### Census Takers Appointed For Coke County

Three women and one man have been appointed enumerators to take the 1960 census in Coke County. They are Mrs. Dale Brown of Robert Lee and Mrs. Louvenia Rees, Mrs. Marvin Corley and W. W. (Wish) Millikin, all of Bronte.

Mrs. Brown's territory will be the incorporated town of Robert Lee and Bronte will be handled by Mrs. Rees. Mrs. Corley has been assigned all the west half of the county except Robert Lee, and Millikin will work the east half outside of Bronte.

Crew leader for the counties of Coke, Sterling and Irion is Lester Jeschke of Miles. Enumerators with their crew leaders will attend training sessions in San Angelo starting next Monday, March 28.

Each census taker will receive approximately nine hours of instruction. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count. Classroom training will cover proper manner of asking questions, use of the Census questionnaire, Census definitions, and map reading.

Every census taker will be furnished with a map of his district. At they make their rounds, census takers will be required to canvass every street and road and visit every housing unit within the boundaries of their assignments shown on these maps.

Advance census report forms for the 1960 census were being distributed by Coke County post offices Wednesday. Every family should receive one of the forms and have it filled out before the census taker calls.

### Absentee Voting Underway in City, School Elections

Ballots have been printed for both the school trustee and city elections, which will be held the first week in April. Persons wishing to vote absentee may do so until three days before each election.

The city election is set for Tuesday, April 5, while the school trustee voting will take place Saturday, April 2. Three trustees are to be elected from a slate of four candidates. In the city voting three councilmen will be selected from a field of six candidates.

Absentee voters in the school election should go to the county clerk's office in Robert Lee, or, if unable to do so, may write that office requesting that a ballot be mailed to them. The same procedure may be followed in the city election, except the place is Bronte city hall.

Candidates for school trustee are Conda Richards, Bob Wilson, Joe Rawlings and Marvin Landers.

Candidate for mayor is J. A. Stephenson, now upopposed since Dr. John R. Harris withdrew from the race. Dr. Harris' name will appear on the ballot, however, since the ballots were already printed at the time he withdrew. Council candidates are Matthew Caperton, Cecil Kemp, Charlie Boecking, Joe D. (Binks) McCutchen, H. A. Springer and C. E. Bruton.

### Harris Withdraws From Mayor Race

Dr. John R. Harris announced this week that he is withdrawing his candidacy for mayor of Bronte. Dr. Harris stated that his primary aim in running for the office was to work toward obtaining a sewer system for the city, and since this has already been assured, he does not wish to run for the office.

Dr. Harris issued the following statement in regard to the coming race:

"Because of the recent funds made available to us for a sewer system for Bronte and because this was the primary reason I was a candidate for mayor, I hereby respectfully withdraw from said candidacy."

The withdrawal of Dr. Harris from the race leaves Mayor J. A. Stephenson a clear field with no opposition in his bid for a second term as mayor.

Voters of Bronte last Saturday overwhelmingly approved \$135,000 bonds for building a sewer system by a majority of more than two to one. A total of 248 votes were cast, which was considered by city officials to be an excellent turnout. Proposition No. 1, for \$85,000 in revenue bonds, carried 168-80, while Proposition No. 2, for \$50,000 general obligation bonds, carried 168-78.

Mayor J. A. Stephenson said he was most happy that the bond issue carried by such a large majority. He said the city council will feel like going ahead with construction with no qualms about whether or not people here really

want a sewer system. "The people definitely want it, and we were all glad the bond issue received such a large majority," he said.

The council met in special session Monday and canvassed the ballots. Jack Brown, financial advisor on the project, met with the group and preliminary plans were made for sale of the bonds. The city officials said they are hopeful that actual construction can begin by June 1.

Plans have already been made to apply to the Federal Housing & Home Administration for a grant to assist in building the disposal plant. Approval of several thousand dollars for this purpose is almost a certainty, the council has been informed.

Engineers are expected to arrive in Bronte shortly to start work on preparation of plans and specifications which must be completed before bids can be called for.

### Red Cross Drive Lagging in Coke

County Chairman H. A. Springer said this week that the Red Cross drive in Coke County is lagging and more workers and contributors are needed.

Fund Chairman Cecil Kemp reported that \$174.25 had been turned in to him up to Wednesday.

Springer said he still had not secured anyone to take charge of the drive in the west part of the county, but he hopes to in the next few days.

He urged that everyone contribute liberally when called on by the Red Cross workers.

### 1960 LONGHORN SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

Announcement was made this week of the 1960 Longhorn football schedule. A total of ten games will be played, the first five of which are non district tilts, and the last five will pit the Longhorns against their district rivals.

Four newcomers to the Bronte Longhorns are on the schedule for next fall. They are Ozona, May, Roscoe and Roby. Roby is a newcomer to District 6-B, replacing Eldorado which advances to Class A competition this year.

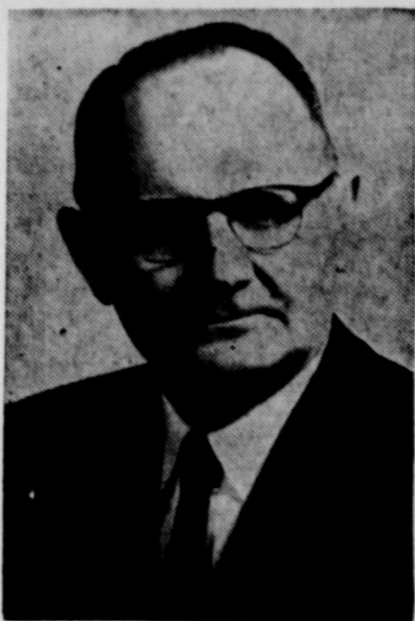

## Judge Joe L. Mays Is Candidate For Re-Election to District Court Bench

Judge Joe L. Mays was in Coke County Tuesday visiting among the voters in the interest of his candidacy for re-election as Judge of the 51st Judicial District. His district includes Tom Green, Coke, Sterling, Irion and Schleicher counties.

A native of Bell County, he came to San Angelo in 1929 after getting his law degree from the University of Texas. He was engaged in private practice for many years. He was elected Tom Green County Judge in 1950 and was appointed

to serve out three months of the term of his predecessor who resigned.

Judge Mays secured the nomination for District Judge in a three-way race in 1952, and succeeded John Sutton on the bench Jan. 1, 1953. He is now completing his second 4-year term.

He married the former Miss Brevard Burk, whose family were long time residents of Tom Green County. They have a son, Joel Mays, who is a petroleum engineer at Monahans. He is married and the father of two children.

Judge Mays has aimed to try cases on their merit, and make his rulings with fairness, prompt-

ness and impartiality according to the evidence.

He appreciates the excellent cooperation he has received from the citizens of his district and especially those who have been called for jury duty.

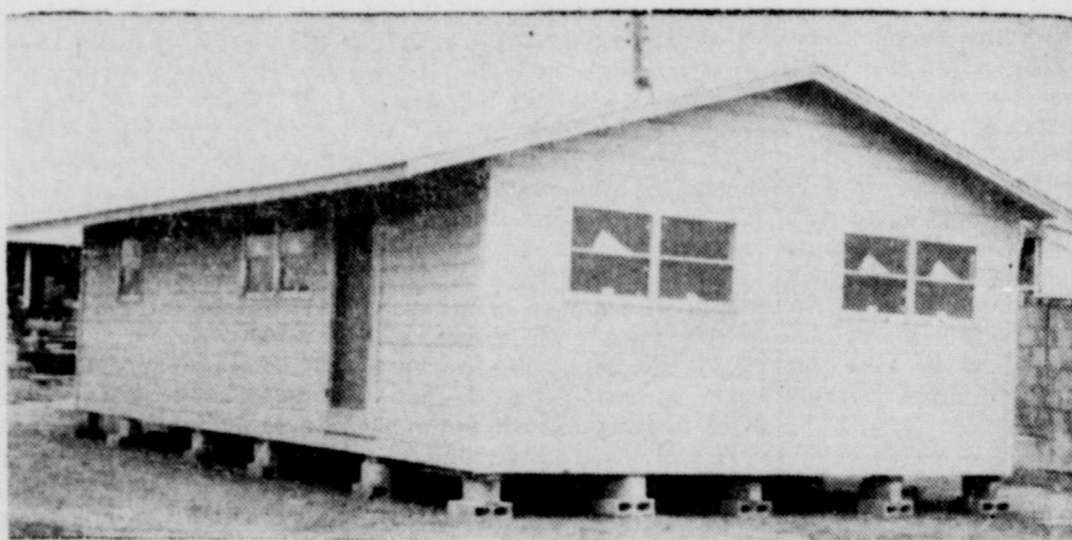

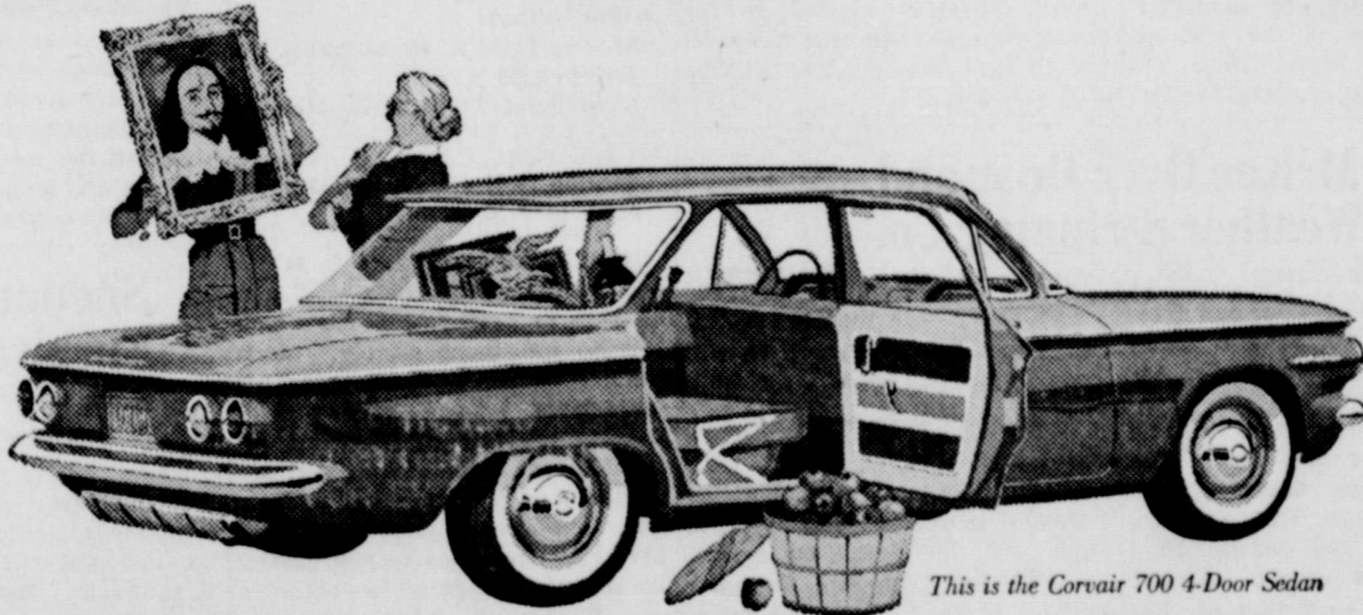
