Race Develops For City Council

More candidates than vacant positions was the story Wednesday morning in the upcoming election for three city councilmen. With the filing of H. A. Springer for reelection since last week's paper was published, there are four candidates for the three spots. A race is also on the docket for mayor with two candidate seeking that position.

J. A. Stephenson, present mayor, and Dr. John R. Harris have both filed as candidates for mayor. Other council candidates besides Springer are C. E. Bruton, Matthew Caperton and Charlie Boecking. Like Springer, Bruton is seeking re-election. The other councilman whose term expires this spring is Bill Thomas, who declined to run again. Both Caperton and Boecking are former members of the council.

The city election will be held on Tuesday, April 5. Deadline for filing is 30 days before the election.

Red Cross Drive Starts March 1

H. A. Springer, Coke County Red Cross Chapter chairman, announced this week that the organization's annual fund drive will begin March 1. Springer said that Cecil Kemp has accepted the job of being fund drive chairman, and will be in charge of the campaign.

Quota for the county this year is \$932.00.

Springer said that the job of securing volunteer workers to carry on the campaign remains to be done and that anybody who will help should contact him or Kemp. He said he hopes a full slate of volunteers will be lined up by next week.

The Red Cross is an organization which helps both the civilian and military population in times of disaster, either personal or on a larger scale. During the 1954 flood in Bronte the Red Cross came to the aid of many families who suffered severe damage to their household furnishings.

Council Calls Election On Sewer Bond Issue

An election has been called by Bronte's city council to vote on the proposition of issuing bonds for construction of a sanitary sewer for the city. The council met in special session Tuesday afternoon and passed a resolution calling the election.

Two propositions will be voted upon. The first would authorize the city council to issue \$85,000 in revenue bonds, to mature in not less than 30 years and to bear interest not exceeding 6 per cent. The second proposition would authorize the council to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$50,000, payable over a period of 30 years and bearing interest not exceeding 6 per cent. The No. 1 proposition specifies that the \$85,000 bonds would be retired only from revenue earned by the sewer system. The No. 2 proposition authorizes the city council to levy a tax to pay it off.

At previous meeting of the council to discuss the sewer bond vote, a bond issue of \$130,000 was discussed, but the group decided to increase the amount to \$135,000 to insure having sufficient funds to build the proposed system, if approved by the voters.

Jack Brown of San Angelo, financial advisor who has been working with the city on this project for some time, was also present Tuesday.

He reiterated his statements of last week in which he said he believed the sewer system would pay for itself and no tax would be necessary to pay off the general obligation bonds. However, he also stood by his original position that the bond issue should be split into \$85,000 revenue bonds and \$50,000 general obligation

CORRECTION!

Longhorns Lose Bi-District Tilt To Mertzon Team

The Bronte Longhorns fouled away their chance to go to regional basketball competition, when Mertzon's Hornets defeated them 38-32. The game was played in Central high gym in San Angelo Tuesday night.

The Longhorns had things completely under control in the first half of the contest and when the halftime horn sounded the score was 21-11 in Bronte's favor.

Mertzon came alive in the beginning of the second quarter and Bronte seemed unable to do anything but foul, and give the Hornets free throws, which won the game for them.

Bronte's star guard, Steve Baggett, fouled off first, and was followed by Benny Corley, Dee Arrott and Jerry McCutchen.

Mertzon made only six field goals but made 26 free throws, while the Longhorns made 14 field goals and four free throws.

bonds, so that if revenue from the sewer system would not take care of the entire obligation, the city would have the authority to levy a tax to take care of part of the debt.

At the meeting last week, Brown said that if a tax had to be levied to pay off the entire amount of the general obligation bonds, it would not take more than a 40 cent tax. At the Tuesday meeting, however, he said he had determined that a 35 cent tax on present valuations would be sufficient to meet all the payments due on the \$50,000 bond.

Brown told councilmen again that if they could get 300 users at \$2.50 per month, the sewer system should pay for its operation and make the payment on both bond

issues. This number of users would contribute \$9,000 per year, and Brown said that larger users who could be charged a higher fee ought to bring revenue up in excess of \$10,000 per year.

Payment on both bond issues would amount to \$8670 after the first two years. The payments would be \$6750 each year for the first two years, according to the schedules which Brown worked out. Reason for making payments lower the first two years, he said, would be to spare the city heavy obligation during the time the system is getting in operation. A maximum number of users is expected by the end of the first two years, also.

Present plans for the proposed system call for a \$25 connection charge if the user ties on at the time of construction. A tentative \$50 charge is proposed if the connection is made after completion of the system. However, members of the council said they would set the connection charge at the lowest possible figure, in order to encourage local residents to tie on at the time of construction.

Considering the possibility of having to pay off the entire amount of the general obligation bond with a tax levy, the Enterprise made a survey of the city tax roll this week. Some interesting facts were determined from the study, which included only property renditions of business and home owners (no owners of vacant lots were considered.)

At the 35 cent tax rate, which Brown said would pay off the tax bond, it was found that 295 (90.5%) of the home and/or business owners would have to pay less than \$17.50 per year. That would leave 9.5% or 31 taxpayers whom the tax would cost more than \$17.50 per year.

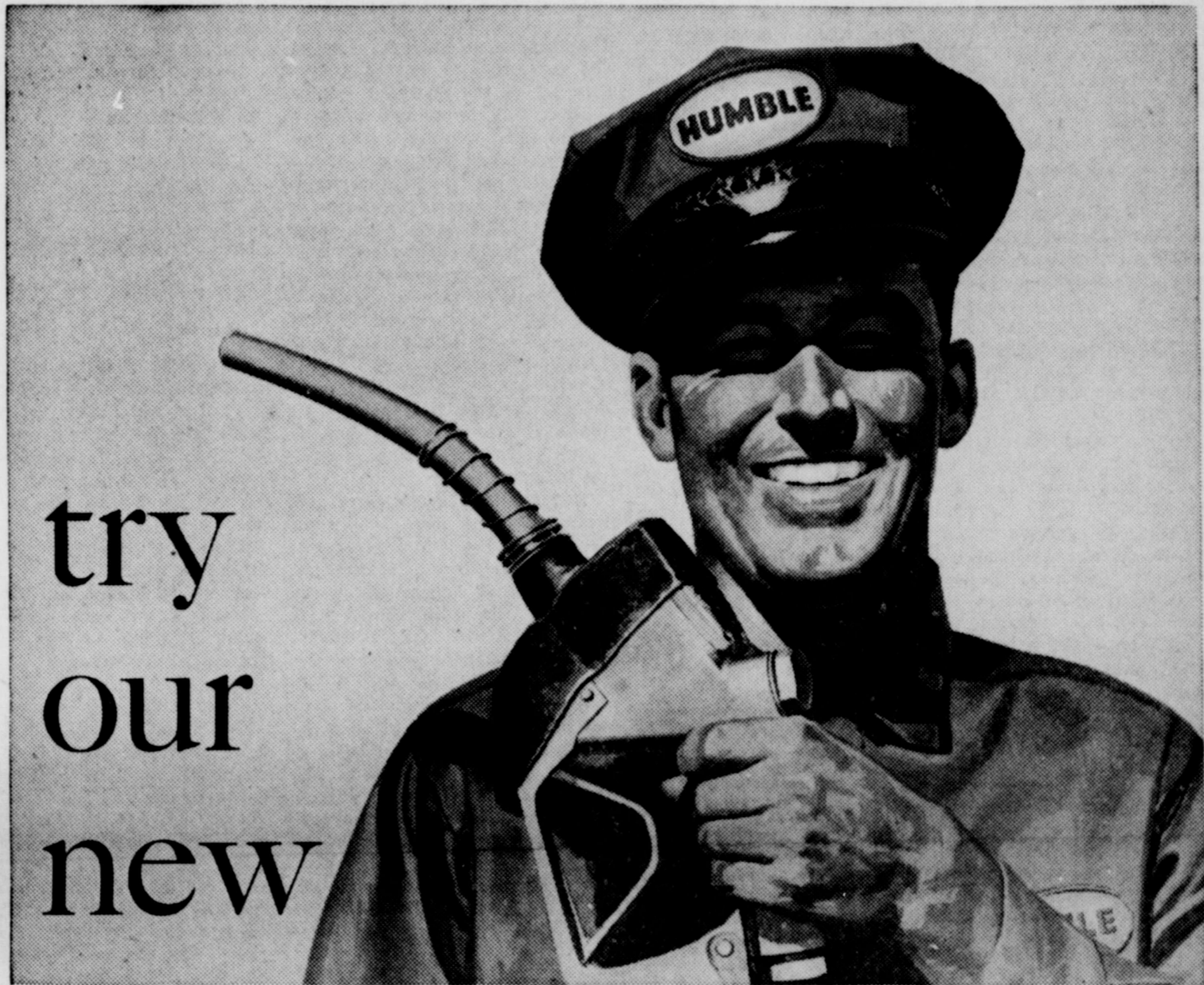

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Bronte, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose herein-after mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 19th day of March, 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bronte, Texas, be authorized to issue EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$85,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of purchasing, constructing and improving a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty (30) years from their date, and to bear interest at a

rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses as said expenses are defined by statute?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bronte, Texas, be authorized to issue FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of purchasing, constructing and improving a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty (30) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due."

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Bronte, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

Mrs. Olive Keeney, Judge
Mrs. Robert Foreman, Clerk
Mrs. Marvin Corley, Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$85,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR PURCHASING, CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING A SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$85,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR PURCHASING, CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING A SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM

BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF" "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO EACH of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions, respectively.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

SECTION 7: In the event the said revenue bonds submitted under Proposition Number 1, above, are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, who own property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

SECTION 8: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in said City, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Bronte, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

Bronte Chapter Observes National F.F.A. Week

By J. T. HENRY

Feb. 20 to the 27 is set aside as National F. F. A. Week. This is also a significant time for the Bronte Chapter of the F. F. A. because it marks 28 years of activity for the local chapter. On Jan. 16, 1932 the local chapter received its charter.

During the intervening years a lot of changes have come about. We have changed from small farms cultivated with horse drawn equipment, to larger farms cultivated by power equipment. REA has come to all the farm homes and brought with it all the conveniences of the city. Operators now must control larger tracts of land to justify the high cost of the equipment necessary to stay in the business with today's accelerated production practices.

All this is reflected in the Vocational Agriculture program in the schools. More emphasis is placed on the care, repair and operation of farm equipment, the processing and marketing of farm produce and legislation affecting the farm program. With equipment costs high and still rising, it is imperative that farm operators of the future be trained to maintain and operate this equipment at peak efficiency.

REA has made it possible for most farms to have and use the small arc welder for emergency repairs and construction of equipment and improvements about the farm. This called for instruction in the school shop. This school was one of the first in Texas to get and put into use, an electric welder in the Agriculture Shop. It was the first one in Texas to get the acetylene cutting torch and

welding equipment. This has been used for instruction in the second and third year course of study to train students in the use of these machines. These have been available for use by adult students in the community as well. As a result, a number of welders are now in use on farms and ranches in the community.

Last November a welding school for adults was conducted by a representative from the Texas Education Agency and twelve men received the instruction in the local school.

Leadership training plays an important part in the local program. This consists of training for judging teams (chapter conducting teams, demonstrations and F. F. A. Quiz. Teams from this school have ranked as high as second in the state in judging and third in the state in chapter conducting. These contests put the boy on his own and develop skill and confidence in what they are doing.

Co-operative activities play an important part in the F. F. A. program. By working with other organizations in the school and community, the students receive training that will be of benefit later in life. It is through these activities that they develop skills and at the same time render a service in the school or community. This year a number of very useful items have been constructed for the athletic department, school plant and individuals.

The F. F. A. motto is:
 "Learning to do
 Doing to learn
 Earning to live
 Living to serve."

The first part of this motto is covered in the instruction given

by the teachers. The demonstrations and examples performed to put over the information. The second part is done by the student to test the instructions and develop skills. The third and fourth part of the motto will prove the worth of the first two parts.

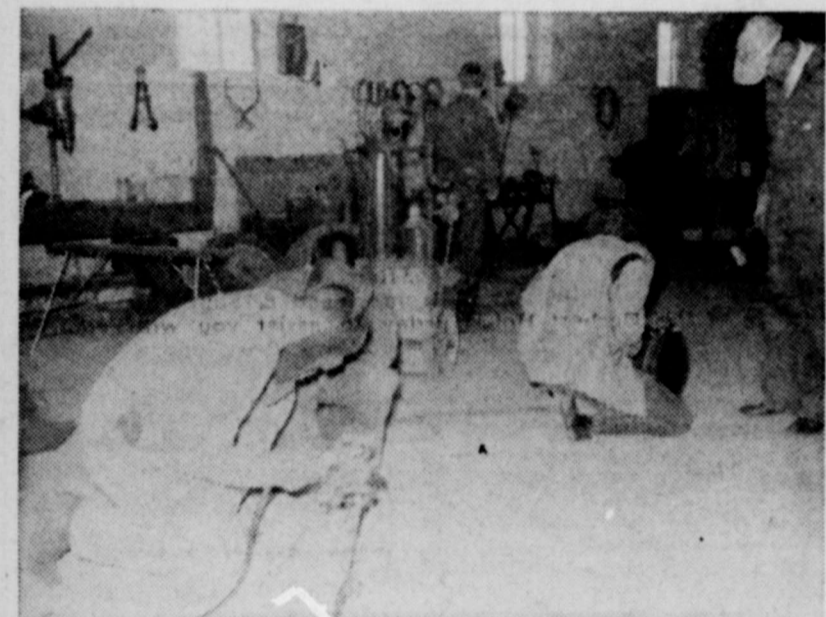

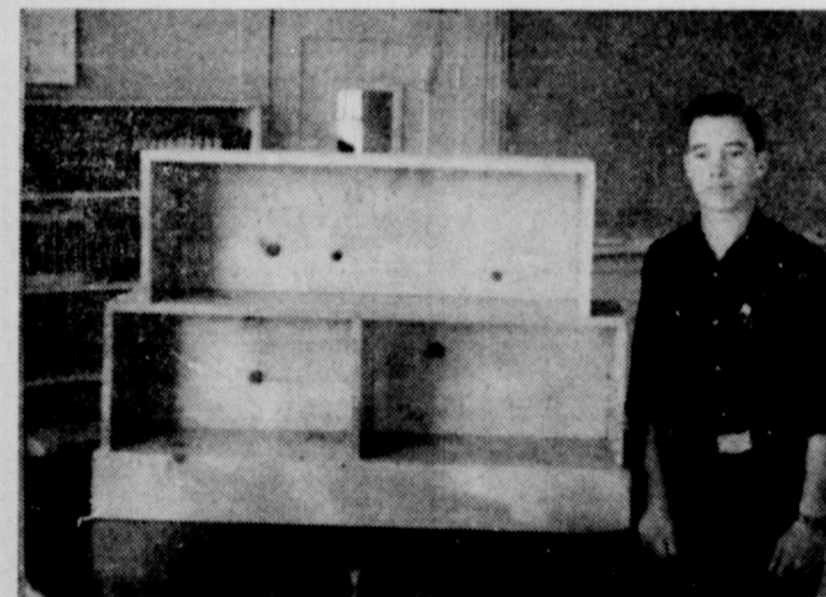

J. T. HENRY watches Grady Becksworth cut the top of a small barrel with the acetylene torch.



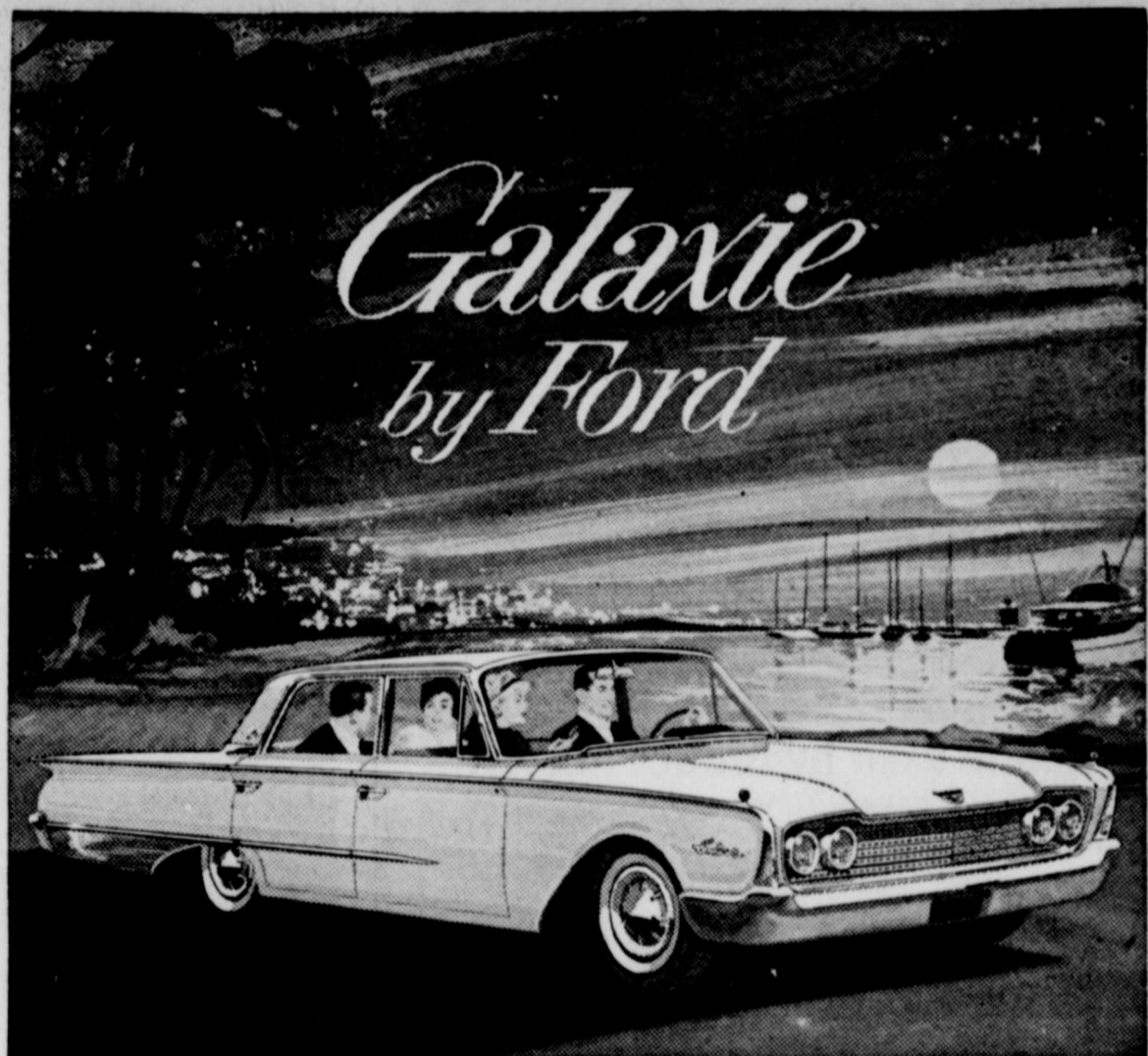

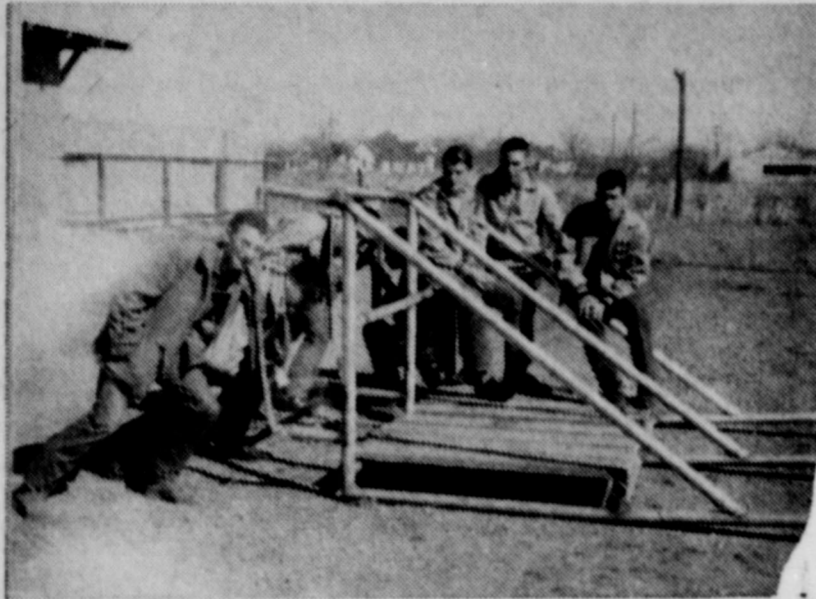

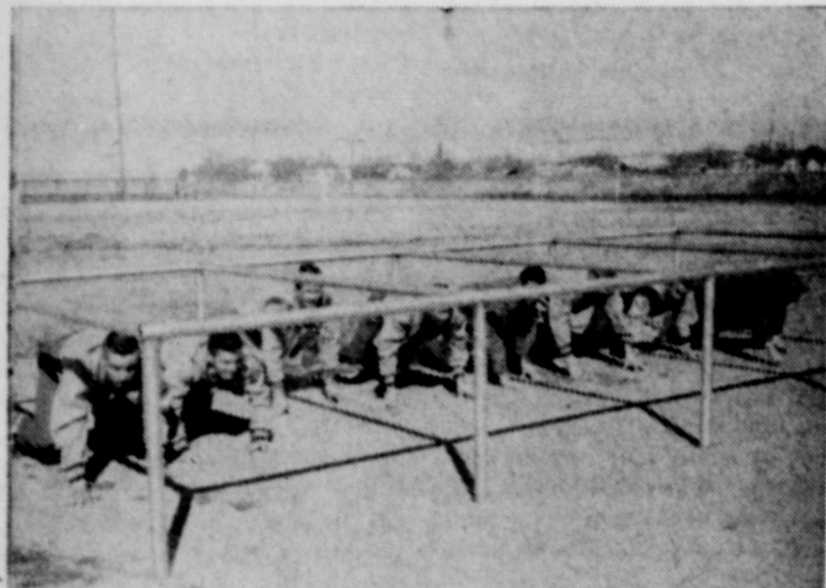

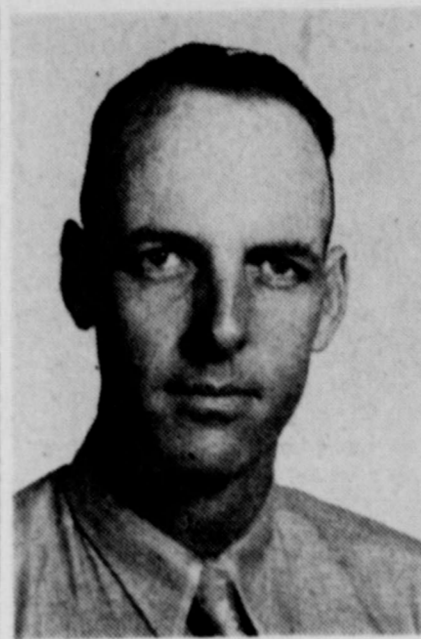
J. T. Henry Has Led Bronte's V. A. Department Since 1937

When anyone in Bronte community thinks of the Future Farmers of America or Vocational Agriculture, he thinks of J. T. Henry. This man has guided the vocational agriculture department of the Bronte high school since the fall of 1937. He was away from this job from 1941 to 1943, serving in the army, but returned to the local classroom when he was discharged. Henry was awarded a 20-year pin by the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Ass'n in 1956.

During his years in Bronte high school, few boys have graduated who have not come under his instruction and influence. He has turned out some championship judging, chapter conducting and other teams during this time, and is well known over West Texas for his ability as a teacher.

Most recent accomplishment of Henry and his boys was a complete remodeling and re-decorating of the vocational ag. building. This work was completed last summer, and makes the ag. classroom and workshop an entirely different place for the boys to study and work. Bronte PTA furnished the materials needed for the project and all the work was done by Henry and the students.

In addition to learning the principles of good farming and ranching, the classes render a large amount of service to the Bronte school and other community groups by building many things needed. This year they have built

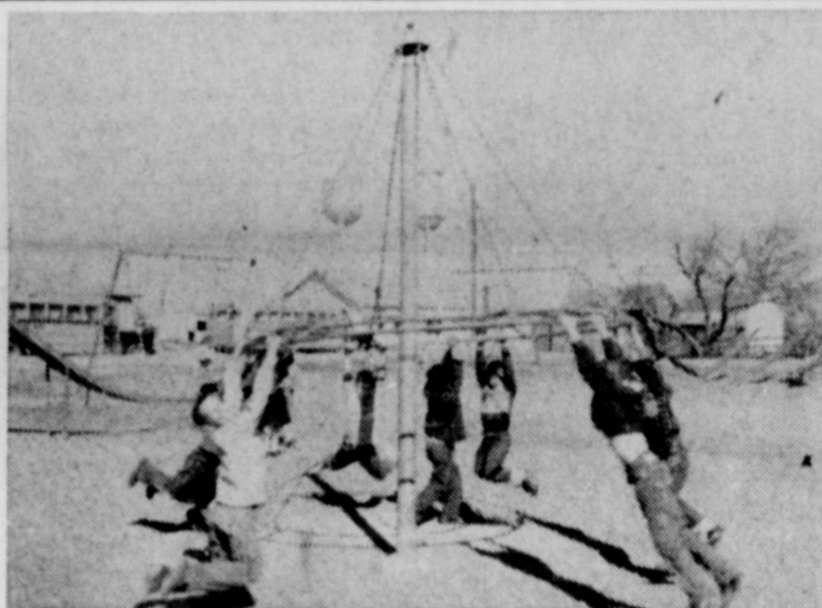
equipment for the athletic department and made improvements at the football field. They also set up playground equipment which was donated by Humble Oil & Refining Co. for use of primary students.

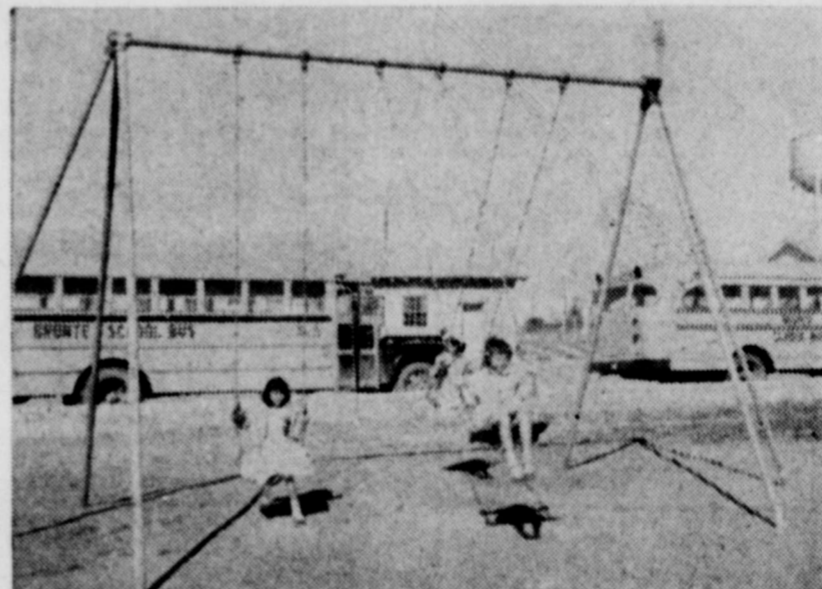


PRIMARY GRADES youngsters enjoy the slide set up by the FFA boys.

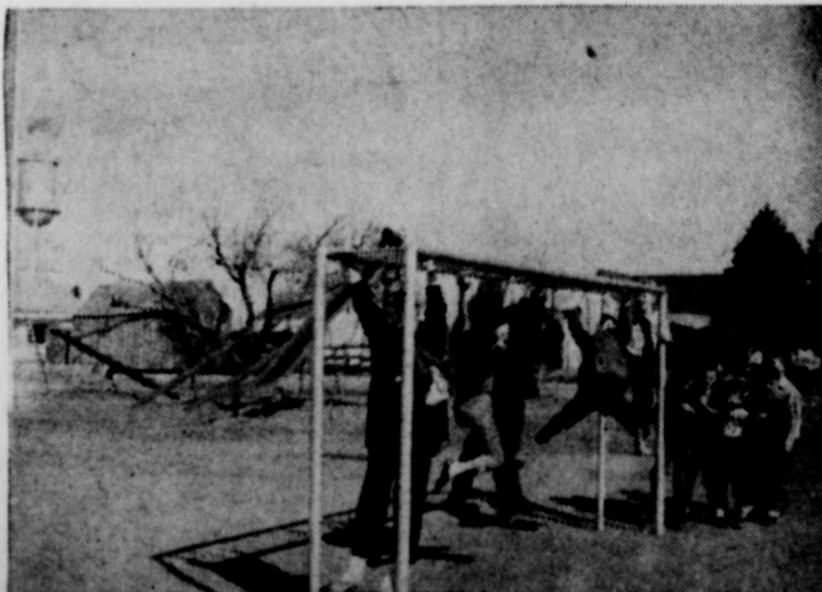
a teacher in Bronte School. They have one daughter, Linda, who is a high school senior. The family resides at their home in the east part of town.

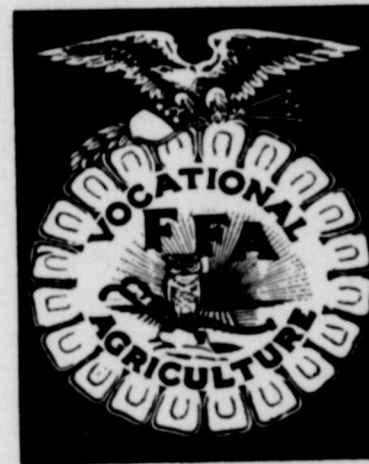
