WTU Officials Meet with Lions

Six executives of West Texas Utilities Co. met with the Bronte Lions Club last Thursday to discuss the new power plant which the company is building on Oak Creek Lake.

Present were four men from Abilene, Si Phillips, vice president; John Hutchinson, chief engineer; Ed Hamilton, engineer; Col. J. N. Green, engineer in charge of the Oak Creek job; Lige Ruble, district manager of Ballinger; and Jay Garrett, sales manager of Ballinger.

Hamilton and Green spoke to the Lions and told them some of the details of construction, size of the plant and other interesting data. They reported that all contracts would be let to firms using union labor, but said they felt sure there would be a large number of jobs available for local residents, when unions failed to provide required laborers.

The WTU men said that at least 200 men would be employed on the project during the peak of construction, and that an estimated 121 persons, including children, would be connected with the permanent operation of the plant.

The general contract for the \$10 million plant was recently let to Austin Building Co. of Dallas. The plant will be approximately 11 miles north of Bronte. Lone Star Gas Co. will run a 12 inch line to the plant to supply fuel for the generating units.

New schedules for the pool this year will include a ladies swimming morning each Tuesday, opening at 9:30 and a late night schedule on Thursday when the pool will not close until 9 p. m. It will be open from 2 until 6 on Sundays; 2:30 until 7:30 on Wednesday; and 2:30 until 8 on other evenings.

Census Shows Bronte Has 994

Preliminary census figures released by W. G. Stacy, district supervisor for the Bureau of the Census, shows that Bronte lost 26 people in the last five years. The release reported 994 for Bronte, and the official figure in 1950 was 1020. At least one more person will be counted in the official total who was not reported in the above figures and city officials are hoping that enough persons were away from home during the month to boost the official total over 1,000.

Figures released for Coke County show a big increase to 5539. Many local persons say they feel sure that this figure is incorrect, as they feel sure the rural population has not increased.

Rev. Lester Vinson will give the

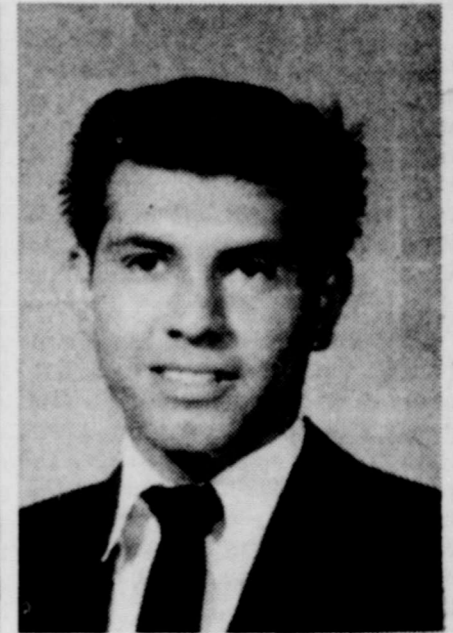

Record Number Vote In Primary Election

A record turn-out of more than 1500 voters cast their ballots in Coke County last Saturday. A new sheriff was nominated and a runoff developed for the office of tax assessor-collector. Coke County stayed with Gov. Price Daniel, who was victor in his bid for a third term. This county back the loser, A. J. Bishop, by an 81 vote margin, over the winner, J. W. Moore, for state representative. Coke voters also gave Judge Joe L. Mays the most votes over two opponents for district judge. Precinct 2 voters elected a new constable.

Melvin Childress is the nominee for sheriff. He won over Will Percifull by a vote of 891 to 618. In the race for tax assessor-collector, O. B. Jacobs received 745; Aubrey Denman, 278; William J. Green 141; and Mrs. Juanita Trimble 354, leaving a runoff between Jacobs and Mrs. Trimble.

Here in Precinct 2, Oscar Renshaw polled 281 to Pete Gentry's 145. In Precinct 2 Ollie Roe defeated Lloyd Phelan, 498 to 331. Precinct 2 Commissioner Fern

Havins received a majority over three opponents in his bid for a second term. Havins polled 425; Alton Roberts, 239; C. L. Sparks, 76; and J. F. McCabe Jr., 89.

Democratic Convention Saturday

The county Democratic Convention will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the courthouse at Robert Lee. Delegates were elected to the county convention last Saturday at precinct conventions.

Bronte is entitled to nine delegates and the following were named: Clark Glenn, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Boecking, Mrs. Robert Forman, Edward Cumbie, Noah Pruitt Sr., Mrs. Barton Waldrop and Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn. Robert Lee is entitled to eight delegates, Silver has two, and each of the other county voting precincts has one.

The precinct conventions at Robert Lee and Bronte passed resolutions endorsing Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for president of the United States, thus assuring a majority of county delegates for the senator. Reports of action on this matter from the smaller boxes was not available.

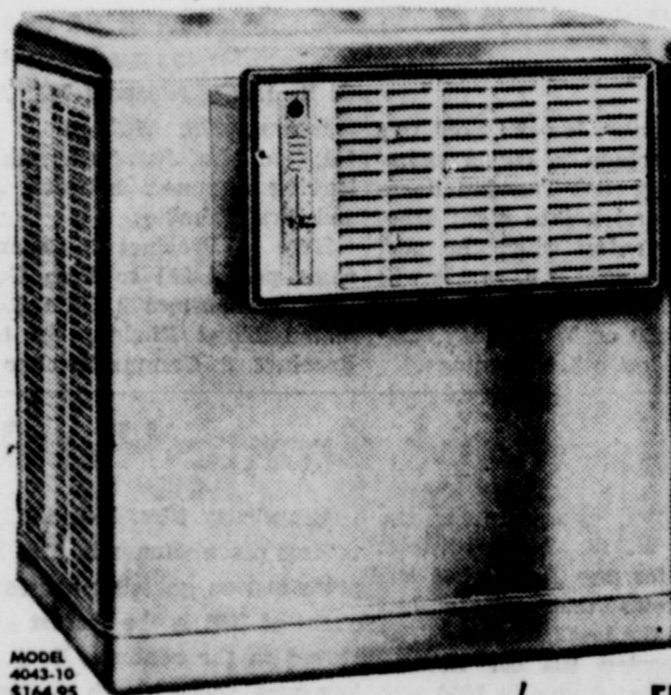

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Recent rains have brought up some grasses on the chiseled and seeded area on the J. D. Harmon place west of Robert Lee. Grasses seeded were green sprangletop, plains bristlegass, sideoats grama and blue panicum. The grasses that seem to be germinating best at this time are green sprangletop, and plains bristlegass.

Aerial spraying of mesquite on the Arledge ranch north of Sanco is showing good results. In a count of 100 trees on a representative area, only 13 were green or had sprouted by April 27. For best results, aerial spraying should be done following a rain and not earlier than 40 days nor later than 90 days after the first leaves appear.

Any grass seeding remaining to be done should be completed as near May 15 as possible so that seedlings will have a chance to get some growth before hot weather.

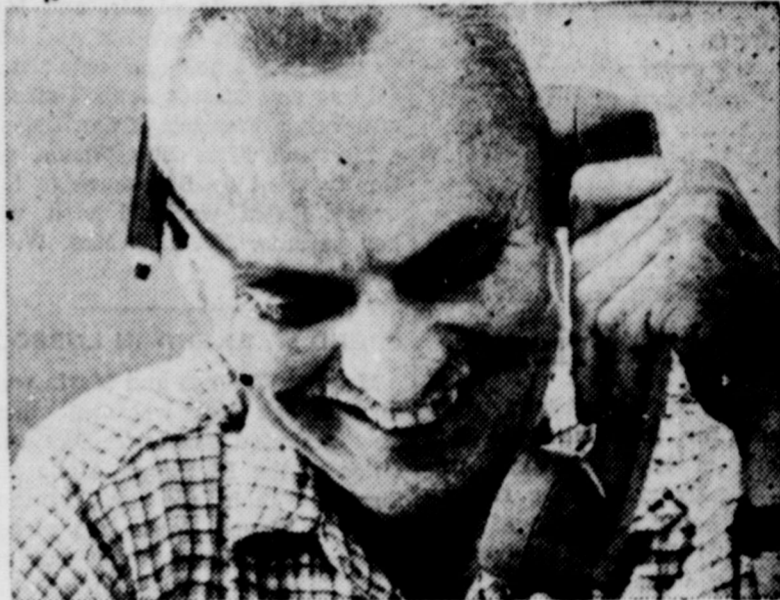

And still in the fourth grade we grew so large that the next year, the principal had to arrange for two brave teachers to teach us. In the fifth grade, Mrs. Mayo taught about a dozen of us. I guess we were so mean that she figured she couldn't handle any more. And poor Mrs. Johnson had to put up with the remaining 20. She must have had the meek little angels, for she was back the next year.

And then in the sixth grade, now that was an eventful year. We not only dwindled down to 32, but it seems I recall a certain incident when D. W., an inquisitive little chap, asked his teacher a question and she demonstrated the answer rather than telling.

But such was the life of any of us innocent little 6th graders.

But in the 7th grade, it was different. We were big stuff, the boys started playing football and the girls started making fools of themselves by falling all over the basketball court. But it was fun. Mrs. Baker stuck that year out with us.

By this time we had established quite a name for ourselves, in fact, to be exact, we were known as the most destructive, nerve-racking, intolerable class in all of the Bronte school. But what did we care, we were in the 8th grade, ready to go into high school, that is, if we dared hope that we could make it. It was a struggle on that important day at the end of school, we not only had the pleasure of being the first 8th grade graduating class in the new auditorium, but the following students received diplomas:

Ensor, Linda Henry, Armilda Hester, Neta White, Jean Moore, June Moore, Dixie Sharp, D. W. Sims, Richard Spencer, Jerry Wilkins, Kenneth McCutchen, Bobby Wrinkle, and Brenda Corley.

As little tots, I can remember when we used to see the football boys and the basketball boys play in the games, and we wondered if we would ever get to high school. We used to see Mr. Flores, Mrs.

Fancher, Mr. Simpson, and Mr. Henry and wondered what it would be like to sit in high school classrooms and study high school subjects. Well, now we were finding out, for at last we were Freshmen. One September morning in 1956, we found a bunch of us called Freshmen of Bronte High School, and did they make fun of us! As we think about it now,

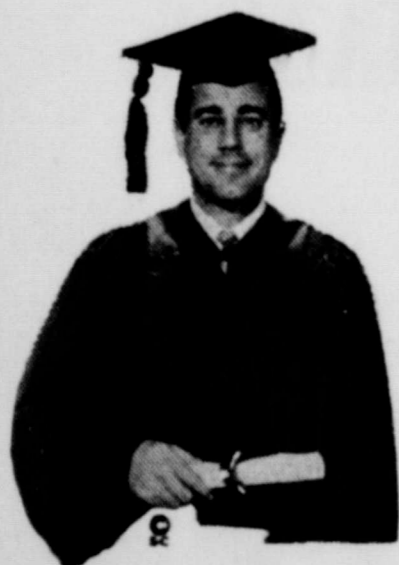
