

Deadline Near For GI Loans

Arthur Sitas of San Angelo, veterans service officer for Tom Green, Coke and Irion counties. has received information of interest concerning direct GI loans to terans of World War II and the Korean conflict.

Word from the Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock states that Direct Loan Funds may not be committed after July 24, 1960. Funds now on hand and those to be received early this year must be committed, disbursed and the loans closed prior to June 30, 1960.
