Benny Corley was high point man for the Bronte high school team and made a total of 42 points. He also set a new district record for high jump, clearing the tape for 5 ft., 9 in.

Bronte also set new district records in the mile relay and the 440 relay, tying in the latter for first place with Sterling City.

## Residents of Bronte Looking Forward to Easter Events

### School to Dismiss For Easter Holiday Egg Hunt Sun. At Bronte Park

Bronte School students will enjoy a long weekend during Easter. Classes will dismiss Thursday (today) at 2:30 p. m. and will resume at the regular time Tuesday, April 19. Thus, students and teachers will have two days off besides the usual Saturday and Sunday.

Original schedule called for three holidays, but the third day was cancelled so that time could be made up for a day when school was dismissed last winter because of icy roads.

### City Officials Discuss Sale Of Sewer Bonds

Three city officials and the city's financial advisor went to Fort Worth Monday to discuss possible sale of sewer bonds with the representatives of the Federal Housing and Home Administration.

Attending were Mayor J. A. Stephenson, Matthew Caperton, H. A. Springer and Jack Brown of San Angelo. The group met with Charles Thomas, the city's engineer, at Fort Worth and he joined them in the discussion.

Mayor Stephenson said they were highly encouraged by the talk with FHHA officials and were led to believe that the agency would buy the \$85,000 revenue bonds, if a commercial buyer is not found soon.

Stephenson also said that application has been made for a federal grant for funds to help defray cost of the sewage disposal plant.

He said that city officials are doing everything they can to expedite the matter, so that construction can begin at an early date.

### Board Members Sworn in Tuesday

Bob Wilson was sworn in as a new trustee of the Bronte School District, and Joe Rawlings and Conda Richards were sworn in to succeed themselves as trustees at a meeting Tuesday night.

Prior to the board meeting the trustees were guests of the homemaking department at a dinner. The food was prepared and served by Mrs. Royce Fancher and her homemaking girls.

Hurlin Lee was re-elected president of the board, and Allen Sherrod was elected to serve as secretary another year. Conda Richards was named vice president of the board, succeeding Luther McCutchen, who retired as a trustee.

The board heard reports from Mrs. Fancher, Miss Dianne Dunklin and Bob Howard concerning the work in their departments. They told of the progress which had been made this year as well as to remark on their problems and needs in carrying out their assignments.

An equalization board, made up of D. K. Glenn, W. H. Maxwell, Sid Evans, and F. S. Higginbotham as alternate, was appointed. Tentative date set for their meeting is June 10 at 2 p. m.

Other routine matters were discussed and bills were approved before the meeting adjourned.

Aubrey Denman, caretaker of the Bronte County Park, announced this week that the annual Easter Egg Hunt at the park will be held again this year. Time has been set for 3 p. m. Sunday.

## Absentee Voting Starts Monday

Absentee voting for the May 7 Democratic primary election will begin next Monday. State law provides that persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 days nor less than three days prior to the election.

Absentee voting is handled in the County Clerk's office. Persons may call at the office in the court house and cast their ballots, while non-residents must send in a written request that they desire to have ballots sent to them.

Since a heavy vote is expected in Coke County this year because of the large field of local candidates, 2,000 ballots are being delivered by the printers to the clerk's office this week.

## 4-Cent Water Conservation Stamp Is Due

The world's first water conservation postage stamp is to be issued April 18 in Washington, D. C., honors rural and urban organizations engaged in small watershed conservation activities, according to W. E. Jacoby, local WUC for the Soil Conservation Service.

The new 4-cent stamp will go on sale at the post office here April 19, the day following its issuance at the Seventh National Watershed Congress in the nation's capital.

The Coke soil conservation district and the Kickapoo Creek watershed association are among the local groups honored by issuance of the stamp. C. N. Webb, chairman of the local SCD, said local groups are attacking water problems where they begin on the farm land where the first water falls, and along the small creeks that form our major rivers.

Mr. Webb pointed out that virtually every community in the country has a water problem of some sort — too much (periodic floods), too little (drouths), or too poor (polluted). In Coke County the main water problems are drouths and periodic floods.

The Kickapoo watershed project sponsored by City of Bronte, Coke SCD, Kickapoo WCID, Coke County Commissioners Court, and Bronte Lions Club, has been planned and approved for operations, and is about ready for signing of easements. It is among more than 210 similar small watershed projects throughout the United States.

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## School Standards Must Improve, Grubbs Tells PTA

Durwood Grubbs, science teacher at Lincoln Junior high school in Abilene and president of the Texas Association of Classroom Teachers, told PTA members Tuesday night that Texas schools must improve within the next two years, or fall far behind in this nuclear and space age. Pointing out that Texas now stands 35th in education, he said that if Texas does not provide for its own public schools, federal aid to education is a must. He also pointed out the difference in federal aid to and federal control of education.

He issued a plea for parents, teachers and administrators to sit down together to work out the problem. He pointed out that parents must maintain a voice and assist in the school program in every way possible. He said that standards for teachers must be more rigid, that teachers must be educated in the subjects they will teach, that they must be relieved of some of the extra duties they are expected to perform in order to have more time to teach, and that they must be provided with more time for adequate preparation and study.

Grubbs pointed out that main problems facing schools today are: that the crop of depression babies, the smallest in our history, now are the teachers and parents of World War II babies, the largest number in our history; that the nuclear and space ages have suddenly been forced on the educational systems in this country; and that we are forced to keep pace with Russia in the education process, or lose the fight for democracy in this country.

Grubb's speech was impressive and well received by PTA members.

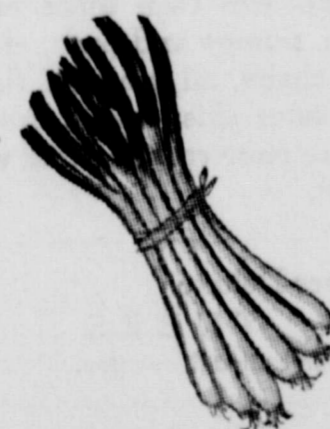
