22 For, 9 Against Investigating Possibilities for Sewer System

Only 31 persons had returned the coupon run in last week's Enterprise to voice their opinions concerning a sewer system for Bronte. Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said Wednesday morning. She reported that 22 persons had signed coupons as being for further investigation of the possible sewer system, while nine had

indicated they were against it. Mayor J. A. Stephenson said this week that plenty of coupons are available at the city hall and at The Enterprise office for anyone who wishes to express his views. He said that the city council would like to have a better coverage of local opinion than has been received the past week, and urged local residents to go by the city hall and fill out one of the coupons.

New Car Tags Now On Sale

The new license plates are a reversal of last year with white lettering on a black background. Coke County's prefix has been changed to JE and the numbering starts at 3575.

Up to the present date a total of 1,671 passenger cars for 1959 were registered in this county. Owners of new autos must purchase 1959 licenses for the period remaining before April 1.

Deadline for getting new motor vehicle licenses is April 1.

CLOSE FRIEND DIES

John P. Arden, 21, of Waxahatchie, one of the three Texas Tech students found dead near Silverton this week, was a close personal friend of Richard Wayne Rees, also a Tech student. The two boys lived in the same dormitory and spent last summer's vacation period working together at Yellowstone park. The three victims were in the rugged caprock country to collect wildlife specimens and apparently died of exposure in a snowstorm and subfreezing temperatures. Their bodies were found Sunday after an intensive search by horsemen, jeeps, Texas Rangers and volunteers.

Parallel Parking Required on 277

At its regular meeting last Friday night Bronte's city council passed an ordinance making it a city law for all vehicles to park parallel on State Street (Highway 277) from the south edge to the north edge of the city limits.

The council passed the ordinance because it is required by the State Highway Department on U. S. Highways. The ordinance has to be published two weeks in The Bronte Enterprise before it goes into effect. Penalty for conviction of disobeying the new city law is a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor

more than \$100.

The council also passed a motion to make South Jefferson a one way street from its intersection with Main Street to Holmes Avenue. Only south bound traffic will be allowed on this street. Jefferson is the street which runs in front of the school and Holmes is the street which runs in front of the W. O. Eubanks home.

Candidates Learn Cost of Running

Candidates for Coke County offices will have to pay 2% of one year's salary as their share of the cost of holding the primary elections. This applies to principal offices and commissioners, but those running for constable will pay only 1%.

The assessments were made by the Coke County Democratic Executive Committee in a session at the court house Monday. R. B. Allen, county chairman, presided over the meeting. The committee is made up of voting precinct chairmen, all of whom were present but those from Green Mountain, Tennyson and Walnut.

Mr. Allen advised the group that the large number of candidates made it possible to lower the assessment this year. Two years ago the filing fee was 3% and it was 7% in 1956.

Cost of holding the first primary May 7 and a likely runoff a month later is estimated at \$1,500.

Candidates have until the coming Saturday, Feb. 13, to pay their filing fee. Since Mr. Allen now resides in San Angelo he has made proper arrangements so that the fees may be paid at the office of County Clerk J. L. Tinkler.

March 28 is the date when the ballot will be made up and turned over to the printer. Order of names on the ballot will be determined by lot. A committee to assist Mr. Allen in making up the ballot includes D. K. Glenn, Prec. 2, Bryan Yarbrough, Prec. 1, Fred McCabe, Prec. 3, and Eugene Brooks, Prec. 4.

Each of the 12 voting boxes will have a presiding judge and three clerks. In the larger boxes of Robert Lee, Bronte and Silver, a double election board will serve so that vote counting may be carried on during election day. Election officials receive \$8 for 10 hours and \$1.00 per hour overtime.

It was pointed out that no person is eligible to serve on an election board if he has relatives running for office. A presiding judge was named for each box and he is to appoint his assistants.

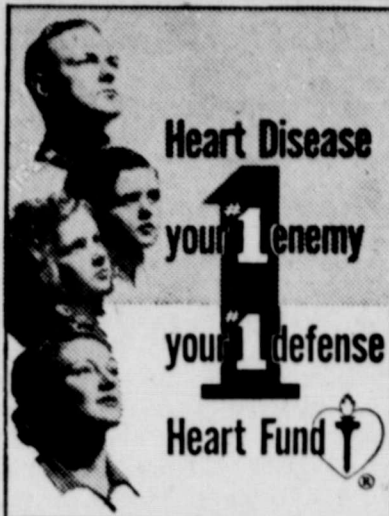

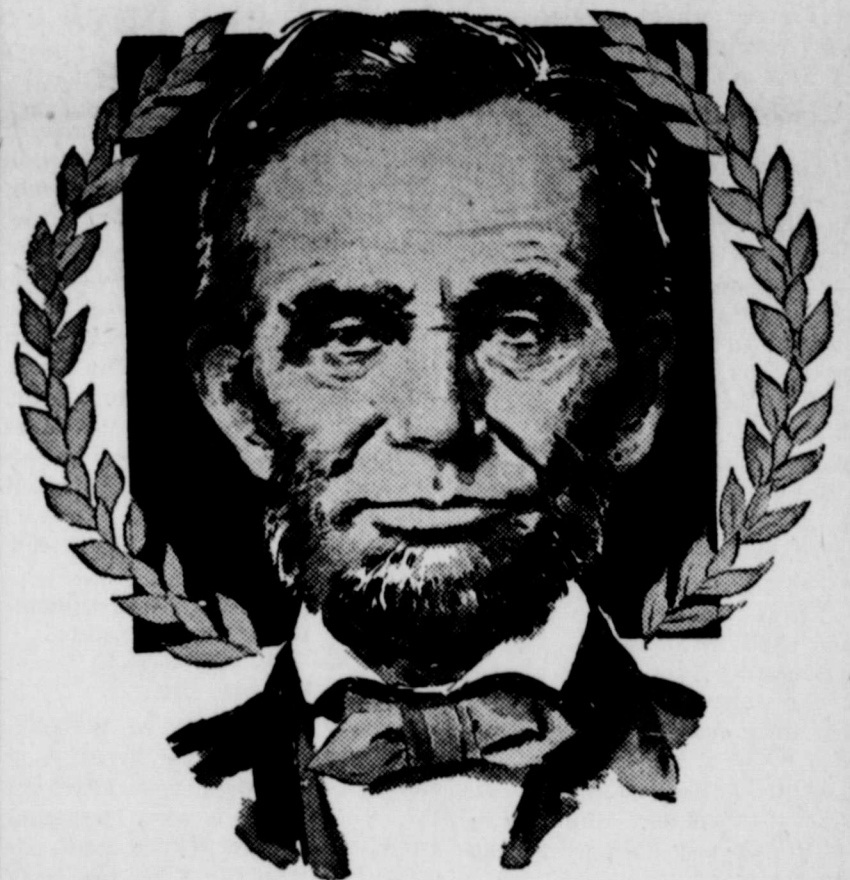

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING STANDING OR PARKED MOTOR VEHICLES UPON EITHER SIDE OF STATE STREET (U. S. HIGHWAY 277) BEGINNING AT ITS INTERSECTION WITH THE SOUTH CITY LIMIT LINE AND CONTINUING TO ITS INTERSECTION WITH THE NORTH CITY LIMIT LINE OTHER THAN PARALLEL WITH THE ROADWAY AND CURB AND WITHIN EIGHTEEN (18 INCHES) THEREOF, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful and a violation of this Ordinance for any person, firm or corporation owning or operating a motor vehicle to cause, suffer, allow or permit such motor vehicle to remain standing or parked, whether occupied or unoccupied, upon either side of State Street (U. S. Highway 277) beginning at its intersection with the South City Limit Line and continuing with said State Street northerly to its inter-

section with the North City Limit Line other than parallel with the edge of the roadway or curb of said Street, headed in the direction of lawful traffic movement and with the right hand wheels of the motor vehicle within eighteen (18) inches of the edge of said roadway or curb.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation who violates this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Introduced on the 5th day of January, 1960, and passed, approved and adopted on the 5th day of February, 1960.

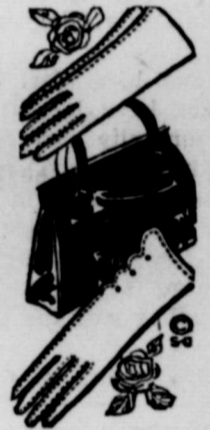
