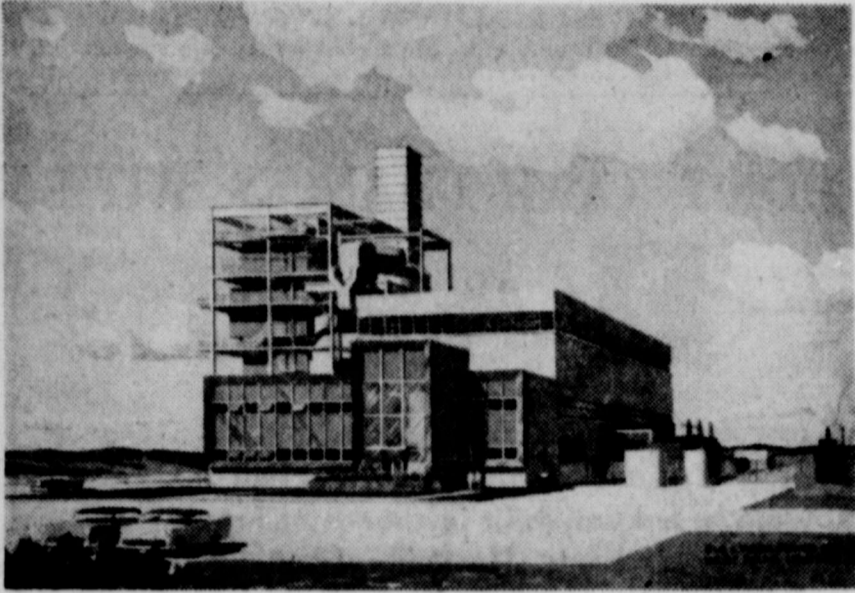

WTU Lets Contract For Oak Creek Plant

The General Contract for WTU's new power plant on Oak Creek in Coke County was awarded last week to Austin Building Company, Dallas, Texas.

The bids were opened in the office of T. J. McCarty, WTU Construction Engineer in WTU's General Office at Abilene.

Six firms submitted bids for the general contract, which included subsurface and above ground construction, the circulating water system including the intake and discharge structures at the lake.

Austin Building Company, Dallas, H. P. Zachery Co., San Antonio, and Templeton and Cannon, San Angelo, were the three lowest bidders in that order.

Construction of the \$10 million power plant will begin May 9. Austin Building Company crews, under the supervision of C. B. Amos, will begin moving into the construction site next week.

The plant which is located about 11½ miles north of Bronte and 3½ miles south of Blackwell is approximately half way between San Angelo and Abilene. The first unit for the plant, a 75,000 kilowatt reheat generating unit, is now being built by General Electric Company. The plant is scheduled to be in operation the early part of 1962.

The plant building itself will be of masonry reinforced steel construction and will be 90 feet by 100 feet and approximately six stories high.

J. N. "Pete" Green will be WTU's resident engineer during the construction.

The bids for the piping installation will be let in August and for the electrical wiring installation in December of this year.

All livestock owners and sheep and cattle raisers are invited and urged to attend.

Henry did not have official returns on the state judging contests held last Saturday at Texas A&M College. He said he felt sure Bronte placed within the top 12 or 15. About 100 of the top teams in the state were entered in the contest. He said he felt the teams had a successful year, making a good showing in the five contests they entered — San Angelo Stock Show, SAC, Sul Ross, Texas Tech and A&M. Individual awards will be made at the end of school awards program.

Democratic Primaries Will Be Held Saturday

Democratic Primary elections will be held all over Texas Saturday, May 7. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Precinct conventions will also be held Saturday, with the Coke County meetings convening at 2 p. m. Complete information on precinct conventions and the county convention May 14 can be found in another story in this issue of The Enterprise.

Only two county wide contested races will be decided by Coke voters. Four candidates are running for the new office of tax assessor-collector and two are in the race for sheriff. Seeking the tax office are O. B. Jacobs, Aubrey Z. Denman, William J. Green and Mrs. Juanita Trimble. Run-

ning for sheriff are Will Percifull and Melvin Childress. Frank Dickey is unopposed in his bid for re-election as county attorney.

Precinct 1 voters have a highly contested race to decide in selecting their county commissioner. Fern Havins, incumbent, is opposed by Alton Roberts, C. L. Sparks and J. F. McCabe, Jr.

Election Party Saturday Night

The Enterprise's biennial election party will be held Saturday night at the newspaper office. A blackboard will be erected on front of the building and votes tabulated from over the county as soon as they are available.

Everyone is invited to attend the Election Party, which will last as long as necessary to determine the outcome of Coke County races.

Cancer Crusade Underway Here

Coke County's Cancer Crusade is underway this week, with workers busy calling on the people of this area. Some of the workers in the Bronte area had completed their canvass Tuesday night, and a total of \$218 was reported up to Wednesday morning.

Workers were urged to complete the drive this week and turn in their money to Ben Oglesby at The Enterprise office. He is in charge of the drive on the east side of the county.

In a meeting last week, County Chairman A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee said he was greatly encouraged by the interest shown in putting over the Cancer Crusade. He said workers had been lined up to work in the Robert Lee and Silver communities, as well as in Bronte.

Kirkpatrick told the workers that "people are becoming more and more interested in finding a cure for cancer, and I believe they will give liberally to this cause."

Anyone who wishes to contribute to the Cancer Crusade and has not been contacted may mail it or bring it to The Enterprise office.

Another race of interest to Coke Countians is the 51st District Judge contest. Judge Joe L. Mays has two opponents, William Davenport and William C. McDonald, in his bid for re-election. All three are from San Angelo.

A. J. Bishop Jr. of Winters is opposed by J. W. (Bill) Moore of Ballinger for State Representative.

Closer to home, A. E. (Pete) Gentry, present constable, is opposed by Oscar Renshaw. No other precinct contests are to be voted on in Precinct 2 this year.

Considerable interest has been shown locally in the Governor's race, in which Gov. Price Daniel is opposed by Jack Cox of Breckenridge. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey is opposed by Don Yarborough of Harris County, and Attorney General Will Wilson has two opponents in Waggoner Carr of Lubbock and Bob Looney of Austin.

Neither Senator Lyndon B. Johnson nor Congressman O. C. Fisher has an opponent. Likewise, District Attorney Justin Kever has no opposition.

Democrats Urged to Attend Precinct Conventions and Pick LBJ Delegates

National Democratic Committeeman Byron Skelton today urged Texas Democrats to vote on Saturday and attend their precinct convention to safeguard their opportunity of voting in November for Senator Lyndon Johnson for President.

Skelton said there are daily indications that Senator Johnson is moving out in front nationally.

"Support in an overwhelming majority of Texas' precincts will give Senator Johnson a tremendous boost nationally," Skelton said. "Texas represents a wide diversity of Democrats, including urban, rural, conservatives, moderates and liberals. Support of even a modest majority of precincts representing this diversity would demonstrate Senator Johnson's wide vote-pulling appeal in the Presidential race."

"To vote for Senator Johnson for President in November, we must first secure his nomination," Skelton added. "Our Texas delegation must be dedicated Johnson supporters who will work energetically and unceasingly for his nomination."

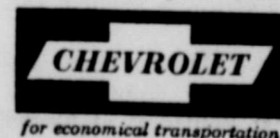

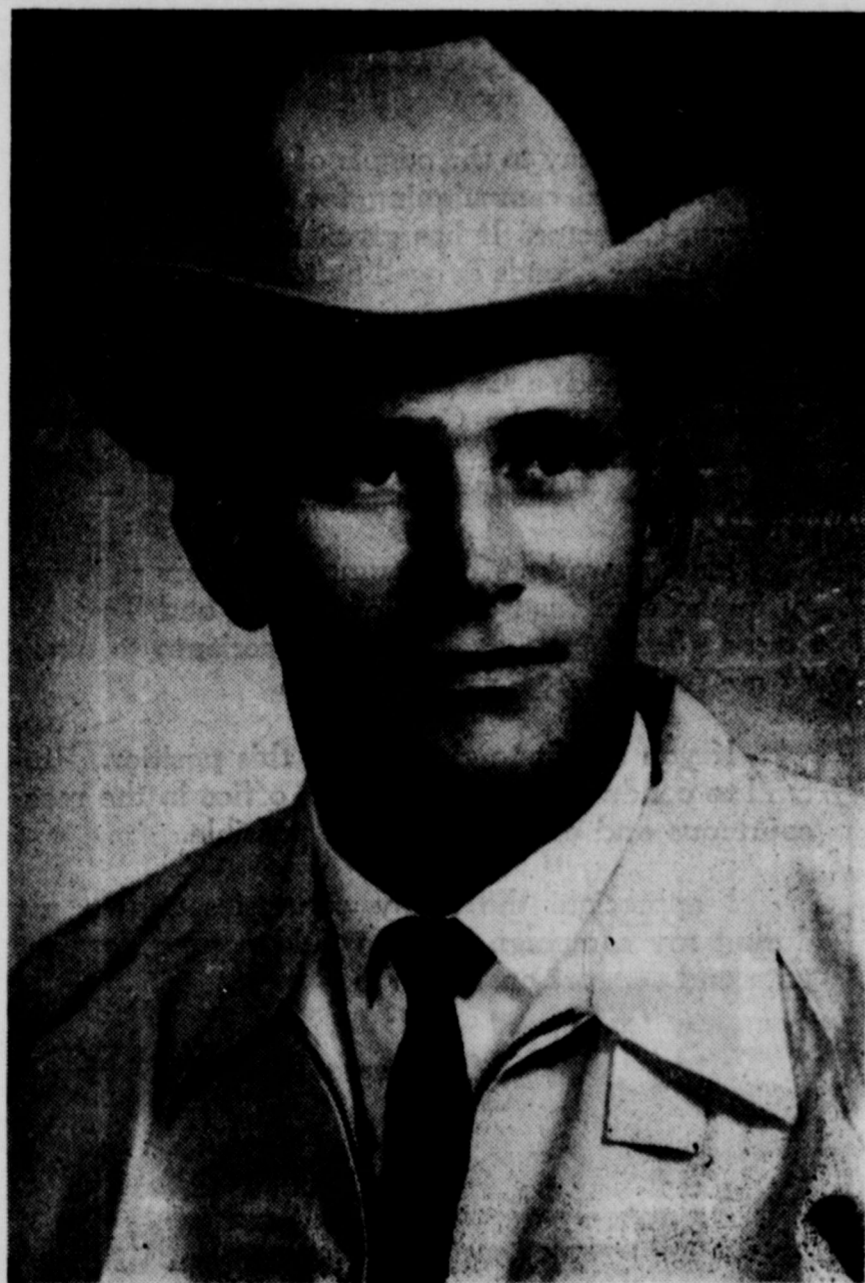

Notice Of Precinct Conventions

Notice is hereby given that Democratic Party precinct conventions in all voting boxes of Coke County will be held at 2:00 o'clock p. m. Saturday, May 7, 1960.

Any legal voter is invited to attend the precinct convention, but he or she must present his poll tax or an exemption certificate with the word "DEMOCRAT" stamped upon it.

This is a new law and must be observed by persons holding the precinct conventions. Persons exempt from paying a poll tax will be furnished a certificate when they vote which will qualify them to sit in a precinct convention.

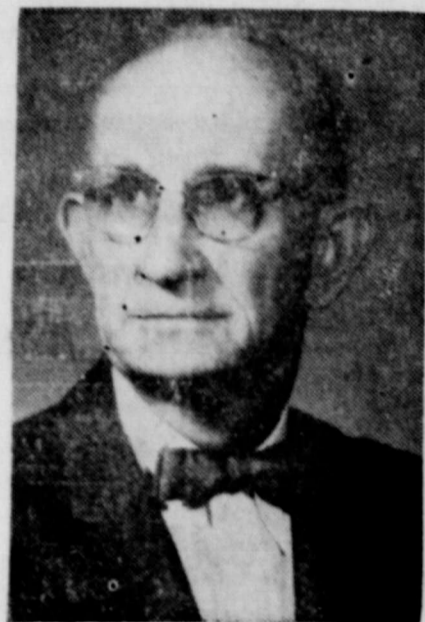

Johnson Says Congress Has Good Record

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson said Sunday that the "batting average" of Congress is better than usual this session. Johnson, in a radio report re-

corded for broadcast in Texas, had as a guest on his weekly program Senator Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.).

Together, the two Senators discussed achievements of the Congress and briefly outlined major work still to be done.

"We have come to expect each year about this time some charge that Congress has done too much or not done enough..." Johnson said.

Looking to the immediate future, Johnson predicted that before the session is over "we will pass an amendment to the Social Security Act, we will have some good farm legislation, we'll pass a good housing bill, we will pass some form of medical care bill for the aged and aging that will protect the doctor-patient relationship. We'll pass a minimum wage bill."

The Senate Majority Leader also predicted the Congress will enact space legislation as recommended by the President.

"In addition," he said, "I think that we will pass a good bill through both houses in connection with mutual aid that will be an improvement over any other bill passed."

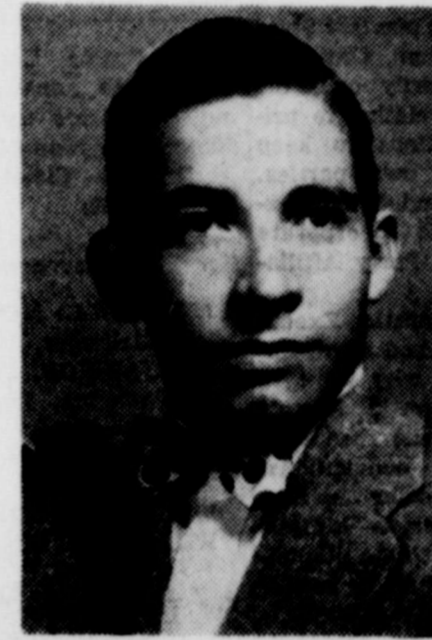

Republicans Must Stay Out Demo Primary

Texas Republicans today were bluntly informed that the Democratic Primary on May 7 is open to Democrats only.

A "GOP Keep-Out" sign was erected by State Democratic Chairman J. E. Connally of Abilene.

Connally declared: "The purpose behind the State's new 'Party Affiliation' law is to keep members of one political party from participating in the affairs of another party."

"A person who votes in the Democratic Primary on May 7 will have his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate stamped 'Democrat,' and this affiliates him with the Democratic Party. He cannot then participate in the Republican Party during the poll tax year."

"The policy behind this new law was laid down at our last State Democratic Convention. Our platform on party integrity calls for strengthening laws relating to primaries and conventions to keep people within their own parties. The Legislature amended the Texas Election Code to incorporate this policy under a 'Party Affiliation' law."

"The State Democratic Executive Committee has had many inquiries from people who want to vote in the Democratic Party's primary on May 7, and then take part in Republican conventions. This can't be done, under our new laws. A person affiliates himself as either a Democrat or a Republican on May 7. He can't be both."

Connally pointed out that the primary election judges are required, under the law, to stamp "Democrat" on all poll tax receipts, exemption certificates or affidavits of loss. A stamped certificate of affiliation will be furnished those who aren't required to have a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate.

The political conventions are open only to those who have affiliated themselves with a Party. In the case of Democrats, a person must vote in the May 7 primary in order to attend his precinct convention, be a delegate, or hold any Party office.

A basic plan was worked out last week with Glenn Waldrop on his ranch about 20 miles west of Robert Lee. This plan includes a conservation cropping system, cover cropping, crop residue use, contour farming, and terraces for the cultivated land. The pasture practices include proper use and deferment. Working with Waldrop was Montie Wallace, Range Conservationist with the local SCS office.

O. T. Colvin is pitting and seeding about 20 acres of pasture land on his farm west of Blackwell. Originally Colvin planned to do 45 acres when he signed a Great Plains contract in June of 1958. But a recent check showed that he had obtained sufficient recovery of native grasses by deferment and proper use to reduce the acreage. The remaining 20 acres is being seeded to a mixture of grasses including Blue grama, KR bluestem, Sideoats grama, and Green sprangletop.

District cooperators have found that recent rains have been sufficient to start germination of grasses planted on root plowed pastures. A check made last week on the D. K. Glenn ranch east of Bronte showed Blue panicum to be germinating and making good

growth. Glenn has removed all livestock so not to destroy the small seedlings.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS AND NATURAL GAS SERVICE TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITH IN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the first day of May, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Bronte by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

- Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.53.
 - First 1 MCF @ \$1.760 per MCF gross; \$1,584 per MCF net.
 - Next 1 MCF @ 1.482 per MCF gross; 1,334 per MCF net.
 - Next 3 MCF @ .927 per MCF gross; .834 per MCF net.
 - Next 20 MCF @ .649 per MCF gross; .584 per MCF net.
 - All Over 25 MCF @ .593 per MCF gross; .534 per MCF net.
- Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. THE fact that there is an imperative need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three

separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor. PASSED AND APPROVED on

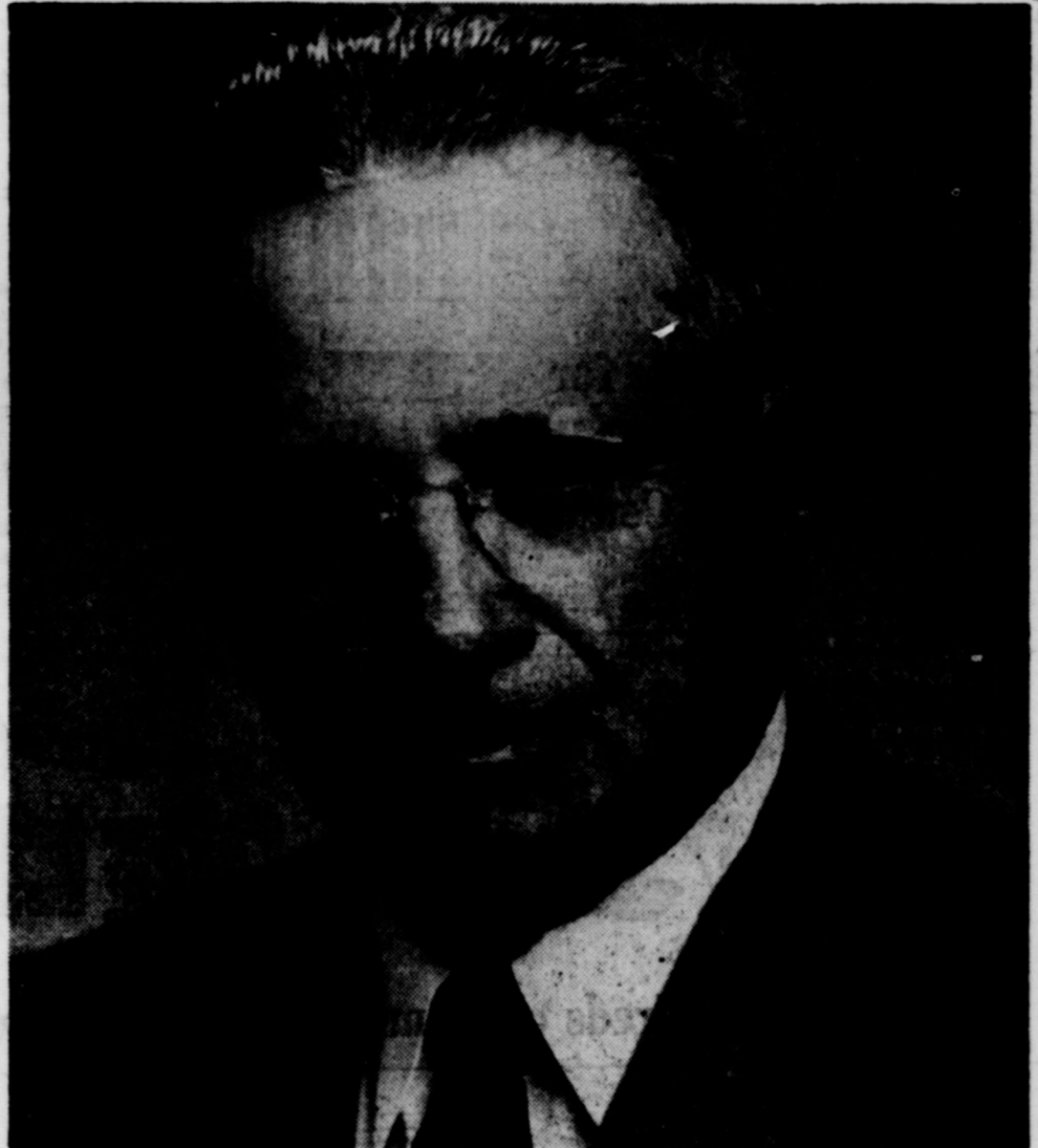

If Elected District Judge, I Will:



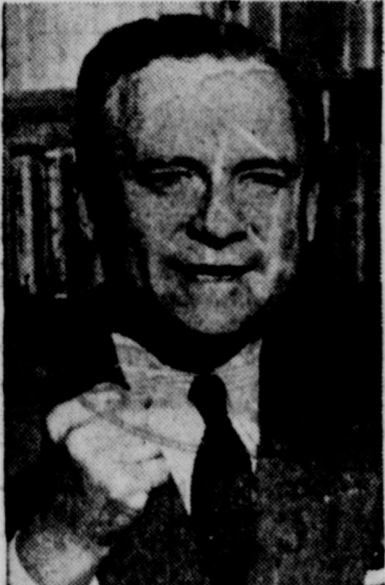

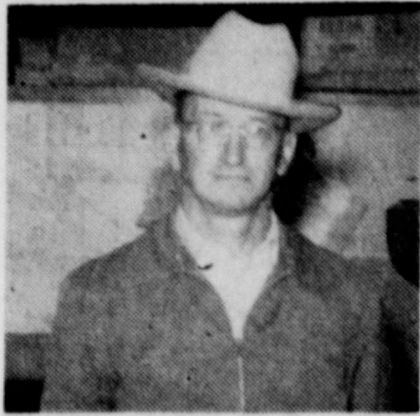
MORE GOOD RAIN

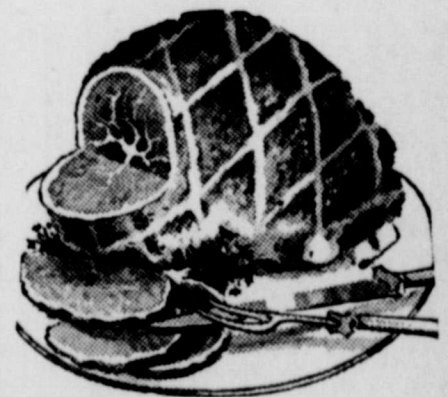
