## Bronte to Close for New Year's Expect Record

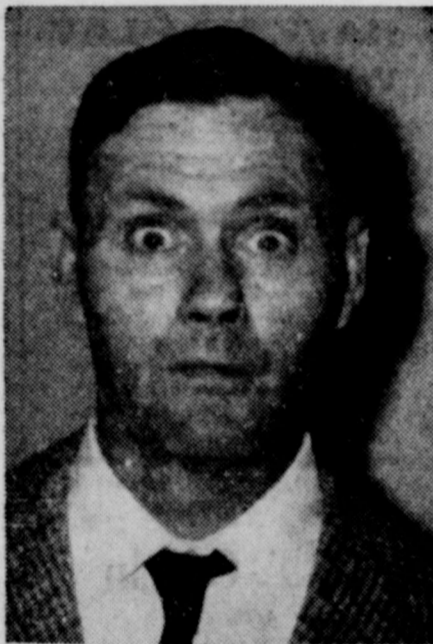

## Expect Record Entries For Coke Stock Show

The annual Coke County Livestock Show will be held Monday, January 11 at the stock barns in Robert Lee.

Approximately 50 FFA and 4-H club boys and girls from Robert Lee, Bronte and other places throughout the county will be exhibiting 12 fat steer calves; 9 registered beef heifers, 60 hogs and 150 head of sheep for the top honors and prize money. This is to be a record number of entries for the Coke County Show.

Judging the show will be Carl Maddox, V. A. teacher at Odessa, who formerly taught vocational agriculture in Robert Lee. Maddox is well known for his training of livestock judging teams, having had a second place state team in Robert Lee in 1951.

John Atkins, district sales manager for the National Farm Life Insurance Company, and a former Ag teacher at Iraan, and Arthur Barleman, Sterling County Agent, will sift and classify all animals.

Judging of the prize animals will begin at 9:00 a.m. Monday morning with the judging of the swine entries. Sheep judging is scheduled to start at 10:30 a.m. followed by judging of beef cattle at 1:00 p.m.

All entries except beef cattle must be weighed and assigned stalls by 4:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon, Jan. 10.

Twenty-five lambs and hogs will be offered for sale by public auction at 2:00 p.m. Each boy or girl qualifying an animal for the sale is allowed to sell one animal.

## Coke Countians Show Interest in Politics

The political pot began to boil in Coke County this week as two candidates announced for county offices.

Melvin Childress of Robert Lee was the first candidate to announce. He is seeking the office of sheriff. O. B. Jacobs also announced this week that he will seek the new office in Coke County of tax assessor-collector. Both men are running their announcements in this issue of The Enterprise.

The entire political calendar for Texas has been moved up since last election year. Date of the first primary is May 7 instead of the last week in July. The runoff primary has been set for June 4.

Another change in the political calendar provides that candidates

must file by Feb. 1 in order to have their names printed on the ballot.

The coming year is an important election year. A president will be elected along with a full slate of state officials. A congressman and state representative will also be named.

In county races, residents of the east side of Coke County will vote on a sheriff, tax assessor-collector, and county attorney. Commissioners will be elected only in Precincts 1 and 3.

In addition to the state, district and county races, the usual city and school elections will come up this year.

In order to vote in any of these elections, you must have a poll tax receipt or exemption. Deadline for paying poll taxes is Jan. 31.

## Melvin Childress, Ranch Foreman, Is Candidate for Coke County Sheriff

First candidate for a Coke County office to enter this year's primary election race is Melvin Childress, 47-year-old ranch foreman, who is a candidate for Sheriff.

He is a native of the county, having been raised in the Paint Creek locality southwest of Robert Lee. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Childress, who moved to Arizona in 1930.

His mother was the former Pearl McCutchen, a sister of Bill McCutchen, and practically all of his life has been spent in Coke County. Since 1941 Mr. Childress has been foreman on the ranch northwest of Robert Lee owned by the late R. C. Russell.

He is married to the former Miss Essie McCullough, who grew up in the Sanco community in the home of her uncle, A. R. Eubanks.

Mr. and Mrs. Childress have three daughters. They are Mrs. Leslie (Bonita) Copeland of Perkins-Prothro Camp, who has a son and a daughter; Mrs. Jerome (Juanice) Sheppard of Spearman, who has two sons and a daughter; and Mrs. Eddie Roy (Carolyn) Braswell of Sterling City, who is

the mother of a daughter.

Mr. Childress has served as a member of the Robert Lee school board and is active in the Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

He made the following statement for publication:

"In placing my name before the voters as a candidate for the office of Sheriff, I am aware that the responsibilities of this office are of great importance to the residents of Coke County. Before making a decision to run I have given the matter much careful thought and consideration.

"It is certainly my desire to carry out these responsibilities to the best of my ability and with fair and honest treatment to everyone. During my adult life I have been engaged in farming and ranching, a work that I love and for which I have deep respect.

"I feel that I can qualify for the office of Sheriff, and if elected I aim to conduct the office in a fair and impartial manner, at all times keeping in mind the best interests of Coke County and its people.

"I realize full well that no man can win in a campaign such as this simply because it is his desire to hold public office. And if I am elected it will be necessary to have earnest support of friends and voters who are really interested.

"I will appreciate your favorable consideration of my candidacy, and if elected I hope to be able to handle the office of sheriff in a satisfactory manner."

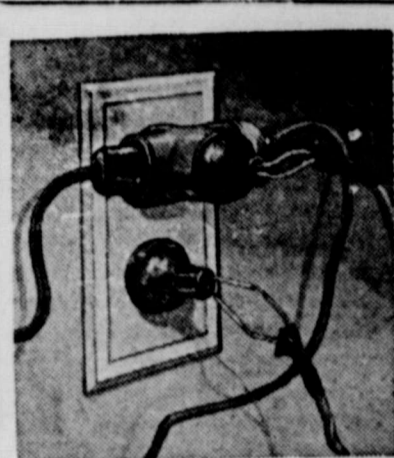

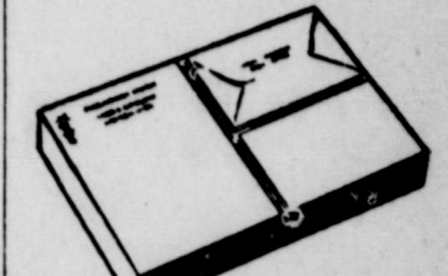

## Annual March of Dimes Drive Gets Underway in Coke County

The annual March of Dimes drive is underway in Coke County and plans are being made for several fund raising events which will be held during January. Plans are not complete, however, and will be announced in next week's Enterprise.

Matthew Caperton is county fund chairman again this year, and will actively direct the campaign for the east side of the county. County Judge W. W. (Bud) Thetford will be in charge on the west side.

Caperton said the March of Dimes is very important this year to residents of this county, as the local chapter is heavily overdrawn on funds from the National Foundation. "We used up all of our local money early in the year," Caperton said, "and have been drawing on national funds for the past several months in order to pay the bills for treatment of our polio victims."

He urged that Coke County residents give generously to the March of Dimes in order for the Coke

County Chapter to become solvent again.

Funds from the March of Dimes over the years have financed the vast research program which finally climaxed in the development of the Salk vaccine for polio. The money is also used to finance treatment of polio victims. Now that the big hurdle of finding a vaccine has been cleared, the National Foundation has taken on the additional job of research and prevention of arthritis and birth defects.

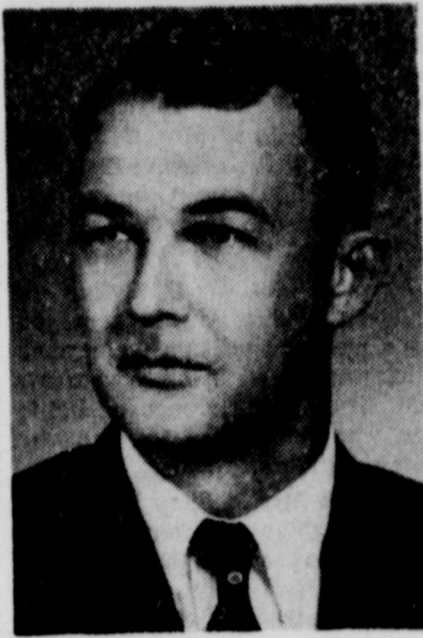
Caperton pointed out the importance of all these projects and added that he felt sure that Coke County residents would come through in their usual generous manner in supporting the March of Dimes.

"We will send forms out to families by children who are in school, but we have a hard time finding children who will be starting out in the first grade and have no older brothers or sisters in school," she said.

The census will include all boys and girls who will be between the ages of 6 and 18 on Sept. 1, 1960. Amount of state money the school receives is affected by the census count. Therefore, it is very important to get it correct, Mrs. Glenn said.

## Water District Tax Vote Next Tuesday

Voters living in the area drained by the Kickapoo Creeks will go to the polls next Tuesday to decide whether or not they favor levying a 30 cent tax on all taxable property in the area for use in carrying on the work of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

In effect the tax levy election

will decide the fate of seven proposed flood control dams on the creeks which run through town. In order for the dams to be built, the water district must function as a legal body, and in order for it to function, it must have funds for carrying on its operations. Therefore, the tax election is of great importance to the people of this area.

Directors of the water district say they believe the 30 cent per \$100 tax will be necessary only a few years and then it can be suspended until such time as more funds are needed. The tax will be levied on county valuations, which are considerably lower than those used by the city of Bronte.

The tax money will be used for covering incidental expenses incurred in construction of the dams. Some of it will also be used to set up a fund, which is required by the federal government, in case of needed repair work on any of the structures or to take care of any emergency which may arise. The District is required to deposit \$200 per year in this fund for each structure until \$1,000 is accumulated for each of the dams. The incidental expenses expected will include such items as advertising for bids, mimeographing or printing plans and specifications for use of prospective bidders; paying a bookkeeper during time of construction; payment of any cost required in obtaining easements; fencing; telephone calls, etc.

F. S. Higginbotham, president of the district, said the directors considered a lower tax rate and spreading it out over a longer period, but decided it would be less costly to local residents to assess the 30c tax for a couple of years and then do away with it. At the same time the tax election is held, voters will elect two directors for the district. Terms of Higginbotham and D. K. Glenn are expiring, but both have indicated they will allow their names to be placed on the ballot for reelection.

Directors of the district feel that there is an excellent chance the dams will be approved by the federal government and that federal funds will be made available for construction costs. Favorable reaction to the need here was voiced by members of the planning party which made the preliminary survey on the project.

The election will be held in the city hall with J. B. Mackey serving as election judge. Noah Pruitt Sr. will be assistant judge and Mrs. Otis Smith and Mrs. Olive Keeney will be clerks. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

## 1½ Inch Rain Soaks Area

More fine rains fell in this area over the weekend and the first two days of this week. The slow drizzle amounted to 1½ inches here since Sunday night.

While this area was receiving rain, the country north and west of here was covered with a blanket of snow. Up to a foot of snow fell in the Texas Panhandle.

Prospects for a good year on the farms and ranches of the Bronte area increased with the rains of the past few days.

## AD-LIB-BEN

The election Tuesday is of great importance to everyone who lives in Bronte or in the rural area affected by the sometimes rampaging Kickapoo Creeks. An approval of the 30c tax will make it possible for flood prevention dams to be built if they are approved by the federal government. And, regardless of how much approval we get for federal funds, the dams cannot be built unless we are willing to pay our small part of the project.

Some people have thought that the 30c tax was a little high, but it won't amount to much, if you will stop to figure it out. The tax will be placed on county valuations, which are extremely low. Not many houses in Bronte are valued at more than \$2,000, and the tax on this amount would be only \$6.00 per year. One ravaging flood could cause a hundred times that much damage in a few hours. It is believed that the tax will be necessary for only a couple or three years, and then it can be discontinued.

We urge you to vote for the tax so that we will have a chance to build the dams. We believe the prospective saving in property and very conceivably in human lives makes it a necessity that we support this measure.

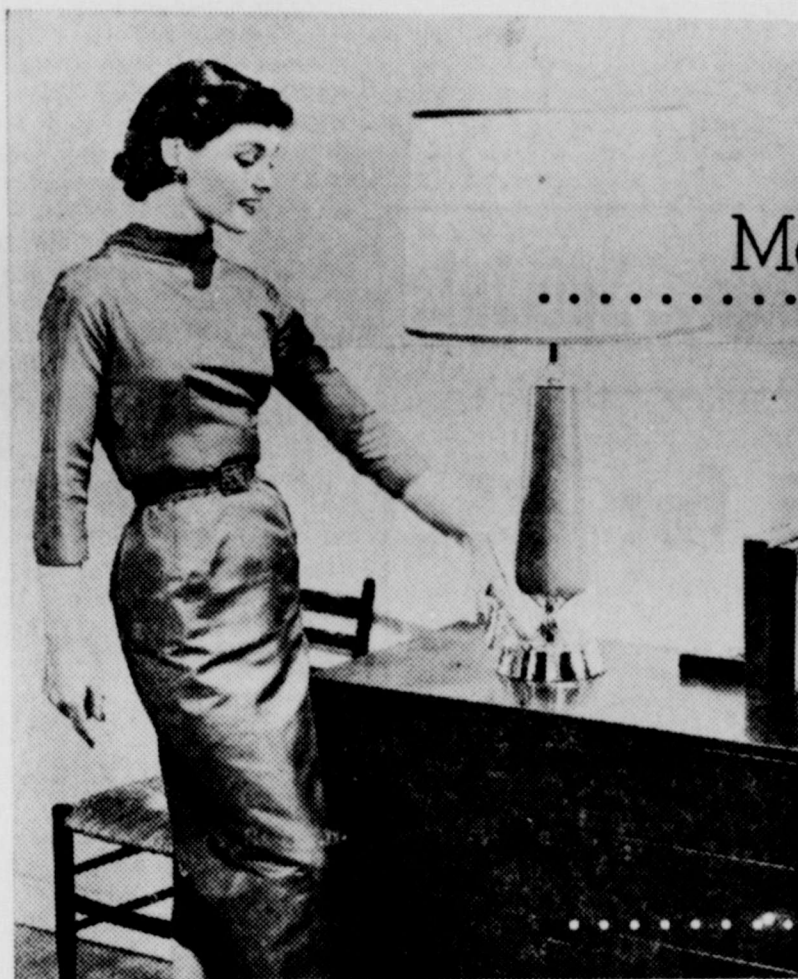

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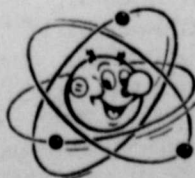
