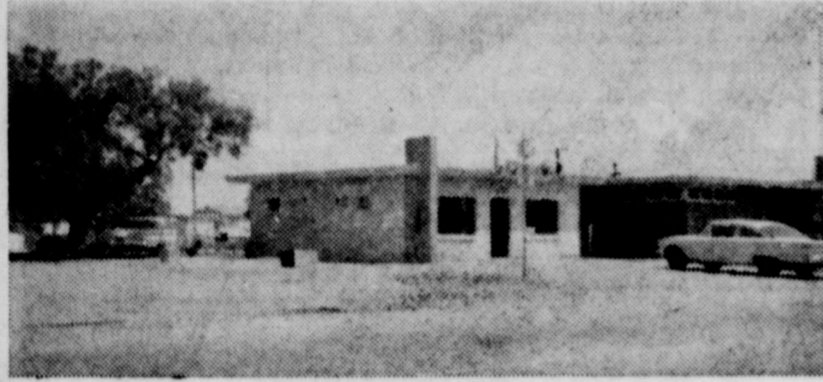

## New Patterson Pharmacy Sets Formal Opening for Saturday

Formal opening of the new Patterson Pharmacy will be held Saturday. The firm opened for business Wednesday morning after installing fixtures and stock the first of the week. The new store, owned by Wayne Patterson of San Angelo, is located immediately north of the Harris Clinic and Bronte Hospital.

Patterson issued an invitation to everyone in this area to visit the new pharmacy Saturday. He said free coffee will be served and that he wants to get acquaint-

ed with as many people as possible during the opening.

Patterson, who is a registered pharmacist, said the store will

be a prescription pharmacy, with only a limited number of patent medicines. "We will handle only those over the counter items that people expect to buy when they come in to have prescriptions filled," he said. Sick room supplies will also be sold. No cosmetics and other such items will be handled, he added.

The building housing the new store is owned by Dr. John R. Harris, and Patterson has a ten year lease on it. Lewis Sweet of Blackwell was contractor. It is 25 x 30 feet and of tile construction, designed to blend in with the adjacent clinic and hospital buildings. The floor is covered with asbestos tile and slim line lighting is used throughout.

Fixtures are all new and were designed and built especially for the building. They are the latest design and are arranged to give the customer quick easy service, Patterson said.

Mr. and Mrs. Patterson presently reside in San Angelo where he has been in the pharmacy business for many years. He said this week they will build a home on Oak Creek Lake north of Bronte just as soon as possible. The Pattersons have one daughter who is a student in the University of Texas.

Patterson told *The Enterprise* Tuesday that he is proud of the new business and that a more up-to-date prescription store cannot be found in the state. "We hope that this store will be an asset to the community, because we want to be a part of the Bronte community ourselves," he said.

## A Quarantine Against Rabies Now in Effect

Vaccinations of dogs and cats at the four designated places in the county on May 30-31, totaled 165. This figure is far short of the more than 800 vaccinated last year when rabies was so threatening.

The Robert Lee area led with 60 pets being immunized, while the Bronte area was next with 50. Forty turned out in the Silver area and 15 at Tennyson.

A thirty day restraining period beginning with the day of the vaccinations is in effect to make the program more effective.

The detention period enhances the program by allowing the vaccine to immunize the pets before they are given free run and also permits time for the removal of strays that would be a menace in the event of an outbreak of rabies.

## Scout Shakedown Before Jamboree

Three Boy Scouts from Coke County who will attend the National Jamboree in Colorado in July, went to Camp Sol Mayer last Thursday for an over night shake-down. All Jamboree Scouts from the Concho Valley group were on hand with their leaders to have equipment checked and get the feel of camping at the big event next month at Colorado Springs.

The shake-down camp got under way at 2 p. m. Thursday and closed at 2 p. m. Friday. W. T. Roach accompanied his son, Billy Rankin and Clark Godwin from Robert Lee and Eddie Glenn of Bronte was accompanied to Sol Mayer by his father, D. K. Glenn.

Over 50,000 Scouts and their leaders from all the 50 states will attend the Jamboree the third week in July.

## O. B. Jacobs Winner Of Tax Assessor Race

O. B. Jacobs won the nomination for county tax assessor-collector in Saturday's Democratic runoff election. He defeated Mrs. Juanita Trimble by a vote of 672 to 408.

The turnout of nearly 1,100 voters for the second primary was a surprise, since the tax office and a Criminal Appeals Judge were the only contests. More than 1,500 votes were cast in Coke County's regular primary May 7.

Four candidates in the race for the tax office split the vote. Although Jacobs led the field then he failed by a few votes to get the required more than 50 per cent of the votes cast, and a runoff resulted.

The May 7 result was Jacobs 745 votes, Trimble 364, Aubrey Denman 278 and William J. Green 131.

The contest for Judge of the Criminal Appeals Court resulted in W. T. McDonald having an edge of 493 to 484 over Judge

Lloyd W. Davidson, who was seeking re-election. McDonald won the state office by a small majority.

Jacobs is expected to be elected in November and take over the tax office Jan. 1. For the first time in many years the sheriff and tax office will be separated in Coke County, voters having approved the separation at an election two years ago.

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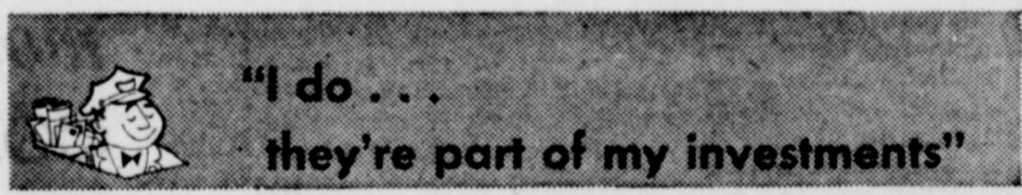
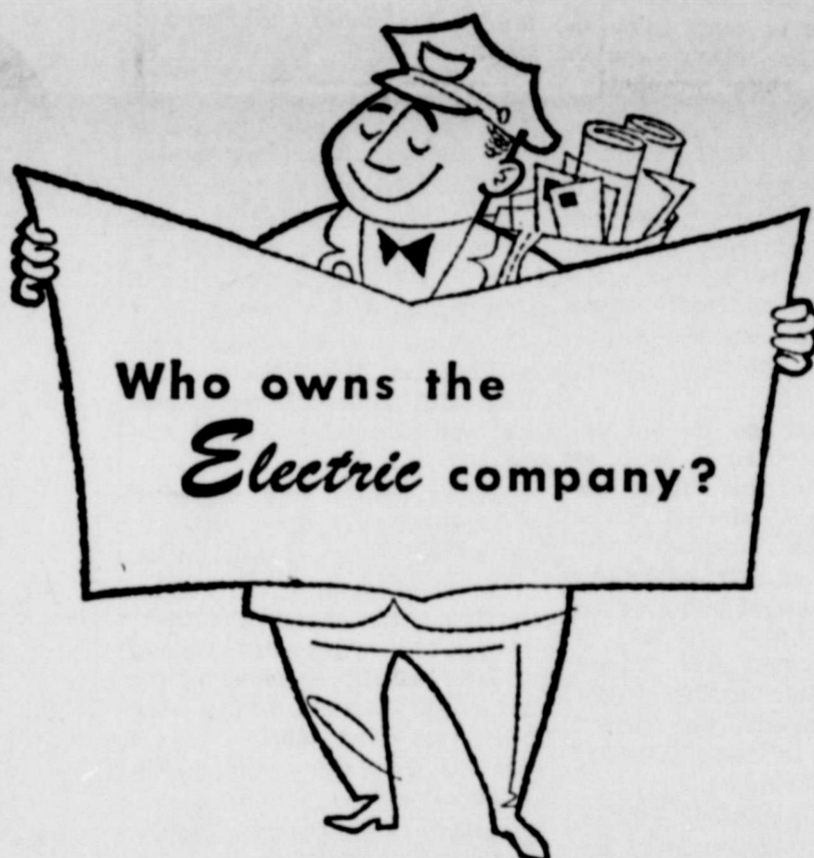
