disadvantage from the very beginning, as three of its top players went into the game with injuries. Benny Corley and Dee Arrott, first string backs, and Jerry McCutchen, brilliant pass receiving end, were all working under the handicap of injuries received in previous games. Corley was under tremendous fire from the Wildcats from the very beginning and

by shortly after the end of the first quarter, the Wildcats had him sufficiently well worked over that he was unable to play any more of the game. Both Arrott and McCutchen, however, managed to stay the entire game. Then to further weaken the Longhorn squad, Bob Wrinkle, Bronte's standout tackle received a broken leg bone on the second play of the game when a Wink players helmet hit him. He was unable to continue in the contest.

Despite the handicaps, the Longhorns went on to play a fine game, and fans were well pleased with the performance of the remaining members of the team.

Bronte received the kickoff. Larry Robinson took the ball on the 10 yard line and ran it back to the 22. Arrott carried for no gain and then Corley fumbled and the Wild-

cats recovered on the 25 yard line. Harold Davis carried for 7, then tried again for no gain. Mike Ballard made 1 and Dwight Dow fumbled the ball, with Bronte recovering on their own 19.

Corley carried for 4, then Arrott made short yardage, but a 5 yard penalty put the Longhorns back on the 18. Corley's pass to Jerry McCutchen was nullified by another penalty, which put the Longhorns back on the 13 yard line. On the next play Corley quick kicked to the 43. A penalty was called against Wink for 15 yards, so the ball was placed on their 42. Davis and Ballard carried for 5 and 7 yards, giving the Wildcats a 1st on the Bronte 47. Dow passed to Ballard for 13 and another 1st on the 34. Dow lost 1 and Ballard picked up 3. Then came the long pass from Dow to

Ballard for 31 yards and the 1st touchdown of the game. Dow tried to run the conversion, but was trapped behind the line.

Curtis Robinson kicked to the 3, where Larry Robinson took the ball and ran it out to the 25. Mickey Black made a nice 7 yard gain, but on the next try Corley couldn't go. Arrott tried a pass to Jerry McCutchen, but it failed, too. Corley got off a nice punt down to the Wildcat 30.

James Bates received and made it out to the 38 before he was brought down. Davis's run was good for 6 and Dow made 4 for a 1st on the 48. Thret plays later the Wildcats had netted only 1 yard, so a punt was in order. Davis booted the ball down to the 10 yard line.

Arrott carried twice and Corley once, but they didn't make the

necessary 10, so Corley kicked the ball out to the 35 yard line. Ballard made 3 yards in 2 tries, then Dow rared back and let go with another touchdown pass to James Bates. Billy Allen kicked the conversion, making the score 13-0.

The kickoff was taken on the 10 yard line. Mickey Black's pass to Jerry McCutchen was good but Bronte was penalized 15 yards, and the ball was put down on the 25. Arrott's pass, intended for J. McCutchen, was intercepted, but the Wildcats fumbled and the Longhorns recovered for a 1st down on the 49 yard line of Wink.

Arrott tossed one to M. Black for 10 and good for a 1st on the 39. He tried it again, but it was incomplete. Corley picked up 2 and Arrott's pass to M. Black was intercepted, so Wink took over

2nd Quarter

Davis made a yard and Bates added 2 but the Wildcats decided to run for the short yardage needed for a 1st. Ballard carried and made 4 for a 1st on the 37. Bates completed a 27 yard pass to Spencer, gaining a 1st on the 10. Ballard gained 8 and Bates went over for the TD. Dow came back in and tried a conversion, but it failed. Score: Wink 19, Bronte 0.

Reyes Olivas took the kick on the 20, returning to the 30. Corley tried 2 passes, but they were incomplete, and gained 1 on the ground. He kicked to the 30 and Bates brought the ball back to the Longhorn 47. Davis made 5, but a penalty for 15 put the ball on the 37 yard line. Dow overcame the loss with an 18 yard pass to Spencer and a 1st down on the 48. Another penalty put the ball back on the Wildcat 47. Two plays later Davis kicked. Kenneth McCutchen carried and gained 9, good for another 1st on the 19. Spiller couldn't go, but Arrott then passed to J. McCutchen for 6, making a 1st on the 9. Then Arrott made 7 more for a 1st on the 9. He added another 5 and Olivas picked up 1. Arrott went over from the 3 for the TD and Spiller added 2 points on the conversion. Score: Wink 33, Bronte 14.

Bates took McCutchen's kick on the 25, carrying out to the 37. Dow's pass was incomplete, so he was pulled and Bates took over the signal calling for the Wildcats. He was the right man, as his pass to Spencer was good for 57 yards and a 1st down on the Longhorn 5. A penalty against Bronte moved the ball to the 2½, and Ballard moved it up to the ½ yard line. Bates couldn't make it, but on the next try he went over and Robinson kicked the extra point, to give the Wildcats a 40-14 lead.

Robinson kicked to the 15 and Mickey Black brought it out to the 40 to start the series of downs. Olivas made 2, then Arrott passed Olivas for 4. Spiller pushed through the line for the needed yard and the Longhorns had a 1st at midfield. Spiller fumbled and lost 5 and Arrott made it up, putting the ball back on the 50. Olivas picked up 1 and Arrott's pass went incomplete, so the Wildcats took over on their 49 yard line.

A pass from Dow to Spencer made a 1st down, gaining 11 yards. Allen then moved up to the Bronte 25 for another 1st. In

the next series of downs the Longhorns were a little hard to manage as they threw the Wildcats for losses of 10, 5 and 3 yards on 3 downs. The Wildcats were able to make 13 on the 3rd play but it was not enough to overcome their losses, so Bronte took over on the 33 yard line. Only one play remained before the final gun sounded.
