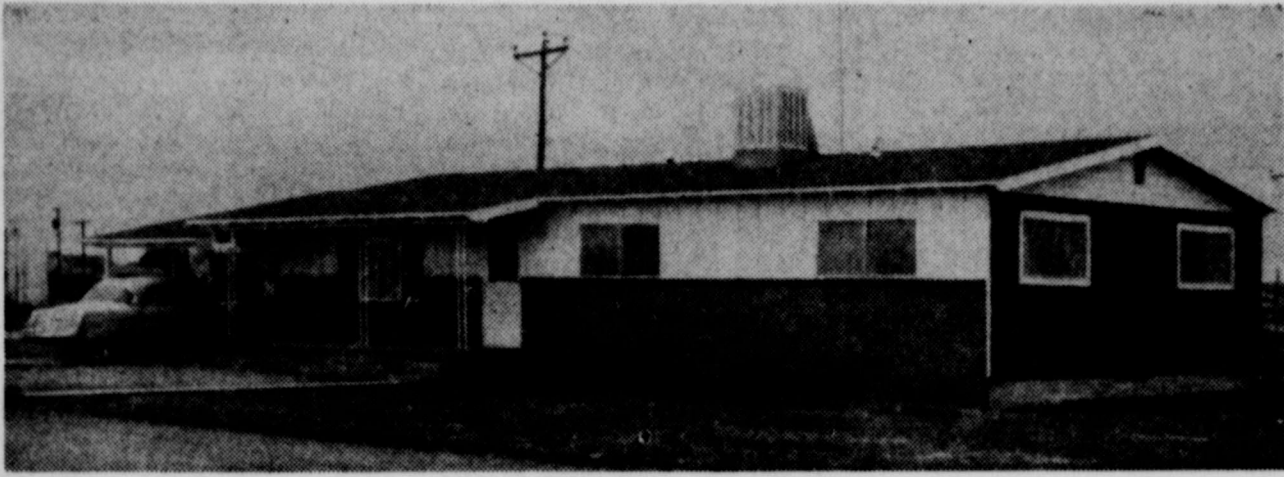

NEW METHODIST PARSONAGE

New Methodist Parsonage To Be Dedicated Sunday

The new parsonage of the First Methodist Church in Bronte will be dedicated Sunday when a special dedication service will be held at 3 p.m., followed by an open house until 5 o'clock. The house is located immediately west of the church.

Dr. L. K. Brown, district superintendent, will be present to lead the dedication ceremony. Rev. Bob Grimes, pastor, has issued an invitation to the public to attend the dedication service or to drop by during the open house.

The new parsonage was completed a few weeks ago and the Grimes family moved in just before Christmas.

A total of 1,484 square feet of floor space is included in the house, which consists of a living-dining room, kitchen, den, three bedrooms, two bathrooms and several closets and storage spaces. In addition, there is a storage room containing 156 square feet, and a carport is attached to the west side of the house.

The outside of the house is finished with asbestos siding and brick and the roof is made of

crushed brick. Hardwood flooring was used throughout the interior, and the walls in the den and kitchen are finished with wood paneling. The bathrooms are of tile construction, one of them having a shower and the other a tub.

New living room furniture was purchased for the parsonage, and the pieces formerly in use were refinished and moved into the den. New drapes were hung throughout the house. Central air conditioning has been installed and heating is provided by wall heaters. Cooking facilities consist of a built-in oven and a cabinet-top range.

Rev. Grimes said that all members as well as friends of the church who belong to other denominations, are cordially invited to attend the Sunday afternoon program.

3 Longhorns Make All-Area Class B Team; Bob Howard Selected As Coach of the Year

Three members of the 1959 Bronte Longhorn football team were placed on the Abilene Reporter-News All-Area team, according to a story released in Sunday's newspaper. Making the all-area team were Benny Corley, back; Bob Wrinkle, tackle; and Lanny Denman, guard. In the same selections, Bob Howard, Longhorn coach, was named Coach of the Year in this area.

Corley, in addition to making the first team, was named Back of the Year. His outstanding 1959 record gave him the coveted honor and made him third highest scorer in the area among all classes of schools. His season record showed a total of 135 points stacked up, made with 21 touchdowns, three extra kicking points and three two-point conversions. He racked up well over 1,300 yards rushing from his fullback position and was probably the entire area's

Water District Tax Carries by 132-27

Voters living in the Kickapoo watershed gave their stamp of approval nearly 4 to 1 on levying a 30 cent tax to meet incidental construction expenses and to set up a maintenance fund for dams on the creeks. The election, which was held Tuesday, also returned F. S. Higginbotham and D. K. Glenn to the water district board of directors.

A total of 159 votes were cast, with 127 voting for the tax and 32

against it. Glenn received 131 votes and Higginbotham, 130. A scattering of write-in votes were also counted.

Now that the tax has been approved, the water district is waiting only for approval by the Soil Conservation Service to get actual construction preliminaries underway. If the construction is approved, federal funds will be made available for actual cost of building the proposed seven structures.

When this approval is received, plans and specifications will be drawn up and bids will be called for.

Engineers who made the preliminary survey on the project were optimistic about receiving approval for federal aid. They made extensive surveys among local residents in determining the amount of damage sustained in recent years, and were of the opinion the damage would warrant construction of dams to prevent a recurrence of the disasters.

Plans Made for March of Dimes

"Our plans are taking shape for a very successful drive" Matthew Caperton said Tuesday, in referring to the 1960 March of Dimes Campaign in Coke County. He said that final arrangements had already been made for several of the fund raising events and that more are "in the mill."

The biggest money raiser in past campaigns, the Tad Richards dance, will definitely be held again this year, Caperton said. Date for the big event is Saturday night, Jan. 30. Clark Wynne and his orchestra from San Angelo will play for dancing.

The annual Mother's March has been set for Jan. 28, and Caperton said that plans for it have not been completed, but will be announced in next week's Enterprise.

He also plans a Tamale sale to be conducted by the Latin American citizens of Bronte. This event is held each year and has become a good money maker. Tentative date for it has been set for Jan. 23, but definite announcement will be made next week.

Mrs. LeDrew Arrott has been appointed to work the Juniper community and other workers will be secured to work at Tennyson and Fort Chadbourne.

Caperton urged everybody to give wholehearted support to the March of Dimes this year, as Coke County is deeply "in the red" with the National Foundation. "Our needs have far exceeded our local funds during the past year," he said, "and we have had to go to national headquarters to secure funds to meet these needs."

Entering the race for County Tax Assessor-Collector this week is Mrs. Jack (Juanita) Trimble. She makes the second candidate for this office which will be separated from the sheriff's department starting Jan. 1. Deputy Sheriff O. B. Jacobs announced his candidacy two weeks ago.

Mrs. Trimble is the former Juanita Eubanks, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. I. N. (Babe) Eubanks. She was born and raised at Bronte. She married Jack Trimble in 1938 and the couple has lived in Robert Lee the past 15 years.

Mr. Trimble was engaged in oil field work and stock farming prior to an accident in July, 1952, when he was struck by a car and critically injured. After many months in the hospital and treatment by specialists he got back on his feet but is not able to carry on his normal pursuits.

Mrs. Trimble operated a laundry for some time and has done cafe work. She and her husband also are local circulation representatives for the San Angelo Standard Times. Recently she enrolled in a business school at Odessa and is now completing that training in night classes at San Angelo. She attends the Methodist Church. She has a son by a former marriage, James Coleman, of Odessa. Mrs. Trimble is a sister of Mrs. V. M. Box of Robert Lee and Mrs. Frank Hearn of Texas Natural Camp at Silver.

Mrs. Trimble feels that she is qualified to handle the duties of the tax office, since much of the work is now being done by women. She is 46 years old. If elected she pledges to give the office her full attention and render the best possible service to the taxpayers of Coke County. She needs the posi-

tion. Mrs. Trimble says she will conduct an active campaign and hopes to contact every voter before the May 7 primary election. She will appreciate your favorable consideration of her candidacy.

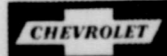

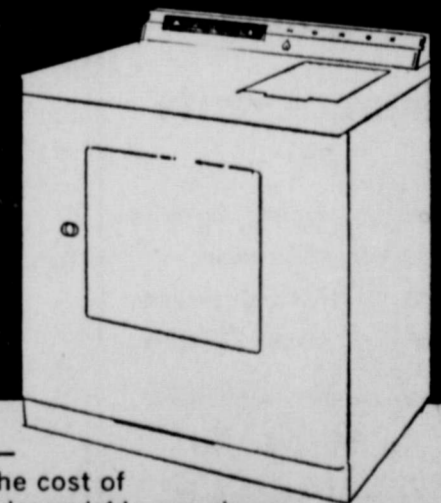
