Council Wants Opinions on Sewer Question

Bronte's city council is seeking information in an effort to determine the amount of interest among residents regarding a sewer system for the town.

Mayor J. A. Stephenson asked The Enterprise to run a coupon questionnaire for local citizens to fill out and return. He said the council hopes to secure enough cooperation in filling out the coupons to determine the sentiment of the people toward working further on building a sewer system.

The council met several weeks ago with Jack Brown, San Angelo investment broker, to discuss the economic feasibility of the sewer system. Brown told members of the council that the \$130,000 figure which is the estimated cost of the project, should not be too much to be retired with revenue bonds. These bonds would be paid from earnings of the system and

would not require any tax money. However, he said, in order to be sure that the city could meet its obligations on this amount, it would suggest that part of the money be raised with general obligation bonds and the city council be given authority to levy a small tax to pay them, in case the revenue from the sewer system falls short.

He pointed out, however, that a sewer system in Bronte would

assuredly increase property values far in excess of what the tax would be. "A sewer system in this town would increase the value of all property by a good percent," he said.

Brown told the council that "sewer systems are cheap to operate. There is practically no maintenance cost when a system is installed properly," he said. He noted that practically no additional help would be required to operate the system.

Brown did tell the city fathers that he doubted if revenue from the system would make the payments the first year or two after it is installed. "But as more and more people start having septic tank trouble," he said, "you will get more and more customers to tie onto it and thereby increase revenue." He suggested a charge of \$2.50 per month for ordinary connections, saying that when the city obtains 300 connections on the system, that this charge should pay for retirement of all bonds, as well as the small expense of operation.

Brown told the council that some difficulty might be encountered in getting people to tie on as soon as the system is installed, but, he said "when these folks see how trouble free the service is, as compared to septic tanks, they'll want to get in on it."

Mayor Stephenson told the publisher of The Enterprise that he believes a majority of the residents of Bronte are for the sewer system now, "but we would like to have an expression of opinion from as many as possible on it." He asked the cooperation of every person in the city in filling out the questionnaire below.

More copies of the questionnaire will be available at the city hall and at The Enterprise office, for anyone who does not take the paper, or for anyone who needs more than one coupon. The coupons may be turned in at either place.

M.; four daughters, Mrs. John Leathers, Odessa, Mrs. Jack Newman, San Diego, Calif., Mrs. Floyd Gibson, Tennyson and Mrs. Everett Best, Bronte; two brothers, R. L. Wrinkle, Bronte, Tom Wrinkle, Beaumont; three sisters, Mrs. Robert Clark, Plainview, Mrs. Maude Burrows, New Mex., and Mrs. Marietta Burrows of California; and 13 grandchildren.

1,414 Poll Taxes Is New Record

A total of 1,414 poll tax receipts sold before the Jan. 31 deadline is probably a new record for Coke County.

In 1956, also a presidential year, the number was 1,283. However, that figure was exceeded in 1952.

With a few persons just reaching the age of 21 and privileged to vote their first time without a poll tax, and all persons over 60 years of age being exempt, the potential voting strength of the county this year will be close to 1,700.

That many are not expected to vote. But a big field of candidates for local offices attracts much interest, far more than state or even presidential races.

\$1200 Turned in for Coke March of Dimes

Matthew Caperton, Coke County March of Dimes campaign chairman, reported Wednesday that a total of \$1200.68 had been raised on the east side of the county.

He broke the figure down as coming from the following sources:

School, \$67.97; Tamale Sale, \$20; business forms, \$148.70; Tad Richards dance, \$460.00; Mother's

March, \$200; Tennyson and Ft. Chadbourne communities, \$200; dimes boards, coffee sales and basketball game, \$99.01.

W. W. (Bud) Thetford, chairman for the west side of the county reported that a \$568 had been turned in to him. Quite a few events are yet to be counted there and Silver has not completed their campaign.

Caperton said he hopes to have a complete report from the entire county for next week's paper.

He expressed his appreciation to all the workers and contributors to the 1960 March of Dimes. "I am very well pleased with the way everyone has worked and given to the drive," he said, "and I certainly want everyone to know how much I appreciate their cooperation."

Caperton also said Wednesday that he felt someone in the community should come forward and volunteer to serve as drive chairman next year. He has had the job for the past two years, and said he would not be able to take it again next year. In addition to serving as county chairman for the past two years, he has been in charge of making all arrangements for the Tad Richards dance for the past five years.

3 Trustees to Be Elected in April

The annual Bronte school trustee election will be held the first Saturday in April, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee. Terms of Luther McCutchen, Joe Rawlings and Conda Richards expire this year.

Barbee said that candidates for the school board have until 30 days before the date of election to file for the office. Absentee voting will be permitted during the period from 20 days to three days before the balloting.

Candidates must file with the secretary of the school board to get their names on the ballot. Barbee said the board would decide at its next meeting on details of the election.

Holdover trustees include Hurlin Lee, chairman, Allen Sherrod, Secretary, Edward Cumbie and Jacob Bruce Morrow.

City Election Will Be Apr. 5

Terms of four city officials expire this year and will be filled at a regular city election on the first Tuesday in April, which will be April 5.

The terms of Mayor J. A. Stephenson and Councilmen C. E. Bruton, H. A. Springer and Bill Thomas expire this year. Holdover members of the council with another term to serve are Bill Luckett and Royce Fancher.

Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said that candidates for the offices have to file their names with her at least 30 days before the election in order to get their names on the ballots.

Any qualified voter residing in the city limits is eligible to run for the offices. The office of mayor pays \$7.50 per month, while councilmen draw \$5.00 per month. All terms are for two years.

Mrs. Lucy Warner Victim of Auto Mishap in Arizona

A. N. Rawlings, accompanied by his sister, Mrs. Marvin Simpson of Robert Lee were called to Tempe, Arizona this week by the death of their sister, Mrs. Lucy Warner. Mrs. Warner suffered a concussion when she was struck by an automobile as she crossed a street on a crosswalk. She died of the injury Monday night.

She was born in Burnett, Tex., June 15, 1901 and lived most of her life in Coke County. She had been a school teacher for about 33 years, and had taught the last 25 years in Arizona. She also formerly taught at Bronte. She was graduated from Texas Women's College in Denton and received her master's degree from the University of Arizona. She belonged to the Methodist church there.

She is survived by a son, Clifford Warner of Holbrook, Ariz.; her mother, Mrs. A. J. Rawlings of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Simpson and Mrs. R. G. Lewis of Tucson; and her brother, A. N. Rawlings.

14 TICKETS ISSUED TO SPEEDERS HERE

Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles reported this week that the Highway Patrol picked up 14 speeders Saturday night between Bronte and Blackwell. He was working on the tickets and book work connected with the offenses early this week.

Liles said he hated to fine the speeders, but that he had no choice in the matter after they are caught breaking the law. "Getting fined for speeding is especially bad now, because the person has to pay a fine and is penalized on his insurance premiums too," he said.

The judge urged all local residents to keep their automobiles within the speed limits, and thus avoid fines as well as increased insurance costs.

1960 Politics to Be Interesting

Politics from the local level up is becoming more interesting all the time as some good races have developed in precinct, county and district offices.

Right here in Precinct 2, three candidates have filed for constable. Two of them, A. E. (Pete) Gentry, the incumbent, and Oscar Renshaw, have already made public announcements of their candidacy. George Wrinkle filed before the Monday deadline, but has not yet made a public statement concerning his candidacy.

Probably the most hotly contested on the county level is for the new tax assessor-collector office. O. B. Jacobs, Mrs. Juanita Trimble, William J. Green and Aubrey Denman have announced for this office, and a lively campaign

is in prospect. Jacobs and Mrs. Trimble live at Robert Lee, Green is from Tennyson and Denman lives at Bronte.

Much speculation came to an end after the Monday deadline passed and Sheriff Paul Good did not announce for re-election. Two Robert Lee men, Melvin Childress and Will Percifull are seeking the sheriff's job.

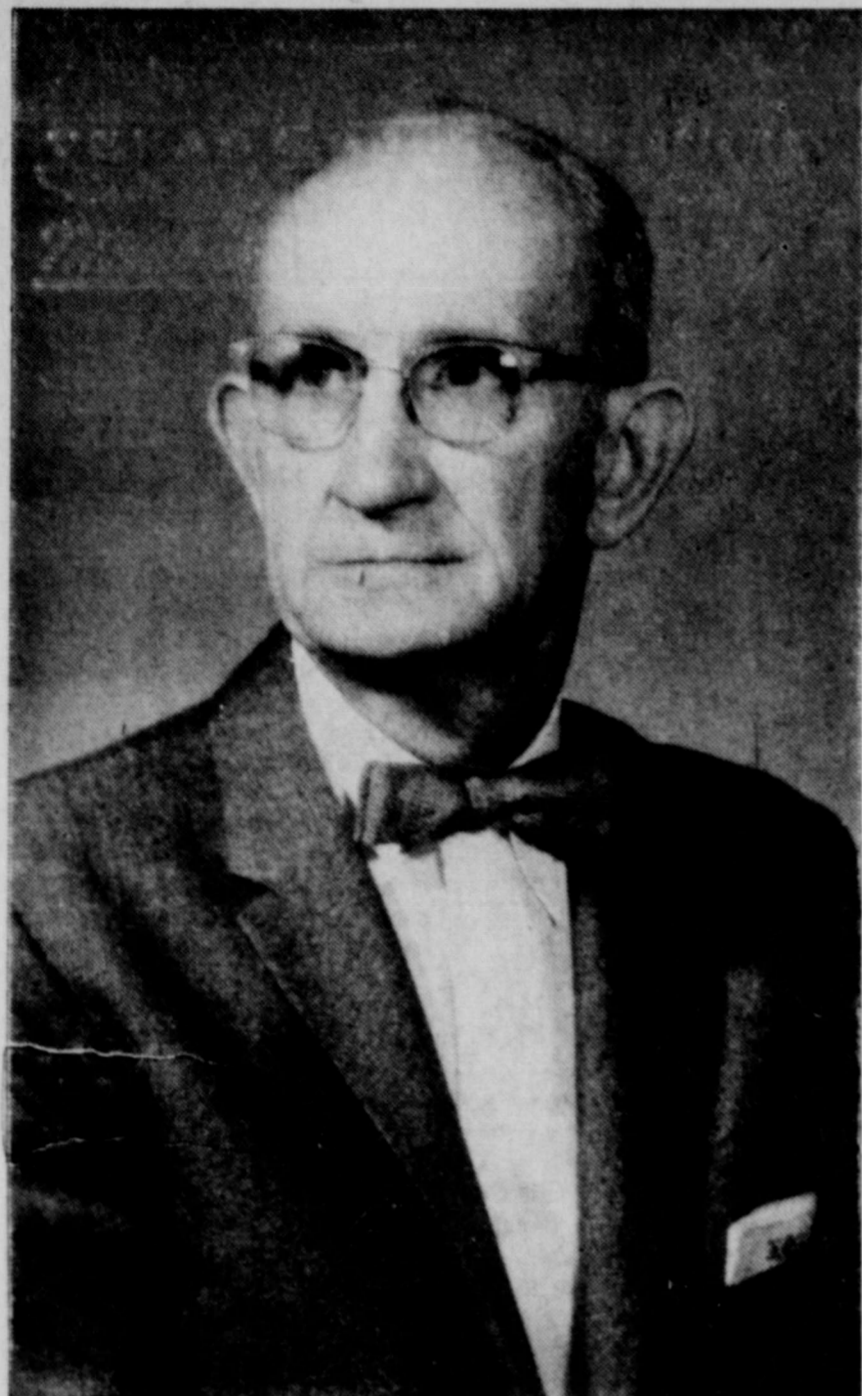
Another hot contest has developed in the commissioners race in Precinct 1 (Robert Lee). A fourth candidate, J. L. McCabe, Jr., filed before the deadline to oppose Fern Havins, the incumbent, Alton Roberts and C. L. Sparks.

Competition has developed in the race for state representative from the 77th district, which is made up of Coke, Runnels, Concho and

Coleman counties. J. W. (Bill) Moore, mayor of Ballinger, has announced for the office and will oppose A. J. Bishop, Jr., of Winters who is seeking re-election.

Judge Joe L. Mays of San Angelo has two opponents for district judge. William C. McDonald, San Angelo attorney and former Bronte resident, and William E. Davenport, also a San Angelo attorney, are running against Judge Mays.

No competition has developed against Frank Dickey, for county attorney; Justin Kever, for district attorney; O. C. Fisher, for congressman; or Floyd Harmon, for commissioner in Precinct 3. State Senator Dorsey Hardeman has two more years to serve in his present term.

Deadline Near For GI Loans

Arthur Sitas of San Angelo, veterans service officer for Tom Green, Coke and Irion counties, has received information of interest concerning direct GI loans to veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict.
