Funeral Services For Donna Estes, Burns Victim

Funeral services for Donna Marie Estes, 14-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Estes, were held Sunday afternoon at Blackwell Baptist Church with the Rev. Kenneth Jones, pastor, officiating.

The little girl was fatally burned Thursday afternoon when she was playing in the bath room and apparently opened a gas jet. When enough gas accumulated to reach a nearby hot water heater, an explosion occurred, burning the girl. She was rushed to the Simmons Memorial Hospital in Sweetwater where she died early Friday.

She was born April 30, 1959, in the Simmons Hospital. Survivors in addition to her parents are four step brothers, Larry and Wayne Estes and Bill Presslar, all of Blackwell, and Tommy Estes of Ballinger.

Pall bearers were Jerry Ware, Thurman Self, John Tubb and Rex Reagan.

Burial was in Blackwell cemetery under direction of Cate-Spencer Funeral Home of Sweetwater.

Hail and Tornadic Winds Cause Heavy Damage West of Bronte

Hail and tornadic winds did many thousands of dollars worth of damage in an area west of Bronte last Wednesday night. Countless tons of falling ice cut leaves from trees, battered roofs

and covered the ground making it look like a winter snow storm. Automobiles traveling through the area bogged down in the banked up hail until it was cleared by maintainers.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Vic Haselden, northwest of Bronte, was a total loss. The roof was blown off and walls of the tile structure were cracked in a number of places. The couple was not seriously injured. The tornadic winds also did considerable damage further south on the Wendland Ranch.

More than two inches of rain fell in Bronte, but the hail stopped just west of the Humble Camp, before reaching town. High winds

also swept through town, but no severe damage was reported.

The hail swept area commences about the Hayrick road which turns off on the west side of the J. A. Percifull place and extends west to beyond seven-mile hill to the vicinity of the place of Binks McCutchen.

In addition to loss of grass and damage to land, a large number of sheep were reported killed in the area. McCutchen's loss was heavy. He also reported that wildlife on his place took quite a beating in the storm.

The area most severely pounded by the hailstorm looks as if it had been burned by a heavy frost, as the trees have no leaves and all vegetation on the ground looks dead.

An actual dollars and cents estimate of the damage is hard to make, since there is no way of knowing how much damage was done to the land. Some folks are of the opinion it will take several years for the grass to recover from the pounding ice.

Mr. and Mrs. Haselden have already moved in a new house to replace the one destroyed by win. They moved in Sunday.

Electric power failed in Bronte for more than an hour during the storm.

Another thunderstorm struck the vicinity Tuesday night, with brilliant lightning and a brief period of strong winds. Little moisture was recorded, however, and no damage had been reported up through Wednesday morning.

William Alonzo Payne was born in Mississippi Aug. 18, 1882. After coming to Texas he resided at Talpa in Coleman County a short time and had been a resident of Coke County since 1904. He and Miss Mary Clawson were married in Robert Lee April 2, 1911. In 1914 they bought a farm between Robert Lee and Bronte from Jim McCutchen and this has been the family some since.

Mr. Payne was a good friend and neighbor and leaves a wide circle of friends who extend sympathy to the bereft family.

Surviving are his wife, four sons, Barney Payne of Ft. Worth, Lonnie and Lloyd Payne of Robert Lee, and Morris Payne of Andrews; two daughters, Mrs. Alta Snyder of Van Horn and Mrs. Irene Reed of Andrews.

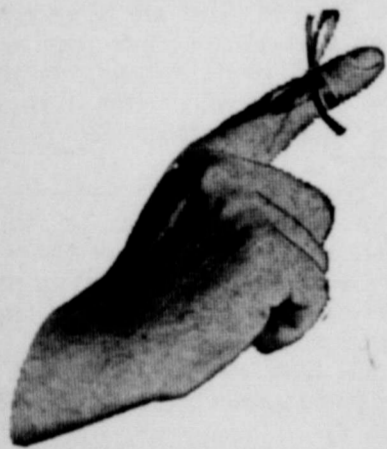

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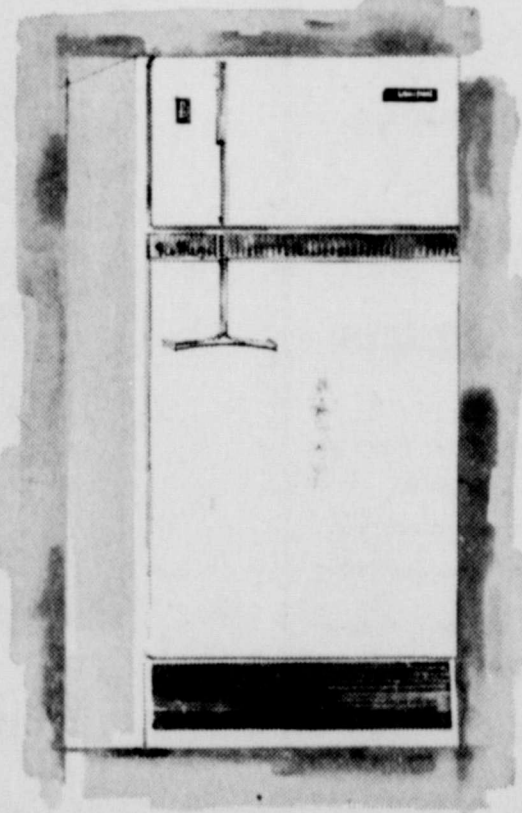

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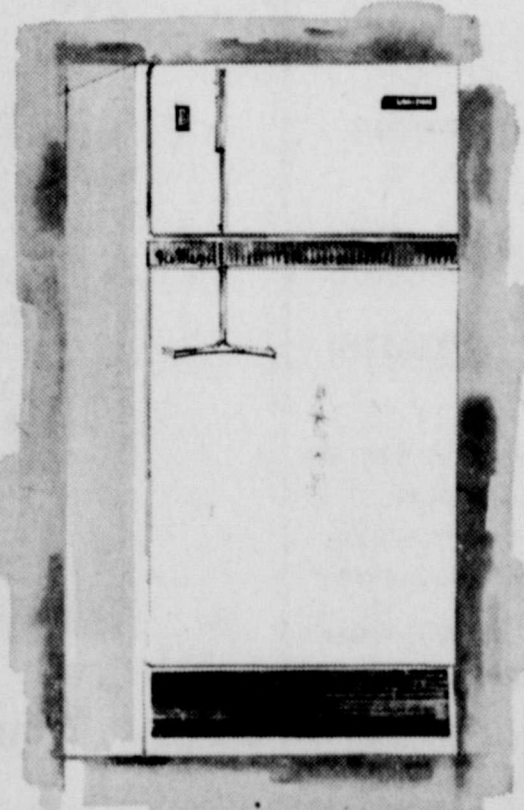

Mrs. Brunson wore a powder blue sheath dress with pink accessories and a white carnation corsage.

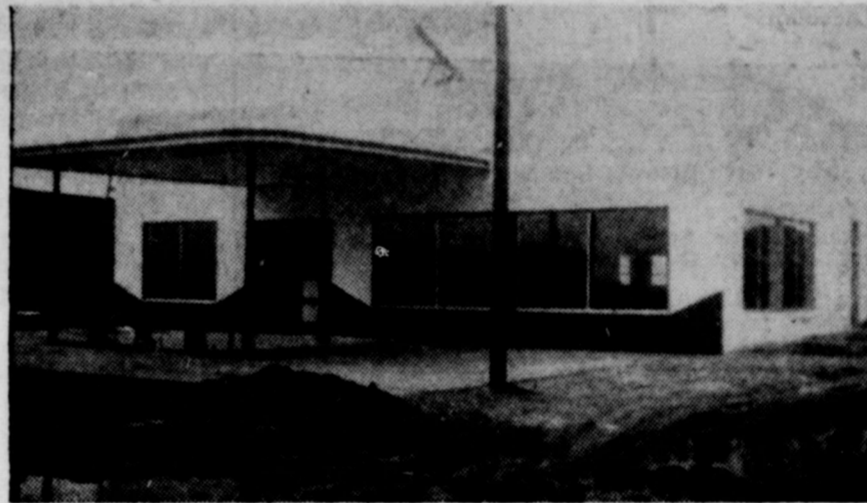

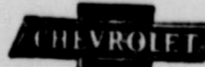

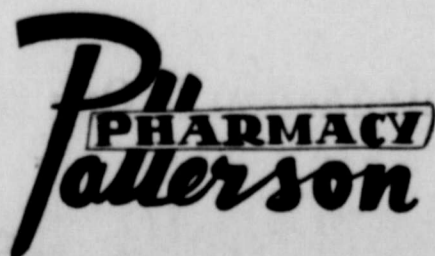
