The election to vote a tax to supply necessary funds for flood control dams on the Kickapoo Creeks comes up next month and some discussion has been heard the past week on what the money will be spent for. A story in this issue of The Enterprise pretty well outlines the expenses which will be incidental to building the dams.

Directors of the water district tell us that the tax shouldn't be necessary for more than two years as they are not expecting any expenses on the dams, once row crop land. they are built. However, a nest egg of \$1,000 per structure is required by the federal government just in case something needs to be done to the structures.

We would be extremely foolish to turn down this proposal. It is estimated that more than a milion dollars will be spent by the government in building the dams, but of course, if we don't do our part, nothing will be spent.

Then, too, there is the matter of floods which the engineers say will be eliminated if the dams are built. The amount of increased taxes will be pitifully small compared to the loss sustained by many during the two deluges which have occurred in recent

We will do well to vote FOR on this matter.


